Berlin unveils FY '16 budget draft

(April 23, 2015) Berlin's fiscal year 2016 outlook largely maintains the status quo, according to a first look at the projected budget during a public meeting on Monday night, when the mayor, town council and department to discuss the planned \$5.6 million budget, up 4 percent over the previous year.

"One of the things were attempting to do in this budget ... is we're going to budget for success," Mayor Gee Williams said. "These are all things that the public said were very important to them in the strategic planning sessions, and fortunately they were all more than on our radar screen."

A prior year surplus of \$484,500 was divided into capital expenditures, including \$26,000 for a new Town Hall vehicle and \$66,000 for a pair of new police vehicles, as well as \$30,000 for replacement finance and billing software and \$30,000 for a new HVAC system in the Welcome Center.

And additional \$170,500 went to sidewalk and street repairs on Baker Street, Bryan Avenue, Cedar Avenue, Branch Street West, Grace Street, Flower Street, Maple Avenue and Tingle Road.

Finance Director Natalie Saleh said general fund operating revenues did not have "major changes or major additions," with most line items mirroring the previous budget.

Residential impact fees projected huge increase of \$288,000 thanks to planned expansion on Seahawk Road, phase one of which is expected to be finished in 2016, adding 144 townhomes to the area.

Also in the general fund, corporation tax revenues estimated a \$20,000 jump, which Saleh attributed to increased activity in the town, and highway user revenue showed an increase of \$17,200.

Slot revenues look to drop 1 percent, totaling \$3,000 less than the \$233,000 the town received during

the prior year. Salah said the working budget also allowed for a conservative \$20,000 hike in state income tax revenue.

In total, the general fund showed a projected 16 percent net increase, totaling \$5,485,371 after a \$200,000 stormwater contribution.

Williams said it was the largest single-year increase "in several years."

The administration budget showed a 9 percent rise over the prior year, because of projected increases in health insurance costs and more funds reserved for special appropriations, capital outlay and contingency.

Town Administrator Laura Allen said the \$15,000 special appropriations hike contains room for potential town council grants to nonprofit groups, including Atlantic General Hospital, Diakonia, the Worcester County Development Center and the Cricket Center.

Local ties provide powerful moments during Relay rally

(April 23, 2015) Last Sunday's Relay for Life benefit at BJ's on the Water in Ocean City raised thousands of dollars for cancer research, but the event also included a series of powerful moments that, more than give faces to a movement, served as a rallying call to anyone who ever watched as a loved one's life was threatened by cancer.

The event also doubled as a CD release party for Teenage Rust, the '6os-styled garage group that includes BJ's owners Billy and Maddy Carder as members, the former being a two-time cancer survivor.

Proceeds from the sales of the albums went to Relay for Life, but that was just the beginning.

Maddy took to the microphone just after 6 p.m. to announce the raffle drawing of a pink Electra cruiser bicycle that Ocean Pines resident Marty Clarke gave to his wife, Donna, herself a cancer survivor prior to her death in a car accident last November.

"On Nov. 6 we lost a dear friend, mother, grandmother, wife to most of us in this room," Maddy said. "When she passed, Marty immediately came up to me and said, 'I've got something of Donna's I want to donate to your Relay For Life benefit."

Maddy said the Clarkes "have always been a part of our team" during their annual campaign leading up to the Relay For Life of North Worcester County event held at Frontier Town.

"We sold 100 \$20 tickets," Maddy said. "Boom, Donna, \$2,000 more dollars to Relay because of you."

Jeremy Markel, a manager at BJ's, won the drawing.

The night included several other raffle awards tied to Relay For Life, capped by a \$10,000 50/50 prize won by Quiet Storm owner Bill Dreibelbis.

Markel, meanwhile, said he planned to give the bicycle to his girlfriend.

"I'm going to make sure that she properly takes care of it and gives it the respect it's due for the situation," he said. "I met [Donna Clarke] not too long ago, right before the accident. It's definitely moving.

Town offers first look at \$5.6M 2016 budget

The \$80,000 projected increase in capital outlay, Allen said, included \$30,000 for the feasibility study of the former Tyson plant, as well as \$25,000 for the development of architectural design standards to assist the Berlin Planning Commission.

The economic development budget showed the largest percentage increase of any department, up 45 percent due to a significant jump in employee health insurance, as well as a \$50,000 Department of House and Community Development façade grant for the new art gallery on South Main Street.

Finance was nearly flat, with an estimated 2 percent increase. The customer accounts and parks and recreation budgets were unchanged, police rose just 1 percent, and streets

increased 4 percent.

The public works budget looks to drop 31 percent, thanks to an \$80,000 decrease in equipment costs, while the sanitation budget showed a 25 increase due to a request for a new employee.

"We are going to be the big bad people this year and ask for one new employee," Water Resources/Public Works Director Jane Kreiter said "We struggle in public works. There's six individuals [and] people aren't able to take their vacations because there's just so few people. We have more and more events, more and more snow storms, more issues that public works has been involved with. They are overstretched."

Kreiter said she hoped to cover the cost of the new employee by capitalizing on a situation in billing for commercial trash pickup.

"Our quarterly rates are about what commercial, private companies charge for one month," Kreiter said, adding rates would be restructured to increase gradually.

Williams, as well as several councilmembers, praised the combined efforts of public works and water resources following recent snowstorms, and admitted the employees were overtaxed.

"With our [vacation day] system, you either use it or lose it," Kreiter said. "They're unable to take those vacations that they've earned, but also sorely need ... I think that additional person will certainly help ease the burden on all of us."

The buildings and grounds budget, overseen by Human Resources Director Jeffery Fleetwood, showed a projected 20 percent increase. Fleetwood said the big-ticket item was \$45,000 for contracted cleaning services that would cover buildings including the Welcome Center, town hall, the planning building and public restrooms.

Planning estimated a 7 percent increase due largely to a 122 percent estimated jump in contracted services tied to building permit inspections, according to Planning Director Dave Engelhart.

After the department heads had their say, Williams asked Saleh to explore bond options for several additional capital projects, including the potential \$2.5 million to purchase the former Tyson plant, \$1 million for a new police station at the corner of Route 113 and Bay Street and \$500,000 for expanded parking accessible to downtown Berlin.

"They would have to be, basically, through debt service like any other capital improvement," Williams said following the meeting. "It's not in what the department heads recommended, but that's not their job. These are decisions now that we've informed the finance director we'd like to seriously consider, then she can start exploring what our options are."

Williams said the town could

spend an additional \$75,000, spread out over three years, in order to match a grant for construction of the new library.

The mayor and council will meet on May 4 to go over the utilities portion of the budget, followed by a budget work session on May 18.

Williams said the town hopes to formally introduce the budget during a public meeting on May 26, with an anticipated vote on June 8.

Billy, Maddy Carder emphasize importance of cancer research

'What's so great about this town is everybody comes together and helps out," Markel said. "I've never been in a place before that's like that. It makes everybody feel special. I'm definitely honored.

Fittingly last year, on Jan. 3, the town honored the Carders with the Hal Glick Award, presented each year to area residents known for their charitable efforts.

It was in 2000 that Billy was first diagnosed with a non-Hodgkin lymphoma. Twelve years later, doctors told him he had lymphoma of the central nervous system.

"He started losing his vision in May of 2012," Maddy said. "I'll never forget it. He said, 'Have you ever had floaters in your eyes?' I said, 'Yeah, but they're here and gone in a second.' He said, 'I can't seem to get rid of them.'

"He went to several doctors down here and they kept telling him it was just a virus in his eye," Maddy continued. "They kept treating it and his vision kept getting worse and worse."

Billy ended up at the Wilmer Eye Institute at Johns Hopkins in Baltimore, where he had two eye operations and a biopsy that led to the second cancer diagnosis.

"It started in his eyes and that's where we were praying it was going to stay because the central nervous system is your eyes, your brain and your spinal cord," Maddy said. "Unfortunately, on June 30, 2013 we found out it had moved to his brain."

Maddy said doctors prescribed "aggressive" rounds of chemotherapy several times a week. Because of the treatments, Billy lost the ability to walk.

"He was on so many steroids," Maddy said. "He was on 14 different medications. It just never stopped. We were trying to run this place, we're trying to take care of him, we're running up to Hopkins all the time.

"Finally in September 2013, the tumor in his brain started diminishing and they approached us about a bone marrow transplant," Maddy continued. "The gift that we got was that the doctors believed in him and believed in the research they had done. That's why [Relay For Life] is so close to our heart, because of the research. If it had been just a couple years prior, they probably would not have been able to save his life.'

Maddy remembers the difficult time when she was tasked with being a caregiver to her ailing husband, and stressed the importance of staying positive in the face of unspeakable adversity.

'The caregiver – it's not happening to them, but it's happening to them because they're fighting for the person they love's life, but yet there's so much on their shoulders," she said. "You're trying to keep that person's spirit going and you're trying to be that rock, but you're giving them injections and you're cleaning out their ports and you're seeking whatever you can seek from the doctors - however many answers you can get.

"You're online researching things and you're surrounded by people that are going through things, and that's how you get through it because you know you have to stay positive and you can't let any negativity enter your

body," Maddy said. "The minute negativity enters your body, you might as well say goodbye. You have to stay straight and you have to stay positive and you have to fight the fight."


Maddy went on to say the amount of money someone donates is not as important as the fact that they become engaged.

Berlin Dollar General battle ongoing; next stop cir. court

(April 23, 2015) Despite a series of setbacks, developer Oxford Chase and property owner Mike Hamad are still hopeful a deal can be reached to move the existing Dollar General store in Berlin to a new location on Old Ocean City Boulevard near Healthway Drive.

The town's board of zoning appeals granted a parking exception in September, but the project hit a potentially fatal snag in March, when the Berlin planning commission rejected the plan because of objections from neighboring businesses concerning possible traffic issues.

One of the issues is whether Hamad's property or the adjoining 14.5-acre parcel registered to Baltimore resident Stanley J. Smuck, has the right of way.

Hamad told the Gazette in March that the issue dates back several years, when his attorney sent a letter to Smuck asking for clarity on the easements and right of way coming out of the property.

"His attorney sent us a nasty letter back saying, 'I don't want to talk about it. We don't want to do nothing and if you do something we're going to sue you," Hamad said at the time.

Now the developer, who is repre-

sented by attorney Randy Coates, is taking the matter to the Worcester County Circuit Court.

'We're going to see what happens at the court, and then the developer is going to proceed on the right-ofway thing, because really the surveyors and everybody say there is no right of way," Hamad said. "The right of way was only there when the whole property was one farm.

"They never used that right of way for the last 40 years," Hamad continued. "What happened was that propwas subdivided. Decatur Apartments bought one part, the Smucks bought 14 acres, [another party] bought a parcel. Really that doesn't exist. I think they're just playing politics."

Mark Cropper, who represents the Smuck family, said at this point he was "merely observing, monitoring and reporting" to his client the efforts of Oxford Chase through the litiga-

"The planning commission denied the site plan on numerous issues, the very least of which had anything to do with these easements, because the planning commission found that it did not have the authority to decide who was right and who was wrong with regards to the existence of this See PROPERTY Page 8

right of way," Cropper said. "Irrespective of what Randy Coates is trying to achieve, that will not resolve the dispute of what this easement does or does not do."

"The Smucks only concern is that they have access to 346. They have never been against developing the property or the Dollar General," Cropper added.

Coates was not available to comment on the story.

Hamad, meanwhile, said the other party "doesn't have a leg to stand on."

"They're trying to work something with us, but we're not going to work nothing with them," he said. "[The right of way] doesn't exist. The surveyor said it doesn't exist the developer had a surveyor that said it doesn't exist, our attorney said it doesn't exist."

During the planning commission meeting, the panel voted down the proposal following objections from neighbors, including Atlantic General Hospital, that the Dollar General would increase traffic in the area.

Again, Hamad cried foul.

"The town has got to understand that there is a comprehensive plan for development over there," Hamad said. "Traffic is going to be there no matter what. They should have known that that exists."

Hamad sold the property contingent on the Dollar General getting final approval from the town. He recently gave the developer an extension until June 1 to get a deal done.

If the court rules in favor of the developer, the matter would go to the Berlin Board of Appeals. Either way, Hamad vowed to get full value on his property

"If the Smucks want to buy me out, that's fine. If the town wants to buy me out, that's fine. If they deny me my property, they're condemning my property," he said. "We're going to wait and see what the court does, but if they do deny them then that's when I'm going to have to sue somebody, and it has to be the town of Berlin for condemning my property."





Williams, wearing his trademark top hat and not skipping a beat, playfully joined in.

"It was spectacular," said Economic Development Director Ivy Wells, who participated in the flash mob along with Town Administrator Laura Allen and Helen Wiley from Church Mouse.

Wells said Allen came up with the idea, put together a few practice sessions and enlisted extras from Seaside Dance Academy and Stephen Decatur High School.

"The idea came out of a conversation I had with a friend, Amanda Thompson, who is a modern dancer and a city planner in Decatur, Ga.,' Allen said. "In that conversation, I realized we hadn't celebrated our 'America's Coolest Small Town' win through dance. She suggested forming a flash mob as part of our event and agreed to choreograph it.

With the support of the Arts and Entertainment Committee, Allen said she and Wells, Wiley and Decatur Student Maury Izzett rehearsed with Thompson via Skype.

'Maury asked her friends to join in," Allen said. "I talked to Worcester Youth and Family as well as Seaside Dance Academy, and Ivy made sure there was a good spot for it during the event. Everyone I spoke to thought it was a fun idea, especially the mayor."

After practicing with the group, Wells met with Williams to cue him in on his part.

"I told him to not be offended when we interrupted him with a song during his speech, and for him to act surprised and say, 'Hey, I wonder what's going on here,' and for him to just join in. I thought it worked out better than I imagined," she said.

Wells has used video of the flash mob in what she called "a social media experiment." As of Tuesday morning the video received more than 4,000 views on Facebook and an additional 1,000 views on YouTube.

Capitalizing on host DJ BK's touting of "America's coolest mayor" during the stunt, Wells also purchased the URL www.americascoolestmayor.com, redirecting it to www.berlinmainstreet.com.


"By far I received more views from the Facebook direct upload," Wells said. "I just found that was really interesting, and I'm really trying, overall, to get some more video on the town YouTube channel."

Salisbury Park and Flea drawing tri-state crowd

(April 23, 2015) Salisbury's weekly Park and Flea event takes the yard sale to a whole new level, super-sizing the concept of antiques, collectibles and various other bric a brac across an enormous parking lot, where dozens of vendors open their virtual garages for the world to see inside, and hopefully, buy and take a few things home.

Michael Day, former "coolest" small town economic development director in Berlin, runs the event, open every Saturday at 7 a.m. and Sunday at 9 a.m.

"I've been running it for 13 years," Day said. "I started it in 2002 when I was on the Salisbury City Council as a signature project."

Day, at the time a member of the Urban Salisbury board of directors, hatched the flea market to mimic a similar event held every Sunday in Columbia, Md.

The event was originally held in the downtown parking garage before moving the expansive parking lot at the corner of Route 13 and Main Street in downtown Salisbury.

"That cut way back on the advertising, because it was very visible," Day said. "Before we had to have a lot of signage out. Every Friday somebody would have to go out and put signs up — me, usually — and we had to advertise pretty heavily so people could find it. It had its disadvantages."

In the old location, Day said the event created a \$4,000 deficit in Salisbury, but was kept alive because of the amount of people it brought to the downtown area.

"It was an offset," he said. "But when we moved out near the highway, we got a lot of free advertising because it was so much more visible, and we didn't have to have somebody paid because it wasn't inside the city parking garage anymore.

"It became all-volunteer at that point and it's owned and operated by the Salisbury Art and Entertainment Committee," Day continued. "Now it generates money. It's worked out really well."

Day said exhibitors come from all across Maryland, as well as Virginia and Delaware.

"We have some real regulars that come up from all over," Day said. "One See PARK Page 12

guy used to come up every Saturday from Pocomoke and drop off his dry cleaning up here. He switched from Pocomoke to Salisbury because of the flea market."

In the winter months, at a low, 15-20 exhibitors set up shop in the parking lot, according to Day. That number balloons to more than 60 during the summer, drawing upwards of 1,000 visitors each weekend.

"We'll sell out half the time in the summer," Day said. "Our peak has been 93 vendors on a Saturday and 65 on a Sunday."

Day described the items for sale as, "everything from junk to antiques."

"It's way across the board," he said. "It's a flea market, flea market, flea market."

Organizers of the event are looking to increase the draw from areas like Berlin, Ocean City, Ocean Pines and Selbyville, where Park and Flea has been stepping up its advertising budget. The event also recently joined the Ocean City Chamber of Commerce.

For first-time shoppers, Day advised, "Get there as early as you can."

"You can spend as much time as you want, but usually people take half an hour to an hour walking through," he said. "You never know what you can find. I've seen a quilt sell for \$1,200 right next to stuff selling for a quarter."

Heritage Festival set for Saturday

Annual Berlin event to feature Williamsburg style historical reenactments

(April 23, 2015) Saturday's Berlin Heritage Festival promises a portal into the past, with displays, artifacts, and live reenactments set to transport guests back through time.

Organizer Pat Diniar said the event began with a group of "historyminded" people who felt the town's history was going under-appreciated.

"We're party animals in Berlin," she said. "We'll party at the top of the hat, but nobody remembers the start of the town, which was 1868. There were no elected officials, it was run by a committee until 1897, 1898 when they elected their first mayor, who was John Pitt, who we're going to honor."

More than a dozen vintage vehicles will be displayed throughout the downtown area, including a 1918 touring car owned by Jack Benny, Reece Cropper's 1941 Cadillac, a 1957 Thunderbird and fire trucks from the 1920s.

Dinair said guests will also see tandem bikes and historical vegetable trucks, as well as artisans churning, braiding, hooking, spinning, weaving, lacing, quilting and knitting, all in period costumes.

"The thing that makes us different from everybody else is we're going to have street scenes," Diniar said, comparing the key attractions to those scenes seen in Williamsburg, Va.

Karen McClure, president of the Ocean Pines Players, wrote the historical segments.

"We're doing little short plays, like 10-15 minutes long," McClure said. "Each of these little plays depicts a different period in the history of Berlin."

"Decoration Day," a view into 1920's Berlin that includes a "generational clash" between Edwardian mothers and their flapper daughters, begins at noon.

"Civic Duty," set in 1942 just after the United States entered World War II, bows at 1:30, followed by "On the Road," set in 1959, at 3 p.m.

"The setup is there is a young girl who wants to be a beatnik and her mother, obviously, is horrified by this," McClure said, added that audiences could expect a twist ending.

McClure said the segments, which will be stated near the Atlantic Hotel, took months of research in order to produce.

"Many of the things that emerged in the research have stimulated me to start a project with some other people to do other historic plays down the line," McClure said. "There's a lot that I learned that people just don't know about various people and events and attitudes over time, and they're getting lost.

"In the meantime, we're hoping the street scenes entertain people while we teach them a little something about how the town was," Mc-Clure added.

Charlie Flagiello, performing as "Uke Ellington," will play period-appropriate music between performances

Capping off the event at 4 p.m. is a performance by the Pine Tones Chorus on the steps of the Atlantic Hotel.

"Nothing like this has been done down here," Diniar said. "We're acting out the times of this country, and we'll have things about the history of national posted all throughout the streets.

"It's an enormous amount of research, but I'm fortunate in that I love history and I have a group of people around me who love history. At the drop of a hat we'll tell you everything we know," Diniar continued. "It should be a nice day, and we hope everyone enjoys themselves and maybe learns a little something too."

The Heritage Festival runs from 11 a.m. to 4 p.m. A rain date is set for Sunday.





Chavis said the brewery can keep overhead costs as low as \$1,000, meaning almost every dollar raised in every facet goes directly to Habitat for Humanity.

Habitat's efforts in Worcester County struck a particularly resonant chord with the Burley Oak team, according to Chavis, because the nonprofit assists locals not unlike the dozen or so employees at the brewery.

"Anybody in this county that would go to a bank and say, 'hey, I don't have 20 percent to put down,' the bank will say, 'We're sorry. You'll never be able to buy a home," Chavis said. "The Habitat of Worcester County can help somebody purchase a home at zero percent interest, and it's extremely affordable and you pay directly to [the nonprofit].

"In the past two and a half years we've been able to provide jobs to 14

people, including health insurance, and we're really proud to be able to do that and be a part of the community," Chavis continued. "So, to be able to help somebody like the people we live

and work with every day was kind of a big deal for us. It gives people like us to purchase a home at an affordable rate."

Burley set a goal to raise

\$22,000 during the event, enough to pay for the framing, walls and roofing for the exterior of an entire house.

Tickets are \$40, which includes unlimited craft beer samples, live entertainment from 2-8 p.m. and admission to the adjacent art market. Burley Oak will also sell t-shirts made specifically for the event for \$25.

All of the proceeds from tickets and t-shirts, as well as 20 percent of the art market sales, go to Habitat for Humanity of Worcester County.

> The event also includes a food truck provided by SoDel Concepts, as well as a cornhole tournament with prizes awarded to the top-three finishers.

Sponsorships are available with visibility incentives, starting at

the "blue" level for \$250, and topping off with the "gold" package for \$2,000.

"We just figured it would be a fun way to raise money that's not terribly expensive," Chavis said. "For \$40 dollars it's pretty affordable, and you're getting unlimited beer and live music all day. Hopefully it will be very successful, and we plan on volunteering and taking part in the actual build of the home after everything is set up."

Bowland said Habitat was "excited" to have the opportunity to partner with Burley Oak.

"They champion the movement to buy local and support local businesses, which in turn helps local families and stabilizes the community," she said. "Habitat for Humanity shares that sentiment.

This festival is the coming together of all of these efforts. The money raised by the community celebrating at this event, purchasing goods created by talented local artists, enjoying the craft beer made by Burley Oak, will help build a home for one of our local families," Bowland added.

Garden Market set to open for season, April 25

(April 23, 2015) With the warming weather comes the opportunity to reap the benefits of the Eastern Shore farmland's bounty, much of which is available at an increasing number of roadside markets.

One such stop, Garden Market on 10835 Cathell Road roughly a mile outside of Ocean Pines, reopens for the season with limited hours starting on Saturday, April 25.

Husband-and-wife team Lynn and Cindy Crockett started the market part-time in 2008, eventually turning it into a full-time endeavor when Lynn retired from the construction business.

The market originally was set inside a small 10-by-15 space, considered a temporary roadside stand, before expanding to a permanent 300-square-foot space with additional parking this year.


In the beginning of the season, Lynn Crockett said, crops grown on their own farm are largely supplemented by regional produce, including tomatoes.

"We get a lot of stuff as it's coming up the coast until our stuff starts coming off, like strawberries, which is one of the first things to come off, and we have a small you-pick section," he said. "The produce starts very early in Florida, and then we follow the produce as it's coming up the coast. We'll start off with Florida tomatoes and Georgia tomatoes, and Georgia corn right around Memorial Day.

"By mid-summer we're probably selling 75 percent of our own produce," Crockett continued. "We also supplement with local produce during the times when we can't produce enough for the market."

The market also offers homegrown hanging baskets of flowers and homemade organic canned goods, as well as jams, jellies and sauces from Mc-Cutcheon's Factory Store in Frederick, Md

Garden Market is open from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. on weekends, expanding to stay open seven days a week starting on Memorial Day, running through October.

Money, emotion battle science in zoning dispute

Zoning fights such as the one taking place in Berlin between the developers of a would-be Dollar General on Old Ocean City Boulevard and the town's Planning Commission, almost always end badly for one party or the other.

Although that would seem to be stating the obvious, the issue in such cases is not just winning or losing, but how much the parties involved invest of themselves and their resources before victory or defeat is declared.

That's what determines the severity of the loss or the quality of the win in zoning battles, emotion and money and the amount of either that are committed to the fight.

Complicating the situation is that zoning is more of a science than it is an art, because the state laws that empower local zoning boards don't allow for as much interpretation as some people would think.

Proponents and opponents of a potential development can argue all they want about subjective matters such as appropriateness, appearances, preferences and such, but it remains that either an application meets zoning requirements or it doesn't. There's not much room for an in between.

Without getting into whether this particular project should be permitted, or even on whether it's the best thing that could happen to that property for the town as a whole, if this thing does end up before a judge, the planning commission will need to provide provable reasons that would be applicable to any commercial project of similar scope on that parcel.

We're not necessarily rooting for anyone in this dispute, but this does seem to be one of those situations where both money and emotion are going to be invested before it's all over.



There is a \$25 minimum donation to participate in the 16th annual event. Registration begins at 8:30 a.m. at the inlet in front of the Ocean City Life-Saving Station Museum.

"It's a great community event for kids, families and the large population of people in Worcester County and the surrounding areas who have rescued animals," said Heather Bahrami, chair of the Boardwalkin' committee.

Participants can begin walking with their four-legged friends anytime after 9 a.m. Walkers can choose between the full 5-mile Boardwalk route from the inlet to 27th Street and back, take the 2.5-mile trip to 12th Street and back or decide on a different course, she said.

Complimentary photographs will be taken of owners and their pets with a red carpet laid out down on the pier.

Refreshments will be provided by Harrison's Harbor Watch at the inlet and Layton's on 16th Street.

Owners can also enter their dogs into contests for Largest Dog, Smallest Dog, Best Dressed and Best Trick. Winners will take home a basket filled with dog treats, toys, beds, food, leashes and collars. Look forward to all kinds of goodies pet-related, Bahrami said.

Cats will not be left out. Enter the annual Cutest Cat photo contest. Photos of all the cutest felines will be posted for the public to vote on.

Photos should including the owner and pet's names, address, phone number and e-mail address. The winner will take home a prize basket full of cat-related treats. Pictures will not be returned and become property of the Worcester County Humane Society.

Individual participants and teams who raise the most funds will receive gift baskets containing gift certificates to restaurants, a two-night stay at the Hilton and dog items from Greene Turtle, Bahrami said.

Walkers who raised \$25 will receive a dog walk bandana. AT-shirt is the prize for a \$50 donation and a dog walk lunch tote is given to participants who collected \$100. Money and pledge sheets are needed to qualify for the limited number of prizes.

Last year, \$25,000 was raised for the shelter with about 120 walkers and their dogs. A couple of activities were also going on in Ocean City during last year's events, which effected the turnout, Bahrami said.

This weekend, the goal is to raise \$50,000 for the Worcester County Humane Society, which relies mainly on donations and provides care to animals until they are adopted into suitable homes.

As of Tuesday morning, \$12,540 had been raised so far.

"There is a need in the area and we found 240 different families for animals last year," Bahrami said.

This is the first time registration was online and 535 people have said they are coming on Facebook. "If we get half, it's amazing," she added.

Attendees can adopt a shelter dog for the event and must make arrangements in advance by calling the shelter at 410-213-0146.

"It continues to grow and we try to make it bigger and better each year," Bahrami said. "It's a fun time and I am looking forward to it."

South Moon Under on 81st Street and Malibu's Surf Shop on Eighth Street and the Boardwalk will be donating a percentage of their sales on Saturday to the humane society.

The weekend-long event kicks off on Friday, April 24, at Adolfo's on the Ocean at 13th Street and the Boardwalk from 5-9 p.m. with a spaghetti and meatball dinner including a side salad, rolls, dessert and non-alcoholic beverages for \$20 at the door. Adolfo's will donate a percentage from each ticket purchased to the Worcester County Humane Society, and there will be a silent auction to support the shelter as well.


Additionally, Republic Services customers may place up to four bags of leaves or yard debris curbside for each scheduled pickup. This is in addition to regular trash pickup.

Feeling sluggish? Why not try escargot

There's just something about the French that I adore. Maybe it's because of my namesake; mayhap I long to understand my lineage long-

the old country. The first Souplis, Andres, landed America 1962. It wasn't long before the name was Anglicized closer to the name as know it today.

removed from

French class is one of my favorites to teach, although I must say that teaching it one night a week for six weeks is next to impossible. There are signature dishes, to be sure, but the country is so vast and the culinary traditions so deep, that it is very difficult to give even a skimming of teachings on French food. But every year, when I teach about the southwest corner of the country, I reunite with an old friend: a la Perigourdine. But more on that later.

I'm sorry that you have to suffer through this, but every now and then I have to write about something that I know most people will not cook. The time and the ingredients alone will be an immediate turn-off for many of the readers out there. Of course, the fact that I'm writing about slugs might have something to do with it as well.

OK, maybe they're not slugs, but rather snails, or escargots. But this classical French combination transcends normal escargots and brings it to a whole new level of cool for

When things are cooked "a la Perigourdine,"or in the style of Perigord, there are a few essential ingredients that find themselves in the dish: black truffle, ham and walnuts. "Walnuts with snails?" you may ask yourself. Yes, walnuts with snails. Slimy, sidewalk-trekking garden snails. And they are delicious.

Now, not being one to leave my reader hanging on the cusp of confusion as to where to find the sundry provisions to make this dish, all I need to do is to direct you to great online sources for these goods; Williams-Sonoma.com for the truffle salt and Dartagnan.com for the rest. The latter, named for that famed, rascally fourth Musketeer, is home to a great many French gourmet products and one of my favorite places to shop for retail goods.

As for the truffle salt, all I have to do is get you to try it. Yes, it is pungent and yes, a little goes a long way. But the results are gorgeous, and at school we have been known to use it on grilled meats, vegetables, soups, terrines, fried foods and more. It is simply an amazing seasoning to use.

And when you make your escargots a la Perigourdine, make sure that you have a nice bottle of Pinot Noir on hand. The lighter, red wine will complement the duck, truffle salt and garlic well and leave you with a pairing made in heaven. You can sit back and hear the words of Athos, another Musketeer, as he muses on the mysteries of life:

"Life is a chaplet of little miseries which the philosopher counts with a smile. Be philosophers, as I am, gentlemen; sit down at the table and let us drink. Nothing makes the future look so bright as surveying it through a glass of chambertin.'

Slugs Perigourdine

Serves 6 guests 1 can Escargot Sliced black truffle 3 oz. country ham, fine julienne 10 oz. Garlic butter (recipe follows) 1/4 c. Walnut halves 6 oz. Duck confit (recipe follows) Truffle salt, as needed

Divide the escargots evenly between six ramekins or if you're lucky enough to own escargot dishes or shells, use them. I don't bother with them, so do as you wish.

Top the escargot with the shaved truffle, ham, garlic butter and wal-

Top this with the duck confit and bake until heated throughout.

Taste and season accordingly with the truffle salt. This is powerful stuff, so go easy. But, once you get a taste for it, you will probably always keep it around.

Garlic Butter

Makes about 1 quart 1 lb. unsalted butter 1 head garlic, smashed and minced Juice of 1/2 lemon 1/2 c. Italian parsley, chiffonade 1/2 tsp. dried thyme Salt and black pepper, to taste Beat the butter to soften until it is

well-whipped. Add remaining ingredients and season to taste.

Refrigerate until needed or leave out if you are using soon.



Duck Confit

Yields 6 duck legs 1/4 c. Kosher salt 6 cloves garlic, smashed 1 shallot, fine julienne Thyme, as needed Cracked black pepper 6 duck legs Duck fat, as needed

with plastic wrap.

Yes, this takes a couple of days to make, but it is so worth it! Plus, it freezes beautifully, especially if you vacuum pack it.

Salt the duck legs well and place in a single layer in a tight pan.

Top with garlic, shallot, thyme and pepper and press down, covering well

Allow to sit in the refrigerator for 36 hours.

Rinse very well and place back in the pan with the duck fat (you know? The stuff that you have just laying around your house).

Roast at 225F for about 3 hours, or until the meat pulls right off the bone. Drain the oil, straining and reserving for your next batch and when cool enough to handle, shred the duck.

Refrigerate or freeze until needed, or use immediately.






