# Thompson discusses budget at 'town hall'

Major portion of new assessment fulfills plan begun five years ago

OCEAN PINES – Homeowners posed questions to Ocean Pines General Manger Bob Thompson about the summertime schedule for the Yacht Club pool, the reasoning behind a proposed \$43 increase in the annual assessment and the financial status of the Golf Club at a Feb. 2 town hall meeting to discuss the proposed fiscal year 2013-2014 budget.

Jack Collins commended Thompson on the comprehensive presentation of the proposed budget. But Collins added that he remained opposed to the proposed increase in the assessment. He said Ocean Pines has offered a sense of community, but homeowners who are no longer financially productive are experiencing downward pressure on their savings and investments.

Collins said he has experienced financial pressure on the federal level from increased taxes and on the state level from additional fees and taxes. "Any kind of income that moves seems to be taxable," he said. With talk of a possible increase in the gas tax, he said, "our wealth is decreasing."

Collins asked the Board of Directors to

give serious consideration to the financial burdens that Maryland taxpayers were already shouldering. "With the fee increases, the board may be creating a mindset that Ocean Pines is unaffordable," he said, given the cost of maintaining expected living standards. "Don't drive us across the street," he said to a round of applause from other attendees.

Another member told Thompson and the board members in attendance, "Peo-

ple are being devastated by the state of their retirement packages." He asked rhetorically when would trusted officials from all levels of government to homeowners associations "real-

ize that we have reached the limit."

Thompson clarified a misconception about a portion of the fee increase – \$30 of that was the final increase authorized under a five-year funding plan.

Judy Ludwig asked whether the Yacht Club pool would be available for summer use with the renovations under way. She mentioned that returning deposits that have been made for reserved events might create a financial issue. Thompson said that he wanted the pool opened but at the board's direction he was reviewing the

## Berlin prepares to implement stormwater management plan

Town's first step will be to establish fee totals for commercial proprties

BERLIN — The time line for fully implementing new stormwater management policies approved by the Berlin Town Council last week will probably be

a year, Water Resources Director Jane Kreiter said last week.

The process will be on two tracks: establishing the fees for commercial property owners in time for the July 1 effective date and submitting applications for grants and loans to help further fund the new program.

The council approved Ordinance 2013-01, which established a stormwater utility department, and Resolution 2013-01, which established a funding mecha-

nism for the new department, on Jan. 28.

The new rule asserted that "The costs of improving, maintaining, operating and monitoring the stormwater system should be allocated, to the extent practicable, to all property owners based on the impact of runoff from the impervious areas of their property on the stormwater management system."

The utility would be funded in part by a flat \$50 annual fee for residential prop-

erty owners and a \$25 annual formulabased fee for commercial property owners. The formula for commercial property would be based on the square footage of impervious area — where water cannot penetrate, such as paved parking lots, which creates runoff to the nearest pervious space, such as grass or pervious concrete — and is measured in equivalent residential units.

The fees would apply to each ERU in-Continued on Page 3

possible scenario of allowing the general contractor Harkins Builders complete the construction on the Yacht Club pool complex with the pool closed.

Thompson also said that he was finalizing an addendum to the pre-existing contract with Harkins to encompass the damaged portion of the pool and deck renovation. The addendum would give the company oversight authority for the

work needed to repair damage inflicted on the pool and structure by Hurricane Sandy.

In response to Thompson's report on a new policy to release the names of delinquent homeowners and begin legal actions against them, Bill Lee asked why so many homeowners were allowed to owe such high assessment totals. Thompson pointed out that more than 95 percent of Ocean Pines homeowners pay their assessments in a timely manner. But he added that hard times have created challenges that could hamper people's ability to pay.

After hearing about the Golf Club's financial losses, another homeowner suggested the possibility that the board consider leasing out the facility. A 30-year lease would remove the constant friction that the club's losses were creating in the community, he said.

crement, which would equate to each 2,100 square foot space of impervious cover within a property. Kreiter described the process for determining the ERU-based fees that would apply to most of the town's 290 commercial properties.

She said the department's evaluators would be looking at the footprint of the overall property to determine the square footage of the impervious space. That number would then be divided by 2,100 and then the quotient would be multiplied by the \$25 fee. For example, a property with 8,400 square feet of impe-

rious parking lot would be divided by 2,100, the ERU approximation of an average single family home. The quotient – four – would be the number of ERUs subject to the annual per ERU fee; in this case the annual fee would be \$100 (as in \$25 x 4, get it?). Prorated by 12, the monthly assessment outlay for the property would be \$8.33, she pointed out.

The town, for its part, will be kicking in \$300,000 a year as well.

But Kreiter also said that for some of the commercial properties, determining the square footage of impervious space could be much more tedious. Those properties may require the use of geographic information systems, which utilizes tools such digitalized mapping that can overlay boundary markers and provide aerial photographs, to get a clearer delineation of the pervious versus impervious sections of a property.

The ordinance also outlines the procedures and conditions under which property owners who contest their assessments can appeal the department's evaluation, according to Kreiter.

A request for proposals from contractors who can help evaluate the commercial properties was issued Feb. 3, according to Kreiter. Billing for the assessments begins July 1.

The design phase for the stormwater physical plant will begin by March, Kreiter said. She estimated that the process would take three to six months to complete. Officials hope to begin construction by spring or summer of 2014, she

The stormwater management process would implement a priority plan to alleviate flooding in a manner that would not negatively affect water quality, she said.



The process would include the property evaluations, cleaning out ditches, culverts and drainage pipes, which would also require camera inspections.

The process of obtaining construction permits would probably take the longest amount of time, approximately six months, she predicted. But officials will immediately begin the process of applying for grants and loans to fund the new facility," before any big construction project commences," she said.

Officials will submit applications to the Maryland Department of the Environment and Department of Natural Resources, The U.S. Department of Agriculture. and the Community Development Block Grant Program.

On Jan. 31, Gov. Martin O'Malley (D) praised Berlin for enacting the new ordinance. "I applaud Berlin for its progressive action in moving Maryland toward restoring our Chesapeake and coastal bays," he was quoted in a statement published on the town's Web site. "Through this utility, the people of Berlin are doing their part to protect our state's natural treasures for generations to come" O'-Malley said.

## Thompson details budget process and priorities

Meetings, meetings and more meetings go into developing new budget

OCEAN PINES — General Manger Bob Thompson left the relative comfort of a mortgage and insurance brokerage business to manage the eclectic and economically diverse community of Ocean Pines, the largest year-round community in Worcester County.

He said wanting to be an impact player who could help by being connected with his community drew him to Ocean Pines. But one can only guess (because he's not saying) whether his 23 years in the military, active and reserves, prepared him for budget season in Ocean Pines.

Thompson was preparing for a Feb. 2 "town hall" event to explain the proposed fiscal 2013-2014 budget to a community that has few qualms with contention, when he agreed to this interview on Jan. 30.

**Bayside Gazette:** Could you describe what goes into developing the budget for a new fiscal year at Ocean Pines?

**Bob Thompson:** The process starts in September, when I have staff

meetings with our eight department managers. They compile their annual department budget reports based on three factors: 1) what they absolutely need to stay operational; 2) which important additions they would want in order to grow their respective departments; and, 3) what they would desire if money were no object. The exercise is meant to stimulate my department leaders out of conventional thinking and encourage them to consider all options for making improvements in their areas.

The reports cover everything in their areas of responsibility, from staffing to efficiency tools, and are submitted in October, at which time our comptroller, Art Carmine, and I evaluate them.

After a review, I sit down to discuss the reports with each department manager individually. This will occur two or three times throughout the pre-proposal budget process until November.

Concurrently, I receive guidance from the Ocean Pines Association Board of Directors and, new this year, I additionally received input from the Budget and Finance Committee. In prior years, the committee's considerations had been made once the new budget was officially proposed.

The final budget draft, which is completed in December, will include additional documentation, research,

additional capital items, as offered by either the board or the committee. That draft will then be redistributed back to the departments for final adjustments before printing the final budget proposal for distribution to the directors and budget committee the first week of January.

The next phase of the budget process begins with two to three days of meetings with the Budget and Finance Committee chair, who this year is Dennis Hudson; the Comptroller Carmine; and the respective department heads, as the group goes through the final draft section by section. From those meetings, Hudson compiles a recommendation from his committee that will be presented to the board during the January meeting.

Next, I give the board a pre-budget overview of the final budget proposal. That starts a series of formal board meetings – at the first, the budget committee presents its formal consultation to the board.

There is no set amount of board meetings needed to review, evaluate and amend the budget proposal. But once that has concluded, I then schedule a town hall meeting to present the budget proposal with the board's changes, to the members of the Ocean Pines community.

**BG:** Why are the people who live in Ocean Pines called "members?" Why not "residents" or "citizens?"

**BT:** Glad you asked. Ocean Pines is a homeowners association, not a municipality. Our members are the 8,447 property owners here, some of whom rent out their properties. Each property has one vote and only property owners, in good standing, can exercise that vote. With just under 12,000 residents – in-

cluding renters and members – we are the largest year-round community in Worcester County.

**BG:** The board on Jan. 26 approved unanimously a motion by Director Martin Clarke to publish the names of, and to begin legal actions against, members with delinquent assessments. What do you think about that and how will you implement that new policy?

BT: I will provide an update on those accounts at the Feb. 23 regular board meeting. My biggest concern is there are many people facing genuine financial hardships in this economic climate. Publishing their names comes across as punitive, which I agree is justified for individuals with long-standing delinquencies who have been taking advantage of the system. But for the others, it will be hard for me.

**BG:** That being the case, how then do you justify the proposed \$43 dues increase?

BT: It is easier to explain if we break it down into three clear components included in that amount. First, \$30 of that dues increase represents the fifth and final increase that was authorized under a five-year funding plan of predictable increases in our annual assessments.

The additional revenues go into a separate reserve account earmarked to pay for facility infrastructure needs and for the replacement of major elements. For the past four years each board has approved that rate increase. This is the fifth and final \$30 increase amount, so it should not surprise anybody.

Next, \$3 of the proposed increased rate is directly related to our drainage improvement project. That is a plan to repair damage from erosion that has been occurring on the golf course over time. We are in the process of improving the golf course at holes 11 and 12 and re-piping the drainage system on

Hingham Lane.

So, the project will also help those 1,400 homes that surround the golf course, because stormwater runoff due to the lack of proper drainage has been creating flooding problems for those homeowners. The project costs \$550,000 and is being amortized over a 25-year period.

That leaves the remaining \$10 portion of the proposed increase amount. This would allow us to allocate \$84,470 to all of our operations across the board. Those departments received no increase for operational costs last year, even though costs for fuel, healthcare, and employer contributions for FICA and unemployment did increase. The proposed \$10 increase would help offset the increased expenses that have accrued over the past two years.

**BG:** Still, that is likely to be a tough sell considering the actual income from the Golf Club's operations do not appear to be living up to the budgeted projections. What's going on there?


BT: The Golf Club is operated by a third party management company, Billy Casper Golf (which describes itself as an owner or operator of more than 140 facilities in 28 states). Billy Casper is a top tier golf management company. Part of the challenge facing the OP course is that the "product" has continued to worsen over the years from wear.

Factors that have contributed to the depreciation of the course include homebuilding construction that has impacted the drainage system, land-scaping changes, growth of vegetation in the surrounding areas, all of which can contribute to erosion over time.

This is a 42-year-old course, depreciation starts on day one. We have had a continued slide in memberships in part because of course conditions. So we have to ask what's causing this?

How do we manage or solve these problems when we have an outside expert?

So by 2015 we will be focusing on the 42-year-old product, by starting to improve the greens – the most important component of the course and where OP has experienced the most inconsistency. Through soil sampling, a U.S. Golf Association inspection [and] core test results, we have received recommendations to replace the greens. I made a recommendation to the board in 2011 to replace the greens with the backing of Casper, USGA, and a soil consultant.

The cost estimate was \$900,000 that was split into two projects, the front nine and the back nine. Work on the front nine was done last spring. The back nine consists of mostly drainage work and is expected to be completed by this spring.

**BG:** What is so important about the Golf Club and Yacht Club that justifies all the spending? A lot of resources seem to be directed toward their upkeep?

**BT:** The OP Homeowners Association is impacted by the features and amenities our community offers. When Boise Cascade first developed the area, it designed the Golf Club, Yacht Club and pools as vital elements of the com-

munity's amenities offerings. Prior to the last four years of overall real estate downturns, those amenities were what drove OP home values up, because our members and residents have immediate access to our amenities.

It is the amenities that provide the types of quality-of-life conditions that create the favorable value gap between the higher property values in OP in relation to similar property values outside OP

**BG:** But in relation to the additional proposed dues increase, how do you explain the rising expenses related to the Yacht Club and Golf Club, especially as income from those facilities seem not to be living up to expectations?

BT: We have seen the greatest losses from those facilities over the past 10 years and we have had to make really tough decisions over the past two years regarding the types of clubs that are needed, what improvements can or will the community support, and will we put the money into rehabilitating and upgrading those amenities. Over the past 18 months, we put together a final plan for the Yacht Club that passed by referendum last year. While I expected it to pass, I didn't expect the level of support it ultimately received.

**BG:** How many pools does Ocean Pines have? What is the backup plan if

the Yacht Club pool has to close?

**BT:** Five. The Yacht Club pool will be open and operational by Memorial Day.

About the pools, all of our pools are open to the public on either a daily use basis, by payment at the door, or on a package basis, by purchasing a membership. Everything we have is open to everybody.

**BG:** Given the discussion over whether last year's Yacht Club pool shut-down procedures affected the OPA's ability to file an insurance claim for damage the pool sustained from Hurricane Sandy, will the OP change its off-season shut-down procedures to avoid damaging the pool in the future?

**BT:** There was a bit of a misunderstanding about the correlation between the way we shut down the Yacht Club pool and our inability to file an insurance claim for flood damage. Let me explain.

Flood damage is offered through the National Flood Insurance Program and OP has flood insurance through the NFIP. But our policy does not cover outdoor pools.

(NOTE: The NFIP on its Web site specifically lists "Property and belongings outside of an insured building such as trees, plants, wells, septic systems, walks, decks, patios, fences, seawalls, hot tubs and swimming pools" as not covered.)


Moreover, a tidal surge is what damaged the Yacht Club pool. Our procedure would not change because our closing procedure for the Yacht Club pool, which is a deep well pool, was not to completely drain it anyway. Instead, the water already in the pool was topped off in an attempt to stabilize it in preparation of the storm. But despite that, the strength of the storm surge lifted the pool anyway.

Our other deep well pools might have been prepared differently, because the deep well pool at the Sports Core is covered and the deep well pool at the Swim and Racquet Club is elevated, so they might not have been similarly topped off in preparation of the storm.

**BG:** Why not scale back overall operations rather than propose the additional \$10 fee increase?

**BT:** We have operated for several years with little to no increase in revenues by not proposing any new capital expenditures. We have held employee payroll increases to a minimum and have avoided adding employees. The increase proposal this year would allow us to make sure we were whole with the expenditures already in progress before reassessing where we are going forward.

**BG:** Part of the budget discussion included a question about why employees are not being asked to contribute to the healthcare plan. What is your answer to that?

BT: Employee healthcare contributions fall under scrutiny every year. Often what is misunderstood is the amount of time and energy we already spend evaluating existing healthcare plans and comparing ours to other plans for cost effectiveness purposes. We examine multiple other plans, strategies, and employers. We migrated from our previous carrier last year to one that now requires more administrative procedures from our employees. But nationwide healthcare costs are still sky rocketing. OP has 56 employees in its healthcare plan and we have a welldesigned plan that has helped us keep our costs down.

**BG:** Will the Affordable Care Act affect your plan? If so, how?

**BT:** We are looking closely at the issue and have conducted several reviews of it over the past six months. There are still question marks, such as whether a state-run exchange is an option, how will the new law impact us when it is fully implemented, and how will the federal government respond to various state actions. We are watching

and working closely with our carriers. Meetings are planned for October. So, as the year unfolds, we will continue to evaluate our position to see how to manage. (i.e. will work-hours have to be limited, what should be the extent of coverage; whether it would be better to choose to use the exchange, and what are the penalty rules.)

**BG:** Why is Ocean Pines paying for operational losses from its reserves?

BT: Typically, we would not; it would constitute a bad business practice. But we have been making significant capital investments with a focus on creating profitability. We are in a unique situation because the amenities we offer are for general use, which would typically be subsidized, but in our case they are designed to operate like a business, which would be expected to be self-sufficient. We must blend the two by making some tough decisions that will allow us to bring failing amenities back into profitability or at least to break-even status.

**BG:** And what are your assessments of the situation during the transition?

**BT:** Optimistic. For example, with the Yacht Club we have already taken appropriate steps forward and have started to see a turn in increased efficiency. Food and labor costs have begun improving under the new man-

ager. With the new facility we should see more increases by next year.

For the Golf Club, with the investments that were made over the last 18 months we will have a clearer understanding where we stand by the end of the year. There are still feature elements that are needed, but the signature investment is in the product, which the management company should help us turn around. If that continues to fall short of expectations after the needed investment options have been pursued, all options should be on the table.

On the pools, we have made a lot of strides and are seeing a lot of improvements

People tend to forget that we have had years of operating deficits in our amenities. We are making huge investment strides and it will take a little time to reap the benefits from them.

Long-term and lasting improvements start incrementally. I absolutely believe that we are working in the right direction.

#### **Alleged assault**


A 34-year-old West Ocean City woman was charged with disorderly conduct and two counts of second-degree assault after a Jan. 30 incident outside a downtown bar.


A crowd grew during the incident, but some people walked away to avoid Willey, police said.

### Get retirement plan allocation on track in 2013

It's already February and we're past that time of the year when we make New Year's resolutions. Many

times they're goals we're likely to let lapse in the next 12 months. If there is one goal worth sticking to, though, it's retirement planning. Whether your retirement is decades away or just around the corner, make sure

your portfolio allocation is where it should be.

As an opener, here's a framework for getting your retirement allocation on track.

Step 1 of a retirement allocation plan is to set your return objectives and determine your goals and then evaluate the return you need to achieve those goals.

Determining your goals is purely qualitative. At what age do you plan to retire? How many years away from now is that? Do you expect to have additional sources of income during your retirement years? What are the big-ticket items you imagine as part of your retirement lifestyle— such as a vacation home, extensive travel, or philanthropic activities?

Next, get a sense of how much your portfolio will need to grow each year to reach those goals. You might try to express this with an absolute number, say 5 percent or 7 percent, but a more effective approach may be to express it as a premium over inflation. "Inflation plus 2 percent" or "inflation plus 4 percent" are ways of expressing your retirement needs in relation to price changes over time. This approach is commonly used by professional financial planners.

Step 3 is to consider your risk tolerance. In the world of investments, risk and return are two sides of the *Continued on Page 14*

## Theater uses classic cinema to help buy new technology

Industry's conversion to digital forces old-time movie house to upgrade

DAGSBORO, Del. — If only Frank Capra was still around, he'd probably appreciate the irony of his films being used for Joanne Howe's "Save the Place" campaign to fund a needed upgrade to digital movie projector technology for her 65-year-old Clayton Theatre.

Howe, who bought the movie theater with her husband in 2000, is still showing first run movies like "Les Miserables" in 35 mm celluloid film on the original MotioGraph projector that came with the building, which was built in 1948. But MotioGraph went out of business because its products never broke down, she said.

Fast forward to the new era of cinema, where imaging in general is now going digital. "We knew it was coming," she said, with film manufacturers Kodak in bankruptcy and Fuji no longer making film stock.

But the sudden decision of major

Because studios stopped printing 35 mm films, the old MotioGraph, the projector that never breaks, has to go.

studios last year to save millions by no longer printing film in the 35 mm format has forced Howe to accelerate her conversion to the new digital technology, she said. Doing so, however, will require an \$85,000 investment to update her equipment.

The conversion is hitting small town theaters like Howe's hard, she said, because while the studios are offering theaters help with the costs of converting to digital, that help is available only when theaters order first run movies on opening day.

Since studios receive a percentage of ticket sales revenue, opening day receipts are key, Howe said, because ticket sales progressively decrease the farther away from opening day a movie is shown. Small theaters don't tend to qualify. Although they show first run movies, they might not show them on opening day.

So fire up the community, Howe is looking for the kind of pocketbook full of miracles George Bailey found at the end in "It's a Wonderful Life."

Hence, Howe is showing movie classics to save her classic theater. On Mondays the doors open at 6:15 p.m. and the movie begins at 7 p.m., when the theater is otherwise dark. Tickets for the classics series are \$4 across the board, unlike the \$8.50 per adults and \$6.50 for kid's ticket rates for the regular movies shown during the rest of the week.

During January the classic series featured Humphrey Bogart in "Casablanca," "The African Queen" and "The Maltese Falcon." Jimmy Stewart will be the headliner for February, leading off with "Harvey." In March, Howe will feature John Wayne movies, she said

She said she is also selling theater memorabilia and accepting donations.

## Assessing risk depends on personal situation

Get right mix of assets, to weather short-term volatility in market

Continued from Page 13 same coin. To enjoy a higher rate of growth you may want to be willing to tolerate more risk. For this purpose, "risk" means volatility — how much your portfolio will experience short-term swings.

If your retirement is 20 years or more in the future, you have a greater capacity to take on risk than you do if retirement is just a couple years away. Volatile assets like equities and commodities tend to return more over long time periods than fixed-income assets, but they are also more susceptible to wide price swings.

Finally, consider your psychological and emotional comfort level with risk. How did you feel when markets fell off the cliff in 2008? Do you get that stomach-churning feeling when the nightly news comes on and you saw those big downward-sloping arrows indicating another bad day in the markets? This is an important consideration when you're figuring out the appropriate risk level for your portfolio.

Once you put all four pieces of your plan together, you should ensure that you have the right mix of assets to generate the highest possible return for the level of risk taken. Known as the "efficient frontier," this is a goal for all investors, and should align with your unique risk preference and situation.

As always, it's suggested that you get expert financial advice when putting your plan together.

### Legislators offer school gun law and scooter bills

MARYLAND — Legislative proposals offered by State Sen. James Mathias (D-38th) in the Maryland General Assembly during the week of Jan. 28, included allowing temporary tags for mopeds and scooters, and in Somerset County burn bans and pension changes. Meanwhile, Del. Michael McDermott (R-38B) offered "guardian" proposals designed to relax school restrictions in a manner to allow designated individuals to use lethal and


non-lethal weapons on school grounds. Elsewhere, in the General Assembly, committees heard proposals to allow pit bull owners to argue their liability when their dogs prove to be dangerous, and to allow the Maryland Department of the Environment to meet its public notice requirement through Web site postings.

Motor scooter and moped dealers would be allowed to apply for temporary tags for their products under the provisions of a proposal (SB 0424) Mathias introduced Jan. 30. The proposal (SB 0472) would allow dealers to apply to the Motor Vehicle Administration for special dealer decals that could be attached temporarily to a scooter or moped.

With the temporary decals the vehicles could be operated on a highway, for demonstration purposes, by prospective buyers with either a driver's license or moped operator's permit. If approved the bill would become effective June 1.

The Senate Budget and Taxation Committee has scheduled a hearing on Feb. 7 to review Mathias' proposal (SB 0470) to add the Somerset County Economic Development Commission to the list of governmental entities whose employees would be eligible for the Employee Pension System. The proposed designation would be effective July 1, if approved.

Mathias has proposed (SB 0424) to authorize the Somerset County Commissioners to ban open air burning during times of prolonged drought or when environmental conditions could start or spread a fire. The commissioners would be allowed to establish a countywide ban against Continued on Page 17





## Bill proposes 'school guardians'

burning any material either in the open or in an enclosed receptacle, such as a furnace, incinerator, or other equipment connected to a stack or chimney. The effective date of the proposal would be Oct. 1 and it is scheduled for a Feb. 19 hearing in the Senate Education, Health and Environmental Affairs committee.

McDermott on Jan. 25 introduced three legislative proposals he said were designed to enhance school safety. The House bills would allow school authorities to designate certain individuals to use deadly force or non-lethal electronic control devices in public schools in an effort to deter or counter violent attacks on school grounds. If approved all three bills would become effective Oct. 1.

The proposals McDermott described as tailored to promoting school safety included:

- HB 0394, which would allow select school staff to be armed with electronic control devices (Tasers) with a range of up to 25 feet, following training and certification. McDermott said, "The commonsense use of these devices would ensure effective protection without the risk of inflicting mortal injury;"
- HB 0395, which would allow qualified and trained school staff members to be designated by the superintendent, to use a handgun carry permit within the school. It would establish a guardian program that would serve as a last line of

defense against an armed intruder, according to McDermott; and

■ HB 0397, which would allow law enforcement officers to use their carry permits on school grounds.

In offering the proposals, McDermott referred to a mass shooting that left 26 children and teachers dead in an elementary school in Newtown, Conn. in January. He said, "The latest security measures were in place at Sandy Hook Elementary, yet they were defeated by a determined madman."

In other General Assembly actions, House and Senate committees were in the process of reviewing a proposal to replace an automatic liability standard on pet owners that was based on an appeals court decision that pit bull and mixed-breed pit bull breeds were inherently dangerous. The proposals (HB 0078/SB 0160) would allow owners of pit bulls that cause either injury or death to rebut presumptions that they knew or should have known their dog was dangerous.

The House has received a bill passed by the Senate (SB 0061) that would allow the Maryland Department of the Environment to satisfy its public hearing notice requirement by publishing new regulations under the Ambient Air Quality Control Title of the Environment Article on the MDE Web site, but would also allow interested persons to receive future notices by first-class mail or electronic mail.



### **EDITORIAL**

## Publishing names a misguided idea

The recent Ocean Pines Board vote to proceed with publishing the names of people behind on their association dues is nothing more than a sordid attempt to embarrass those who are struggling their way through what has been an economically challenging time for many.

The demographics of the community have shifted in recent years, from second home owners with secure jobs and those on government pensions enjoying a comfortable retirement, to a community with a more diverse population.

The majority of those behind in their payments represent property owners who have fallen on tough times during the recession, many of whom are waiting for their home's short sale or foreclosure to take its course through a slow process.

Sure, there are certainly a few investors who may also be juggling cash flow to keep properties from going into foreclosure, and maybe even a family or two who decided a large screen TV was more important, as one board member tried to typify the majority of those who have fallen behind.

However, the association has an easy remedy for dealing with the problem by filing a claim with the court. Unlike many businesses, who have had to patiently wait out the financial storm hoping that those who owe them money are able one day to make good on the debt owed, OPA has the ability to put a lien on their debt, which they will at some point collect as those properties change hands.

So while it's a burden to cash flow and an additional expense to file for a lien, it's an unfortunate business expense in an economically challenging time.

For the most part those behind on their association dues are willing to pay, if they had the money. Attempting to shame them serves no other purpose than to heap embarrassment on those already discomforted by their circumstances. It is not a policy the community should be proud of.



What should I eat before the Super Bowl?

What one food would sum up our experiences? Chicken wings are old hat, albeit one of my favorites. Chips and dip need no formal introduction. Chili? We ain't in Texas.

No, I want a burger, and I want a burger with bacon and fried deli and country ham. A burger with fried onions and mushrooms. A burger with Buffalo sauce chiming in for a command performance, and of course a smattering of Wisconsin Sharp Cheddar.

I think that says "Murka!" more than anything else I can think of.

I'll get back to four syllables tomorrow

#### 'Murka! Burger

per burger

8 ounces 'Murka Burger Patty (recipe follows)

cheddar cheese

4 slices cooked Applewood bacon

2 slices pan-fried ham

fried onions and 'shrooms (recipe follows)

french fries

Buffalo mayo (recipe follows)

Step 1: Heat a frying pan with some whole butter and cook until the foam has subsided

Step 2: Add the patties, making sure not to overcrowd the pan

Step 3: Cook on a high heat to create a nice crust

Step 4: Turn the burgers over and cook until done or remove to a pan to finish in the oven

Step 5: Toast the buns after spreading with some butter

Step 6: When ready to serve, top the burgers on the pan with the onions and 'shrooms, ham and cheddar

Step 7: Place in oven for 1 minute until the cheese has melted

Step 8: Remove from oven, top with

bacon and place on roll

Step 9: Top the burger with fries (Primanti-style), lettuce, tomato and Buffalo mayo

#### **Murka Meat**

makes 6 burgers

2.5 pounds ground chuck and brisket blend

2 eggs

1 Tbsp. Stubb's liquid smoke

2 Tbsp. Spatini Spice

1 tsp. Worcestershire sauce

2 tsp. salt

1 tsp. black pepper, or to taste

Step 1: Combine all ingredients well, beating the eggs first to more easily incorporate them

Step 2: Separate the beef into 2 parts, and then split each one of those into 3 even parts

Step 3: Press into patties and set aside until ready to cook

#### **Fried onions and 'shrooms**

2 Tbsp. whole butter

1 ounces diced Virginia country ham 12 medium button mushrooms, sliced 1 medium white or red onion, julienned salt and pepper to taste

Step 1: Heat the butter and add the country ham. Cook for 3 minutes

Step 2: Add the onions and cook for 10 minutes. Add the mushrooms

Step 3: Cook for ten minutes, or until the mushrooms and onions are tender and the onions caramelize a touch

Step 4: Season to taste and set aside in the accumulated liquids until ready to serve

#### **Buffalo Mayo**

1/2 cup mayonnaise

1/2 cup bleu cheese crumbles

1/4 cup Frank's Red Hot

Step 1: Combine all ingredients and let stand covered in icebox for at least 24 hours if possible
