## **Berlin comes together on crosswalk**

(May 14, 2015) Town employees and members of the community last Friday dedicated the new safety-enhanced crosswalk at the intersection of Bay Street and Route 113.

The crosswalk, with a visual and audible countdown timer added to the traffic signal, comes more than a year after Tymeir Dennis was killed and his brother, Tyheym Bowen, was seriously injured when they were struck by a Maryland State Police car.

The Nov. 8, 2013 incident resulted in the creation of the volunteer Berlin Pedestrian Safety Committee, which began a long campaign for additional safety features at the intersection.

Presiding over the ribbon-cutting ceremony was Berlin Mayor Gee Williams, who said the purpose of the dedication was to honor the memory of Tymeir Dennis and to celebrate the

life of Tyheym Bowen.

"We really are grateful that we were able to turn something that was a tragedy into a permanent transportation benefit and asset for this community," he said.

Williams also praised the collaborative effort that brought the crosswalk into existence.

"I honestly believe that this communitywide effort ... made all the difference in making this happen, and I think that it was recognized locally and throughout the state what can happen when people work on a common cause," Williams said.

Patricia Dufendach, chairperson of the Berlin Pedestrian Safety Committee, said she was proud of the committee's accomplishments.

Among its efforts, she said, was the creation of a petition to lower the speed limit through Berlin and install "pedestrian-initiated crosswalks" in major intersections on Route 113. "The goal of a walkable, bikeable Berlin is safer now than ever with the installation of this audible countdown crosswalk," Dufendach said. "This intersection has been the site of several terrible accidents. Firsthand experience confirmed that there was not a safe way to cross this road."

Because of the efforts of the committee and the people of Berlin, Dufendach said, the State Highway Administration conducted the studies necessary to lower the speed limit to 45 mph, repaired malfunctioning streetlights in the area and established the crosswalk.

The state will also install hazard identification beacons at the north and south ends of Berlin to notify drivers they are entering a residential area, Dufendach said.

Tymeir Dennis' aunt, Dr. Roxie Dennis, closed the ceremony with a prayer before the mayor led a ceremonial crossing of the street.

### Pines announces seven candidates in '15 director's race

(May 14, 2015) Seven candidates have been certified for the 2015 Ocean Pines Association Board of Director's election, giving the upcoming election a total field that matches last year's largerthan-usual number of office-seekers.

None of this year's candidates are incumbents, although some had previously served.

Former board members running in this election are Ray Unger, Terri Mohr and Bill Zawacki. Also hoping to gain a seat on the board is Slobodan Trendic, who ran for the same position last year, but then dropped out early.

Political newcomers in Ocean Pines are former police officer Thomas Herrick, Carol Ludwig, director of the Delmarva Chorus, and Cheryl Jacobs.

Current Board President Dave Stevens praised the efforts of the community's Search Committee in recruiting candidates.

"I thought they did a really good job and came up with an interesting slate of candidates," he said. "They really went all out to try and get people, and all of them are very qualified."

Stevens said there were not any real surprises in the pool of candidates, and that he has not yet decided if he will back any of the contestants.

"Obviously, Terri Mohr and I ran against each other during the last election, and I think there's no doubt about where she's coming from. And we didn't leave any doubt at all about where we were coming from," Stevens said. "I expect this will just be round two."

Ocean Pines property owners vote by mail in board elections, one vote per household, with the top two vote getters each receiving three-year terms.

The community also announced several key dates in the election process. The candidates draw was set for June 11 at 4 p.m. A candidate forum will be held on June 24 at 6 p.m.

Cut off for voter eligibility is July 2, and all ballots must be mailed by July 7. Ballots may be received no later than Aug. 6 and will be counted on Aug. 7.

The election results will be certified during the annual meeting, on Aug. 8 at 10 a.m. at the Pines Community Center.

## Jerry Lewis chosen as Ocean Pines Yacht Club manager

(May 14, 2015) Hopes are high as the Ocean Pines Yacht Club enters its second year of operations, and much of those hopes are related to its new manager, Jerry Lewis.

No, not that Jerry Lewis.

Lewis, 53, lived in Preston, Md. until he was 13, when his father took a job in Muscat, Oman and moved the family to the Middle East. Lewis returned to the United States to attend college and then took a string of jobs that returned him overseas, beginning in the Cayman Islands at Hyatt Regency.

"That was my first job, right out of college, which was not so shabby," he said. "I was just married and we didn't have kids yet. It was a fun, fun time."

Next, Lewis worked for a private club in Casablanca, Morocco for seven years, followed by a stint in Dubai working in food manufacturing.

When his grandmother passed away, Lewis returned home to care for his grandfather. In 1999, he and his family, his wife and two children, moved to Ocean Pines, and Lewis continued working in the food service industry locally.

General Manager Bob Thompson said the community received more than 60 applications for the position before deciding on Lewis. "We interviewed 12 and he seemed like the clear choice to us," Thompson said. "He has a strong background, and we liked that he lived here, so he's familiar with the community. And it didn't hurt that when we started making calls everyone raved about him. We're real, real convinced we got a good deal."


Lewis said his first impression of the yacht club, upon its opening last summer, was how much potential the facility had.

"The view smacks you in the face as soon as you step on the property," he said. "I can't see how anyone could ever not think it's just like paradise.

"There's just so much capability and opportunity there," Lewis continued. "Ocean Pines has grown into this diverse community. Everybody has different likes and expectations of what they want the club to be, whether it be bringing their children there, going to trivia night, showing up for Sunday brunch, showing up for music on the weekends, going to the pool – there's a lot of moving parts there that just need to be brought to their full glory."

hit on all things possible to satisfy as many people's demands as possible," he said. "They've got a really good staff there, but, as always, there are going to be certain things that need polishing."

Thompson said the club will also tweak certain aspects of the facility itself, including the service bar and tiki bar.

"We're making improvements on some of the critical elements that we learned, running through last year, to make sure [Lewis'] foundation is strong enough where he can focus on the service and the quality," Thompson said. "We're poised now better than we've ever been for success at the club. We've got the right manager, the right time and the right type of equipment and unique environment that's in place for us now."

Thompson also shook off much of the criticism that arose during the club's first year.

"Those who want to be the most critical typically haven't run a business or have very, very limited understanding of the food service industry," he said. "You learn. The club's new for all of us. We had our expectations, we exceeded them revenue-wise, certainly through the summer, but we

also had some expectations that weren't met because of some things we didn't think about through the construction. We're making those improvements now.

Thompson also underscored the facility's versatility, saying it was comparable to a restaurant as well as to a convention or conference center.

When you walk from the parking lot through the building to the back, you're on one level with one floor, no steps and easy access," he said. "You have the outside tiki bar with the patio where you can enjoy a drink and listen to music, you have the a la carte dining downstairs, you have the wedding and event activities upstairs. You could compare us to anything, but there's very few places in the area that can compare to what we have in total.

The goal of the club during the second year, Thompson said, was "continued success.'

'We're very, very excited with Jerry there, who has a strong financial background and an extremely strong operational background," he said. "We're going to give him the tools and give him the equipment for success, and in the limited time he's been here you're already starting to see the impact on the energy at the club level."

### **Berlin recognizes** six PD officers for service in B'more

(May 14, 2015) Six members from the Berlin Police Department received commendations at the mayor and council meeting on Monday at Town Hall to recognize their efforts during the civil unrest in Baltimore two weeks ago.

Police Chief Arnold Downing said the six-member SWAT team was called to action during a Berlin council meeting on April 27.

Before the involvement his officers, Downing said he had been "watching the events unfold" on television.

"At roughly 7:30, I received a ... call for assistance in Baltimore," Downing said. "The thought at that time was Berlin [could] possibly, with the aid of the other counties, put something together in the morning.'

By the end of the meeting, however, Downing was told by state officials the need was urgent. Within an hour and a half, the team was on the road.

"We saw officers get attacked with bottles, bricks and cars, and property being destroyed, on TV, Downing said, adding that he stayed up all night watching television news re-

ports and hoping for the safe return of the officers.

The police chief said Baltimore police were severely over-extended by the time reinforcements arrived.

"As soon as they got there, they knew they were needed," he said. 'They had people that had been working ever since [the previous] morning in short sleeves in the freezing cold, fatigued and worn out ... attacked and embattled."

When he learned the officers were

returning home without injury or incident the following morning, Downing said his "prayers were answered."

At-Large Councilmember Thom Gulyas expressed pride in the officers, while District 4 Councilmember Dean Burrell added, "Your humility for service and what you do and your professionalism was second to none." Mayor Gee Williams also praised

the officers. 'We feel so very fortunate that you

all have developed a culture here of

successful community policing, where I believe there is mutual respect for what you do," he said. "We just can't thank you enough."

DFC. Jessica Collins, a member of the SWAT team sent to Baltimore, received an additional commendation during the meeting for her role in an identity theft investigation last year. Downing said the joint investigation, including collaboration with Homeland Security, led to a subject being charged and convicted.

## **Ocean City's annual Cruisin' kicks off Thurs.**

Thousands of cars, visitors expected as resort event hits quarter-century mark

(May 14, 2015) More than 3,300 hot rods, custom cars and classics from 1976 or earlier will be riding down Coastal Highway this weekend for the 25th annual Cruisin' Ocean City.

The event, which started Thursday and continues through Sunday at the Roland E. Powell Convention Center on 40th Street and downtown at the inlet parking lot, draws thousands of spectators over the course of four days.

"It's the largest automotive event in the mid-Atlantic region," said event promoter Meredith Herbert. "Ocean City is an ideal location for a car show and the inlet parking lot is perfect with the beautiful beach on one side and the classic Boardwalk on the other."

Highlights of the 25th anniversary weekend include an appearance from Tom Wopat or better known as "Luke Duke" from the classic television show "Dukes of Hazard." He will be in the convention center's ballroom on Friday from 11 a.m. to 4 p.m.; at the inlet on Saturday during the same hours and Sunday at the inlet from 11

A 25th anniversary celebration will take place a few minutes prior to the Grand Finale Awards ceremony, which begins at 2 p.m. at the inlet on Sunday. Participants who have attended all 25 years will be honored and a giant Hot Rod cake, cupcakes and door prizes including televisions, iPads and cash will be available, she added.

Awards will be presented daily with the Grand Finale Awards honoring sponsors and top awards. There will be more than 500 trophies, plaques and awards handed out before the weekend comes to a close, Herbert said.

"We are very excited to be celebrating the 25th anniversary of Cruisin' Ocean City Maryland," Herbert said. "Come out this weekend to enjoy cars and conversations with car enthusiasts."

On Saturday night, the 28th Street Pit & Pub will host a Cruisin' pin-up contest at 8 p.m. Attendees are asked to dress up in their best pin-up gear or cheer on contestants. There will be many giveaways with cash and trophies awarded to contest winners.

## **Nonprofit pitches** continue as Berlin preps '16 budget

(May 14, 2015) Two more nonprofit organizations have joined the list of community service agencies seeking grants from the Berlin mayor and council as they enter the final stages of deliberations on the town's 2016 budget.


Representatives from Diakonia and the Worcester County Public Library went before the council Monday night, with Diakonia seeking \$7,500 in funding and the library requesting \$75,000, to be spread out over three years, toward construction of a new library in Berlin.

Diakonia Executive Director Claudia Nagle briefed the council on 2014 statistics at the West Ocean Citybased emergency and transitional housing program.

'The purpose of our program is not only to provide basic needs to those folks who are calling Diakonia home, but to address the root causes that brought them to us," Nagle said.

Nagle told the council that Diakonia offered guidance, counseling and assistance to the less fortunate with the goal of placing them into permanent housing.

Through Diakonia's programs, 53 people gained employment in 2014,

including 39 Berliners. The nonprofit provided more than 50,000 meals to emergency shelter residents and helped 78 people into permanent housing, she said.

She also said Diakonia's food pantry program provides more than 16,000 bags of food annually, while a new program provides support services for area veterans and their families

According to Nagle, 130 volunteers donated more than 12,000 hours of service to the nonprofit last year. Much of that time was to help operate

the Used to Be Mine Thrift Shop on Route 611 and Sunset Avenue. The shop is open Wednesday through Saturday.

'Our program is about helping people find their purpose," Nagle said. "We help people learn to contribute what they can ... respect and dignity is key to what we do.

Attorney Joe Moore, a member of a citizen committee supporting the county libraries, and Deputy Library Director Jennifer Ranck spoke on behalf of the library.


Tickets are \$15 and include entrance to the event and food. Animal House will provide live entertainment.

### Library seeking \$75K grant toward new Berlin branch

Looking to upgrade an undersized and deteriorating building, the county bought a 6.4-acre parcel on Harrison Avenue in Berlin last year as a site for a new library. A preliminary site plan shows the building increasing from 3,038 square feet at the old facility, to 11,000 square feet at the new location.

Ranck said that includes additional space for community and performance groups, a town and county history collection, an expanded area focused on child and teen reading, and more computers and Wi-Fi ports.

The county budgeted \$2 million for the new building, part of which paid for the land. The state added a \$1 million matching grant, and the Humphreys Foundation pledged a two-to-one matching grant of up to \$150,000.

If Berlin decides to contribute the full \$75,000, the Humphreys grant could total more than \$400,000, according to Ranck.

Ranck praised the town for its support and suggested, "An innovative town like Berlin certainly deserves an innovative library."

The Berlin council will meet at town hall on Monday during a budget work session at 6 p.m.

'I'm motivated to help out with the pirate party because 100 percent of the proceeds go back into our local community helping those that need it most - abused and neglected children," Del Corro said. "Giving these children an advocate can make such a powerful impact on the rest of their lives.

Del Corro, who plans to attend the party in costume, will also hold an exercise fundraiser at CrossFit Ocean City to raise money for CASA.

District 2 Berlin Councilmember Lisa Hall also plans to come out in pirate clothing.

"The CASA program is one of the most important programs in Worcester County and the State of Maryland," Hall said. "The sexual abuse of our children in society today is unacceptable. I am reaching out to all grandmothers, mothers. aunts. elected women in politics, women judges, women prosecutors, women parole board members and asking them to step up and make these predators accountable. Laws need to be changed to protect the victim – not the accused.

Volunteer Ed Battisfore plans to attend because he has "some time and some money to put into action."


"If I saw a child in the street unattended or unfed, or in a T-shirt and diapers while it was snowing I would not just drive on by," Battisfore said. "I would stop to assist or protect that child from harm. I know that most people in Worcester County feel the same way and would do the same thing if they saw such a child. Knowing that these children exist in our community behind closed doors ... for me to turn my head would be the same as driving by.

"Spreading the word of the existence of these children through volunteering and fundraising gives other people in Worcester County the opportunity to get out of their car and join the effort to save our children with whatever time or money each person can spare," Battisfore added. The pirate party is a fun evening for all who attend and supports the work that must be done."

## ACT teams up with brewery for second Toast to the Coast

(May 14, 2015) Assateague Coastal Trust and SweetWater Brewing Company are presenting the second annual Toast to the Coast Friday at 6 p.m. at the West-O Bottle Shop & Bar.

Admission is free, and the event features free tastings of SweetWater beers, as well as samples of sustainably farmed wines, handcrafted rums and snacks donated by Barn 34 and OC Wasabi.

Steve Farr, development director at the trust, compared the event to a cocktail party.

"It's really an opportunity to introduce ourselves to people who don't know a lot about us," he said. "It gives us the opportunity to attract our current members as well as new members to informally get together and talk and present some information on some issues in a more relaxed, informal atmosphere.

"We find that it's easier to attract people who may not already know us and love us if there's some fun thrown in, and in this case it's an opportunity to taste some great beer, wine and rum, and hang out on a Friday evening," he said.

The event will double as a fundraiser and awareness drive for the nonprofit, and as a celebration of SweetWater's entry into the Maryland marketplace.

The Atlanta-based brewery already has a track record of supporting environmental groups by donating more than \$700,000 in the last decade to the Waterkeeper Alliance and supporting clean water advocacy in the southeast.

"As [SweetWater] expands the market for their beers, they're looking for partnerships with the local waterkeepers in those areas and we're fortunate to be one of those here," Farr said. "They're sending someone up from their main brewery in Atlanta to help introduce the company to this area, as well as pour some of their beers for tastings – and hopefully sales."

The bar will sell additional drinks, including those made with sustainable rums, with a portion of the proceeds benefiting trust.

The label "sustainable" as applied to making rum reflects the methods that precede the actual distillation process.

Growing and processing sugar used to make traditional rum can be an environmentally destructive process, resulting in soil degradation and erosion, as well as pollution of local waterways. Distillation can create additional problems, releasing large amounts of carbon dioxide into the atmosphere, and leaving behind difficult-to-dispose of wastewater.

Sustainable rums, on the other hand, use improved farming practices, require less energy and water, and produce fewer greenhouse gases.

Farr said SweetWater and the trust plan to continue the partnership and will likely hold additional events during the spring, summer and fall.

"They want to get out in the marketplace as a new product, and if we can have a partnership with a beer company that is sustainable and demonstrates good corporate citizenship – and also entice people with some tasty beer – that's always a good thing."

The trust also will have displays concerning the federal government's proposed offshore oil and gas exploration.

At the end of the day, Farr said Toast for the Coast is about, "awareness and fun."

"Last year's event was successful in terms of bringing people out to have a good time and learning a little bit about what we do, and we hope that this one will be even more successful," Farr said.

#### **Event approvals**

The council voted to approve two returning events and endorsed one new happening in Berlin.

Returning on June 6 is the annual Jazz and Blues Festival, which will run from noon to 6 p.m. Also a Memorial Day Service was approved for May 24 at the American Legion in Berlin.

A new Flower Street basketball league, proposed by resident William Johnson and in collaboration with Worcester Youth and Family Counseling Services, was approved for June 15 - July 20.

Johnson said the league could comprise as many as 18 teams and more than 200 area youths.

At-Large Councilmember Tom Gulyas, District 1 Councilmember Troy Purnell and Police Chief Arnold Downing all expressed interest in becoming sponsors for the event.

#### Annexation approved

A public hearing was opened and closed without public comment, leading to the unanimous council approval of Annexation Resolution 2015-03 consisting of 15.2 acres of land at the corner of Friendship Road and Route 50.

The annexation was necessary to move the Arby's in Berlin across the street to make room for a new Royal Farms store. Arby's will be rebuilt.

According to the terms of the agreement, the property would be subject to the town's public works agreement and the property owner would be required to

pay for any necessary improvements in infrastructure.

#### **AMP** agreement

The council passed Resolution 2015-06 related to a mutual aid agreement with nonprofit electric provider American Municipal Power Inc.

Electric Utilities Director Tim Lawrence said a similar agreement with the town's previous supplier left something to be desired while the new agreement would give the town, "the backup of 132 municipalities" in case of a disaster such as a hurricane.

#### Grab a grant

Economic and Community Development Director Ivy Wells encouraged town shops to apply for façade grants. Wells recently helped businesses, including the new art gallery, secure funding for improvements.

## Give new guy a chance

People in Ocean Pines pay a good amount of attention to their amenities, especially the new yacht club, which cost the community almost \$5 million, and may or may not have already been paid for depending on which board member or accountant you talk to.

Two weeks ago, during an OPA board meeting, the majority of the public comments were about the yacht club, with a crowd coming out in anticipation of a vote on whether to close the facility during the slower winter months. The crowd opposed the closing as did most of the directors.

Now a new manager, Jerry Lewis, is taking the facility. Lewis brings decades of experience in the industry in some pretty high-profile positions in interesting places including Dubai, Casablanca, and the Cayman Islands. Whether those years overseas toughened him up enough to deal with the often-finicky Ocean Pines crowd remains to be seen.

Still, the community should give Lewis a chance here. The previous manager at the club rubbed more than a few residents the wrong way, most notably by uttering some disparaging remarks about his clientele. Lewis appears to have a little more tact, and should be given every opportunity to turn things around at this first-rate facility.

Mistakes were made during the first year at the yacht club. Sure, there were a few flies during the summer months, and yes, the financials looked pretty poor during the winter months, despite however many people and dollars trivia nights brought into the building.

The customer base in Ocean Pines has money to spend, and most of those who have spent a few dollars on food and drink there while taking in the stunning view, watching a band play out on the patio in July or relaxing inside yearround, have given the place high marks.

Lewis will now inherit management of the club, as well as a year's worth of knowledge of what went right and what went wrong. Expectations are high, and, at least for now, he should be given every chance to succeed.



## Horseshoe crab tagging demo, May 17

'Hands on' program offers science and fun for whole family

(May 14, 2015) Assateague Island Alliance (AIA), the Friends Group of Assateague Island National Seashore (ASIS), will host "Horseshoe Crab Ecology and Tagging Demonstration," Sunday May 17, at 1 p.m. at the Assateague Island Visitor Center.

Horseshoe crabs (Limulus polyphemus) will soon grace the shores of the coastline of the mid-Atlantic states to undergo an ancient mating ritual during the full and new moons in late spring through early summer. Get the fascinating story of this amazing living fossil and find out how other species have come to rely on it for survival.

Join AIA volunteer board member and citizen scientist, Dick Arnold, for an informative and hands-on program discovering horseshoe crabs and how valuable this creature is to the global ecosystem. ## **Burley Oak and WCAC hosting fundraisers**

(May 14, 2015) Saturday is going to be busy in Berlin, with two fundraisers scheduled for area nonprofit or-

ganizations. One targets the need for housing, while the other aims to increase awareness of the local arts community.

The Worcester County Arts Council will hold its inaugural 5K Race/Walk for the Arts at 8 a.m. on Saturday, the same day that Burley Oak Brewing Co. will raise money for Habitat for Humanity of Worcester County during the Burley Build Benefest at 2 p.m.

In developing the outdoor beer and music festival held on the brewery grounds, Burley Oak General Manager Nicky Chavis said the brewery can keep overhead costs as low as \$1,000, meaning almost every dollar raised will go directly to Habitat for Humanity.

Habitat's efforts in Worcester County struck a particularly resonant chord with the Burley Oak team, according to Chavis, because the nonprofit assists residents not unlike the dozen or so employees at the brewery.

"Anybody in this county that would go to a bank and say, 'Hey, I don't have 20 percent to put down,' the bank will say, 'We're sorry. You'll never be able to buy a home," Chavis said. "Habitat of Worcester County can help somebody purchase a home at zero percent interest, and it's extremely affordable and you pay directly to [the nonprofit].

"In the past two and a half years we've been able to provide jobs [and health insurance] to 14 people. We're really proud to be able to do that and be a part of the community," Chavis continued. "So, to be able to help somebody like the people we live and work with every day was kind of a big deal for us. It gives people like us an opportunity to purchase a home at an affordable rate."

The brewery set a goal of \$22,000 for the event, enough to pay for the framing, walls and roofing for the exterior of an entire house.

Tickets are \$40 and entitle the purchaser to unlimited craft beer samples, the opportunity to hear live entertainment from 2-8 p.m. and admission to the adjacent art market. Burley Oak will also sell T-shirts made specifically for the event for \$25.

All of the proceeds from tickets and T-shirts, as well as 20 percent of the art market sales, go to Habitat for Humanity of Worcester County.

The event also includes a food truck provided by SoDel Concepts, as well as a cornhole tournament with prizes awarded to the top-three finishers. Tickets are available online at www.burleyapparel.com/collections/burley-build-benefest-1.

For the arts council, the goal is to spread awareness about upcoming exhibitions and projects and to increase membership.

The registration fee is \$25, which will earn participants a T-shirt and a one-year membership in the arts council.

"It's a membership drive, kind of like what NPR does, but we thought this would be more fun and interactive with the community, and raise awareness with runners and maybe reach a whole new group of people," Board Member Erika Rittling Uebel said.

Executive Director Anna Mullis echoed the council's desire to raise its profile.

"We have several different programs that we sponsor and classes and grants and scholarships, but we wanted to offer something fresh, something different and take advantage of the nice weather," she said. "There are various different organizations that do this type of activity, and we liked the idea because it's open to people of all ages and they don't necessarily need to be art-oriented."

The arts council is working with OC Tri Running, which will be the host.

"They have a great database and they've hosted successful events in the area," Uebel said. "They take care of the registration and the planning and the course and all of that."

Uebel said entrants could register online until the day before the event, or in person on the day of the event, although T-shirts may be limited to pre-registrants.



Uebel said the council would also distribute pamphlets touting council activities.

"I don't think the community knows everything that we do contribute to. We plan to have some paraphernalia out where people can see all the different things we do," she said. "When they see that, I think there will be a little more of a connection to how important the art council is and what it means to be a member. Whether you're an artist or not, you should still support the arts in the county."

## **Despite rumors, Mama Della's open for business**

(May 14, 2015) Entering its seventh year, Mama Della's Pizza and Sub Shop in Ocean Pines is under new management.

Veteran restaurateur John Rogers took over the shop in March. A feud with the former ownership followed, including several posts on social media suggesting the store was closed and the building was being torn down.

Rogers, however, is suggesting otherwise.

"Contrary to popular belief, we are not going anywhere," he said.

Rogers's time in the restaurant industry dates back to 1986, when he moved to the Eastern Shore and began working at Pizza Tugo's – as a dishwasher.

"I've worked for Captain's, Domino's – pretty much every pizza place down here," he said. "I've always liked the business. There's just something about making food that I've always loved."

Rogers, who also managed Crabs to Go for 15 years, has kept many of the specialty pizzas and subs on the menu, including the Barnyard, a sub with steak, chicken, bacon and American cheese.

Other dishes, including the Papa

Burger, have been reverse engineered.

"It's a sausage burger, but the father never gave that recipe to me, so I had to come up with one on my own," Rogers said.


Pizzas are made on premises using a brick oven, and with sauce and dough brought in from Baltimore, and a 50/50 blend of mozzarella and provolone cheeses.

"I would put our pizza up against pretty much anybody in town," Rogers said. "We never skimp on any of the toppings, which a lot of places do. You're paying \$11.99 for a medium pizza, \$13.99 for a large and then it's \$1.50 a topping. If you're paying that price we're going to give you what you're paying for."

Rogers said the early returns at Mama Della's have been strong, and he hopes to expand the restaurant in the future.

"The family built up a really good business here and a really good clientele," he said. "I'd just like to see it continue to grow, and hopefully, if things go well, maybe expanding into a second location. That would be my ultimate goal."



## Grilled steak sure to not get any flank

The back deck is power washed, hot tub opened for the season and the garden beds are getting there. Hard-



By Paul Suplee, CEC PCIII wood charcoal is flaming in the chimney as I get ready to adorn it with baby back ribs, baked potatoes and a glorious flank steak; honestly the best I've ever made. It was in the sous vide for six hours and it's

ready to go.

Now that the spring semester is over I can really get some things done around the house. Well, until I start working my summer job, that is. Oh well. No rest for the weary.


Through the mosquitoes, ticks and spiders I trudge as my wife and kids run screaming for the hills every time one appears. Now, don't take me wrong. I hate bugs as much as the next guy, but I just don't get excited about it – at least not until a sizeable spider is running up my arm after having been displaced by my toil.

Though the bugs certainly do not bring me joy, the sounds of the birds do. Even if I see a snake slithering through the grass I smile, as usually it means that it's warm enough for the grass to grow, giving cover to the beast as it silently moves along. I don't mind them, but I know enough to keep my distance. And that's where I have to stop, reflect and breathe deeply and get ready for another season of the "Assateague Darwin Awards," one of my favorite times of year.

You see, nothing irritates me more than visitors who come to the island to see the famous ponies. Almost invariably, someone in the group becomes the "pony whisperer," nuzzling up to Pinto or Grazer or Bullet or whatever its name is.

And, on occasion, they will be bitten or kicked or stomped by said pony. Come on, people. I'm thrilled that you took riding lessons in middle school, or that you had a pony at your kindergarten graduation party, but that doesn't make you a ranger on the pony patrol. Even they know their limitations and act accordingly with these majestic and mostly docile beasts.

I'm reminded of this because USA Today ran a video story of a gaggle of tourists in Yellowstone running from a black bear and her cubs because they were, well, stupid enough to get between a mama black bear and her



cubs. I haven't figured out the proper onomatopoeia by which to express the irritation and contempt that I feel towards these particular people.

And it's not only because they got caught in the wrong place at the wrong time. Some of the people legitimately had a hard time getting back to their cars. Let's face it, they were old.

But others were just plain idiotic, snapping pictures with cubs less than a foot away with a defensive mama bear zigzagging across the road like Barry Sanders in the good old days, all the while acting like NatGeo pros. At the end of the chase it appeared that no one was injured or seriously mentally maimed in the exchange, which will probably put fodder in the cannons of those naturalist adventurers who look for that kind of encounter.

As someone who has enjoyed surfing for decades, I still feel no need to pet a shark. In fact, I have no intentions of ever surfing in a great white feeding ground, a practice common in such places as Australia since it means smaller crowds. Call me oldfashioned. Is this a guarantee that no shark will ever take a nibble on me? Absolutely not. I just won't go looking for the moment. I would just assume that it never happens at all, thank you very much.

I finish with my meditation, take another deep breath, smile as I think of award season, and throw the flank steak on the grill that I had earlier cooked sous vide for six hours. Now that there are two cookers available to consumers: Sous Vide Supreme (about \$450) and Anova Culinary (\$179), I can write about sous vide with a clearer conscience. And if I can keep just one person from a pony bite this summer, than my work here is done.

#### Sous Vide Flank Steak

For each flank

- 2-3 Beef flank, trimmed of fat
- 1 stick unsalted butter
- 1 Tbsp. Steak seasoning
- 2" sprig fresh rosemary
- 2 sprigs fresh thyme

Vacuum pack ingredients using any sort of air-removal system

Set your water bath to 140 F for an absolutely perfect medium steak

Cook the bag in the water bath for six hours. Personally, I clip the bag to the tank so it doesn't slide under the burner. The temperatures will stay more constant the further away from the burner your content is

After six hours do one of the following: If holding for later use, place the bag in an ice bath until cold throughout and then refrigerate for up to three weeks or freeze for up to a year. If using immediately, cut open and get psyched, because you're about to have the best flank steak ever

To serve, grill and seal the outside quickly. You don't want to lose that beautiful medium interior

Serve immediately. This meat does not need to rest or slack as flank often does. It is already tender and will be amazing




