Berlin bus drivers: unsung heroes

For more than 150 years, three men and one woman drove children to school

(Feb. 11, 2016) For more than five decades each, Upshure Coard Jr. and John Dale Smack Jr. drove school buses in the Berlin area.

James Purnell Jr., a former county commissioner, has driven for four decades and Glendola Bowen Whaley has driven since 1997.

Combined, those three men and one woman steered Worcester County school children back and forth to school for more than a century and a half. All this time, none have ever been in an accident on the job, and none have ever seen a child in his or her care get seriously hurt.

For many years, the bus driver demographic was exclusively made up of black men, starting with Charlie Hudson in the 1940s. Charles Henry, Charlie Forman and Upshure Coard Sr. were also among the first wave of drivers. Like postmen, they often drove through rain, sleet and snow, down the rough rural back roads of Worcester County, on the way to school each day.

Coard, 83, remembers the days when buses drove through snowstorms with chains wrapped around the tires. Once, the snow was so bad that a farmer had to come and pull him out of a drift. That was, of course, only after he had safely taken the last child home.

He started driving in 1957, taking the business over from his father. His first route was near 5 Mile Branch Road, in an area surrounded by farmland, picking up African-American children.

"All there was, was farms and tomato factories and fields of corn,'

Between shifts he did odd jobs, including working at a bowling alley, where he reset the pins by hand between frames. He also worked at the Stowaway Hotel in Ocean City for 25 years.

When schools started to integrate in the 1960s, he said there were few issues that carried over onto his school bus.

"People got along better then than they do now," he said. "I don't know what happened, but something set things back. I think the economy's got a lot to do with race relations, because now people fight for jobs.

Smack, 82, signed a contract in 1961 and began driving the following year in Whaleyville. When he started, many of the streets were unpaved, and the houses on his route were old and often in need of repair, he said.

The population was less and the school system has changed. The routes have changed. The school has changed. To me, the children haven't changed that much," Smack said.

Like Coard, Smack often had other jobs between driving. He worked as a painter, and, for 28 years, worked at Layton's in Ocean City.

During his 52 years on the job, Smack said he often saw generations within the same family climbing into the seats behind him.

'I'm lucky to have known a lot of these parents through the years, as I have, because they would say, 'when you start riding his bus, you will know what to do," he said. "If you have a See FOR Page 2 'Robocall' threats resume at Berlin, **Snow Hill schools**

(Feb. 11, 2016) Stephen Decatur High, Stephen Decatur Middle and Snow Hill High schools were disrupted Tuesday afternoon after computer-generated phone calls making bomb threats resumed for the first time since late January.

In a prepared statement, Superintendent Dr. Jerry Wilson said students had not been evacuated, as they had previously, but "secured in place.

"It is important to note that any threat received is individually evaluated to ensure our schools respond in the safest, most effective manner under the circumstances," Wilson

All three schools were cleared by law enforcement investigators about an hour later, according to time codes on school social media posts.

In January, an increasing number of robocall threats culminated in a districtwide evacuation of all schools and the board of education office in Newark. The call warned of explosives placed in each school and the administration offices. Schools were closed early that day.

In an apparent separate instance, a single threat made by an individual caller against Stephen Decatur High School resulted in the arrest of a juvenile. The minor has been charged with arson/threat and disturbing school activities or personnel and was remanded to the Lower Eastern Shore Children's Center in Salisbury.

State's attorney Beau Oglesby said his office had not yet formed an opinion on whether or not to charge the juvenile as an adult, and the decision ultimately rests with the juvenile court.

"We are waiting on answers to questions centered on the services provided at the juvenile level and comparing that to what is offered at the adult level, and taking into account juvenile service's opinion," Oglesby said.

A decision is expected within 30 days, he said.

good relationship with the parents, you will not have many problems."

For more than five decades, he did not miss a single day of work.

"The years that I drove the bus, I did not have a day of sickness," Smack said. "That sticks with me every day. God is good."

Purnell, 78, and Whaley, 69, both still operate buses in Worcester County.

"Most of my life I spent behind a steering wheel," Purnell said.

In 1974, he took a route over for his cousin, near Germantown. Today, he drives Bus 13 to Stephen Decatur High School.

Like Upshure, he remembers a more rural Worcester County.

"Back then you didn't have the heavy populated areas that you have now," he said. "The population was probably about half of this size. [The county] is not nearly as rural now as people perceive it to be."

During the 1970s, Purnell said a standard chauffer's license was all it took to drive a bus. Today, drivers have to pass a class, a rigorous Department of Transportation inspection, and a physical.

He said parents were also more supportive of drivers when he started. He blames that shift in support on a changing culture.

"Back then, we didn't have babies raising babies. That's the problem now," he said. "You got a child in school and you look at the mother who is probably about 19, 20. Plus, she's out there working, trying to make a living, because you've got a lot of single mothers. A lot of kids out there now raise themselves.

"Looking back, you could go tell a parent your kid did such and such – you'd better not go do that now," he said.

Whaley is the baby of group, both in age and in tenure. She started driving a bus in 1997, taking children from the Route 707 area to Ocean City Elementary School.

Before driving, she worked at Berlin Middle School, as "support personnel." Her two sisters, Ruby Baker and Queen Satchel, and her brother, Theophilus Bowen Jr., were also bus drivers.

Now, she drives Bus 8 to Showell Elementary School. It's an experience that has been overwhelmingly positive, she said.

"My kids are not that bad, plus I have good parents," she said. "I don't really have to write up referrals. I take care of the situation myself. When I get finished and back my bus up in the yard, I have a satisfied mind."

Bus drivers in the Worcester County make \$20.86 and hour, plus an additional \$1.479 per mile. Maintenance and upkeep can claim 30-40 percent of that, and new buses can

cost well into six figures.

It took decades of work to get to that point, however, starting with an association of African-American bus drivers that formed in Berlin.

Purnell said he made \$775 a month when he started driving. In the 1950s, Coard remembers making \$400 a month.

'We thought \$400 at that time was good," he said.

Eventually, the meetings drew drivers not just from Berlin, but also from across the county.

"It brought the black drivers from Pocomoke and Snow Hill, and they all came together," Purnell said. "That lasted way beyond integration, then all the sudden - out of the blue - came the Worcester County Bus Association.

"We all joined in and were able to keep functioning, and the next thing you know we were all members of the state association," Purnell continued. "But it was through that first association and working with the county that's how we arrived at what we're getting today. If it had not been for the association, I don't know where we'd be."

Those early meetings also led to drivers receiving fair pay for afterhours trips, from sporting events to nearby towns, to week-long field trips across state lines.

"The biggest part of my mileage is done on the highway, going to New York and staying the whole week, going ʻround to Morgantown, West Virginia and staying the whole week. I carried boy's basketball to Memphis, Tennessee and staved the whole week," Purnell said. "Now, I get paid for it. My room is paid. My food and lodging and everything is taken care of. We've come a long ways - a very long ways."

All four say they share more than just the bond of being black bus drivers from the Berlin area. In the broader picture, they are four people who enjoyed their jobs and genuinely loved the children they served.

"There's an old saying that I found out years ago is true: in order for a bus driver to be successful and enjoy your job, you've got to love the kids," Purnell said. "If you don't love kids,

you don't need to get behind that steering wheel.

Purnell said he plans to continue driving for at least the next two years. After that, he'll have a decision to make. His current bus will need to be replaced, based on state regulations, and a similar model would cost him \$157,000.

'I don't think I'm going to do that." he said. "That may partly answer that question."

Asked how long she hopes to continue driving, Whaley said, "I'm not tired yet."

"You let me know when you are, and I'll come back," Smack said with a laugh.

After nearly 20 years on the road, Whaley said she is more than a bus driver. She also considers herself a counselor - and a friend - to the children.

"I love my children, and they love me. And I know they do because they tell you," she said. "I get respect from them - and their parents also - and I enjoy my job."

The best thing, to me is, when I still see those kids and they say, 'I remember you. You drove my bus," Coard said. "It makes you feel good that you've done something right."

Berlin native Gregory Purnell, who helped bring all four drivers together for this article, said he still has fond memories of his own bus drivers, who he called "unsung heroes" of the community.

'Your bus driver is almost like a part of your family," he said. "When I was going to school, I knew every bus and who drove every bus and almost knew every route, because you had an affinity for those bus drivers. They were part of your every day. Five days a week, you were with that bus driver twice a day.

"How many times have they waited for a kid who was running to the bus? How many times have they dropped a kid off at his lane when it was raining or snowing? This is the story of the bus driver – how they cared for those kids just like they were their own.

That bus driver is a hero in the neighborhood. Everybody had a bus driver," Purnell said.



After debate, payroll increase stays in Pines '17 budget draft

Eligibility for raises would be based on merit; funding equal to 2.6 percent hike

(Feb. 11, 2016) Ocean Pines employees will likely be eligible for merit raises this year, following a lively debate on the subject during a public meeting last Friday.

While discussing the next fiscalyear budget, Vice President Cheryl Jacobs suggested that the current economic climate might make such raises dubious.

Director Tom Terry said he would "personally not support" removing all money for salary increases from the budget draft, and said he was certain Jacobs shared his view. Not so fast, she said.

"You shouldn't put words into my mouth," she said. "I had a concern, from the beginning of this process, about giving raises in [these] eco-

"I understand that we need to allocate funds to keep our employees, and I understand that by putting this money there it doesn't mean anybody gets a dime of it, but nobody can get anything unless the money is allocated," Jacobs continued. "I had a concern about trying to keep the salaries at a level where they are currently, to just be fiscally responsi-

Jacobs suggested salaries be frozen. As an alternative, Director Dave Stevens said the 2.6 percent across-the-board funding level in the latest budget draft could be reduced to, say, one percent.

"One percent isn't going to be across the board, but it is going to be able to be distributed to high performers," he said.

"That's an alternative – make it

less than three percent – or the alternative is, people could always come back and we could change the budget," Jacobs said. "If there is a person who is deemed to require a merit increase ... we have the ability to do that later."

Stevens countered that General Manager Bob Thompson should have the flexibility to offer raises, in exceptional cases. Thompson agreed.

"This is an interesting discussion toward the end of the budget process," he said. "I adamantly disagree with removing the [funding]."

Thompson pointed to several salary studies, saying the roughly three percent increase was not only appropriate, but also "probably a low number." He also reminded the board that three percent was the number suggested by the directors in their budget guidance earlier this year, and added that raises would not be uniform, but would be based on the performance of each employee.

"There are people that may get zero or one percent in a given year, because their performance hasn't been to the level we expect them to be," he said.

Director Jack Collins said the last three budgets have included funding for across-the-board salary increases of 7.1 percent, 3.96 percent and 3.3 percent, respectively.

"I think, as an association, we've been very generous over that threeyear period of time. I'm going to have to come down on Cheryl's side,' he said. "We may be entering into some difficult, challenging times."

Collins said the budget draft had \$296,000 in payroll increases, including \$124,000 for base salaries in fiscal year 2017 and an additional \$38,000 for overtime.

'You can't count overtime," Thompson said. "Either that, or when the roads need to be plowed we don't have to bring them in because I have to pay them overtime, or when a police officer has to go down to court, I can't have them work later in the week on their regular duty, because I have to pay them overtime.

He went on to say Collins and others were assuming Ocean Pines employees were overpaid, which, he

Continued from Page 6 said, was not the case.

"You believe that our people aren't paid enough to begin with that's separate from whether or not the economy says we ought to act different," Jacobs said.

"Fair enough, but take home pay is take home pay for an employee," Thompson said. "Cost of goods increases, so if we hold the line on our salaries their dollar amount that they get paid actually purchases fewer items – it purchases less, so it is, in effect, a decrease in their take-home salary.

Thompson said the 2.6 percent increase was essentially a "cost-of-living" adjustment, and that the price of virtually everything outside of gasoline was going up.

"I absolutely believe what we're putting forth isn't only reasonable, it's the low-end reasonable," he said. "You're telling me a gallon of milk, a loaf of bread, a box of Pampers none of those things have increased in the last few years in cost?"

The other side of the argument, Stevens said, was that salary increases for the 81 full-time Ocean Pines workers would negatively affect the 8,452 homeowners in the community.

"Given the economy, I think Cheryl is right to consider a reduction," Stevens said, adding that he was concerned with the continuous rise in payroll.

"When you do these systematic increases year over year over year, and you're always raising the base of salaries over that period of time ... you get the creeping salary issue," he said. "What we're talking about is slowing that curve."

"I can't hold more strongly on any item in this budget than to pay our people," Thompson said. "I think the message that we're sending ... is just a miserable message to send our people right now.

Looking for a compromise, Terry asked for a consensus to keep the current payroll increase in place, with the caveat that a human resources study be performed before the next budget cycle.

Stevens and Collins appeared to disagree, but Jacobs acquiesced, leading to an unofficial 4-2 vote. Director Tom Herrick was not present during the meeting.

The directors will meet again to discuss the budget on Friday, Feb. 19 at 9 a.m. in the community center. The final budget vote is slated for Feb. 25.

Health Pavilion traffic issue brings crowd to OPA meeting

(Feb. 11, 2016) The issue of traffic created by the new Delmarva Health Pavilion in Ocean Pines has been simmering since the facility opened last October.

That simmer came to a boil Friday morning, as developer Palmer Gillis and officials with the Maryland State Highway Administration met with the public to talk about potential solutions.

After circulating a blueprint showing a new road connecting the pavilion to Ocean Parkway, Gillis told the audience in the Assateague Room in the Ocean Pines Community Center that he was looking for suggestions.

Currently, traffic can make right turns only in and out of the center, meaning illegal U-turns and other potentially problematic traffic occurrences are becoming prevalent. The situation is expected to get worse, as Gillis intends to build four additional medical buildings in the complex, giving it an eventual 90,000 square feet of office space.

Director Dave Stevens said the problem dates back at least six years, when development of the property was first discussed, and that giving access to Ocean Parkway was not a reasonable solution.

The other members of the board uniformly agreed.

"I find it really curious that you would have purchased this property, knowing what you were going to put there, without having dealt with this issue right up front," Board Vice President Cheryl Jacobs said. "The fact that you went forward, knowing that the board six years ago said no - I find that remarkable.'

Jacobs also chastised Gillis for cutting down dozens of trees on the property, essentially eliminating a natural noise and light burrier that protected nearby residents.

Gillis said he could show evidence that the right in, right out model would support the full build of the facility, and that the alternate plan was an attempt to "be responsive to ... residents."

"I'm going to take wild guess here and say there isn't one person in this audience here who represents these people that you say want a different access, but, rather, these are all people who say, 'don't take my land to put this road in," Jacobs said, drawing her second applause line of the meeting.

Gillis said other developers had eyed the property for years and wanted to build everything from apartment complexes to supermarkets in the space, all See PRMC Page 10

of which would have been much less desirable than medical offices for nearby residents

SHA District Engineer Donnie Drewer confirmed that "oodles" of other people had looked at the property, and said state highway was required by law to give Gillis access, because the area connected to a state road

He added that Gillis could put up a second building on the complex before he was required to conduct another traffic study.

"If he puts in five buildings and all the traffic that's going out that one entrance causes that intersection to fail completely, then we can't give him permission unless he mitigates that," Drewer said, adding that he did not know what that mitigation might be.

"Whatever it is, he has to do at his expense – not at state highway expense," he said.

Drewer said allowing left turns into or out of the property was "pushing the problem down the street," because Route 589 will eventually be dualized – although he could not say when that might happen.

"The priority list for Worcester County for the last 10 years at least has been finish U.S. Route 113. And I'm

proud to say that we have finally funded the last phase of 113 just this past year," he said. "The next step is for the elected officials to decide what's next on the list."

In Worcester County, that list could include dualizing Route 90, building a new bridge on Route 50 going into Ocean City, or expanding Route 589 to a dual highway.

"If you just take those three projects and add the total cost together ... you might even say [it would cost] a billion dollars," Drewer said.

Peninsula Regional Medical Center

is the tenant of the \$6 million, 20,000-square-foot first building in the medical complex, which consolidated family practices in Berlin and Ocean Pines. The building also includes a pharmacy and cardiovascular and pulmonary rehabilitation facility.

PRMC Vice President Steven Leonard called the addition a "wonderful success," but admitted he had heard concerns about traffic.

"We've told Mr. Gillis pretty clearly that before we continue to invest ... it really is important for us to figure out some sort of solution. Otherwise we're in somewhat of an awkward position," he said.

Leonard said there would be a pause in PRMC involvement until the problem is addressed.

"It's sad. We don't want that, but at the same time I think that serves everyone probably better than trying to cram stuff in there without a solution," he said

"Just because PRMC is taking a pause, doesn't mean that I'm taking a pause," Gillis said. "There are other users that could go on that property."

lasted nearly two hours, often became heated.

Mike Sparks, who lives directly behind the property, said the proposed access to Ocean Parkway had nothing to do with Ocean Pines residents.

"This has to do with giving traffic patterns for people that are outside the community," he said, adding that the development hurt the overall feel of the community.

Tom List said the road would create a traffic nightmare for residents. Deena Lewis said the noise increased dramatically after the buffer of trees came down, and that the alteration was both a privacy and a security issue.

Robert Stewart said Gillis was guilty of having "a lack of transparency," while another resident went as far as labeling Gillis as a bully.

Debbie List said she doubted Gillis' sincerity.

"I'm pretty good at reading body language after 30 years [as an] elementary school teacher she said. "I can see through your smiles, I can see through your posturing."

Gillis said he took that statement personally, but acknowledged that he was in business to make a profit.

"I am a builder," he said. "I'm not going to sit with real estate holding it when I can't use it. This is not a threat - I'm just reporting the information. If I can't build what I do - medical offices - then I will ask somebody to look at

"As far as transparency, I'm absolutely transparent and honest. I build and develop medical offices. Period," Gillis continued. "As far as taking my sincerity to the table today, I can sit here and say I am in this to make a profit.

"I believe I have a great plan for this piece of property that will be an amenity to this community - and you'll use it. What I'm here to explore today, with all sincerity, is options and ideas, which include a traffic light for this property, a south-bound left-hand turn lane into this property, widening the bridge to this property, widening the road at Ocean Parkway for this property [and] annexation for this property.

The only way I know to solve problems is to put the issues on the table those are the issues that I can come up with. And I'm asking this community, without being insulted, to help me with that solution. And I would appreciate that you respect of my sincerity, because I will tell you right now that if I can't develop medical offices I will sell it to someone else. That's plain and simple."

Jacobs intervened, suggesting a traffic light in front of the facility, onto See OPA Page 12



Route 589, or a left-hand turn lane was likely the "simplest solution to the whole problem.'

SHA Assistant District Engineer Dallas Baker said that would require a traffic study – but that neither option was off the table.

At the end of the three-hour meeting, Director Tom Terry asked that the board form a committee to discuss the issue

"I think there are solutions here that are very simple," he said. "I think we need to come together with a solution that's much less dramatic than trying to build a road, and I think those answers are there.'

OPA President Pat Renaud said the board would appoint a citizen task force and asked anyone interested to send an email to either him, or General Manager Bob Thompson.

"We want this problem to be solved – obviously," he said. "We don't want to let [the discussion] go and let it drift for another six years.


"I think, for now, we've had a good vetting of people. Some people were emotional, and some people were very logical in their thought process, which was good. And I think we can come up with a solution that will satisfy all of us – or most of us, anyway."



All options open, funding set at \$15,000 for goose control

(Feb. 11, 2016) Whether Ocean Pines will ever take lethal action against invasive Canada geese is still up in the air, although it came closer to allocating a specific dollar amount for mitigation of some kind.

During a public budget meeting last Friday, Director Tom Terry suggested the board earmark \$15,000 to deal with the issue. The belief is that certain types of geese are significantly adding to pollution of the ponds at the north and south gates.

Director Bill Cordwell said the board had told "several people at several meetings" that lethal measures of Canada goose control would not be in the budget.

"Why is this being thrown in at the end of [budget talks]?" he asked.

Terry said the funds would have "nothing to do with killing" [the geese], but would instead be used for relocation purposes.

"Are we that naive?" Cordwell said.
"I'm not, Bill," Director Dave
Stevens said. "The statement [that the
board was not considering lethal
measures] was accurate at the time
and at the time it was right. After we're
finished here it may not be accurate."

Stevens suggested Ocean Pines hire a "qualified, certified contractor" to

deal with the issue. Previously, public works in Ocean Pines had been tasked with creating "no mow" zones around the ponds, oiling eggs inside nests, and applying a product called "Flight Control" near the Worcester County Veteran's Memorial.

"Find one of those contractors, hire them and turn the problem over to them," Stevens said. "How it happens – whether they move them to a farm or whether or not they end up as a Diakonia dinner – it's their issue."

Thompson said if the funds were put into the budget, the directors would have the final say on what actions would be taken, but the board had to come up with a solid number with the budget deadline looming at the end of the month.

That did not go far enough for Director Jack Collins, who asked for assurances that the U.S. Department of Agriculture and U.S. Fish and Wildlife Services be consulted on the matter.

"Fair enough – that's not budgetary," Thompson said. "Any action we take has to be approved by the board. All I need is a dollar amount."

A consensus was reached to put \$15,000 into the budget as a place-holder. The directors asked Thompson to come up with a better estimate before the Feb. 25 deadline to finalize the budget.

Some Flower Street residents wary of Cannery

(Feb. 11, 2016) Berlin's new affordable housing complex Cannery Village has already had its share of setbacks, as move-in dates have been pushed back multiple times and by several months.

Now, it looks like the development could have a problem with its neighbors on Flower Street.

The first item for discussion during Monday's Town Council meeting in Berlin was a request for fence around the development. Residents Barry Jarmon and D.J. Lockwood addressed the council.

Lockwood said his property was particularly close to Cannery – he estimated 25 feet – and that he had security concerns. With 44 homes coming

to the development, he said he expected more than 200 people, including nearly 100 children, all close to his back porch.

During a recent open house at Cannery, he said several personal items had been upset on a paved basketball court in his yard.

"To expect new residents to respect our properties – who we don't even know – we don't want to have to take that risk," he said.

"This is affecting homes that ... have been there 50 years or so," Lockwood continued. "I'm just saying, do what's right."

The residents created a petition to put up a fence around the area of Cannery Village that borders existing homes on Flower Street. Berlin Councilmember Elroy Brittingham said he signed that petition.

Brittingham said he owned property there, and that he had longstanding concerns that schoolchildren from Cannery Village would cut through yards and open spaces.

"That's the biggest concern – trying to get some privacy between the two properties," he said.

Berlin Mayor Gee Williams said the town had spoken to the Worcester County Board of Education, who agreed to put an additional bus stop at Cannery Village. He said the lack of a barrier was still an issue, but hoped for a compromise with the developer.

"I've lived here longer than you've been alive," he told Lockwood. "All I'm saying is, there are ways we can mitigate things."

The town had already facilitated one meeting with residents to try to address the issue, and Williams said Berlin had no legal authority after the planning commission approved Cannery last year.

"Planning and zoning, their job is to deal with all of this stuff. By law, all kinds of precedents can require the developer to create whatever barriers the neighborhood feels are necessary. That opportunity was missed," he said. "Now we've got to figure out what we can do when we have no legal authority."

Councilmember Troy Purnell, a local developer, said he generally puts fences up around new properties, at his expense. He asked if anyone had tried to contact the developer, Osprey Property Company. As it turned out, company principal Andrew Hanson was in the room.

Hanson said he had reviewed the petition and spoke with several homeowners on Flower Street.

"I understand the concerns they've expressed. I'm afraid some of them are ill conceived. I'm afraid you, Mr.

Mayor, are among those," Hanson said.

"Right off the bat, you said the residents of Cannery Village may not respect their neighbors. I truly hope that's not that the case. We have worked hard to create a very unique community here," Hanson continued. "Everyone I've spoken to is very excited, and I think once they get to know their neighbors, I hope that there will not be issues."

Hanson said he spoke with Jarmon as far back as 2013 and agreed to put "vegetative screening" around the property, which had been installed.

He said the request in the petition was for a 2,500-foot-long fence, which could cost \$100,000.

"I'm trying not to get emotional," Hanson said. "It's sort of like, we've got these new renters who are moving in and we're ... trying to create a barrier to keep them out.

"That's unfortunate," he continued. "These folks - they are going to be working in the town, are going to be shopping in the town, sending their kids to the town schools, and $\bar{\text{I}}$ really would not like to welcome them to Cannery Village with a six-foot, white, ugly privacy fence.'

Councilmember Lisa Hall said she sympathized with the residents and had a similar personal experience.

"I think this goes back on planning and zoning," she said. "When they start

granting variances, they need to look at the big picture and what the impact is going to be on existing homes.'

As a compromise, Hanson said a smaller permanent barrier, roughly 250 feet and finished by a vegetative fence, was possible.

"We want to be good neighbors," he said. "I'm happy to sit down and listen and talk about some possibilities."

"I'd rather us try to find a solution upfront, because the farther this goes, the harder it will probably be to get done," Williams said. "You guys can lead by example ... let's find ways to help each other. It's actually easier in the long run than the other way."

After the meeting, Lockwood said he was not comfortable with the outcome.


"We all understand that our town is developing, but it shouldn't be at the expense of current residents," he said. To believe that new renters won't cut through [exiting properties] is absurd."

Lockwood noted that other developers, including Purnell, put fencing around their properties as a courtesy to nearby residents. He also said he felt Williams was playing politics, and that a vegetative barrier "sounds good, but it takes 10 years for them to become effective."

"At least the wheels are in motion," Lockwood said. "Hopefully, we can get a resolution."

BERLIN PARKS COMMISSION BRIEFS

(Feb. 11, 2016) The Berlin Parks Commission discussed the following items during a public meeting at Town Hall on Feb. 2.

Summer Movie Nights

For the second straight month, the commission talked about the upcoming Summer Movie Nights series, which it will host with the Berlin Arts and Entertainment District committee

A request for proposals for vendors will be issued this month, and the group compiled a list of films it will show in 2016.

"Runaway Bride" and "Tuck Everlasting" will bookend the six planned screenings, and the public will be allowed to vote on the remaining four films. The commission also considered letting nonprofit groups sell refreshments during the events.

A special event request will likely be brought to the Berlin Mayor and Council in March.

Clean-Up Day

The committee planned for two related parks events, Clean-Up Day on April 16 and Take Pride in Berlin Week, April 16-23.

Town Administrator Laura Allen suggested cleanup day focus on "tidying up" the former Tyson's Chicken plant, which the town recently purchased and plans to turn into a public park and recreation complex. Allen said the goal was to have the property available for "passive use" by the end of spring.

Others on the commission said there was a need for trees and shrubs in Berlin, and suggested the emphasis be on planting. The "Edible Forest" project, a collaboration between Stephen Decatur High School and As-

sateague Coastal Trust, could be tied into the events. Students are working to grow edible plants at Stephen Decatur Park, and could begin planting in April.

Just Walk

After a successful fall event, the commission began planning a spring follow-up to Just Walk, set for May 7. Previously, it had been an annual event.

Set in Stephen Decatur Park, Administrative Services Director Mary Bohlen said she was working on a longer route. A health fair component, popular during the fall event, will also return, with the Worcester County Health Department and Atlantic General Hospital being likely partners.

The commission also suggested offering several prizes during Just Walk, including a Fit Bit.

Youth club

Last month, the Berlin Youth Club took 17 local children on a field trip to the Delmarva Discovery Center in Pocomoke. Organizer Amanda Chaffee said the kids especially enjoyed a presentation about the various kinds of animal droppings.

"That really fired them up," she said. "We have a ton of boys."

The children also went to Subway while in Pocomoke, and the store donated sodas and chips to the club.

On Jan. 15, the Berlin Youth Club held a movie night, with 13 children attending to watch "The Sandlot." Next, on Feb. 27, the club will visit Wallops Island.

Chaffee noted that the recent "Taco Wars," hosted by Guido's Burritos in Ocean City, benefited the club. The town of Berlin also supports the youth group, which is part of Worcester Youth and Family Counseling Services.

BERLIN BRIEFS

(Feb. 11, 2016) The Berlin Mayor and Council discussed the following items during a public meeting at town hall on Feb. 9.

Co-op agreement

The council unanimously approved a resolution to establish a cooperative agreement with The Nature Conservancy. The organization was granted access to 196 acres of land in Berlin along the Pocomoke River watershed, which it hopes to improve.

Mike Dryden said the Conservancy's work would enhance water quality, create a wildlife habitat and reduce flood-

Town Administrator Laura Allen reported that she contacted the Maryland Department of the Environment, which had no issues with the project.

Rezoning

Planning Director Dave Engelhart said two rezoning requests would come before the planning commission on Feb. 10, after press time.

The town hopes to build a new police station at 109 Decatur Street. Engelhart said that parcel is currently zoned as a B-2 shopping district, and would need to be changed to R-1 residential.

A property at 15 Gay Street wants to build two ground-level retail spaces there, with two apartments on the second floor - a common structure in downtown Berlin.

Engelhart said several adjacent property owners had asked for a similar zon-

ing change, from B-2 shopping district to R-1 residential, which would presumably raise property values. He called the change a perfect example of 21st century rezoning for mixed use.

Burley festivals

The council endorsed four events to be held on the Burley Oak Brewing Company property on Old Ocean City Boulevard. Owner Bryan Brushmiller said the endorsements were necessary to get approval from the liquor board in order hold the events in Burley's parking lot.

Four "Explore Berlin Festivals" will be held April 23, June 11 and Sept. 17. The brewery will also hold an event in conjunction with town fireworks on July

Carol Rose from the Berlin Heritage Foundation said her group had planned a separate event during one of the "Explore" festivals, which Mayor Gee Williams said would not be an issue.

More events

Economic and Community Development Director Ivy Wells asked for and received approval for 27 events planned for 2016, including the Jazz and Blues Bash, Bathtub Races, Peach Festival and Fiddler's Convention.

One popular event that will not return, Wells said, are the High Heel Races. She said nonprofit host Women Supporting Women had changed executive directors and were not interesting in continuing the annual fundraiser.

Wells said she would seek another nonprofit group to fill the vacancy, on June 3.

Commissioner Bertino to hold town meeting, Feb. 27

(Feb. 11, 2016) Chip Bertino, Worcester County Commissioner for the Ocean Pines district, will hold a town meeting on Saturday, Feb. 27 at the Ocean Pines library. The meeting will begin at 10 a.m.

Bertino will provide information on issues and developments occurring within the district and the county.

Worcester County State's Attorney Beau Oglesby will be the guest speaker, and County Attorney Maureen Howarth will also be introduced. Bertino will be joined by Commissioner President Jim Bunting during the question and answer part of the program.



Traffic could jam future

Palmer Gillis, of Gillis Gilkerson, the builder and developer of the Delmarva Health Pavilion in Ocean Pines, has a point. Although he refrained from saying it bluntly when he met with residents last Friday to discuss his project's traffic flow problems, that facility is there to stay, like it or not.

That won't be the end of it either, as more will happen on that parcel over time, whether his company does it or it's some future owner who figures out a way to get a better return on the investment.

How the pavilion got there, whether Gillis Gilkerson should have purchased the property in the first place and what anyone said or didn't say two or three years ago going into the project is irrelevant. That's history and the issue now is how to address the future in a way that's at least tolerable for everyone involved.

There's no reason to doubt Gillis when he said if the project's ingress and egress issues can't be resolved, he would sell the whole package to someone who might have other ideas about how to use it. He is, after all, in business to make a profit.

Considering what could be permitted under the parcel's commercial zoning designation – service stations, restaurants and retail space among other things – having a nice campus with healthcare offices is the best possible fit.

Maybe, as was proposed Friday, the installation of another traffic signal on the highway will provide quick relief, but chances are commercial growth and the development of the surrounding area will lead to a time when that won't be enough.

Additional traffic studies will be required before the property can be fully developed and those could limit the project's potential.

Still, it would behoove the community, the task force that will consider the traffic configuration options and Gillis Gilkerson to address the immediate situation, but also to think about what the issues might be 10 years from now.

(Feb. 11, 2016) The 33rd annual Optimist Seaside Boat Show returns to the resort with more than 350 boats, 50 dealers and approximately 150 vendors featured Friday through Sunday, Feb. 12-14, at the Ocean City convention center on 40th Street.

Admission cost is \$10 for a day pass or \$15 for the entire weekend. Children admission is \$1.

Many dealers and exhibitors will offer special show prices on new and popular models. Visitors can browse a selection of sport cruisers, sport fishing, performance and "super boats." Financing and insurance is available for interested buyers.

One of the most popular boat shows on the East Coast grows every year, drawing thousands of water and boating enthusiasts to the resort with 12,000 people expected to attend throughout the Presidents Day weekend.

Exhibitors will be offering marine state-of-the-art electronics, trailers, canvas tops, motors, jewelry, dock builders, boat lifts, art, fishing gear, paddleboards and other water sportsrelated gear.

"North Bay Marina has donated the door prize for over 28 years," said Charles Smith, the show's publicity chair. "Each attendee has a chance to win a pontoon boat with motor. We feel their contribution has really made a difference."

"The show has been good to us and we try to be community involved and active," Scott McCurdy said.

Maryland touts tax-free weekend for Energy Star

(Feb. 11, 2016) Comptroller Peter Franchot reminds Marylanders to take advantage of Shop Maryland Energy, a tax-free weekend on select Energy Star appliances, Saturday, Feb. 13 through Monday, Feb. 15.

The annual tax-free weekend, now in its seventh year, allows consumers to make qualifying purchases without paying the state's 6 percent sales tax.

"Shop Maryland Energy weekend is good for consumers, good for small businesses and good for the environment," Franchot said. "It allows consumers who buy Energy Star qualified appliances to not only save money on the initial purchase, but to conserve energy, reduce greenhouse gas emissions and reduce future energy expenses."

During the Shop Maryland Energy event, air conditioners, washers and dryers, furnaces, heat pumps, standard-size refrigerators, compact fluorescent light bulbs (CFL), dehumidifiers and programmable thermostats that have been designated as meeting or exceeding the applicable Energy Star efficiency requirements developed by the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency and the U.S. Department of Energy will be tax-free.

The Energy Star, a U.S. Environmental Protection Agency program, was established in 1992 to reduce levels of greenhouse gas emissions and other harmful pollutants caused by the inefficient use of energy. The Energy Star label assists consumers in identifying energy-efficient products that offer savings on energy bills without sacrificing performance, features of comfort.

"Consumers have an excellent opportunity, for a limited period of time, to receive a tax break for purchasing Energy Star appliances," said Cailey Locklair Tolle, president of the Maryland Retailers Association. "These appliances not only are energy efficient, potentially saving the consumer the cost of the product over time, but help to protect the environment as well. This annual program is a win-win for everyone; consumers support retailers in their communities, energy efficiency saves consumers money at home and energy efficient technologies result in reduced air pollution."





cousin Taj, a soul gone way too young.

Taj was gregarious, spontaneous and exuberant in his love for glam rock, a lifestyle that he lived from the 80's until the very end. With his pink hair, broad smile and bear hugs, there was just something about the guy that you couldn't help but to love. He never pretended to be anything that he wasn't, but as we all know, we don't get to pick and choose when our loved ones move on, and this was certainly no exception.

At the wake, the priest gave his opening remarks and then my cousin Debbie read a passage. After that, people came to the podium to speak their mind, and that is indeed when the party began.
