Berlin's party packs Main Street

Decision to postpone event due to weather proves to be right move By Josh Davis

BERLIN– After postponing the party on March 29 due to heavy rains and thunderstorms, last Saturday's Coolest Small Town Celebration take two was met with picture-perfect weather.

Thousands flocked to Berlin to see Budget Travel's 2014 "America's Coolest Small Town" in person.

"We're absolutely delighted with the

turnout," said Berlin Mayor Gee Williams. "The fact that we postponed (the party) not only brought us wonderful, blessed weather, but I think it also increased the amount of publicity and awareness about the fact that we were doing this. So it's a win-win all around."

A parade featuring area youth organizations and students ran through the town beginning at 1 p.m. Ocean City Pipes and Drums also took part in the festivities.

"It's a pleasure to be here and we're glad we were invited," said Pat Harmon, the band's manager. "We're having a lot of fun and the turnout is fantastic. There's a very large – and loud – crowd and everybody seems to be having a ball."

Food vendors were set up along the downtown corridor along with several area merchants and nonprofits. Live music was offered during the celebration, and the town's open beverage container laws were suspended with Burley Oak Brewing Company hosting a beer garden just outside of the Atlantic Hotel.

"What a great day, beautiful weather and an awesome, awesome turnout," said Burley Oak owner Bryan Brushmiller. "I see a lot of locals and a *Continued on Page 5*

Day announces plans to retire as Berlin's promoter

No date set, as he has projects here to finish

BERLIN– One of the architects of the "Cool Berlin" campaign announced his intention to retire this week.

Michael Day, Berlin's Economic & Community Development Director, declined to give a specific date, but has begun the process of stepping away following more than a decade of public service in Salisbury,

Pocomoke and Berlin. "I'm going to retire when they let me," Day said with a laugh. "I just wanted to give them a heads up that I'm going to be laying the plan out. I didn't give them a definite date just yet, so

I'll still do my work with the town to make sure that all my loose ends are tied up. I've got several projects that I've started that I want to complete."

Born in Salisbury, Day attended college in Rochester, N.Y. before returning to the Eastern Shore.

"I've run away from Salisbury six times but for some strange reason I've come back each time," he said. "I'm here and I'm probably going to stay here; I still live in Salisbury but I'd love to move to Berlin – that's sort of my fantasy plan."

He ran a photo business with his late wife for 25 years before rapidly improving computer technology made the archival processes cost prohibitive. Public service – and his passion for the Main Street movement – was soon to follow.

"I started looking into another career, got involved with some museums and worked as a part-time director of a community center in Salisbury, so I got the feel for nonprofits and Main Streets," he said.

A flip of the coin – literally – enticed him to run for Salisbury City Council.

"Mayor Tilghman got me and Jack Elliott, who has since passed away, in a room and said, 'one of you two will run for city council,' and we flipped a coin and I lost," Day said. "So I spent three years on the Salisbury City Council."

Day, who helped draft Salisbury's Main Street program, later began working as a circuit writer in Berlin and Pocomoke just two weeks after his term in the Salisbury City Council ended.

They were looking for someone to work in Berlin for 20 hours and Pocomoke for 20 hours, so I did that for four years back and forth between the two towns before Berlin offered me a full-time position as director of economic development," he said. "So I took that and just kept moving forward, and it was a big help because then I could move forward on a faster pace."

The Main Street concept -a statesponsored program of strengthening the economic potential of traditional Main Streets and neighborhoods in order to improve the economy, appearance and image of those districts - has long been a passion for Day.

"It's a small town concept and it works," he said. "Unfortunately Salisbury hasn't followed the blueprint as much as they should, and I'm perfectly upfront about that and I'm vocal about that - that they have not laid it out and followed the plan.

"Here in Berlin, we won the state award for organization in the first year we were a Main Street, and that is really, really unusual to do that," he said. "We pretended we were a Main Street for three years before we actually applied; we had worked like a Main Street, acted like a Main Street and they allowed us to call ourselves a Main Street. When we became a Main Street we were already very tightly organized."

Last year Worcester County Tourism Director Lisa Challenger nominated Berlin for the "American's Coolest Small Town" contest in Budget Travel magazine. Day said the movement "started building steam" on its own.

"At the end of December when they closed the first round of voting we ended up being third," he said. "Mark Huey, who was working for Lisa at the time as a social media coordinator, had a lot to do with that. It got us propelled into the third spot and we knew we were going to be in the top 15 when they

opened voting back up in February.

'We knew we were going to be in it and we were in it to win it," he said. "The merchants got behind it, the residents started to get behind it and the publicity that we got just from that was worth everything.

"It was a great campaign," said Challenger, who also worked with Day on the Tourism, Arts and Downtown Development (TADD) program.

"Working with the town and working with Michael - it's never a competition of who gets the credit and who the leader is and who did more work," she said. "It's just such an easy partnership and there are no big egos in the way. We work really, really well with Berlin and with Michael Day."

Day expects Megan Houston, Berlin's new Main Street coordinator, to be a major player in continuing Berlin's strong Main Street program once he departs.

"We hired Megan to do just that and she's getting a real good grasp of it," he said. "She's been doing some training and she has a pretty good handle on things, so that will be a big help when I step down.'


'He will be greatly, greatly missed," said Houston. "He's made a huge impact on this community in everything that he's done up to this point."

Houston has worked with Day since December.

"I plan on continuing what he started," she said. "I'm learning as much as I can and doing as much as I can, and while he's still around I'm going to try and absorb as much as I can.'

Berlin Mayor Gee Williams called Day "the spark that Berlin needed" to get to the next level of economic vitality.

"If you tried to point to one individual who has made the most significant difference in helping Berlin move forward economically in the last few years, that person would clearly be Michael Day," he said. "It was just the right combination of his life experience, his experience with government, his experience with business and his ability to explain and persuade people to work together. And he works hard at it - whether it's a work day Continued on Page 7


or a weekend it's all the same to him." Bud Church, President of the Worces-

Mayor Gee Williams praised the shop, calling it "a prototype ... vision of what Berlin could become."

"I think many of the businesses have used variations of your business model to become successful," he said. "When you started out nobody was doing the things that you do."

The council also approved requests for May Day Play Day on Saturday, May 10, Spring Cruisers on Saturday, May 17, a Memorial Day Celebration on Monday, May 26 and Reindeer Run on Saturday, December 6.

Additionally, it set dates for special spring trash and yard waste collection on April 23 and 30 (yard waste) and May 7 and 14 (bulk waste). Hazardous items, including cans of paint, will not be picked up. The town will post a full list of restrictions on its website and broadcast it on local public access television.

Engelhart, the town's planning director, spoke about the progress of the "workforce housing" site Cannery Village. The planning commission approved a preliminary site plan was approved on April 9, he said.

The plan, including 40 houses that will be sold to buyers at prices based on their income levels, had been delayed since 2007 before finally gaining approval during a council meeting last year. Councilmember Elroy Brittingham questioned the safety of the entrance for Cannery Village on Cannery Way at Flower Street.

"It's going to a very dangerous entrance," he said. "I think that really needs to be looked at."

Town Administrator Laura Allen updated the council on the sidewalk safety upgrades at Route 113 and Bay Street.

"The state highway administration folks finished the sidewalk and crosswalk improvements on Route 113 and Bay Street," she said. "They finished those late Friday night, so they were ready to go on Saturday for the Coolest Small Town Celebration."

Signs reducing the speed limit on 113 through Berlin to 45 mph are slated to go up today. Variable signs alerting the public to the new traffic patterns will be part of the project.

The meeting ended with a flourish of praise for the Coolest Small Town Celebration held last weekend.

"It was probably one of the biggest events we've ever had," said Michael Day, the town's economic and community development director. "I think our events this year are going to get bigger, and this was good practice."

Day called on the town to continue the shuttle bus service that debuted during the celebration.

Williams praised the town and its citizens for their conduct.

"We are very grateful for not only all the folks who made last Saturday's celebration an outstanding success, but also I want to acknowledge all the work and vision and effort by the citizens and public servants ... who helped to make all this possible over the last few decades," he said. "All of this didn't happen overnight — it happened in a very continuing, steady process of constantly looking for



ways to improve the community." Williams also recommended strategic planning sessions.

"A lot of good things have been happening, but everything seems to be accelerated," he said. "I think it's a good opportunity while interest is high ... to gather the community together and organize a way to have a strategic planning effort so we can get guidance from the public about how to prioritize."

While he looks forward to a "busier, more vibrant town," Williams cautioned against losing sight of the character and diversity that made the town "America's Coolest." "I don't think anyone that I've talked to wants us to become a big town," he said. "I think we should continue to make sure this is one of the best small towns not only now, but for the generation that follows. This is a pivotal time and I think it's our responsibility to do what we can to get the best community input."

contractor "shall commence work within thirty (30) calendar days of the award of contract." The total time for completion is 180 calendar days.

The deadline for an issue to be placed on the county commissioners' May 6 agenda is 9 a.m. Wednesday, April 30.

Depending on the complexity of the project and bids received, the county staff tries to submit their recommendation for the bid award to the county commissioners for the next meeting following the bid opening, which is often a matter of only two days, according to Kelly Shanahan, the county's assistant chief administrative officer. However, complex projects or bids, which require significant review and verification, might not be presented until the second meeting after the bid opening.

For example, the recent proposals for design of the Ocean Pines wastewater collection system improvements

were opened on Monday, March 10, but the review took two weeks and the recommendation was not submitted until March 26 for the commissioners' consideration during their April 1 meeting.

The contractor who is awarded the work for the replacement of the Ocean Pines water lines would be required to start work within 30 days. That would mean work could begin in May or June and continue through the summer.

General Manager Bob Thompson said he was well aware of the work to replace the water lines.

"I just don't have the dates," Thompson said.

Ocean Pines Public Works Director Eddie Wells was already working on issues, such as the condition of Ocean Parkway after the completion of each day's work, Thompson said.

President Tom Terry expects the issue to be resolved satisfactorily.

We have a pretty good, very good working relationship with the county," Terry said.

Director Jack Collins had alerted the board to the work because he "figured it would be a big issue" because it includes "just about every address on Ocean Parkway."

Turns out, being cool can be exceptionally good for business

Local shops prepare for surge in popularity after 'cool' designation

BERLIN– Businesses in "America's Coolest Small Town" are bracing for an increase in traffic – and hopefully – in revenue following the recent designation from Budget Travel magazine.

Several area business owners and workers sounded off on their expectations during last Saturday's Coolest Small Town Celebration in Berlin.

"I think it's going to make opportunities for the town that the town is prepared for; it's been prepared and I think that's why it's become America's Coolest Small Town," said Bryan Brushmiller, owner of Burley Oak Brewing Company. "The infrastructure is here, the restaurants are here and people are just starting to discover it." Austin Widdowson, owner of Re:Fresh Media, believes the designation will help validate local businesses.

"We've definitely lost work before because we're not in a big city – we're not in L.A. or New York – but there's only one America's Coolest Small Town," he said. "I think it's the community that always made this place what it is. Of all the places I've lived in my life I've never seen a community actually come together like this."

Debbie Frene, owner of Victorian Charm, saw an immediate boost in her bottom line during the celebration.

"The turnout is fabulous," she said. "We've almost had more people than we could handle. We've sold more than 200 T-shirts today, so we have no complaints at all."

Many believe the initial increase in traffic is due largely to residents in bordering towns who are finally taking notice of their neighbor.

"I think it's bringing a lot of people to this town that have never been here before – even locals who maybe live in Ocean Pines or Snow Hill who never think to come to Berlin," said Blair Falck Parsons, owner of Ta Da. "In the last couple of weeks we've heard a lot of people say they were driving down Route 50 and saw the signs and said, 'well, we have to go now, it's America's Coolest Small Town."

"It's great to see people not only from Worcester County, but from other counties coming together to celebrate such a great accomplishment," said Erin Bilenki, a bartender at Maryland Wine Bar. "I think it's going to be good – a lot of people that didn't know we were here stopped in today and we had a great day and we hope they'll come back."

"It's awesome to bring people to a small town where people can find out what Berlin is all about," said Mike Andrews, manager at Culver's Antiques. "We're kind of tucked away, off the road from Ocean City and Chincoteague and such, and I'm thinking we'll get more people in the doors and maybe be able to support more businesses and more services."

Sherry Gamble, owner of The Main Street Enchanted Tea Room, noted that while the increase in business is welcome, most of the regional and national coverage has failed to mention the fact that Berlin tends to be relatively slow during the winter.

"It was March and it was still snowing the week we were voted 'Coolest Small Town," she said. "The next Wednesday there were people in town and hardly anything was open and I said, 'what brings you down here?' They were from Pennsylvania and the town next to them was the coolest small town last year, so they came down.

"The articles didn't mention that this is a resort town in the winter – they were wandering around looking for things that were open," she continued. "I hope they all come back. Berlin at 4 or 5 o'clock doesn't have much business here usually; it's not like I was in the city somewhere where people *Continued on Page 15*

would come in at 4 p.m. to have tea after shopping. But there are certainly more people in town so I'm trying to stay open later and become the coolest tea room in town."

Jason Hagy, owner of Berlin Coffee House, hopes the town finds a way to continue its momentum throughout the fall.

"(The lasting success) might depend on how often they can remind people of it," he said. "Personally, I think they should have waited until the fall when people are starting to forget – to bring them back and remind them. I really think we should do (the celebration) again in the fall just to remind people."

The last time the town saw this

much traffic was following the filming of "Runaway Bride" more than a decade ago. Many expect a similar surge in tourism with the notable exception that this time people aren't coming to experience a fantasy or a fiction – this time they're coming to see what really makes the town tick.

"We've always known we were the coolest small town; now the world knows," said Terry Sexton, owner of The Treasure Chest. "Once people come to Berlin they love it and they come back. So I think this will only help more people to want to come to Berlin. I think it's similar to what we saw with 'Runaway Bride' but in a whole different way – it's not a Hollywood this time; it's really life."

How Much You Wanna Bet?

Police say couple was killed in apparent murder/suicide

Staff Writer/Bayside Gazette BERLIN– Two elderly residents were killed in an apparent murder-suicide on Wednesday, April 16.

The couple, identified as Lester and Ada "Midge" Wright, was discovered by family members at their home on 603 Williams Street in Berlin at approximately 8:42 a.m., according to police.

'The Berlin Police Department responded to 603 Williams Street to do a 'check on the welfare'-type call," said Lt. Ed Schreier of the Worcester County Sheriff's Office. "Upon arrival they found one deceased female and a male suffering from gunshot wounds.

The male subject, confirmed to be Lester Wright, 89, was transported to Peninsula Regional Medical Center where he later passed away due to multiple gunshot wounds.

The Worcester County Bureau of In-

vestigation was called to help with the investigation, according to Schreier.

"They in turn called the Maryland State Police Homicide Unit - that's standard procedure - to come in and assist with the investigation," Schreier said. "They are currently investigating this incident. Preliminarily the female had two gunshot wounds and the male suffered three."

Lt. Schreier confirmed that Lester Wright suffered from self-inflicted gunshot wounds, and that the incident is being considered a murder-suicide.

We believed that he may have shot her first and then shot himself," he said.

The residence is just a few blocks away from the "America's Coolest Small Town" banner hung at the corner of Ocean City Blvd. and Williams Street. Midge, 90, was still working in Salisbury. Lester formerly owned a car dealership in Berlin. They had no children.

US 113 crosswalk complete, signs placed to alert drivers

Safety meetings also led to enhanced sidewalks, changing speed limits

BERLIN–Town Administrator Laura Allen announced that the State Highway Administration has finished the crosswalk on US 113 at Bay Street, along with the enhanced sidewalks requested by the Berlin Pedestrian Safety Committee. Variable message boards have been placed on US 113 in both directions to alert drivers to the change.

"SHA staff worked late Friday evening to make sure the crosswalk and sidewalks would be ready for our celebration on Saturday (April 12) to thank everyone for voting Berlin American's Coolest Small Town," Allen said. "The timing worked out well; we appreciate their efforts."

The pedestrian improvements came from several meetings between the State Highway Administration and the Berlin Pedestrian Safety Committee.

"We are satisfied with the improvements and look forward to having everything completed this spring," said Berlin Pedestrian Safety Committee Chairperson, Patricia Dufendach.

In addition to the crosswalk and ex-

tended sidewalk, the speed limit will be reduced to 45 mph on US 113 in Berlin.

"Weather permitting, we are expecting signs for the lower speed limit to go up on Thursday, April 17, effectively putting the reduced speed limit in place before the Easter weekend," Allen said. "SHA will update the variable messages boards along US 113 to alert motorists to the new speed limit."

The new 45 mph zone will extend from approximately a half-mile north of MD 346 to a half-mile south of MD 818/Germantown Road. In addition, the current 50 mph zone will be expanded beyond the new 45 mph area. The exact limits of each area are:

•Forty-five mph speed limit zone on US 113, from 0.50 mile south of MD 818-Germantown Road (MP 26.74) to 0.50 mile north of MD 346-Old Ocean City Road (MP 29.3), for a total distance of 2.56 miles.

•Fifty mph speed limit zone from 0.55 north of MD 818-Georgetown Road (MP30.39) to 0.50 mile south of MD 346-Old Ocean City Road (MP 29.3) for a total of 1.09 miles.

•Fifty mph speed limit zone from 0.14 mile south of Hayes Landing Road (MP 25.93) to 0.50 mile south of MD 818/Germantown Road (MP 26.74), for a total distance of 0.81 mile.

Reach Out and Read targets children when they come for checkups

BERLIN–Getting books from the doctor are a routine part of regular pediatric checkups at Atlantic Health Center.

Atlantic Health Center recently joined more than 5,000 program sites nationwide that are preparing America's youngest children to succeed in school through the Reach Out and Read program.





If the town is going to be the "coolest" small town in America, it has to own up to that title. It's more than just having a party and adding a slogan to any sign connected to Berlin. Cannery Village is a "cool" concept, and it should be accepted, as one of the many reasons Berlin is a thriving, innovative community. Give Cannery Village a chance.

We are happy with the commission's unanimous preliminary approval of the site plan, and we hope that after the forestation and buffer plans are examined, that the project can move forward.

So while we're writing in this space, we want to wish our readers a Happy Easter, Happy Passover or if those two holidays don't apply, may we all enjoy a happy (snowless) spring.



Fresh profiteroles with chocolate coating

The curtains are hung, the kitchen rearranged and repainted, and the upstairs bathroom that I tore out in December



might actually get done this week. Four months?

Four months? Hey, I'm no builder, as is evidenced by the long durations now trademarked between demolition and project completion. I guess one could

also notice if they

scrutinized the shoddy drywall in parts of our renovated Versailles.

But our abode is comfortable, and long ago I learned that if you squint your eyes, all of the bad stuff just blends together. I call it my Navajo blanket. Known to weave the most immaculate blankets, the Navajo artisan, when finished, would put one thread out of place for no person and no one thing of this earth are of perfection. I like that tradition.

Next on the docket is "Paul versus Kids' Bedroom," a botched room debacle from a year ago that didn't work out so well. "I will sleep when I'm dead," I seem to recall one of our platoon mottos to be.

So, armed with the reality that we would have plenty of physical activity this week, I decided not to shy away from the refined carbs as I am making every effort to at present.

Fresh, homemade waffles are a cinch on our waffle iron. It's a handy tool that also doubles, with replaceable plates, as a Panini grill. But we've had those this week.

For Sunday brunch, I wanted to think

outside the box. Of course I considered eggs, bacon, quiche and other sundries, but I also knew that the family has been asking for profiteroles, an easy favorite.

They are delicious, they are easy, and they are a complete crowd pleaser. If you do not know what they are, but have had an éclair at some point in your life, you now know what they are.

A puffed pastry, considered laminated dough since steam from cooking eggs, butter and water creates the pockets in the finished product, profiterole dough is egg-rich and easily switchable from sweet to savory. The French name for this dough is Pate a Choux, or "cauliflower paste," since the finished product resembles the lovely vegetable.

At the yacht club years ago, I would make traditional cream puffs (pictured) for desserts and also savory puffs filled with lobster or salmon mousse (sans the chocolate icing, of course).

As for the taste, a good analogy was one made by my wife, Julie, as she bit into an empty shell this morning. They resemble Yorkshire pudding, the ubiquitous British side to the Christmas roast. Some eggs, butter and flour go a long way in making this an incredibly versatile product.

A trick I learned a few years ago, a delightful addition to any bread basket at the dinner table is to take pate a choux, mix in some Gorgonzola cheese crumbles, and scoop into a fryer until golden. The cheese is dry enough that the cheese won't ooze out of your fritter, and any lower moisture content cheese can be used, so think Pecorino or Parmigiano Reggiano as well.

As I finish writing this, fully loaded on carby goodness, I have the motivation to keep moving, to keep the renovations coming, and get this pile of projects done; or at least until the sugar crash.

And washing these profiteroles down

with a Coke, I need to ask — who ever said this was a health column?

Fresh Profiteroles

1 stick butter (1/2 cup)

- 1 cup water
- 1 cup flour
- 1 pinch salt
- 1 cup eggs (4 whole)

*This is a simple ratio from Michael Ruhlman's Ratio, a great book on learning the basics of cooking

Step 1: Heat the oven to 425 degrees Step 2: Melt the butter in the water and bring to a simmer

Step 3: Add the flour at once, and beat with a wooden spoon until it forms a dough

Step 4: Cook this for a few minutes, then flatten and remove from the heat

Step 5: When it has cooled down (4-5 minutes), add the eggs one at a time. The dough and eggs will separate and seem funky, but eventually will meld to create a sticky dough

Step 6: When all of the eggs are incorporated, pipe or scoop the dough onto wax paper or silpat on a baking pan

Step 7: Bake at 425 degrees for 10 minutes, and then finish at 325 degrees until golden brown and mostly dried, about 25 more minutes

Step 8: Let cool and pipe with pastry cream (recipe below). Dip into chocolate glaze (below) and let set

Chocolate Coating

1 cup dark chocolate coins or chips 1 tsp. vegetable oil

Step 1: Combine the two in the top of a double boiler. Don't let water get in your mixture

Step 2: Heat gently until completely melted and remove from heat until ready to coat



Pastry Cream

6 egg yolks

1/2 cup granulated sugar1/2 cup all-purpose flour2 cups hot milk2 tablespoons butter

1 tsp. vanilla extract

salt to taste

Cinnamon to taste (optional)

Step 1: Whisk the yolks and sugar together until creamy

Step 2: Add the hot milk to the sugar mixture while whisking until combined well

Step 3: On a medium heat, bring the cream up to a simmer, stirring constantly. There are two critical points here; medium heat and slowly bring it up. It can take as long as 8 minutes, but keep stirring. If you rush it, you will have scrambled eggs

Step 4: Adjust flavoring with salt, vanilla and cinnamon






