Fire Co. asks Town Council to consider reinstating funds

Berlin officials receive unexpected visit just before vote on budget

BERLIN-The Berlin Town Council received an unexpected request during the May 28 meeting, minutes before a scheduled vote to approve the proposed fiscal year 2014 budget—that the council rescind its decision to withhold its annual \$600,000 contribution to the Berlin Fire Company

Attorney Joseph Moore of Williams, Moore and Shockley spoke on behalf of the fire company, accompanied by the company's accountant, Jay Bergey of James Bergey CPA. Fire Company President David Fitzgerald was in attendance, but did not come forward to address the

It became apparent from Moore's statement that the fire company had responded on May 18 to the town's January condition for release of the funds-that the company provides a full accounting of its financial status. But it was also apparent from the town officials' comments to Moore and Bergey Tuesday night that the document package provided was inadequate to satisfy the town's inquiry and too late to be pulled into the budget packaged approved Tuesday night.

Council member Paula Lynch asked if the company contracted for independent

audits of its financials. Bergey responded that the annual audits were conducted by a three-person panel of company officials. Lynch also suggested that the information of the nonprofit company's Form 990 tax form might be too basic for the evaluation needed to address the council's questions.

After the presentation, Mayor Gee Williams suggested that perhaps there might be a way to try to find a level of funding both sides could agree on, if it did not entail having the town restart the budget process. When he opened the discussion up for comments, Town Administrator Tony Carson took issue with the fact that the fire company took six months to produce the information the town requested far earlier in the budget process and suggested it would be unfair to have town staff expedite its review of the information in a few short weeks to present professional analysis to the council to accommodate the new budget.

Both council members Troy Purnell and Lisa Hall also took issue with the length of time it took the fire company to respond to the document requests

The council approved the FY 2014 budget, which for the general fund for the 2014 fiscal year was \$4.77 million, down \$93,270 (2 percent) from the FY 2013 budget amount of nearly \$4.87 million. According to a town summary the major differences were a \$172,000 decrease in property taxes, a \$9,000 increase in the water fund, an \$18,000 increase in the sewer fund, and a \$57,000 decrease in the

Missed Yacht Club pool date draws fire at OPA board meeting

Four-hour meeting sees half of its time devoted to pool-related charges

OCEAN PINES- After a series of votes to deny new proposals for off budget spending during their May 25 meeting, the Ocean Pines Association

Board of Directors was accused by several members of the public of being over-reliant on unrealistic predictions by General Manager Bob Thompson.

More than half of the nearly four-hour meeting focused on the status of construction for the Yacht Club pool. Another confrontation emerged over the timeline for the overdue relocation of the fuel tanks at the marina.

Whether the pool project has been the tragic victim of a sluggish permitting process, or the inadvertent result of grouping concurrent contracts in a way that has created the very problem it was supposed to avoid, much of the debate on Saturday had one conclusion. Barring a miracle, the new pool at the Yacht Club will not be ready for swimmers this summer...and it was not looking that much better for the marina, which when open is an Ocean Pines cash cow.

Needless to say, Thompson's credibility, veracity and competence took quite a pounding, from both the board and the public, the latter of which then turned on the board as well.

Thompson began the meeting with a timeline detailing the status of the two most time- and cost-sensitive projects. A change in contract order was executed on March 1 with Harkins Construction, which directed pool subcontractor Parrish Pools Company, Inc., to start construction drawings for review and



Stormwater waiver produces request for appeal

Jay Bergey says he's not opposing development, but waiver process itself

BERLIN—James Bergey filed a letter to Berlin Town Administrator Anthony Carson on May 16 appealing "the decision of the Town of Berlin to grant stormwater management approval to Main Street Homes regarding its property located near Tripoli and Bay Street."

The Berlin Planning Commission unanimously voted to grant preliminary approval for the site plan for a 40 lot residential subdivision between Tripoli and Bay Streets, proposed by Main Street Homes at Berlin, during the commission's May 8 meeting. The development would

be adjacent to US 113.

Prior to that commission action, stormwater engineering contractor Darl Kolar of EA Engineering had approved an administrative waiver in a Dec. 21, 2011 letter, prior to the town initiating its own stormwater management plan review program.

The administrative waiver was due to expire on May 4, 2013 unless the proposed plan received final project approval, which it did on May 3. With the final project approval, the waiver was extended until May 4, 2017, provided that all authorized construction is completed by then.

In a May 22 interview, Bergey stressed that he was not filing the appeal to protest the development project.

"I just don't to have to pay for their stormwater management issues," he said.

He also said the process was not as transparent as it should be. "They need to

be fair to everybody," he said.


In his letter to Carson (a copy was also forwarded to town attorney David Gaskill), Bergey requested a complete copy of the file regarding the approval.

"I am most interested in the procedure by which the stormwater management approval was granted and, in particular, whether any waivers were granted, and whether or not the plans are compliant with current stormwater management regulations," the letter read.

He said the letter was sent to meet the 15-day timeline window required for requesting an appeal.

Gaskill responded to Bergey in a May 21 letter by informing Bergey that his request would not be processed because he had not complied with the town's requirements for requesting an appeal of actions related to enforcing the policy.

electric fund. It also included a 2 percent salary increase for all town employees and capital improvement budget of \$182,000 that exceeded the surplus left over from last year by \$1,000.

The council unanimously approved the final details for International Food and Music Day, which is scheduled for June 22 from noon to 6 p.m. and will be set closer to the town's center and northern part of downtown Main Street. It also approved the Parks Commission's plans to conduct a mural contest for high school

students that will ultimately be used to replace the mural near the racquetball courts in Stephen Decatur Park.

The council conducted a first reading for Ordinance 2013-04, which would clarify the rules governing sidewalk obstruction on Main Street, such as sandwich board signs a, tables and chairs. The public hearing on the changes will be held during the June 10 council meeting.

The council approved a contract with John Salm for a design and construction drawings to create a proposed sidewalk along Maple Avenue and Tripoli Street.

According to Town Code Sec. 26-217, regarding appeals: "Any person aggrieved by the action of any official charged with the enforcement of this article, as the result of the disapproval of a properly filed application for a permit, issuance of a written notice of violation, or an alleged failure to properly enforce the article in regard to a specific application, shall have the right to appeal the action to the Mayor and Council. The appeal shall be filed in writing within 30 days of the date of official transmittal of the final decision or de-

termination to the applicant, shall state clearly the grounds on which the appeal is based, and shall be processed in the manner prescribed for hearing appeals before the board of appeals.'

Moreover, Gaskill questioning Bergey's standing to file an appeal. According to Gaskill, "You lack standing to appeal unless you can demonstrate that you own property which would be adversely affected by the stormwater management decision made in this particular instance."

The waiver granted to Main Street Homes was not subject to appeal, he said.

Pool's projected opening misses mark, but complaints hit home

submittal three days later, according to Thompson. Between March 4 through April 10, the drawings were prepared and submitted to Harkins for review, which in turn were passed on to engineering contractor AWB to coordinate the necessary mechanical components and submit the proposal to the proper state and county officials.

According to Thompson's timeline, the demolition and equipment room permits for the pool were submitted on March 18. The county permits were granted March 27 and April 1 respectively, it showed. Construction permits from both the county and state remain outstanding.

The board's Jan. 23 meeting to initiate the new budget season began with green visor scrutiny of the \$630,000 price tag that Thompson estimated was needed to bring the Yacht Club pool and bulkhead back into useable shape. To repair the pool, which was lifted and cracked during Hurricane Sandy, in time for Memorial Day summer season would require a specialist at an additional \$200,000, he said.

Thompson recommended that Harkins be allowed to complete the repair work in a second contract to tie into the work that has already begun on the Yacht Club, in order to maintain a continuity of design throughout the entire complex and as a way to expedite the permit process. He recommended that Harkins be assigned the role of general contractor

to oversee the specialized work of whichever contractor was awarded the work to replace the pool and pump house, in order to coordinate utility specifications and permits.

Thompson, who had assured the board and homeowners that the adult-only Yacht Club pool would open in time for Memorial Day weekend, sought to revise the estimated opening date to Fourth of July weekend. All but two directors—David Stevens and Martin Clarke—voted to authorize the contract.

Declaring the pool project 93 days behind schedule at Saturday's meeting, an incensed Clarke chastised board members who voted to accept a \$630,000 nobid contract for the club renovation and pool replacement project based on the previous timelines presented by Thompson. "I am now asking what happened," he said.

Noting Thompson's report that applications for the permits had been submitted mid-April, Board President Tom Terry asked Thompson what questions state permit officials were evaluating and what was the basis for the July 4 timeline.

Thompson said he did not know what questions state officials had asked. He said the July 4 estimate was based on information he received from the pool contractor. He admitted it would be a tight and challenging deadline to meet.

"But they are doing everything they can," he said.

Terry responded, "I'm not putting any timeline on this thing until I have a permit in my hands."

"Anyone who thinks they are going to get a building permit in less than 60 days has never built a dog house," Clarke said. Reiterating that board members voted the way they did based on the belief that by doing so the pool would be ready for Memorial Day weekend, which had just begun. "I am going on record as saying we are not going to be open this summer," Clarke said.

Other directors were clearly seeking to address the situation with a bit less rancor and with attempts to show support for Thompson.

Director Ray Unger stressed the importance that the information on the projects going forward be as open and honest as possible.

"We are in the process waiting for permits; this time next year we will have what we are aiming for," he said. "I have told people we are going to have to acknowledge there will be no Yacht Club pool this year."

Director David Stevens asked for deadlines based on best and worst case scenarios. Thompson predicted July 4 was the best case prediction and July 22 would be the worse-case timeline. He said the opinion of the contractor was that once the permits have cleared the project will be completed in a short period of time.

But when Stevens asked whether the July 22 date would include inspections, it was clear from Thompson's answer that it did not.

"So July 22 is not when we will be able to splash in the pool?" he said. With that, he estimated that mid-August would be a more reasonable deadline.

Terry also wanted to know whether combining the pool into the overall Yacht Club renovation contributed to the delay.

"Did that have an effect on why we didn't apply earlier?" he asked. Thompson conceded that coordination meeting between the general, pool and engineering contractor groups did take time. However, Thompson did point out that general contractor Harkins were already installing the pavers, retaining wall and bathrooms around the pool site.

Stevens said the thing that was really hurtful was that members were currently paying for pool memberships, which would put the board in an awkward position of trying to determine how to make those individuals whole if Thompson's second prediction proved to also be wrong.

Terry asked whether the board needed to authorize refunds for members who signed up for pool memberships specifically because they were promised use of the Yacht Club pool. Thompson said he had only received one such request.

Sharyn O'Hare suggested that pools Continued on Page 9

Service road dedicated to national hero

Samual Bowen, killed in grenade attack in Iraq

(May 31, 2013) During a moving, solemn ceremony Monday, the Route 50 service road was formally dedicated as Samuel Bowen Boulevard in memory of the 1983 graduate of Stephen Decatur High School who was killed July 7, 2004, when a rocket-propelled grenade exploded near his vehicle while he was serving with the National Guard in Irag.

According to the Department of Defense, Bowen was the 1,000th soldier to die during Operation Iraqi Freedom and the first native son of Worcester County to lose his life in Iraq.

Four of his military comrades from the 216th Engineer Battalion — who were with him the day he was killed joined the crowd estimated at more than 200 people. The battalion's chaplain gave the invocation.

Bud Church, president of the Worcester County Commissioners, said he was honored to be at the dedication on Memorial Day "among the many veterans and active service members whose sacrifices have helped protect our liberties.'

Samuel Robert "Smokey" Bowen, "gave his all to protect his family, fellow soldiers, the communities he called home and this great nation," Church said.

"Though he is gone from this earth, his spirit lives on in his family and friends," he said.

He and others were proud to play a role in helping memorialize the brave and caring soldier through the naming of the county road as Samuel Bowen Boulevard, Church said.

Bowen enlisted in the U.S. Army following his 1983 graduation from Stephen Decatur. After completing his time in the Army, he became a professional chef and was executive chef for Volume Services of America in Cleveland.

Although the culinary arts remained his career choice, he wanted to serve his country again and in 1999 he enlisted in the U.S. Army National Guard, the 216th Engineer Battalion out of Hamilton, Ohio, and was sent to Iraq.

On June 16, 2004, Bowen saved the life of a fellow soldier. Church told the crowd how Bowen saved Ron Eaton after shrapnel from an explosion tore into Eaton's body. He picked up the wounded soldier and carried him to safety.

For his heroism, Bowen earned the Bronze Star. Two weeks later, he died from injuries suffered when a rocketpropelled grenade landed near the mil-

Bowen was posthumously promoted to private first class and awarded the Purple Heart, Distinguished Service of Ohio and the Defender of Freedom medals.



with lap lanes open one additional lane for lap swimmers who would otherwise have used the Yacht Club pool.

Thompson then outlined the timeline for the project to relocate the gasoline fuel dock at the Ocean Pines Yacht Club Marina, located in Mumford's Landing. He said that an initial meeting to scope out and review the project with Harkins and engineers with AWB took place Feb. 7. However, a problem with a nonresponsive subcontractor caused scheduling delays in mid-May.

According to Thompson, Harkin's had

assigned a replacement subcontractor which was scheduled to begin this week. The new timeline for the project he said would be two months and would be ready to begin once supplies of pipe were received.

Both Clarke and Terry expressed opinions that it was a mistake to use a prime contractor for all of the projects. Clarke pointed out that revenue from marina sales totaled \$57,000 last May and \$120,000 last June. Noting the pumping station has been closed during the construction process, he said, "We have to get these pumps pumping."

Thompson's mea culpa for misstating the status of the Yacht Club Pool during a November town hall meeting drew ire from the board and public alike. Thompson said he misspoke by declaring the pool was emptied prior to Hurricane Sandy, when he should have said that it was filled in preparation of the storm, which inflicted so much damage that the pool is now being replaced.

At issue, however, was that Thompson's critics pointed out that his malapropos came with extensive details at the time on why the pool had to be drained. Clarke and Unger noted that hydrostatic

pressure would have kept the pool from lifting had it been properly filled prior to the storm.

Several members of the public, including Roland Langevin, who is an election candidate for the board of directors, called Thompson's explanation of the inaccuracies into question, Langevin suggested that the board was being to complicit and too reliant on the general manager.

> a child with autism could cost more than \$3 million.





Fortunately, a carefully crafted trust could be used to help manage the finances of individuals who may not be capable of handling their own affairs.

A trust could also be used to help preserve assets for minor children until they reach a particular age, spread out distributions over time, and even apply conditions that heirs must meet before receiving an inheritance.

Here are a few examples of trusts that could help you control the distribution of estate assets.

· Revocable living trust. When a living trust is created, legal ownership of personal assets is transferred to the trust. However, the trust maker maintains complete control of the assets in the trust, which can usually be amended or revoked. Most types of assets can be held in a trust, including real estate, life insurance policies, investment accounts, and valuable personal property such as jewelry, art, and antiques.

A living trust may replace a will as a family's primary estate distribution document. Unlike a will, a properly established living trust remains private and usually avoids probate. a life insurance payout or inheritance directly might be disqualified from government assistance programs. Placing assets in a trust could help keep the individual's income or net worth within the eligibility limits for federal benefits.

Distributions from the trust can be made at the discretion of a trustee to pay for a beneficiary's special needs. A special-needs trust may be established as a stand-alone trust or may be incorporated into a revocable living trust.

• Incentive trust. Some people prefer to leave an inheritance that improves family members' quality of life without enabling beneficiaries to become unproductive or financially irresponsible adults. Incentive provisions outline requirements or milestones that must be met before a portion of the trust money is awarded. Provisions may be drafted to promote education, entrepreneurship, public service, or philanthropy; to supplement earned income; and even to discourage certain harmful behaviors.

If parents die without making the appropriate arrangements, the courts will decide what happens to their assets and who will become the physical and finan-

cial guardians of their underage or disabled children. Most families would prefer to make these potentially life-altering decisions for themselves.

The use of trusts involves a multifaceted labyrinth of tax rules and regulations. You should consider the counsel of an experienced estate planning professional and/or your legal and financial advisors before implementing a trust strategy.



Billy Casper unheralded by many, unmatched by most

OCEAN PINES—Legendary golf pro Billy Casper, who spent May 22 at the Ocean Pines Golf and Country Club as the venue celebrated the reopening of its back nine greens after a major renovation project, also found a few minutes to agree to a short interview between appearances.

Highlights of the Billy Casper Day event included a putting clinic for some of the 120 people who participated in the Rediscover Ocean Pines Golf Tournament, a chat session with Casper recounting his incredible pro golf career and an awards reception for the winning team of Bob Brice, Ron Olszewski, Warren Oxford and Jan Schlegel.

In his autobiography "Billy Casper: The Big Three and Me," with James Parkinson and Lee Benson, Casper discusses his family life, naval career and rise from obscurity to become one of the greatest players in the game of professional golf and winner of the 1966 U.S Open. Only unlike his contemporaries Jack Nicklaus, Arnold Palmer and Gary Player—known by golfing aficionados as The Big Three—Casper's triumphs went largely unheralded despite his career-long string of successes.

In the forward to the book, Casper's more celebrated peers paid tribute to his mastery of the game. "Bill's fifty-one PGA career wins rank seventh all-time," they

acknowledged. "He won two U.S. Opens and one Masters. He won at least one tournament a year for 16 consecutive seasons, from 1956 through 1971," a record they pointed out that was exceeded only by Nicklaus and Palmer. The tribute ended with the statement, "As Jack [Nicklaus] put it in his autobiography, "The trio should really have been a quartet.'"

Bayside Gazette: What inspires you to decide whether to manage a course? What are the criteria that you use to determine whether or not a course is going to bear your imprimatur?

Billy Casper: Whether there is a need to upgrade the golf course. Whether there is a need to develop a relationship with the people in the area in which the golf course exists. We want to make it more enjoyable for everyone who plays the game of golf. The condition of the golf course is such an important ingredient in that and then to make people feel as if they are wanted and are treated properly; so much so that they want to come back and use the facilities time after time after time. So we do everything to make this more enjoyable for the players.

BG: What sorts of things do you do specifically?

BC: Those are the two main things that we do right there: we upgrade the *Continued on Page 17*

Continued from Page 16 condition of the golf course and we upgrade the relationship with the clientele.

BG: In this particular course was there anything that distinguished it from other courses that you design and manage?

BC: No. There was a need by the membership and it was a common decision between Billy Casper Golf and the person that you are doing the presentation with and it is up to them if they want to hire the company to be used. We are the largest in the United States right now. We are approaching (within two or three) of managing 150 golf courses and we have more than 6,000 employees.

BG: Are you just in the United States?

BC: Yes, just in the United States.

BG: Are there particular regions that have more golf courses than others?

BC: We manage about 15 facilities in Chicago for Cook County Forest Preserve and that is the largest concentration of golf courses that we manage in an area. We also have another eight courses in the Chicago area, for a total of 23 courses and driving ranges.

BG: Why is there so much golf in

BC: That is just one of the seats of golf.

BG: So what was your reason for agreeing to manage the Ocean Pines course?

BC: To help turn the facility around and put it in a position of making money.

BG: What do you think is the formula for a successful course?

BC: To have a great teaching program, full management of the grounds with a greens superintendent, good food and lots of fun.

BG: Do you have any parting comments for the golfing community at Ocean Pines?

BC: I'm grateful that we have such a following throughout the U.S. and with people who are seeking to make their game a success.



Successful businesses and attentive public officials tend to go by the old adage of under-promise and over-deliver, something a few area entities should strive harder to do.

Tempers flared at the Ocean Pines community meeting this past weekend as discussions turned to when and if some pools and gas at the marina would be available. Prior overly optimistic statements led property owners to believe that both the Yacht Club pool and Marina would be open by Memorial Day weekend.

It would have been wiser to provide the community with a more realistic view. While there may be a bit of grumbling for an expected temporary inconvenience, trying to keep everyone happy with invalid information only serves to develop the fury and mistrust shown Saturday.

In Berlin, this week, the Fire Company made an 11th-hour appearance at the Town Council meeting with long-awaited financial documents in hand. These documents had been requested by the city months ago. As the town prepared to vote on accepting the budget for the fiscal year beginning July 1, it was a bit late to take steps to resolve on-going issues.

While everyone, including the town, and fire company would like to see the issues resolved and restore some level of funding to the cash-strapped organization, it certainly doesn't look good when a last-minute plea with only portions of the request are met.

The Fire Company along with OPA board and management would better serve themselves by using a more straightforward method to resolve outstanding issues.



There is nothing like a weekend in New Orleans to remind me of the aging process and the natural degeneration of

the human immune system. Visiting the Quarter French for a Marine Scout Recon reunion with buddies that I have not seen in 22 years, we left few stones unturned as we roamed through the streets of the Big Easy.

Age does at the very least have the benefit of wisdom; we may not be wise, but we are wiser. I think. Since all of us are music lovers our goals were much more oriented to finding the amazing music for which New Orleans is known.

Having done my share of travelling over the years, I have learned to ask locals where they go to enjoy themselves; surely they wouldn't hang out on Bourbon Street, unless of course they were playing a gig or two or tending bar.

Eating our first dinner at the bar in the hotel, rarely a good choice, we were shocked at the caliber of our meal at Wolfe's in the Warehouse. The star of the evening was the blackened catfish on grits with a green onion-crawfish broth. It wasn't long before half the staff knew our table and Harry the Valet Manager directed us toward Frenchman District where we found live music.

After our second or third music venue in which we listened to mind-numbing jazz, blues and zydeco, it became apparent that most of the 'bands' were really just the same guys rotating through the different stages and jumping in. serves 2

18-inch round Italian loaf

3 oz. salami

3 oz. capicola

3 oz. mortadella

3 oz. pepperoni

2 oz. provolone cheese

Olive relish (recipe follows)

Split roll. If thick, take out a little of the crumb (the white inside) to make room for the meat and relish

Put relish on bottom, top with meat and cheese and finish it off with more relish and top of roll

Serve hot or cold

makes way too much! 8 oz. Italian Giardiniera, drained 1/2 c. Manzanilla olives 1/2 c. oil-cured olives 2 Tbsp. Capers

1/4 c. EV Olive Oil

2 Tbsp. Good red wine vinegar

1. Chop by hand until it is the size of capers, or at least the size that your capers were before you started hacking away
