Atlantic General Hospital marks 20th year

From belief to building, it wasn't an easy road

BERLIN - Twenty years ago on May 21, the long and tortuous path to establish a community hospital in Worcester County came to fruition. The opening of Atlantic General Hospital on that Friday saw long-time proponents, political figures, volunteers and business people gather to witness the culmination of years of politicking, planning, fund-raising and, eventually, building the area's first acute care facility.

It was a triumphant moment made possible by an exceptionally determined group of citizens, especially considering that the effort to give the county its own hospital dates back to 1945.

That was when more than 60 members and guests of the Lions Club attended a dinner meeting at the Atlantic Hotel to announce \$105,025 in pledges to the War Memorial Worcester County Hospital campaign.

But that and subsequent attempts to

build a hospital failed for a variety of reasons until early in the 1990s, when the Worcester County Commissioners created a citizens group to pursue this goal once again. Members of this assembly came from every area of the coastal community: lawyers, doctors, business people, volunteers, builders, Realtors, retirees, nurses, restaurateurs, teachers and politicians.

The difference then was that all the elements necessary to make Atlantic General Hospital happen came together at the right moment — the dedication of the citizens group, the support of local Continued from Page 2

Carson accepts top job at Painesville, Ohio

BERLIN - Town Administrator Anthony Carson has resigned his position effective June 30, in order to accept a job as city manager of Painesville, Ohio, just northeast of Cleveland, the Berlin mayor and council announced this week.

Carson has been a manager in county and municipal government for 17 years and has more than 20 years of business management in the private sector. He has served as Berlin's administrator since January 2009. Painesville is a municipality with a population of just over 20,000 residents.

"I enjoyed my time as town administrator in Berlin," Carson said. 'I was fortunate to work with a dedicated mayor and council whose only goal was the betterment of Berlin. I was also fortunate to work with a great town staff. I will always have a great

governments, the generosity of the public and the intervention of a powerful ally at the state level, then Gov. William Donald Schaefer.

Altogether, the public donated some \$4 million to the cause, while governments contributed \$12.5 million. AGH volunteers, with the help of friends from across the state, also hacked their way through a jungle of regulations in order to receive permission to build.

From blurry concept to blueprints to a fully functioning facility, AGH has continued to grow over the past two decades, not just in the numbers of people served or the size of its staff, but technologically as well.

The hospital, which serves more than 117,000 patients per year from Selbyville, Del. to Pocomoke, has made electronic medical records integration one of its strategic initiatives and improving the quality of its services a core principle.

President and CEO Michael Franklin said at the hospital's anniversary banquet on May 2 that part of the celebration was to commemorate "the good quality work that people do here." He told the audience of roughly 150 employees, executives and dignitaries that the staff at AGH performed "some of the best quality care you can find anywhere."

Franklin was keen to highlight technological advances that he said had helped shorten anesthesia, antibiotics and emergency care wait times, improve quality and efficiency of medical and surgical care, and expedite the healing of wounds.

But he also said that the evolving focus of the hospital was to minimize the need for acute care in the first place. "If you need us, we are here," he said. "But we are going to help you to not need us."

To that end, Franklin recognized several staff members whose diligence had allowed the hospital to achieve major improvements in infection control and phar-

Jane Hwa-Huang, received the "Patient Safety Ambassador Award," which is presented each quarter to staff members who have identified and reported a potential patient safety risk. Franklin said Haw-Huang and two of her interns, University of Maryland Eastern Shore pharmacy students Mike Geesaman and Bangura Sarian, identified an error in the pharmacy computer system that would have allowed patients to receive a duplicate of a particular medication.

"Because of their diligence in identifying and reporting the problem, the hospital is able to avoid such potential errors in the future," Franklin said.

errors in the future," Franklin said.

He also recognized the Housekeeping Department staff, whose work has led to a major increase in the satisfaction level of patients and whose cleandown techniques in hospital rooms had helped the facility to decrease the likelihood of hospital borne infections.

Hugh Cropper, chairman of the Quality Committee, said "Every contribution of every employee makes a difference for the quality of service we provide."

Franklin also expressed his appreciation for the hospital's 360 volunteers, who he said provided services worth a value of \$600,000 annually.

Melanie Pursel, executive director

of the Ocean City Chamber of Commerce, was on hand to present Franklin with a certificate of excellence for the hospital's 20 years of providing service to the community.

John H. "Jack" Burbage, Jr., chairman of the AGH board of Trustees, called AGH, "The best small hospital in the United States." He said he was proud to be a part of it and remarked that when the institution had opened it was "under budget and on time."

AGH began as a 62-bed hospital and remains so today, but many of expansions and improvements have been instituted over the years, the latest of which is an expanded and renovated cafeteria.

Ten years ago, the original small emergency room was expanded when the hospital added 33,000 square feet of space. In 2008, the AGH campus gained the 42,000 square-foot James G. Barrett Medical Office Building.

But back in the early 1990s, as those initial advocates organized in pursuit of what everyone knew, but would not acknowledge, was a long shot, they could not have envisioned what their efforts would bring about.


That \$27 million project, which opened with a staff of fewer than 30 physicians and 200 employees, became an economic engine with nearly 200 physicians, 800 employees and an annual payroll of more than \$30 million.

appreciation for Berlin and its residents."

"Berlin has been extremely well-served these past four years by a very experienced and capable person who has done an outstanding job in managing the town during a time of both challenge and change," Mayor Williams said. "Tony has played a key role in the significant progress that has been made in transforming our town's policies, plans and operations to meet the changing needs of our community, not just for today, but for the next generation and beyond.

"The council members and I express our thanks and gratitude for the leadership Tony has provided in helping Berlin build a foundation for success that those who follow us can build on throughout the 21st Century," Williams said.

Williams added that Carson is committed to doing everything possible to ensure a smooth transition in the administration of the town's municipal government.

In one respect, Carson will be going home. He hails from that section of Ohio, and like many of the "boomerang" generation who are repopulating the Eastern Shore, he is heading to a job that will be an hour commute from family and friends where he had lived before coming to Berlin.

Carson compared the community atmosphere of Painesville to Berlin.

"Just add another 15,000 people," he said.

The town's system of governance is slightly different in that Carson will be required to handle day-to-day governmental operations. In lieu of a mayor, Painesville's city manager position implements the policies of the City Council, similar to the relation of a CEO and board of directors, he said.

Over the course of his time in government, Carson has managed cities with populations as large as 225,000, he said.

'Operation We Care' packages set for shipment

Donations being taken of needed items to be sent to troops overseas

WORCESTER COUNTY — The first donations are being accepted for Operation We Care, the non-profit grass-roots effort started and coordinated by Jeff Merritt and his wife, along with a philanthropic group of 36 residents, to provide care packages for Delmarva military members serving overseas. The first of two shipments this year will be mailed out mid-May.

Merritt said Tuesday that the 501(c) (3) organization has 24 drop-off locations on the peninsula. In this area, drop off sites are the Berlin library, OC Floor Gallery, all First Shore Federal Savings & Loan Bank branches, Harley Davidson of Seaford, Del., and Minuteman Press of Salisbury.

In downtown Berlin, Operation We Care will commence Friday at The Church Mouse during the May Day Play Day and Second Friday events.

Merritt said he and his wife started the program in 2007 when they realized there was no organized effort to ship provisions to service members from the local area and they wanted to show their support. The organization collects donations, snack bars, toiletries or cash donations, which will be used to prepare and pay care packages to troops from Maryland and Delaware serving in Afghanistan. After starting the care package drives with three-dozen volunteers, Merritt said his team has grown to more than 200.

According to Merritt, "The response from business, civic and service organizations has just been amazing." He said people of the area are constantly stepping up to help, a situation that he said reminds him to be thankful he lives on the Eastern Shore.

For example, because of the Chesapeake Bay Girl Scout Council's donation of 250 cases of cookies, "Every package gets a box," Merritt said. Another 25 cases go to the soldiers con-

valescing at Walter Reed, he added.

Merritt said the most coveted items are Chef Boyardee pasta in poptop cans, bar soap, shampoo and body wash, granola bars, hot chocolate packets, non-aerosol deodorant, instant oatmeal packets, microwave popcorn, Ramen noodles (wrapped brick-shaped type, not noodles in a cup), tea bags and zipper seal plastic bags to help prevent cross-contamination.

According to Merritt, the goal this year is to ship 500 care packages in the two shipments made in mid-May for Armed Forces Day and in November for Veterans Day. The cost of shipping each package is \$14.85, he said. The organization spent \$12,000 on shipping last year, and the cash donations go towards that cost, he said.

On the Web site, organizers invited school teachers who are looking for class projects to get students involved in the effort by arranging to color the inside of the boxes with supportive messages of thanks and appreciation.

Privately funded tourist trolley proposal falls short for this year

Effort will resume in '14, as proponents look for more support of system

BERLIN — Officials with the Tri-County Council for the Lower Eastern Shore of Maryland were hoping to inaugurate a tourist trolley on May 20 that would serve a route through Berlin, Ocean Pines and West Ocean this summer. But due to the economic climate, the project will be postponed until next year, Brad Bellacicco, deputy transit director for the Shore Transit Division of the council said Tuesday.

He said the buses that were to be used were only acquired a short time ago. "We were trying hard to make something happen on short notice," he said Riggin Johnson, director of the council's Shore Transit Division, said last Friday that the council agreed to buy two out-of-service Ocean City municipal buses and came up with the idea to convert and operate them as tourist trolleys.

Shore Transit, the area's public transit agency, offers fixed route and origin to destination public transportation for Somerset, Wicomico and Worcester counties.

Unlike the familiar orange and white

Shore Transit buses, the trolley system would have been geared toward tourism and would be privately funded. Annapolis has been operating a similar tourist trolley for the past six months, Johnson said

The council had hoped, with the aid of the Ocean City Chamber of Commerce and the county Economic Development Department, to raise \$120,000 the project. But as of last week, it had only about half that.



BES STEM LESSON

Berlin Historic Commission OKs sign designations and fence

Housekeeping night for commission as it deals with routine matters

BERLIN — The Berlin Historic District Commission began its May 1 meeting with a unanimous vote to reelect Carol Rose and Rick Stack as chairwoman and vice chairman, respectively. The commissioners also approved a proposed privacy fence, a design for signs that will be proposed for the Architectural History Recognition Program, and meeting minutes for a special meeting held April 17.

Reggie Mariner, who owns a property on S. Main Street that, abuts the back of the Donaway Furniture warehouse, sought permission to erect a wooden privacy fence along the rear and sides of his property.

"The rear property line is part of the boundary of the Historic District," according to the staff report to the commission.

Planning and Zoning Director Chuck Ward, who serves as the staff liaison to the commission, advised that the submitted proposal merited consideration for approval in his report to the commission.

"Staff suggests that the proposed fence will add a visual barrier from private properties, but will not create a visual barrier from the street frontage. The proposed fence is consistent with other Historic District design standards across the state," Ward said in the report.

The design of the wooden fence, as described by Mariner, would include medium-toned stained vertical slats, separated in two row sections by dark stained borders. Although he asked for clearance for all three sides, he said he only wanted to build a privacy wall along the rear of the property initially, but wanted the option of installing identically designed fences along the sides at a later time if it proved to be necessary.

Commissioner Joel Todd asked Ward whether there would be a time limitation on the commission's approval.

According to Ward, once granted, permission for the erection of the fence would last for as long as Mariner owned the property.

Todd also asked for a staff recommendation on whether a request to build only the rear part of the fence would have strengthened or weakened the possibility of an opinion to recommend approval of the proposal. Ward said if the proposal been only for a rear fence it would have strengthened his recommendation, because it would have been more of an accent, rather than a containment, structure.

When Commissioner Mary Moore asked if the rear fence proposal would serve as a privacy screen, Mariner replied that it would and that it would save his neighbor, who does not live under the jurisdiction of the commission, from hav-

ing to erect a fence in that location.

The commissioners unanimously approved the proposal.

The commission also approved the design for polished natural wood signs with burnished carved lettering for use in the Architectural Heritage recognition program. The 12-inch by 8-inch rectangular signs would recognize architectural landmarks throughout the town in preparation for the first "Berlin Historic Festival," which is scheduled for July 6.

The proposal, which was presented to the commission by Pat Diniar, was unanimously approved by the commission. The signs will be designed by local artist Jim Coltellino, who uses laser technology to create artwork on exotic and domestic hardwoods.

The commission went on to approve the minutes of an April 17 special meeting when they had voted unanimously to approve a new monument sign at the South Main Street entrance to Buckingham Elementary School.

The special meeting marked the fourth attempt by Buckingham Principal Roger Pacella and sign designer Jamie Covington of Pocomoke-based Selby Signs to get the Berlin Historic Commission to approve the design for the proposed new sign. A decision by the commission, which met April 3, was postponed for lack of an affirmative quorum

The commission also approved a second proposal that was postponed from the April 3 meeting, according to the meeting minutes. Newt Chandler of Decatur Investments, reportedly had requested approval to install a metal roofed awning with composite fascia over the south-facing door of their building on S. Main Street. Vice-Chairman Rick Stack

recused himself from the discussion and vote due to a conflict, according to the minutes.

During the special meeting, the commission discussed the practice of the owners of the Globe Theater and Si'Culi restaurant placing café tables along the sidewalks in front of their establishments.

Town Councilmember Lisa Hall addressed the commission about her concerns that the practices might hinder passage by wheelchairs and strollers, in violation of the Americans with Disabilities Act, the minutes reported. At the time of the meeting, the commission was waiting to receive advice from the town attorney on the legal ramifications the sidewalk tables.

In a separate April 19 letter, the commission ended an agreement allowing Continued on Page 14

the owner of Town Center Antiques to place the store's sandwich board on Main Street. "The Commission found that the sign's quality and design were not consistent with other signs in the District, but did provide the allowance of the sign for the remainder of the 2012 calendar year," the letter said.

In the letter, Ward said "As the enforcement officer for the Commission, it

is my duty to advise you to no longer display your sidewalk sign until you have returned to the Commission to either receive approval for the existing sign [or] approval of a new sign."

It is expected that staff will recommend the sandwich board signs be eliminated in the new draft of the town's zoning code, based on the discussions of the Historic District Commission.

With the billiards and electronic sports games, the pub looks like a comfortable Friday night hangout spot.

Wood is a lab technician, who makes animal vaccines and has 20 years of restaurant experience, having worked at the Royal Exchange in Salisbury, Waterman's Cove and the Marina Deck. Blake, who

owns B&B Security, also worked at the Marina Deck. Ward, who is a videographer at Seacrets, is the newest member of the trio.

The décor is definitely shooting for a sports bar feel, with team and bar memorabilia on the walls, windows and light fixtures and football grid carpet in the dining area. The deck and yard in back are being prepped for full service outdoor dining this summer.

Wood said new games that will soon be added include foosball, bubble hockey, and inside basketball.

According to their menu, the drink lineup includes domestic and imported beers, domestic and specialty drafts, and wine and wine-based liquor. Casino funds will aid small business

The recent announcement that the Maryland Board of Public Works has designated Worcester County one of three fund managers to oversee distribution of casino monies set aside to provide loans to small, minority and woman-owned businesses, is great news for small businesses locally that have had trouble getting traditional loans to expand or modernize in recent years.

Approximately \$430,000 in annual loan funding will be available for companies with fewer than 500 employees and revenues averaging less than \$35 million over three years. Fifty percent of the funding must be lent to businesses located within a 10-mile radius of Ocean Downs. These monies will be available for up to five years, with a total estimate of more than \$2 million to be allocated over that period.

Regardless of which side of the casino fence you sit, this is a real boon to our local economy, as small businesses make up the largest segment of the marketplace, and more importantly provide area residents with the majority of job opportunities.

The influx of new retail and other commercial space in the West Ocean City, Ocean Pines and Berlin areas the past few years has been encouraging, providing more of a year-round job and economic base for the areas outside the resort.

These funds will go a long way in ensuring this progression. Whether it's helping a business maintain employees through leaner winter months or used to expand product lines and services, the money will be well spent.

Told sign not up to par

Editor,

I'm a merchant in the downtown area of Berlin, and have been for many years. I am a past president of the chamber and have done lots of community works for our lovely town.

I wish to take issue with some of the recent events a few overzealous members of our community are spearheading. Council member Lisa Hall has deemed it necessary to get rid of sidewalk tables and sandwich signs from the downtown area. Of course this will only hurt a few merchants of our great community, but why?

The ambience of our town is very nice and a few tables in front of The Globe do not hurt anyone; in fact, it brings a nice homey feel that welcomes all our guests. Something we have tried very hard over the years to get people talking about, and to encourage them

to bring their friends to our gem away from the beach.

Lisa didn't present this revelation to us, the merchants, at our monthly merchant meetings, but just went to the press and presented her case. And the effort doesn't stop with café tables but continues to sandwich signs. The Historic District Commission is taking up the banner of getting rid of sandwich signs and here as an example, we have a 36-inch by 24-inch sign in three basic colors — teal border, white background and black letters and painted by an artist with stenciled letters. The HDC, notably Mary Moore, found the sign not to the quality of its liking and has asked that it be removed. When I received a letter from the HDC, I went and talked to Chuck Ward, the city inspector and was informed that we were only given a temporary license and to get the sign permanently approved we had to get it redone to meet his and the HDC's approval.

To me, this is a slap in our business face. The sign was not on Main Street, but down in front of our Pitt Street Store to get people on Main Street's attention. The sad part is, we

have to pay the town for a business license, not including any kind of signage outside of our store, which costs additional money. Then we have to bend to the wishes of some committee members' preferences, which is not in the guidelines.

Chuck Ward expressed to me that he didn't want people walking in the streets to go around signs. However, there are only a few places in town that the sidewalk is limited. Main Street has on one side of the street a 6-foot-wide or larger sidewalk, which can accommodate any sign, so the effort to get rid of these informational and direction markers for the side street merchants is not a productive move.

If you check out old photos of Main Street, you will find the signs all over the place and even merchandise in front of stores everywhere.

Our town has grown and we present a clean friendly place to bring the family for a day trip so why the intrusion. Our community needs better direction than this, and friendlier officials to help keep the business community growing.

Dear Mayor,

I have heard rumors in town regarding the removal of all "sandwich board" signage for downtown business per the request of the Berlin Historic Committee. I would like to express my disapproval and disappointment in even the idea or suggestion of this.

As a small business owner, we followed the guidelines of applying for, getting approval of and paying the permitting fee to have a "sandwich board" sign promote our business. When we opened in 2010 and were located on Main Street, our "sandwich board" signage attracted many customers into our store.

In 2012, when we moved to our new location on Bay Street, we were given the approval to place our sign outside of the Atlantic Hotel since we were not on Main Street and the sidewalk outside of our shop is too narrow. This "sandwich board" is now essential to the success of our small business.

On or off of the Main Street, these "sandwich boards" are a vital marketing/promotional tool, directing a significant amount of customer traffic to all of our locations. This type of signage is even more important for all of the downtown businesses that are located off of the "main drag."

More than 40 percent of our "walk-in" business mentions that, and I quote, "we would not have found you, if not for your sign on Main Street." Other business owners in small towns who have been forced to remove "sandwich board" signage, have noticed a significant drop in business, which results in loss of revenue and jobs.

"Sandwich Boards" are historic, gaining popularity in the 19th century and can be seen in most towns from Berlin, Md. to Sonoma, Calif. They are without a doubt effective in increasing customer traffic to and therefore revenue generating for every business that chooses to use them and I strongly disagree with their removal. Thank you for your careful consideration regarding this matter.





'Great moms' sometimes are volunteers who simply care

Foster parents, advocates and caring individuals also make a difference

WORCESTER COUNTY —With the annual commemoration of gratitude for the caring and selflessness of biological mothers and grandmothers in recognition of Mother's Day on May 12, a canvassing of local child service and faith organizations uncovered a small sampling of some pretty "great mom" surrogates in the area as well. Here we highlight three.

■ Great foster parent: Robin Cook of Bishopville

Terry Edwards, resource home worker for the Worcester County Department of Social Services, who said the term "foster parent" has been updated to "resource parent" to reflect the expanded roles they play in the lives of the young people they help, said all of the 19 resource parents in the program "Do such an outstanding job."

She commended Robin Cook for her ability to maintain biological connections between the children placed in the foster care system and their biological family members. "She is very good at helping the children maintain their cultural identity," Edwards said of Cook.

According to Edwards, even when parental rights to their children have been terminated, Cook stays in contact with the birth parents if possible. Cook and her husband have fostered three children, and have adopted one child privately and one child through the Worcester County G.O.L.D. (Giving Other Lives Dignity) program.

■ Great child advocate: Pat Schumaker of Ocean Pines

Brigitte Saulsbury, program director for the Lower Shore CASA (Court Appointed Special Advocate) organization described Pat Schumaker as, "Extremely dedicated to the program and her role of advocate."

The CASA program, which operates within Worcester Youth and Family Counseling services, helped 77 children in the area last year, according to Saulsbury.

She said the program has 45 advocates, who have each undergone hours of intensive training, background checks, and taken oaths of office. Their roles are to get to know the abused or neglected children in their care, along with the family members, therapists and teachers who also touch the lives of those children, in order to submit reports on behalf of the children in court. "I'm pretty amazed at the work they do," which Saulsbury said can be heart wrenching.

She said Schumaker goes beyond what is normally expected and has been extremely involved with the two teenagers, one young girl and baby boy she has been assigned in the program. Schumaker helps the children build life experiences and basic social skills with activities like dining out and tea parties, according to Saulsbury.

"She also helps train new volunteers," she said.

Schumaker, a retired business owner, said her objective was to help the children she advocates for establish permanence in their lives, in addition to assuring their safety and well-being. She has two daughters and four grandchildren, although, she pointed out she is legally barred from allowing interactions between her court appointed children and her own children.

She said of the children she represents, "I call them my CASA children. They call me Miss Pat." She said she sees the program as a sacred relationship, one where she has been entrusted to be in their lives at a time when the children are in their most vulnerable situations.

Schumaker said her saddest moments are when she sees the levels of abuse and neglect some children are forced to suffer when the need for drugs

or alcohol blinds parents from seeing the negative impacts their behavior has on their children.

She said her happiest moments are when a child is reunited with family members they previously thought were lost to them.

"That is a profound moment," she said

She also celebrates when a child who was previously convinced he or she were incapable of achievement gets that first job and takes that initial step toward becoming a productive member of society, or when a baby goes to a permanent loving family.

Most of all, Schumaker said, a memorable moment for her is when she sees that a child has developed enough trust in her to know that he or she can call on her when needed.

■ Great philanthropist: Betty Tustin of Berlin

Pastor Bryan Pugner, of the Worship Center in Berlin, was quick to name Betty Tustin as "A great lady in our church," whom he called a "Super Great Mom!"

Pugner described Tustin as a tremendously sweet and kind-hearted woman, whose entire family was absolutely amazing. He said she has a daughter with special needs and still finds the time for philanthropic projects.

At Christmas, according to Pugner, Tustin heads the church's Christmas Outreach program, which reaches out to single mothers to find out what toys, clothes and shoes they need to help their families enjoy the holiday.

Her program coordinates with the

Toys for Tots organization, as part of the effort to request the items and organize the gifts, he said. In all, Tustin's Christmas program helps children from 30 to 35 area families have a happy Christmas each year.

Tustin also hosts the Kid's Port program, a boat-themed Sunday school at the church, and a book club for seniors at the Gull Creek Senior Living Community, along with a monthly hymn sing, all of which is sponsored by the Worship Center, which is an Assemblies of God church.

But Tustin was noticeably uncomfortable with the thought of an article focusing on her because, she said, she was only doing God's work and that was where the praise should be directed. "It is only through prayer and the Holy Spirit that these things can be done," she said.





Smoked salmon canapes follow basic rules

There is nothing quite like seeing the flash of fear on a child's face when he realizes that his seat on the water park

ride is now at the bow of the craft ... heading backwards as he plummets over falls.

It seemed that the more he requested of the lifeguards to be facing the deep and fast drop the more they employed their stealthy tac-

tics of spinning the multi-person tube just right. I guess it's the same as pushing the "close door" button on the elevator when someone with an armful of groceries is asking you to hold the car.

Our children enjoyed their weekend at Great Wolf Lodge a few weeks ago as did we. While enjoying the three-acre, four-story water park, it seemed as though the more hair-raising rides we went on, the more our youngest would defy his young mind's logical processes and continue to get on the rides for more excitement.

Arriving home, there was no rest for the weary. It was time to get down to business as I had to plan and cook a cocktail party for some acquaintances in the following week. In going through my mind's rolodex of items I recalled these beautiful and simple cold smoked salmon canapés, knowing that they would fit the bill.

In the cold smoking process, it is important that you cure the salmon first. There is absolutely nothing difficult about this, but it is time-consuming. You can coat the salmon and let it sit in the icebox for 2-3 days, rinse and dry and then smoke. Nothing is difficult. It just takes time.

The Scots are well known for their cold-smoked salmon and it does my heart good to try to recreate the nova lox of the old country. Mine will not be identical, but then if they were, I would just buy the side of salmon and be done

I use a basic formula when making



canapés and it is one that I share with all of my employees and students. Follow this simple guideline and you won't

- Base: think crouton, cucumber slice, Parmesan crisp, cracker, et al.
- Spread: Cream cheese, mayonnaise or aioli, flavored butters.
- Main item: The reason why the guest is choosing the hors d'oeuvres shrimp, chicken, tuna, et al.
- Garnish: caviar, herbs, candied fruits, coarse sea salt, et al.

As you go through the recipe, feel free to substitute herbs and flavorings. Let's face it, not everyone wants caviar or fish roe as a garnish. And some people truly despise dill. It's acceptable to cook to your taste. That's the name of the game.

And while I finish making these, I can't lie. I can't stop laughing about the little one and his flashes of fear and adventure. It's all in a day's work.

Cold-Smoked Salmon **Canapes**

1/2 pound cold smoked salmon (recipe follows)

1 cup herbed cream cheese (recipe fol-

18-24 Scallion Blini (recipe follows)

Tobikko or other inexpensive caviar, as needed

Fresh chervil leaves (Italian parsley is a good sub)

Step 1: Lay out the cooked blini on a lined baking pan

Step 2: Place your cream cheese on the blini using a pastry bag or two spoons to shape a quenelle (quasi-football shaped torpedo of food)

Step 3: Top the cheese with a thin slice of cold=smoked salmon

Step 4: Garnish with fish roe of your choice and a small sprig of chervil or Italian parsley

Cold Smoked Salmon

makes 1 pound

1 pound fresh salmon, skinned with pin bones removed

3/4 cup kosher salt

1/2 cup brown sugar

1 cup fresh dill and parsley

2 Tbsp. black peppercorns

5 bay leaves

Step 1: Grind any large spices such as peppercorns and bay leaves

Step 2: Combine with remaining ingredients except for salmon

Step 3: Sprinkle a liberal layer of the curing mix in a small pan

Step 4: Lay salmon on your cure mix and press

Step 1: Top with remaining cure mix and press with another pan on top

Step 2: Cure the salmon under refrigeration for at least 2 days

Step 3: Remove from the cure and rinse the salmon; pat dry

Step 4: Lay out unwrapped in the refrigerator and let air dry so that the surface develops what is called the pellicle; the tacky surface that attracts the chemical compounds from the smoking

Step 5: Smoke at 150 degrees with apple and hickory chunks for about an hour

Step 6: Allow to cool unwrapped in the refrigerator and when ready, slice thin for use on the canapess

Scallion Blini

1 cup All-purpose flour 1/2 tsp. baking powder

3/4 tsp. kosher salt

3/4 cup whole milk

1 egg

1/2 bunch scallion greens, finely chopped

1/4 pound unsalted whole butter,

Step 1: Sift dry ingredients together

Step 2: Mix milk and eggs and then add the wet and dry together to form a smooth batter. Do not overmix!

Step 3: Drizzle in the melted butter until well incorporated

Step 4: Add the scallons and mix

Step 5: Cook the blini as you would a normal pancake, ensuring that they are cooked through but not dark on the outside

Step 6: Allow to cool to room temperature and set aside until ready to use

Herbed Cream Cheese

3/4 cup cream cheese, softened juice and zest of 1 lmon

2 Tbsp. chopped fresh scallion 1 Tbsp. chopped Italian parsley Salt and pepper to taste

Combine all ingredient and season to
