OPA candidates ready for forum

Mohr wins draw, will appear first on ballots and speak first during June 24 debate

(June 18, 2015) Former OPA Board Director Terri Mohr won the 2015 candidate draw on Thursday,

Six of the seven candidates for office attended the meeting, held in the OPA Board Room in the Administration Office.

Thanks to the draw, Mohr, who served one three-year term before losing a reelection bid last year, will have her name come up first on this year's ballots.

Zawacki, Carol Ludwig and Slobodan Trendic.

Mohr will indeed speak first when the seven candidates, vying for two spots on the board, face off during a candidate forum on Wednesday, June 24 at 6 p.m. at the Assateague Room in the Ocean Pines Community Center.

The Ocean Pines Elections Committee is seeking questions from residents for the forum. The length of each question must be 75 words or less. Residents can submit questions by calling the committee at 410-208-3989, or sending questions by email to Committee Chair Bill Wentworth at bwentworth104@verizon.net.

The deadline for submitting questions is Saturday.

Cut off for voter eligibility in Ocean Pines is July 2. Ballots will be mailed on July 7 and are due on Aug. 6. Votes will be tallied on the following day and the winners, each serving a three-year term, will be announced during the annual meeting on Aug. 8.

Berlin spray paint suspects face trial Friday

(June 18, 2015) Nearly six months after a nighttime spray painting spree shocked Berlin residents, two suspects will go to trial in Worcester County District Court on Friday morning on 40 vandalism-related charges that resulted in \$11,276 in damages.

The defendants, Nick Bonser, 18, of Berlin, and Jordan Denton, 18, of Ocean City, face 39 charges of malicious destruction of property and one count of theft less than \$100. The theft charge is believed to be in conjunction with the spray paint itself, taken from a nearby Wal-Mart shortly before the incident occurred on the evening of Jan. 25.

According to the Worcester County State's Attorney's office, an unnamed juvenile suspect entered into a plea bargain and submitted a plea of "involved" to all 40 charges.

The state's attorney may only discuss outcomes when dealing with juvenile cases, so sentencing recommendations and details are unavailable.

In February, Berlin Police reported 36 separate victims, including the Town of Berlin, which had one vehicle, 10 electric meters and four trashcans spray-painted. Three buildings and 33 additional cars were sprayed during the incident that spanned a dozen streets: Ann Court, Ann Drive, Branch Street, Buttercup Court, Harrison Ave, Henry's Mill, Littleworth Court, North Main Street, Pitts Street, Powell Circle, West Street and William Street.

Renaissance Plaza, the Evergreen Masonic Lodge, Town Center Antiques and vehicles registered to Nestle Dreyer's Ice Cream and Delaware Elevator Inc. also suffered damages.

According to the statement of charges, Berlin police were dispatched to the municipal parking lot at 103 Williams Street at approximately 11:38 p.m. on Jan. 25 in re-

sponse to a call that several vehicles had been spray-painted.

Law enforcement logged the buildings, meters and trashcans, as well as 10 vehicles, that evening. On the following morning, police received 23 additional reports of damaged vehicles and recovered several discarded cans of spray paint.

A police investigation led authorities to the three suspects. According to the report, Bonser and the juvenile admitted, during police interviews, to obtaining the spray paint from the Wal-Mart and "riding around spraying painting vehicles and buildings."

The report went on to state that

Denton admitted to stealing the paint from Wal-Mart and "coming to Berlin with [the suspects] and spray painting cars and buildings."

Berlin Police said they obtained video from Wal-Mart showing the three suspects allegedly stealing spray paint from the store at approximately 9:36 p.m.

Police said all of the crimes occurred between 9:36 and 11:38 p.m. "pursuant to one scheme and continuing course of conduct, willfully and maliciously defacing [properties]."


Denton was served papers on Feb. 11 and had a scheduled hearing on March 13 at 9 a.m. at the district courthouse in Snow Hill. The result of that hearing is unknown.

OPA Board of Directors Candidate Slobodan Trendic hopes to bring a humorous touch to this year's

OPA candidate Trendic using ads to insert levity

(June 18, 2015) The Ocean Pines Association Board of Directors isn't exactly known for its energetic sense of humor, so it's worth noting when a candidate for office attempts to bring a lighter touch during a political campaign.

That's exactly what Belgrade, Yugoslavia native Slobodan Trendic, 59, is attempting to do with a series of colorful, cartoony signs posted around the community.

"I'm trying to maintain a little sense of humor because all too often the board members and others really take things too seriously, which really causes friction and confrontation," he said. "I'm trying to do my best to avoid that, and I think as the community members drive around and notice my signs, they will speak

for themselves what is so different about me.

"Like President Lincoln's old motto said, use your humor to entertain your friends and disarm your adversaries," Trendic added. "That's going to be my style."

Trendic also hopes to bring a worldly perspective to what is, as he sees it, an extremely diverse community in Ocean Pines.

"I'm probably the first Ocean Pines candidate that is not a naturalized U.S. citizen," he said. "I think I bring a very interesting perspective to the community in that capacity, not only as a former Yugoslavian and now citizen, but also as somebody that has traveled all over the world and has seen many, many other places in ways that other people have not. 

places and we have managed to successfully integrate into one cohesive community."

Trendic, a former IT executive with three decades of experience in the private sector, came to the United States in 1978. He bought a summer home in Ocean Pines in 2008, and moved to the area with his wife five years later.

Last year, Trendic filed for the board before stepping down early and throwing his support behind candidates Dave Stevens and Pat Renaud. The pair eventually won the election, and proceeded to reorganize the power structure on the board of directors.

"Maybe I'm just looking for more punishment," Trendic said with a laugh. "Last year I felt there were two candidates that I was really able to relate to. I felt that there was a huge need for change at the board level in order to proceed with the reforms that we needed to undertake, and by staying in the race I would have, probably, complicated the prospect of two good candidates getting elected."

Ironically, Trendic said the presumed lock-step team of Stevens, currently board president, and Board Secretary Renaud, has not always gone as originally advertised.


"If you saw recent dynamics at the board level you will probably conclude that Pat Renaud and Dave Stevens are no longer like thinkers," he said. "I think there's friction building up, which is, unfortunately, very unhealthy. I was most disturbed by Pat's vote to approve the current fiscal budget, specifically raising HOA dues. I think it's just not really what I would call creative leadership. It's maybe public sector behavior, but not something that I would have expected from somebody coming from the private sector."

This year, Trendic said, he's in the race for the long haul.

"Keep in mind that I'm a Yugoslav," he said. "We've been known to be of tough skin. I have no intention of dropping out this time short of somebody running me over with a bus. I was a team player last year, but this year people have urged me to run and they have high expectations – and I'm not going to let them down."

What really motivated his second foray into candidacy, Trendic said, is the fact that he has "lost confidence in the board and the general manager."

"That is the overriding factor for See TRENDIC Page 8



my decision to run," he said. "I'm running as a representative of all homeowners who are not happy with the board's performance and with the GM's performance, whether they're part-time homeowners or full-time homeowners."

Trendic's main issue with General Manager Bob Thompson, he said, is the contract approved by the previous board, in 2014.

"Under the previous president, the board has structured a compensation package that I feel is just outrageous," he said. "We pay the GM a \$165,000 base salary with upwards of \$40,000 in bonuses and a benefits package. All that added up and you're probably looking at over \$225,000."

No other community on the East-

ern Shore, Trendic suggested, pays a managing executive as much as Ocean Pines pays Thompson.

"Even the Ocean City manager doesn't make this type of money," he said. "Even across the bridge, the city manager of Annapolis doesn't make that much money. The problem I have is it's a package put together for the GM that is just not sustainable, and it's really a wasteful use of our financial resources. That is really what caused me to start speaking publically and become more involved with the community last year."

Trendic also tied Thompson to the new yacht club, indicting the GM further for failing to meeting budget estimates during its first year.

"Everything I've read [suggests to] me and others that Bob Thomp-

son was greatly behind the whole project," he said. "He was running the show and he was involved from the design phase all the way to the execution. And I can understand why – every executive would want to have a project that would define his success, maybe his legacy, but let's face it, the majority of people I have spoken to are really disappointed with the yacht club at many levels."

The facility, Trendic said, was originally presented at a \$4.2 million cost to the community.

"The original budget has been exceeded by 25 percent," he said. "I don't call that a success."

Trendic went on to criticize the financial performance of the yacht club, although he did go on record against shutting the facility down during the winter. "We continue to lose money in huge ways and this is one of the amenities that should stand on its own and not be subsidized," he said. "It's not just open to residents of this community and homeowners — it's open to the public. It kind of begs the question, which amenities do we run as profit and loss centers and which amenities need to be subsidized?"

The golf course, yacht club and beach club, Trendic suggested, should all turn profits. Outsourcing some of those facilities, he added, could help towards that goal.

"I think once and for all we need to put this to rest," Trendic said. "We need to clearly identify which amenities should be profitable, which amenities should be free of charge and which need to be subsi-

dized because they are unable to make a profit.

"[Outsourcing] is nothing new," Trendic continued. "Governments all over the world have been doing it for years. Private sector all over the world has been doing it for years. There are certain functions that every entity nowadays pretty much shares in common, and those are the ones that you farm out to third party companies that can do it cheaper, better, faster."

Trendic singled out the beach club as a "jewel that's been neglected."

"It's not only a jewel for us, but also for visitors, for our families, our renters, and it's a first impression to many of the new comers," he said. "When you go to the beach club and you look at the restroom facilities there, it's really embarrassing. I've been to a lot of third-world countries, and I have seen the worst. It reflects on us in a very negative way. As a board member, I would not be able to allow that to continue."

He also proposed Ocean Pines use franchise fees from utilities, like Mediacom and Sandpiper, as earmarks for specific expenditures, rather than simply adding to the general fund.

One of Trendic's boldest ideas is to use Mediacom fees in order to build the necessary infrastructure to liberate the community from its stranglehold. In order to save money on the project, he suggested Ocean Pines find a way to work with the county during a planned replacement of water pipes in the area.

"Mediacom has a monopoly in Ocean Pines - they own the infrastructure," he said. "If I was on the board and responsible for this I would put in place a plan, I would work with the county leadership in a cooperative way, and I would follow their trucks as they dig ditches and I would lay down fiber optics cables. The biggest investment in laying down a fiber-optic network is really in the labor involved to dig ditches and bury those cables.

"We have an opportunity of a life-time," Trendic continued. "The new pipes are going last a hundred years. Imagine if we lay down fiber optic cable behind the county workers in the same trenches, what would that mean to us if we own our own fiber optic infrastructure? We would be able to take over our own cable infraand invite structure service providers like Verizon, AT&T and Mediacom to come in and offer their services. This is the kind of creative leadership that we need in Ocean Pines.'

Trendic admitted he did not have all the knowledge required to find the right solutions to every problem in Ocean Pines, but said there were plenty of residents who did.

"One of my biggest goals is to reach out to whole the community,' he said. "There are executives in this community that have the skills and expertise to do almost anything. There are a number of people here that are smarter, more experienced, more skilled than any currently sitting board member – or any of the seven candidates for the board, me included. I would love to motivate those people to step forward and volunteer either as a board member or as a member of an advisory commit-

"We need help, and this is going to be one of the things I'm going to focus on," Trendic continued. "I think my personality, my personal skills and my professional experience hopefully will make a difference in bringing the board together to work in a more harmonious way."



Candidate Jacobs brings impressive resume to **OPA** race

(June 18, 2015) Newcomer Cheryl Jacobs is painting herself as a fresh face in this year's race for the Ocean Pines Association Board of Directors, but the current special council to Maryland Attorney General Brian Frosh has no shortage of experience in both the public and private sector.

Born and raised in Hagerstown, Jacobs, 67, is the former assistant state's attorney in Baltimore City and boasts additional experience working for several Fortune 500 companies, including Verizon and AT&T.

Jacobs was part of a legal delegation that traveled to China in 2002 and previously served as president of the Maryland State Women's Bar Association, commissioner of the 2011 Worcester County Commission for Women, president of the Friends of the Worcester County Commission for Women, and director on several HOA boards in Ocean City and Baltimore.

She also earned the rank of major in the Maryland Defense Force, which Jacobs called "the modern equivalent of the Maryland Militia," appointed by retired Maryland District Court Judge Frederic N. Smalkin.

"I'm always volunteering to try and do good for people and I was the first and only woman that got involved in that," Jacobs said. "I participated with that for

a number of years, helping guardspeople with their legal issues.'

A property owner in Worcester County for more than three decades, Ja $cobs\,moved\,to\,Ocean\,Pines, originally\,on$ a part-time basis, in 2001.

Jacobs said she was approached by the search committee in Ocean Pines this year, as well as encouraged to run by other residents in the area.

Jacobs eyeing board, future of OP

"People that have known me first suggested that I consider running for the board a year ago," she said. "They know my penchant for wanting to volunteer and trying to make things better, but because I continued to work full time I knew that I didn't have the time to devote to it until I was going to be in a position to work less or retire entirely, and that's where I am now."

Starting in September, Jacobs said, she plans to work no more than two days a week.

"I understand that representing parttime residents is an issue for some people and that was one of the things they thought was good about me running, because I had been in that situation," she said.

Rather than dwelling exclusively on the immediate issues, Jacobs said much of her focus is on the future, when Ocean Pines could face a number of infrastructure issues.

"The bridges, the roads, information technology and the country club are things on horizon that we're going to have to deal with, and I believe that we have to have a comprehensive plan to budget for those in the most cost-effective way," she said.

Jacobs said she is also well aware of the tension between the board members.

"That's an issue, and I believe that because of the way I've operated in the past, which is using a team-building approach, that I'm optimistic I can be effective in trying to minimize or eliminate that kind of contention," she said. "Certainly I am always going to be acting ethically as an attorney and respectfully to people, because that's the only way to be. So I see that as a positive."

Although three of the seven candidates this year are women, and some of the aforementioned tension on the board has involved the treatment of women, generally a minority group on the board, Jacobs was quick to insist that she is not by any means running on the basis of her gender.

"I'm not running as a woman at all, I'm running as a qualified person," she said. "So I would not begin to want to say, 'Oh, well you need to elect me because we need a woman and I'm a woman.' I think that's important to understand that's not where my head is at all, and I expect to be treated equally as a person that posses the qualifications that hopefully people will recognize and vote for."

Jacobs also insisted she does not intend to align herself with either of the current factions on the board.

"My theme is 'a fresh face,' and I do think that we do have recycling of people," she said. "While that's not necessarily a bad thing, people bring experience if they've been on the board before, I think bringing a fresh face and a fresh perspective is a good thing and a positive thing that I can bring.

"I have no hidden agenda — I have one and only one agenda, which I'm open and honest about, and that is protecting the investment of the homeowners and doing so in the most cost-effective way that we

can while maintaining the wonderful community that we have," Jacobs added.

On the issue of amenities, Jacobs said she's looking at the big picture and the interest of the majority of homeowners in Ocean Pines.

"If you come to Ocean Pines because of the amenities then you would expect to have the amenities," she said. "Whatever it takes to continue to make sure we have the amenities that the community at large want is what I would be interested in.

"I do have a problem with what I characterize as 'the tyranny of the minorities,' so I don't think people should be acting on behalf of a few number of people, and sometimes those are the most-vocal people," Jacobs continued. "That's not in the best interest of the community at large. Certainly you have to hear everybody's voice, but when the rubber hits the road, so to speak, decisions must be made for the good of the entire community."


Ultimately, Jacobs said, she hopes her record stands for itself.

"I think I bring a fresh perspective and I think I have excellent qualifications that I can use on behalf of the homeowners," she said. "What I have always done is to build teams with the people that I've worked with, and that's how I would approach the board if elected. When you have that kind of trust with people and you've built a team, you tend to be able to accomplish a lot more than when you're divided."

OP lifeguards exempt from OT pay

FLSA loophole will allow community to pay straight time to staff after 40 hours

(June 18, 2015) Ocean Pines, using a loophole in the Fair Labor Standards Act (FLSA) established by the U.S. Department of Labor, plans to exempt a portion of its staff from overtime pay.

Specifically, the community will use the FLSA Exemption for Seasonal Amusement or Recreational Establishments to exclude lifeguards from receiving time and a half wages.

Ocean Pines General Manager Bob Thompson confirmed the news on Tuesday.

"We're going to extend the opportunity for our lifeguards at our pools, if they'd like to work more than 40 hours, we're going to extend that opportunity to them," Thompson said. "We typically wouldn't pay overtime so we'd limit them to 40 hours, but when we found out the exemption is there,

for those that want to work the additional hours to pick up some more pay, this gives them the opportunity to do so."

The alternative, Thompson said, was hiring additional staff to cover the needed hours.

"Instead of hiring additional staff for those straight hours I'm giving those who are there an opportunity to work a few extra hours if they want to," he said.

According to the federal labor laws, most employees in the U.S. must be paid at least the federal minimum wage and overtime pay at one-half the regular rate of pay after 40 hours in a workweek.

The labor act provides an exemption from the overtime rule for "any employee employed by an establishment which is an amusement or recreational establishment, if it does not operate for more than seven months in any calendar year, or during the preceding calendar year, its average receipts for any six months of such year were not more than 33-1/3 per centum of its average receipts for the other six months of such year."

Aquatics does operate yearround, but, according to monthly financial reports from 2014 the amenity averaged \$89,592 in revenue between April and September. During the other six months the department took in an average of \$18,741, roughly 21 percent of its busy season revenues, putting it within the limits of the exemption.

"It's very rare that anyone goes into overtime and it's not that they won't get paid if they do, because obviously we pay everyone," Aquatics Director Colby Phillips said. "We can't make anyone work if they don't want to, and we pretty much keep everyone under 40 [hours] regardless."

Phillips estimated the community staffs between 35-40 lifeguards.

"We haven't really been that worried about it because no one has gone over 40 and we don't really keep anyone there anyway," she said. "But if they're an 18-year-old that's trying to save money and they want to work and we say, 'hey, you can't work over 40 hours because See QUESTIONS Page 14



we can't pay you overtime,' and all of the sudden we're like, 'hey, you actually can, but it's straight time' a lot of them want it because they want the money.

In a May 28 email sent to several people connected with aquatics, Kathleen Cook, supervisor of lifeguards, said Phillips "had [Payroll Director] Beverly [Meadows] check the Amusement and Recreational Exemption Law. Ocean Pines aquatics, summer staff, fall into this exemption. Due to this exemption, we can work over 40 hours and not be paid overtime. This is good news for those of you that would like to work more than 40 hours in the summer.'

A source, which provided the original email, said they were unaware if any of the lifeguarding staff was upset by the news.

"It's not a matter of being upset, but is it ethical and in line with [state] and federal labor laws," the source said. "The claim that Ocean Pines pools fall into the recreational establishment exemption was the matter in question. When I approached the finance person they couldn't address the matter and referred it to the manager for clarification. They have since responded that they have made a decision, but would not share it with me [saying] they would notify the lifeguards via the supervisor."

The source said they had not heard anything further on the mat-

"There is no problem if the state sees this as appropriate, however I'm not sure how Ocean Pines Aquatics qualifies as a recreational establishment and is not considered an amenity of Ocean Pines when the residents cover the shortages on finances," the source said, adding that aquatics lost \$783,196 during the last five years and projects a budgeted loss of \$121,966 during the current fiscal year.

"You might ask, then, why would you be questioning overtime when it would cost the community more? Because it's important to do what's right [and] when there are young folks involved it's necessary the laws are followed," the source said. "As well, if OP is not exempt we could face charges by the Department of Labor if it's found to be not exempt and some were to file a claim."







"Star Charities is a nonprofit and we're all volunteers and our purpose is to help the people who suffer," organizer Anna Foultz said.

According to the National Parkinson Foundation, 50,000-60,000 new cases of Parkinson's are diagnosed each year in the United States, making it the 14th leading cause of death in the nation.

Foultz said the disease is prevalent in Ocean Pines.

"We're trying to get money to support research to try and stop it, because there's no cure," she said. "It's a horrible disease, and the money we raise is going to stay right here in Ocean Pines.

Star Charities is well known in the community for its fundraising efforts, aiding more than a dozen other local and national organizaand causes, including Alzheimer's research, the American Cancer Society, the Girl Scouts and Diakonia.

County treated teachers, government workers equally

Public school teachers and staff got their raises approved this week, following a Worcester County Board of Education vote on Tuesday to shuffle money and to eliminate a number of positions, many of which were part-time.

The tenor of the public discussion preceding that vote, however, has been that the county commissioners slighted education in the coming fiscal year's budget by not covering the school board's budgeted wage increase for instructional and support personnel.

That's not entirely fair, as the commissioners also did not raise the pay of their own employees and treated everyone on the government's payroll equally.

That doesn't make the absence of a raise any less painful, but it does show that the commissioners weren't targeting education, but were instead trying to squeeze through the narrow crack between declining revenues and rising expenses.

Meanwhile, the incomes of many Worcester County households have yet to recover from the dives they took in the recession years, making any kind of tax increase unpopular enough, much less one that would cover all requests.

As is always the case in government and in most businesses, there is going to be waste or nonessential expenditures that can be eliminated or reduced.

The key is to know how much of that can be done without permanently damaging the institution itself so it can't recover when the economic opportunity arises.

That, in effect, is what the school board did, when it sacrificed in some areas to meet the budgetary requirements in other areas

The board's moves won't cause irreparable harm to the system, just as the commissioners' refusal to fund pay raises won't send it on a downward spiral.

What it really means is that the county has had to pull itself back from the fiscal brink created by an imploding economy that most people and governments never saw coming.

It's not fun, but neither is it personal.

Berlin establishes 'Beat the Peak'

Voluntary program saves electric co. customers money

(June 18, 2015) The Town of Berlin Electric Utility launched a Beat the Peak program on June 1, to reduce energy consumption and costs, announced Mayor Gee Williams.

"Beat the Peak is a voluntary energy conservation program that encourages limited energy usage, especially during peak times. The program saves the Electric Utility and its customers money," Williams said. "With a little extra effort, everyone will be better off."

"Peak times are when our electric utility is purchasing wholesale power at the highest prices. By cutting back on the amount of wholesale power purchased during these peak, high-priced periods, we can reduce our total wholesale power costs," said Town Administrator Laura

Allen. "Reductions in wholesale power costs are passed through to the customers in the Power Cost Adjustment (PCA)."

The demand for electricity in the summer months is highest during extremely hot temperatures; typically, the peak period is from 2-6 p. m. Demand in the winter months is greatest during extreme cold temperatures, especially between the peak periods of 7-10 a. m. and 7-10 p. m.

"We should know about 24 hours in advance of an upcoming peak. We'll use a combination of the CodeRed system, press releases, our website and social media to get the word out along with a request to reduce energy consumption," Allen said.

"It is in everyone's interest to use energy resources wisely," said Electric Utility Director Tim Lawrence. "We encourage our customers to examine their energy use and take steps to conserve on a regular basis. At times

of peak electricity use, it's even more important to conserve."

Steps customers can take to reduce their energy usage include: shut off lights when not needed; unplug small appliances and electric chargers (especially those with small lights); set the thermostat as high in the summer and as low in the winter as comfortable; cover drafty windows; turn off televisions, computers, radios and other electronic devices when not being used; and do laundry and other household chores requiring electricity during non-peak hours.

"As a community-owned electric system, it is important that we work together to keep our electric rates as low as possible," Williams said. "Our customers have the opportunity to make a difference in their system and their electric charges by conserving energy during peak periods. These small steps can really add up."





Chicken tender sandwich with chorizo

As the season wears on, I sit on my back deck reminiscing the awful winter that we just experienced. It's hard

for me to get too upset about the heat for that reason and also I guess because I have spent so many years in professional kitchens, hot and sticky have been the order of the day for of my most adult life.

Standing on the back deck of the restaurant last night, I was rewarded with a lightning show from the storm that blew over the southern part of the peninsula. We didn't get a drop of rain in Bethany, but the show was enough. Now that I think about it, I never heard a single clap of thunder, but I can only imagine that it happened, as the show was so magnifi-

Set against a backdrop of haze and clouds and what appeared to be some fog north of the storm, it amplified the magnitude of each lightning bolt as it either reached across the sky or touched down as it came in contact with the ground. It was something out of a book.

Now as I sit on the back deck, and our dog, Sadie, is nosing around inspecting every nook and cranny of the grills, the cabinets et al., I find at least a little peace and quiet before I go back to work tonight. Now that tropical storm Bill is on the radar, officially getting set to hit Texas later in the day, we have another reason to appreciate a scorching-hot day such as today.

As we all know, if you don't like the weather on Delmarva, just wait 15 minutes. With a deep dip in temperatures tomorrow, we have it on authority that the big storm will hit us by Father's Day, this Sunday.

But the mind wanders. I get a hankering for fried chicken, and as I won't be going to buy some any time soon, I decide to throw together a sandwich for the ages. As a Maryland boy, I love fried chicken. Its crunchy skin, the flavors and the gestalt just say 'Eastern Shore' to me. And since I'm not that much of a crab picker (I know, shame on me) I will simply have to settle for the fried chicken.

Below is a simple recipe for chicken breader, and I know what you are going to say. "You hate Old Bay, Paul." And you would be right usually, but this is one of those instances when blend works its magic. And once you get the ratios down for the breader, I don't think you'll be stopping at the chicken. There is a magical thing that happens once you figure out your fryer breader. It's a very special thing. I for one and happy to be standing over a hot fryer, knowing all the while that the sandwich will be delicious and that winter is still a long ways away.

Chicken Tender Sandwich

Serves 4 8 slices bread Romaine lettuce, as needed

Chicken tenders (4 per person, recipe follows) Roasted Garlic-Chorizo Schmear (recipe follows)

Chipotle Mayo (recipe follows)

- 1. Grill or toast the bread to add some nice flavor and sturdi-
- 2. Spread the top and bottom slices of bread with some Chipotle mayo. Add as much or as little as you

like. This is a fried chicken sandwich, so don't let "health' get in the way of enjoying this avian kerfuffle.

- 3. On the bottom slice of bread, place lettuce, chicken and the schmear in a big pile.
- 4. Top the sandwich with the top slice and skewer, making service a

Chicken Tenders

Makes about 16 tenders 4 ea. Medium chicken breasts 2 c. All-purpose Flour 1/2 c. Old Bay White Pepper, as needed Buttermilk, for dipping

- 1. Cut each breast into four strips and place in buttermilk.
- 2. Have a fryer set to 350F and set up your breading station as follows: Whisk together the flour, Old Bay and white pepper.
 - 3. For this easy breader, remove



from buttermilk and place in dry breader mix, coating thoroughly. As the flour hydrates, add more so that you end up with a nice, thick coating of breader.

- 4. Drop in the fryer carefully and fry until cooked. They won't take that long because they are relatively small. Ensure that the internal temperature reaches 165F.
- 5. Set aside but keep warm until ready to assemble and serve.

Roasted Garlic-Chorizo Schmear

Makes about 3 cups 1 c. Fresh garlic cloves 1 c. Cherry tomatoes Olive oil, as needed 1/2 c. Good Chorizo 1/2 c. Bacon lardons, crispy

1. Toss the tomatoes and garlic in olive oil separately and place on separate pans.

- 2. Season with salt & pepper and roast in a 350F oven until the garlic soft and spreadable and the tomatoes are blistered and soft. Let cool.
- 3. When cool enough to handle, place the garlic, tomato, chorizo and bacon on a good size cutting board.
- 4. Chop into a spreadable 'tapenade' and chill until ready to use.

Chipotle Mayonnaise

Makes about 2 cups

- 2 c. Real Mayonnaise
- 1 ea. Chipotle pepper with adobo 1. Combine ingredients in a blender until smooth. Season with salt and pepper if needed, but I find that these two ingredients are usually enough.




