Berlin to temporarily halt credit pay

(June 30, 2016) The Town of Berlin is sending out about 2,000 letters to its utility customers this week, hoping to spread the word that credit card payments will not be able to be processed by the town for a two-to-three week period, starting July 4.

The lapse will be caused by an upgrade to the town's billing software, as it switches over from Logic Solutions to Tyler Technologies. The Town Council approved the change last May.

"Because we're changing the utility billing system – which means we're also changing credit card companies – we're going to need to suspend, for two-to-three weeks, our ability to accept credit cards," Town Administrator Laura Allen said. "This will affect all of our transactions – not just utility billing customers, but anybody who comes to town who wants to pay for, say, a building permit by credit card.

"Unfortunately, it's a little inconvenient for our customers, so we're trying to get the word out so they can plan accordingly," she added.

Allen said the town would continue to accept cash and checks for all transactions.

She was not sure how many utility customers would be affected, but said the town did not have "a ton of people signed up for online payments."

"The vast majority of our payments are by check and in cash. There's not that many by credit card," she said. "When we initially started thinking about this transition, that's where our focus was, thinking we would need to just pull the online payment down," she said. "As we worked more closely with the vendor, we realized what we would need to do is suspend the credit card payment acceptance for everything."

Along with mailing letters to its utility customers, Allen said the town would post an announcement on its website. Press releases were also issued this week.

"Not everybody is going to read those letters, so we're using various forms of communication to help get the word out," she said. "This is not an unusual element in a financial system change — it's just part of the process. It's one of many moving pieces that we have with the utility billing change."

Allen said the changeover would take several weeks because of the complexity of switching so many town systems. While it's a temporary inconvenience for customers, she said the benefit would be better service, including new bills that will be easier to read. The new systems will feature detailed usage charts that will allow utility customers to compare current activity to their service from the previous year.

"The new software has a more sophisticated online portal feature," Allen said. "For the people who are paying via credit card or using the online portal to track their information, it's a more robust system than what we have currently."

As for the fees associated with online transactions, for now the town will continue to pick up the tab. The council had approved passing service charges onto individual online customers, rather than the taxpayers, but Allen said the details of exactly how that would work are still being ironed out.

"We believe in a process of continuous improvement in Berlin," Mayor Gee Williams said in a press release this week. "Not all change is easy, even the change you initiate. Once the billing transition is completed, I trust our customers will agree that the temporary inconvenience will be worth it in the long run."

Ocean Pines BOD candidates clash at annual forum

(June 30, 2016) Eleven of the 12 candidates for Ocean Pines Association Board of Directors met last Wednesday evening during the only association-sponsored forum of the election season.

While no one candidate scored what could be considered a knockout blow, several did differentiate themselves in terms of the issues and their approach to governance, as well as their overall view of Ocean Pines.

Newcomer George Simon, for instance, addressed the perception of dysfunction amongst the current directors and juxtaposed that with his experience in construction.

"I've seen dysfunction. We may have some issues with the board where they may not get along, but I can tell you – this is not dysfunction," he said. "If you want dysfunction you can go ... into Ocean City.

"We have a good plan here. We have a good general manager. We just need a board that can work together and get the things done in this community and save us money. That's all we need," he added.

Comprehensive Planning Committee Chairman Frank Daly said his priority was "to get the board [of directors] functioning like a board."

"Right now it functions like a sixth grade student council," he said. "We need people in there that are going to provide the right kind of oversight, demand the right kind of accountability and do the kind of in-depth work on proposals that spend your money wisely," he said.

Similarly, Tom Janasek said his priority was to get the board working together.

"There's [been] so much dissention on the boards for the past six years – there's so much infighting," he said. "You go to these meetings and ... they last two hours because people are bickering and talking. There's no negotiation on the board. There's no speaking back and forth. It drives me crazy."

Public hearing on leash laws moved to Monday, July 11 regular session

(June 30, 2016) A Berlin Town Council meeting scheduled for Monday, June 27 was canceled because of a lack of a quorum.

Mayor Gee Williams said he and several members of the council and town staff were taking part in the Maryland Municipal League meetings this week in Ocean City.

"That's the primary reason we couldn't get a quorum," he said. "There's so many key staff members – department heads, but not exclusively department heads – taking part, and most of the council participates.

"Quite frankly, just having passed the budget and gotten so much done, I think a little bit of just having a chance to catch our breath is probably the best thing we could do right now," Williams added.

Town Administrator Laura Allen said the agenda was not yet set for the next meeting, although the town confirmed in a press release that a public hearing on changes to the dog leash laws, scheduled for June 27, would be held during the next town council meeting, Monday July 11, at 7 p.m. in town hall.

The council could also address the portion of Harrison Avenue that was

closed by the Adkins Company, which owns the road. Adkins had tried to sell the street to the town, for what Allen said was "about 10 times the appraised value." When the town balked, part of the road was closed to through traffic.

Williams said there was no news on that front, although he promised, "there will be."

"At this point, we're looking into the public safety impact, and our attorney is doing his research," he said.

SH museum debuts 'Heritage Days'

(June 30, 2016) Focusing on the Victorian lineage of both the town and the museum's collection, the Julia Purnell museum in Snow Hill will start the popular Heritage Days events for children this Wednesday and will continue each week until early August.

"It's our most popular program," Executive Director Dr. Cindy Byrd "Grandparents bring their grandkids, or sometimes one adult rounds up all the neighborhood children and brings them down.

Heritage days are free for children, so long as they are accompanied by at least one paying adult. Adult admission is \$3.

There is no need to preregister, and the program is available between 1-3 p.m. Wednesdays until Aug. 10.

'It's a drop-in event. People come and go," she said.

This week's theme is clothespin people, which will be used to explore

the Victorian fascination with miniatures. Next week is origami, or paper folding art, followed by a bird program, a presentation on elves and fairies, "tassel critters" and, ending the series, croquet and other older lawn games. The final heritage day event will move from the museum to nearby Byrd Park.

"Victorians liked to make little scenes in miniature, and composed little vignettes. These events are based on that obsession," Byrd said. "There were a lot of fads during the Victorian era, and the people liked looking back on simpler times.'

Larger, more grandiose projects were seen as futuristic, or something out of science fiction. Smaller or even miniaturized items were prized for their connections to the past.

"For example, when you see a dollhouse, they are almost always decorated in Victorian styles," she said.

Examples from the Purnell museum's collection such as the flea circus and a copy of "the world's smallest Bible" are testament to that, Byrd said.

Julia Purnell, the museum's namesake, began her collections during the Victorian era and her son, William, extended and expanded them. The Purnell museum's collection is largely derived from William Purnell's belongings.

This first Heritage Days event will allow children to create their own little clothespin people, and will ento make them backgrounds and stories starring them.

Younger boys, Byrd explained, have made more than their fair share of pirate clothespin people, for exam-

The museum provides all the supplies for the event, but for those who want to take more clothespin people projects home, the museum's gift shop sells kits. These projects, Byrd said, typically take about 30 minutes to complete, but can easily be age adjusted for older or younger children.a

Truck, tractor pull fills air and seats in Pocomoke, Sat.

(June 30, 2016) Making a return after last year's event was cancelled because of poor weather, the Lucas Oil Pro Pulling League truck and tractor pull brought more than 1,000 spectators, crew and participants to the fairgrounds in Pocomoke City on Saturday.

The stars of the show were, according to organizer Gloria Smith, the weather, the track, the participants and the 36 pieces of equipment all working together to make for an exciting, family-friendly event.

Clear sunny skies with an occasional breeze marked the event, keeping the shade cool and the motors hot as they strove to drag a 40,000pound sled 300 feet in the shortest amount of time.

Last year, rainy conditions all but ruined the track at the fairgrounds, which would make the pulling difficult and both the audience and participants unhappy.

The people who know dirt work understand – the track came together beautifully," Smith said.

When dealing with high horsepower and high performance machines, a track that's too wet is as undesirable as one that is too dry or sandy. While pulling a load, Smith explained, the tires need to grip the surface and bite in to gain enough traction. Otherwise, fuel and horsepower are wasted on a futile effort.

A track that is too wet or dry is also more likely to be slippery, and cause the high-precision machines to perform poorly.

With the town getting rain in the week preceding the event, Smith said there was an early concern the track wouldn't be ready.

"It hadn't been worked up in two years. The crew started working in the morning, because the tractors like a hard track," she said.

Chisel plows, a wheeled smoothing device that was loaded down with blank granite headstones and other pieces of heavy equipment to provide weight, put in a long day before the See POCOMOKE Page 8

Pines passes pair of capital purchases; food truck MIA

(June 30, 2016) About a month after two tie votes stalled a pair of capital purchases related to the Ocean Pines Association golf course, the board of directors met again in special session and passed both by separate 4-2 votes.

Another item, a motion to approve the purchase of a food truck, was not on the agenda despite also previously meeting with a tie vote.

In a seeming game of musical chairs, Vice President Cheryl Jacobs was absent during the previous vote, but present during the special meeting last Thursday, while Director Dave Stevens was present the first time, but absent the second.

That was enough to swing the vote. The directors approved three Toro fairway mowers, from Turf Equipment Supply for \$44,633.34 each, or roughly \$26,000 less than what was approved in the budget. Turf also won the bid on a Toro sprayer for \$68,224.29, about \$8,000 more than what was budgeted.

Tom Herrick and Jack Collins voted against both purchases, suggesting golf management company Landscapes Unlimited had not requested new mowers or sprayers.

Following the meeting, the directors adjourned to a closed session to discuss a contractual matter related to the golf management company.

Last Friday Jacobs, in a phone interview, said the closed session was essentially a "straight-up" one-year review of the company's perform-

She later sent a written statement about the meeting, addressing both the capital purchases and the food

"Due to a family medical emer-

gency, I was unable to attend the May 26 Board meeting. This was the first meeting I ever missed attending, which was troubling to me, but as much as I love Ocean Pines, family comes first," Jacobs said.

"I had initially requested we resolve the tie votes on the capital expenditure requests through an electronic vote. After reviewing the video of the meeting, it was clear to me that a special meeting was required to address those items, as well as including a one-year review of the contractual performance of the company that manages our golf course, Landscapes Unlimited.

'After much effort trying to find a date that met all or most of the director's schedules, a special meeting was held on June 23; only the mowers and sprayer for the golf course were requested for purchase, which passed by a four-to-two vote (Mr. Stevens was on vacation out of the country and unable to attend by telephone).

"While I remain a proponent of the food truck, after my independent investigation I did not feel there was sufficient information to be able to make a decision. There was no capital request for it at the June 23 special meeting or at the regular board meeting on June 25.

'I know there are differing opinions about the food truck, but I am able to see the opportunities that it could provide for the entire community at special events such as Movies in the Park, Concerts in the Park, Big Truck Day, 4th of July celebrations, just to name a few, as well as food service at Mumford's Landing family pool, that is currently lacking. There is no denying the popularity of food trucks, which are now even becoming franchised."

Forum brings out views on bridges, yacht club and RFPs

Tom Herrick asking about the possibility of outsourcing the general manager position, which he said was shot down without enough review "like he had just told them he was going to take their dog away from them."

"We really need to stop all the bickering and infighting on the board ... I'm telling you, I will do what I say I'm going to do," Janasek said. "The priority would be [to] get the board functioning, whether it be with this GM or whatever GM - get these projects done. We have a problem with getting projects done ... we need another study like we need a hole in the head."

By-laws & Resolutions Chairman Doug Parks carried part of that logic over to a question on whether several ailing bridges should be repaired or replaced. Safety, he said, far outweighed whether the county or state would cover all or part of replacement.

'Replacement obviously comes with a cost, but there's also a warrantee, there's [added] longevity to that bridge that will address what I think is a very important problem – that is the safety, both for the people going over that bridge [and] the people that are going under that bridge," he said. This topic has been on the books far too long. We've had a lot of discussion about it. It's time to make an informed decision - it's not time, as others have said, to have another study."

Budget and Finance Committee Chairwoman Pat Supik said the bridges issue partially hinged on "assessment by professionals," but agreed that if safety was an issue, Ocean Pines should move to replace without or without county or state funding.

She tied the issue into the debate on reserves, saying if Ocean Pines did not have adequate stockpiles "everything becomes a major problem."

Bridges that are falling apart, we all agree, would be a little bit dangerous. If we don't have the reserve funds to immediately take care of those bridges when they need to be taken care of, then we'd have to go borrow the money," she said. "We wouldn't be sitting here making the decision because we wouldn't have the ability to do that.'

Slobodan Trendic spoke in defense of outsourcing, citing the yacht club and information technology as particular areas where Ocean Pines could

Outsourcing is not a novelty," he said. "It's basically an efficient, effective way to bring new ways of running our facilities and our amenities. My philosophy is very simple. We are [an] association. We should do in-house what we have to do in-house because nobody else should or can. But, I also ... believe that we should [not] be competing with local businesses. We should form partnerships.

"Let the professional restaurant owners come in and run the yacht club," he continued. "IT, our information technology infrastructure, is another example of a perfect area that needs to be outsourced ... we are running systems that belong [in] the MIT museum. We don't have the IT systems; we don't have human resources systems. As a board, you can't plan as a general manager you can't plan unless you have the right tools.

Steve Lind also recommended outsourcing the yacht club operation, and said his biggest concern with the amenity was that it was not doing enough business during the summer.

"We have a bayfront place, [an] absolutely gorgeous place [with a] marina, tiki bar, pool," he said. "We go there on a Monday night or a Thursday night, there's nobody there - in July and August.

"I think we should concentrate on increasing the summer business to where it should be, considering we're in a resort area, and then maybe we will be able to keep the yacht club open maybe Thursday, Friday and Saturday and Sunday in the winter and still break even," he continued. "I truly believe the problem is we just don't make enough in the summer. We have three months to make a fortune and we're not doing it."

Sharona Ezaoui admitted she was "not a politician," but repeatedly encouraged the leadership to listen and work together.

"I'm good at doing stuff," she said. "I have ideas that I can do, but I'm not a politician. I would like to be part of the board to [make] decisions, because I know ... I can help."

Business owner Brett Hill hammered General Manager Bob Thompsaying his office lacked accountability, did not do proper research and enjoyed a "rubber stamp" coming from the board of directors.

"The majority of the proposals for spending that come in front of that board are a website, an EBay listing there aren't real quotes," he said. "How do we run a \$14 million budget and not solicit competitive quota-

"I run \$120 million budget every year [and] I get bids on everything, Hill continued. "The board has to hold the GM accountable to that, and the GM is responsible for doing that research, bringing the vendors, soliciting for RFPs and holding his staff to a level of prudent spending of our money. That's how the relationship is supposed to work and that's how I would see it work on the board of directors.

Former Director Ray Unger, on the other hand, stuck up for Thompson.

"The general manager and the comptrollers run the organization as far as the dollars are concerned. It's our job [on the board] to make sure we don't give them too much or we give them too little," he said.

The system has worked so well, in fact, that Unger said he could not remember a time when the board had to

first key was turned in the first competing tractor.

Snow Hill hosts solar co-op meeting, draws few attendees

Organizers of information session say signing online form will mark real success

(June 30, 2016) While only a few people attended the meeting with a representative of MD Sun in Snow Hill last week, it was not a prerequisite for joining or attempting to organize a solar cooperative in Worcester County.

Following the process laid out by Corey Ramsden, Maryland project manager for the nonprofit dedicated to assisting communities form cooperatives, the important part is filling out an online form found at www.mdsun.org/worcester.

The form asks for information such as the address where solar panels are to be located, a recent utility bill and asks users to rank several factors used in selecting a solar installer.

Taking these data in bulk, MD Sun generates a big picture summary of what is, and what isn't important to potential solar customers and uses it to identify potential installers, Rams-

The idea behind a cooperative arrangement is for a large group of potential customers to band together to leverage the best deal on installation costs — the bulk of the customer

outlay when deciding to switch from the traditional power grid to an alternative source.

Anyone in Worcester County can elect to be part of the process, or drop out if it's discovered solar solutions aren't a good fit.

Once the form is submitted, Ramsden said MD Sun would take a look at satellite images of the owner's property to see if it's adequate to generate enough power.

"The images can be wrong, though so it's best to also review them yourselves," he said.

For example, Ramsden said he's seen images that still include trees that would pose a problem for solar panels, but owners report have been removed.

Ramsden said owners need about 200 square feet of roof space for the smallest viable system at 3 kW. He added that ground-based solutions were also available.

The area to be covered in panels must get good, direct sunlight preferably between the hours of 9 a.m.-3p.m., and should face south, east or west. Ramsden said north-facing surfaces didn't get enough direct sunlight to generally be of much use.

Once the nonprofit has enough data to proceed, it will solicit bids from either its own host of vendors or one the nascent cooperative identifies by itself.

"We generally get between three and eight bids per group. Salisbury had four and Easton had five," he explained.

The co-op has the final say in which vendor is selected.

The selected vendor then visits the property for its own evaluation. Finding the property suitable for an installation, the installer will offer a contract to the owner, he said.

"This is the first commitment you, as a buyer, will make," Ramsden said.

Once an agreement is reached, Ramsden said it takes between 3-5 months before a customer begins generating electricity.

MD Sun does have a financial interest in signed contracts, Ramsden said, adding he wanted "to be up front about that."

For each signed contract, the non-profit is paid \$500. Ramsden said the cost is usually paid by the installer out of its marketing budget because of the large number of potential customers already identified by MD Sun.

Ramsden said groups smaller than a countywide effort are possible depending on how many people are interested in forming a co-op, which will be determined by how many online forms are generated.

Continued from Page 6 call for a special assessment.

"There have been enough longterm looks by the board and by the general manager to level this thing out to the point where there's not too much excessive spending," he said. "We always have worked together very

closely, on the board with the GM."

Improvements to the Manklin Meadows Racquet Sports Complex came up several times. Director Jack Collins, the only incumbent in the group, admitted he had "no idea what was approved" when the board last voted on the matter.

"There was \$150,000 that was jammed through, and that "\$150,000 – I think – was spent, not to move a playground or anything of that nature. It was spent to do some stormwater mitigation," he said. "I don't understand that \$150,000 deal at all."

Collins said the original concept was estimated to cost \$250,000. That, however, "expanded," and he said that was because the county demands new construction is "very, very cognoscente of the demands on the environment."

As a solution, Collins said Herrick suggested repainting existing tennis courts for pickleball use, which would require no costly stormwater mediation

"Now, we're going to look at the possibility of buying, renting, or maybe even building some platform tennis courts," he said. "Platform tennis courts means you play on a platform, so you're up in the air ... if you build it on a platform, which platform tennis is supposed to be, your stormwater mitigation is seriously reduced."

Collins went over his time limit during each of the four times he spoke, and was reprimanded by moderator Bill Wentworth more than once.

During closing remarks, Wentworth went as far as pulling the microphone out of his hand, leading to a brief exchange of words between the two.

"It's not all about you, Jack," Wentworth said.

"Take it easy," Collins said.


"You need to take it easy," Wentworth said.

The remainder of the roughly twohour debate went relatively smoothly. Perhaps the most common theme of the evening was whether or not, as Supik put it, "the sky is falling."

"I just look around and I think, well living in Ocean Pines right now I [feel] about the farthest from the sky is falling," she said. "Financially, we are on good ground operationally. If you add up the last three year's bottom line, it's positive."

Supik said the assessment had grown by just \$7 during the last three years. She juxtaposed that with her Mediacom Internet bill, which "goes up \$1.20 every month."

"I think the numbers speak for themselves," she said. "I also think that the board needs some introspec-

tion and maybe a little direction to get running in a positive fashion. Other than that, I think Ocean Pines is on a great track.'

Simon had a similar view. He admitted "writing checks is not fun," but said assessments largely paid for the police, fire, public works and recreation and parks services that made the association a special place.

We live in, what I feel, is one of the better places that you can live," he said. "I moved out of Baltimore and I came down here for a reason. I raised my children here. This is one of the safest places that you can be.

"We want generations of our family to live here," he continued. "We want this to remain the kind of place that people want to live in. I understand that [paying assessments is] tough, but if you look around at the other places around here - Berlin, Ocean City and other neighborhoods around here - we actually have it pretty good."

Janasek was more critical. He said he used many of the amenities in Ocean Pines, but that the yacht club, in particular, was subpar as illustrated by \$17,000 loses in May.

"I would love for everybody to go to the yacht club, but [between] you, me and the wall, the service and the food are not that great," he said. "We haven't had a business plan. These new [restaurants] are eating our lunch.'

He said he was running to "change the philosophy.'

"I come to the board meetings, I complain about things, I talk about stuff I don't I like as long as I've had the chance to do so," he said. "I have the opportunity to do something now, to be on the board, so it's put up or shut up for me. If I'm going complain, I might as well be on the board and see what I can do to change what's going

Hill said the "contentious" board meetings he had seen recently were poorly representing the Pines.

This is my first opportunity to step up, and I'm taking that opportunity. I feel a sense of social responsibility to my community because I see a problem and I want to help fix it," he said.


He said it was "completely disappointing" to see several amenities not ready for the summer during each of the last three years, and blamed the administration.

"That's poor management," he said. "The board has a responsibility to hold management accountable, see that things are staying on track [and] if they're not on track make hard decisions to pull things back together. That's the type of leadership I want to bring to the table."

OPA directors weigh in on candidate forum

(June 30, 2016) With 11 of the 12 candidates for Ocean Pines Association Board of Directors in one room last Wednesday for the annual candidate forum, many of the current directors watched for clues as to which three will join the board in August – and what their ideas and temperaments may be.

Asked to comment, several board members agreed to weigh in on the forum, held in the community center and attended by about 75 people. It was also recorded and streamed live on the internet.

Director Tom Herrick said he was impressed with the variety of candidates – and ideas – in this year's race.

"Whatever you want as a voter, you will have that option this year," he said. "I thought it was phenomenal. I think the [elections] committee did an unbelievable job. It was well run, coming at just under two hours, so I think the audience was captivated by that and we had some great responses."

President Pat Renaud was less enthused.

"Unfortunately, it was ungainly at best and unfair to some at worst. The voting public really could not get a very accurate picture of each candidates strengths and weaknesses because they all answered different questions; therefore, not showing opinions on all issues," he said. "Is there a better way? I hope so and hope that later election committees will have better luck at managing the process going forward if there is another large candidate turnout."

Director Bill Cordwell said he was particularly focused on candidates who had a positive outlook of the association.

"Obviously, like other years, you have two, three, maybe four candidates who are positive and want to see Ocean Pines progress," he said. "They see that Ocean Pines is a great community and a great place to live.

"Anybody who has paid attention can look at the financial performance of the amenities over the last three years and see that we are clearly going in the right direction, except for golf, which had a chance of making money this year until certain board members decided to take it over," he continued. "It is now going back in the wrong direction and we are paying a company a lot of money needlessly to take it that way."

Cordwell said he noticed last year's trend of candidates labeling themselves "independent" was much less present this time.

"One candidate last year, every time he talked it was about staying independent. That, however, lasted until about the time the votes were read," Cordwell said. "At least this years' candidates, with a few exceptions, aren't making promises that they had no intentions of keeping."

Vice President Cheryl Jacobs said she attended the meeting, not as a director, but as a private citizen.

"I thought the event, conducted by the elections committee, was very well organized and conducted in an efficient and professional manner," she said. "I found it very interesting to listen to what the candidates said about the various changes they would make, if elected, to remedy all the problems they highlight in their bid for votes. Were I not on the board, I might believe some of their pronouncements; but I can tell you, it is a totally different experience once you are there dealing with the issues that come before the board."

Despite what Jacobs saw as several candidates delivering "very negative speeches," she said one candidate in particular stood out – although she declined to name "him."

"His message was one of acknowledgement that there were some things we could do better, but when he talked about the multiple properties he owns in Ocean Pines, it was a testament to his belief in the value of this community," she said. How refreshing to hear him concentrate on what a great place

this is to live, which, of course, it is."

She was also impressed with another candidate "with superior qualifications," who she would not name, although she hinted at her role as chairwoman of the budget and finance committee.

"She doesn't just talk the talk, she walks the walk," Jacobs said. "And I'm not reticent about admitting that I believe there is real value to the community in having a mix of genders on the board, particularly one with her qualifications.

"Of course the voters will decide over the next few weeks who will get their vote by what the candidates said and how they presented themselves at the forum, as well as the various interviews they have provided to the media outlets," she continued. "If a resident was unable to attend the candidate forum, I urge them to view the video and see for themselves."

Jacobs also urged voters to reach out to the candidates directly.

"Ask them questions if they are unsure about the candidate's position on any particular issue; their contact information is available on the Ocean Pines website," she said. "If you believe in them, display their sign in your yard. Finally, I am always available to speak to the residents if they want additional information from me."

Exit interview with OPA Director Tom Terry

(June 30, 2016) The next board of directors, which will be decided when votes are counted and revealed in Au-

gust, will be without something no board has gone without in six years – two-term Director Tom Terry.

Terry, who cannot run this year because of term limits, served as president several times during his

tenure, and had a major impact on the association.

When he joined the board in 2010, there was already "great turmoil" because the previous board had fired its general manager, and tapped sitting-director Bob Thompson for the job.

"As a newly elected board member and the new president, it was my job to keep the board and community focused on the future," Terry said. "I had an advantage in that my company, Terry and Unitas Associates, had just finished a pro-bono organizational and marketing study for the previous GM. This activity gave my company the opportunity to meet and interview all the department heads, to see their current situation and their prospective plans."

That insight, he said, was critical

because it gave Terry a "real and not just image or propaganda" view of the inner workings of the association. That, and his tenure on the budget and finance committee, allowed the board to "dig right in and get to work."

Still, he admitted there was a slight learning curve.

"The tendency for a new board member is to come in thinking nothing has been done because they rightly see what is left to do," he said. "The most important adjustment that I had to make was to look back to see what others had done or had started and not completed. I have a tendency to look forward."

Terry said he found a wealth of information, including several engineering studies, and identified plenty of things that needed to be tended to within the 40-year-old community. Putting an emphasis on action, Terry formed the Facilities Planning Group, which helped developed a ranking of all the major facilities that needed to be repaired or replaced.

Including the sports core pool, which is scheduled to start improvements next month, every pool in the association has been renovated or repaired during the last six years. Several major drainage projects, including those near the tennis courts, Hingham Lane and at the community center, were completed, and a new yacht club was built. The

beach club was refurbished, signs were updated, several playgrounds were repaired, the administration building was realigned and the greens of the golf course were addressed.

"The most important thing that some of our OPA members do not realize is the breadth of the OPA organization, and the need for a director to care about all of it," Terry said. "It is also a challenge to have to choose what actions to take when there are not unlimited dollars and people want their items addressed."

Despite all of those improvements, Terry said the boards he served on did not dramatically raise assessments. According to his figures, assessments rose 14 percent during the last six year. During the previous six years, fees jumped 48 percent.

"While I never promised to 'keep dues low,' we did achieve a major trend adjustment to keep Ocean Pines the most cost-effective place to live in the county," he said. "We also had the only reduction in the assessment that has ever happened in the history of the OPA. This financial picture certainly presents a different story than those who claim the boards, or Bob Thompson, are out of control."

Terry helped establish two-day orientation sessions for new board members, discussing the business of the association, reviewing legal guidelines and touring major facilities. He also started the policy of assigning board liaisons to each of the advisory committees, whiling rejecting the idea of having board members sit on special committees that "duplicate the responsibility of staff."

"This gave the OPA members direct contact with the staff to voice concerns and, in many cases, get action without having to raise an issue to the board for it to instruct the GM to do something which could already be addressed by the department head," he said. "After an initial period of sorting out who still reported to who, the system has worked to the advantage of the OPA membership and the GM has extra sets of ears listening to the issues."

He admitted the system is not perfect.


"While the direct involvement of the department heads has worked, the structure and function of the advisory committees continues to be a challenge," he said. "The communications back to the advisory committees from the board is something I wish I had done better."

Terry also said he "violated [his] own guidelines" when it came to one specific project — the negotiations with Sandpiper Energy.

"The Sandpiper negotiations lasted too long," he said. "We should have allowed the OPA staff work out the agreement and bring it to the board's for approval. The OPA members owe Bob Thompson a very large thank you for his efforts in concluding that important issue for the community. The delay in having a reserve study done is another item which I would say is working well, but should have been done much sooner."

On a more philosophical note, Terry said the "classic challenge" in Ocean Pines was whether the facilities and amenities were meant to turn a profit. Technically, OPA is a nonprofit organization.

"The original designers of Ocean Pines got it right. They created a community, which would provide facilities and amenities beyond those in other areas," he said.



Terry: criticism 'goes with territory'

"Like others before me, I have served on boards who faced the challenge of meeting the many and diverse wants of our membership, while still trying to oversee the OPA," Terry continued. "The evolution of the OPA website over the years shows the impact of the OPA moving from a community being built out for vacation homes, to a community which has over 11,000 full time residents and approximately half our members live in the Pines as their primary residents.

"This organization is a nonprofit organization, which must balance the drive for 'profit' with the availability of its services and amenities. One of the first actions I took when I became president was to ask why the new multimillion-dollar community center was not staffed and wide open on the weekends. This was explained to be a cost-saving effort. The Community Center was immediately staffed and open for use seven days a week."

Because Terry and Thompson, as director and general manager, both came on at the same time, the two are often lumped together – for better or for worse. Several current and former directors – and members of the public – have been critical of the pair.

That, Terry said, "goes with the territory."

"I have always been one who welcomed new ideas, even if they have

not been fully thought through," he said. "Unfortunately, there are a few very vocal people who want everything fully scoped out with all details before they can be accepted for discussion. Or worse, announce to the community that the board has already done things, which have not even been voted upon. Also damaging are the attacks, which have no basis in fact, or worse dream up some sort of conspiracy theory, which become the truth for some of our members.

"I accept that if you are going to take a position of leadership not every decision you make will work well," Terry continued. "Mistakes will be made and criticism of those mistakes, while not always useful, should be expected.

"As to whether this can be avoided, the answer is no. There are always going to be people and/or groups, which will not agree with the direction you believe in," he said. "A board member must be ready to say the other side has a point, or the other side is actually right and you should join them on the issue at hand."

Going forward, Terry cautioned the notion that firing this – or any – general manager is a cure-all for the problems facing the OPA.

"The idea that replacing the GM, regardless of who the GM is, is the first thought when we don't like something," he said. "The board needs to

step back from individual situations and look at the body of work the GM and OPA staff have performed. While it is politically helpful to some to focus very narrowly, the good of the organization needs to come first.

"The constant threat of a change in the GM position can be and is detrimental to the staff and their functioning effectively," he added. "No one can serve for any length of time on the board of directors or be the GM without making decisions some people will not like."

Contrary to popular belief, Terry said Thompson has not been "driving the ship" during the last six years. Part of that perception, he said, came about during years when the board of directors was not hypercritical of the general manager.

"The impression is, since the board was not trying to grab headlines or look like they were scolding people, that they were not in charge," he said. "Ask yourself, when you had or have a working position, did you respond positively to public lectures? Did you believe there was stability in the organization if the head people were constantly under attack?"

He also advocated rational, "nonemotional, "nonpolitical" debate and evaluation of capital projects.

"Not all capital projects can be done at once, and some may not be ap-See TERRY Page 16

proved at all based on the evaluated need," he said. "Capital projects which are moved up in timeframe to simply look like a board member, or GM, took care of things is not the way to run a quality community. Further, if there have been approved rankings of work and/or timelines established, use these assessments. Do not simply start over to re-assess again and again."

"Reasonable" is a word Terry uses often, especially when it comes to the new crop of candidates, as 12 men and women compete for three seats on the board this year.

"How many people in the 40-plus

years of the OPA have said they would lower the dues? It has only happened once in all the years," Terry said. "Others run on partial information to present issues as if the sky is falling. The sky has not fallen in the 40-plus years.

"To those who believe the board should run everything, I ask that you ask yourselves just how that would be implemented in an organization that is as diverse and complex as the OPA has become," Terry continued. "This is no longer a small vacation/weekend spot. It is a full-fledged community where new and complex skills are needed to follow ever-growing

regulations and procedures."

During his six years in office, Terry said the needs of multiple facilities and amenities were addressed, and he again underscored the relatively low rise in assessments during that period.

"If a 14 percent growth rate in annual dues over these six years is not better than 48 percent growth in previous years, then your assessment of where our trends are does not match mine," he said. "Yes, there are assets like the country club, which has not been addressed. There is only so much money that can be focused on an amenity in a given time period. The course and drainage have seen

millions of dollars spent on that amenity. There is clearly work left for the coming boards to take action."

Terry's parting thought for the next board was simple – be civil, be reasonable, and put the association first.

"Remember it is not about you, it is about Ocean Pines," he said. "Your skills and talent will be wasted if your goal is personal attention. The board must find a way to create a working environment for success as we did for most of my years on the board."

Terry, who turns 65 on July 3, is currently a candidate for Worcester County Board of Education Commissioner, District 5.



Pines directors asked to reevaluate ballot counting

Elections committee will meet with by-laws group to discuss possible resolution

(June 30, 2016) The election is in full swing in Ocean Pines and issues about everything from how ballots are counted to how many words the candidates can use in their written bios have dominated recent public meetings.

On Saturday, four of the 12 candidates running for the board of directors spoke during the public comments portion of a regular board meeting, while "new business" included two items for review by the directors that related to the upcoming vote.

A motion to eliminate the words "in closed session" from Resolution M-o6 got the most attention, as it addressed the growing controversy of whether Ocean Pines can legally count votes during a closed session.

Elections Committee Chairman Bill Wentworth spoke during public comments to address the motion.

Wentworth said he had no objection to having observers present during ballot counting, but said before that decision was made, "as a courtesy" the board should first talk to his committee in order to better understand the process.

"Trust me – we are not the only folks in the room when that's being done," he said. "I know there's a big thing out here about conspiracy theories ... that's absolutely baloney. You are challenging the ethics of myself and the members of this committee - and you will not challenge our ethics.

"If you are going to do anything with M-06, I would appreciate the courtesy of informing us [and] letting me as the chairmen or the members of the committee to go through with you, point by point, exactly what the process is.

Director Jack Collins, who presented the motion, said he was not suggesting any wrongdoing by the committee or Wentworth.

"I want to point out that there are 12 individuals vying for three spots nine will not be elected," he said. "Perhaps as many as four or five will lose by one-to-ten votes ... by opening up the process, under these circumstances, not only are we in compliance with the law ... but we validate the vote count through the process, we guarantee the integrity of the process, we eliminate any questions as to the accuracy of the



process, we mitigate any contention within the ranks of our members — and that is our community — as it reflects to the perception of a corrupted process.

"To my way of thinking it just makes absolute common sense that, with this many people involved in this election, it would behoove each and every one of us to open it up and be in compliance with the law and get this contentious issue behind us," Collins added.

Vice President Cheryl Jacobs noted that Collins was one of the 12 candidates running, while another director, Bill Cordwell, questioned his motives.

"Every year it seems like it's thrown out there with the old conspiracy theory to get people to come to social media [and say], 'oh that board is stealing this election. They're behind closed doors and they're stealing this election.' To say that it has nothing to do with the integrity of the people on this committee is bull. You are questioning the integrity of everybody — the chairman of that committee, everybody on this committee, and the liaison to this committee.

"It's not a violation of any law ... it's been vetted," Cordwell added. "This board should not be involved in this election process ... Stay out of the election process. These are good, decent people [and] you're saying to all them we don't trust you."

Director Tom Terry said if the process were to be changed, it should not be done during "the heat of the election's process."

Moreover, he said it was a case of one committee – by-laws & resolutions – going after another one. The resolution, he said, came from the bylaws committee.

"It's inappropriate that they took this action without at least going to their fellow advisory committee," he said

Jacobs noted that Jim Trummel, an attorney who is often commissioned by the association to rule on such issues, vetted M-o6 and could not find any issues of illegality.

Moreover Jacobs, herself an attorney, said Maryland law governing homeowner's associations provided language for having closed meetings. Counting votes, she said, did not constitute a meeting.

"This is not a meeting – this is a time when ballots are counted," she said. "There is no business being conducted of the committee, it is simply a time to count ballots. It is not a meeting. From my perspective this is not anything that is in violation of the Homeowner's Act."

Collins confirmed the issue came through the by-laws & resolutions committee, and suggested there should be some interaction between the two advisory boards "to rectify this particular situation."

"We really could address this particular issue within this current election cycle, if it would be the will of the elections committee ... and the by-laws & resolutions committee to come together in a joint meeting to work out the specifics of this particular issue and bring it back to the board. That's really a legitimate solution to this whole situation," he said.

Jacobs called that an "excellent suggestion," and Terry made a motion to table the matter until the committees could meet. Collins seconded that.

"This is amazing," Collins said, making light of the rarity of he and Terry finding common ground.

"This is amazing. My hair is going to grow back," Terry deadpanned.

The vote to table passed 5-0. Two directors, Dave Stevens and President Pat Renaud, were not present during the meeting.

Another election-related item on the agenda, a report from the search committee, was accepted by a unanimous vote. That committee is tasked with finding candidates to run for office in Ocean Pines.

After review of the committee's recommendations, Collins said the directors could meet to vote on those items next month.

Debate over M-06 ballot guidelines

While board tables ruling, others weigh in on whether Pines can count in private

(June 30, 2016) The issue of whether the Ocean Pines Association Elections Committee can count ballots during a closed session has become an annual debate, including this year when 12 candidates are running for three seats on the board of directors.

Resolution M-06, section 9., which governs the ballot count in Ocean Pines, reads, "Counting ballots is the responsibility of the [Elections] Committee, in closed session, with the assistance of a computer consultant and Association staff. The committee shall exercise due diligence in obtaining an accurate county of votes cast."

Page three of the resolution shows board approval on April 24, 2013, and includes the signature of attorney Jim Trammel, who at the time was chairman of the by-laws and resolutions advisory committee.

One of the arguments against counting ballots during a closed sessions stems from the Maryland Homeowners Association Act, which allows closed meetings only under certain situations.

Under a section governing "Meetings of homeowners association or its

governing body," for instance, section 4(i) allows for closed meetings that pertain to "Discussion of matters pertaining to employees and personnel."

Many do not consider directors – or candidates – to be "employees and personnel," but rather unpaid volunteers. The ambiguity of both words used in conjunction, however, is interesting to some, including Jeff Knepper, an attorney and former director in Ocean Pines.

Last Thursday, Knepper emailed a statement on the subject at the request of the Gazette.

"Recently in Ocean Pines there has been a vigorous debate about whether or not the meeting of an OPA Committee to count votes in the upcoming election for three board of directors members can be done in a meeting that is closed to the public," he said. "Maryland law requires a homeowners' association to conduct its meetings in sessions that are open to the public with few, specified exceptions.

"One of those exceptions allows the closure of meetings to discuss matters relating to 'employees and personnel.' Unfortunately, there are no Maryland cases clarifying the meaning of these two terms.

"Some have suggested that 'personnel' must mean 'employees,' but if they are right, then the above sentence would allow closure of 'meetings to discuss matters relating to employees and employees.'

"Personnel' might include OPA's numerous volunteers, it might include directors, and I suppose it might even include candidates running in an election for the board. Until some legal authority formally decides, we will not know the meaning of these words and one interpretation is as good as the

"So the bottom line is that the association's decision to close the vote counting meeting is, in my opinion, based on a reasonable interpretation of an ambiguous and undecided Maryland law. Others may certainly disagree, but that is my opinion."

On Saturday, the issue was raised during a public meeting of the board of directors. The board voted to table the question until the by-law & resolutions committee and elections committee could meet to mutually craft a recommendation.

During that meeting, Vice President Cheryl Jacobs, also an attorney, offered another explanation – the closed "meeting" was not a meeting at all

(June 30, 2016) The last USCG Auxiliary Safe Boating class of 2016 will be conducted Tuesday through Thursday, July 12-14, at the Ocean Pines Library from 6-9 p.m.

The Maryland Safe Boating class and certificate are required for boat operators born after July 1, 1972, but everyone can benefit from it. In 88 percent of recreational boating fatalities, the operator did not have a nationally approved boater education certificate.

Safety on the water is every boater's responsibility and knowing what to do—not only in an emergency but also when docking, anchoring and passing another boat—is key to having fun and developing a culture of safety on the water.

Besides Maryland maritime regulations, the course, as taught by the United States Coast Guard Auxiliary, also focuses on boat handling, safety equipment, knot tying and other practical tidbits from experienced recreational boat enthusiasts.

Close to 100 boaters have completed the course and received their Maryland boater's certificate so far this year.

Ocean Pines Association Briefs

(June 30, 2016) The Ocean Pines Association Board of Directors discussed the following items during a public meeting on Saturday.

Two absences

Two directors did not attend the meeting. Dave Stevens was on vacation, while President Pat Renaud was in New York to attend the "very happy occasion" of a film premier, according to Vice President Cheryl Jacobs. Renaud's son is the director of "The Secret Life of Pets."

Filling in for Renaud during the meeting, Jacobs opened by praising the elections committee for running a successful candidate forum last Wednesday, and she urged the public to watch a video of the event, which can be viewed on the association's official YouTube channel or by using the direct link www.youtube.com/watch?v=OIWI8IAt7Go

Change in agenda

Director Tom Herrick pulled two items under "old business." They were updates on platform tennis and capital improvements to the county club, which had

been discussed during a previous meeting.

Director Tom Terry also asked that the meeting minutes show that he "owe[s] the board of directors a report in July" on changes to the association's investment guidelines.

GM report

General Manager Bob Thompson said May is always "an interesting month" and that heavy rains affected revenues at several amenities.

The golf course finished about \$27,000 behind budget, while the yacht club closed out the month more than \$64,000 below budget. He said aquatics was the lone "bright spot," finishing more than \$20,000 ahead of estimates.

Under "unfinished business," Thompson said a contract was awarded for bridge repairs, with an estimated start date just after Labor Day.

Thompson said the association was also working to address a mysterious odor emanating from the first floor of the yacht club, and that the next step was to change intake vents. If the problem persists, he said scopes with cameras would be used to identify the problem.

Work on the sports core pool is

scheduled to start during the second week of July, a request for proposals was sent out June 15 for improvements to the beach club bathrooms, and estimates are being put together for conversion of two tennis courts into pickle ball courts.

Thompson also sent a memorandum on the "next steps" of the reserve study to the directors on June 8. Updates to the study should be done during the next week or two, he said, including plugging in fiscal 2017 budget numbers. Thompson said the board also needed to agree on a funding percentage.

Terry said work sessions discussing the study would likely be called before the July regular board meeting.

CPI update

Compliance, permits and inspections procedures were expected to get a revamp during the meeting. Terry said he and Jacobs were still working on those, and would likely make a presentation during the July regular board meeting.

Universal membership

Director Jack Collins moved to set a "universal racquet membership renewal date." Currently, he said, memberships expire during staggering dates throughout the year, which can cause confusion and lapsed membership.

Thompson said he had not been asked to consider the ramifications of setting a universal date, and asked for time to do so. A motion to table the matter until Thompson could assess the universal date passed 4-1, with Director Bill Cordwell voting "no."

Appointment

The board unanimously approved the appointment of Matthew Groves to the recreation and parks advisory committee. It is Groves' first term.

Closed session

Following the regular session, the directors adjourned to discuss a turnover agreement related to section 17, also known as "The Point" in Ocean Pines.

Terry, in an interview on Monday, clarified that developers, once work is finished, routinely "turn over" properties to Ocean Pines. That had apparently not been done with The Point. He said the board would make a formal announcement during the next regular meeting.

Third 'Warriors' meeting turns focus on Christian recovery

(June 30, 2016) The third meeting of the Worcester County Warriors Against Opiate Addiction last Tuesday at First Presbyterian Church in Ocean City focused on faith-based recovery and featured guest speakers from Teen Challenge in Seaford and Stand Fast Recovery in Snow Hill.

Teen Challenge Executive Director Bob Carey claimed an 86 percent success rate with the program, which boasts more than 1,000 locations in 106 different counties around the world. Rehabilitation at Teen Challenge lasts one year and focuses on solving addiction issues "through a relationship with Jesus Christ." The average age of people in the program is 28-32, but Carey said the name is still used because of its brand visibility.

In Seaford, Teen Challenge is working on adding two new dormitories for women, including one for women with young children. The nonprofit is largely supported by donations and grants, and Carey said Teen Challenge rarely turns anyone away for inability to pay.

Drug & Alcohol Council donate \$2K to 'Warriors'

"We have a \$500 entry fee and/or \$500 a month, [but] if somebody doesn't have any money or their family doesn't, we still take them," Carey said. "We don't let money deter us from taking anybody in."

Snow Hill native Daniel Freeman modeled Stand Fast after a program he attended in Bangor, Maine that helped him overcome heroin addiction. For now, Stand Fast runs regular Thursday evening meetings in Snow Hill, although Freeman said he would like to increase that to include additional meetings in Pocomoke.

Eventually, he wants to be able to offer a yearlong residential rehabilitation

We're going to need help. It's not easy to do that," he said. "It's something we're trying to get going down here in Maryland."

Jim Freeman, vice chair of the Drug & Alcohol Council, a program of the Worcester County Health Department, presented Worcester County Warriors with a check for \$2,000 during the meeting.

Sen. Jim Mathias was also present, and pledged his support from a legislative standpoint.

Mathias said he recently spoke to Gov. Larry Hogan about the heroin epidemic in the state. Hogan revealed that his first cousin died of an overdose while in Ocean City, when Mathias was mayor of the resort.

"I recall then that the oddity was to hear [about] heroin," he said. "We really thought our real challenge and concern at the time ... was inviting our graduating high school seniors here, allowing them to be here and returning them home safely to their parents."

That, he said, had clearly changed.

"We're not going to arrest our way out of this," he said. "We're going to converge on this in every possible way to bind it. We're not going to allow it to ravage our county - we're going to allow it to ravage our Eastern Shore.

The next regular meeting of the Worcester County Warriors Against Opiate Addiction will be held on July 21, at 6:30 p.m., at the First Presbyterian Church at 1301 Philadelphia Avenue in Ocean City.

In the meantime, "Warriors" cofounder Heidi McNeely said several subcommittees of the group would continue working in specific areas, including education, awareness and resource naviga-

"I think our subcommittees are so important, because they're what is allowing us to go and do something," she said. "These [regular] meetings are wonderful and we want to provide a format for speakers and information, but the committees are really the meat of it.'





Much ado about ballots

Ocean Pines Board of Director member Cheryl Jacobs has a good point: an elections committee gathered for the sole purpose of counting ballots does not constitute a meeting in any legal sense.

The committee isn't empowered to take any action other than to assure ballots are valid and to count them. It does nothing beyond those two functions, so there is no meeting according to the law.

Committee members have rightly taken umbrage at the suggestion, however faintly whispered, that this closed-door process opens another door to election rigging or some other nefarious scheme.

Even the mention of that possibility questions the integrity of each individual who volunteered for the job and would be considered by just about anyone as a personal affront.

In fairness, we wondered as well why the ballot counting should be closed until Jacobs offered her opinion to the contrary. That prompted the realization that ballot counting in municipalities is closed to the public, as is allowed by Maryland election law.

The purpose of this provision is to permit the vote tallying to proceed without public interference, politicking or interfering in an attempt to influence the process. The law does make an exception for legally authorized watchers.

The closed-door vote-counting procedure was once challenged in Ocean City on much the same grounds as those expressed in Ocean Pines. The fiery response from the election judges, given their professionalism and pride, was hardly surprising.

Insinuating that a group of people might be ethically challenged is more than just politics in small towns. Everyone knows everyone else and that makes it personal.

Even if the public were to be allowed in the room as votes were being counted, any comment from individuals, political conversations or disruptions would be inappropriate and could themselves be viewed as an attempt to affect the results. That said, doing the tally in private, with authorized watchers present if need be, is the right way to go.


Burley Oak donated \$5,000 to the display and wanted to hold an event in conjunction to the fireworks.



Donato pointed out that the children did most of the painting. Moreover, he said the concepts and images were all things they came up


with themselves.

Homeowner public statement on Ocean Pines construction

(June 30, 2016) Homeowner Robin Tomaselli read a prepared statement, addressing conditions at the swim and racquet club, during the public comments portion of a regular Ocean Pines Association Board of Directors meeting on Saturday.

She also emailed that statement to the *Gazette*.

"We represent the more than 50 households and countless residents of the Ocean Pines community who utilize and/or whose homes view the area known as the swim and racquet club, marina, tennis courts and recreational area. This area is also identified by the State of Maryland as part of the Maryland and Coastal Bays Critical Area. We want this area returned to a park and recreation area immediately and ask that it be maintained that way all year long.

"Many violations have taken place in this area over the past eight years. Up until eight years ago, the area that is now referred to as a 'staging area' by Bob Thompson was considered simply a 'transfer station' by the previous general manager. At that time, only an occasional truck from the Ocean Pines Public Works would transfer dirt onto a barge. This happened about two or three times a month for only a few minutes each day and drew little concern from any of the residents of the surrounding communities.

"About six years ago, Fisher Marine was permitted to use and store equipment in this park and recreation area for up to ten months each year. Shortly after that, he moved in as many as four barges. McGinty Marine also moved in equipment. Some of which were tied to the bulkhead and some moored in the canals. After repeated complaints by many in this community without resolution, a call was made to the State of Maryland and they investigated immediately. They found that these barges were illegally moored/stored in these canals. They were sited and made to remove the equipment immediately by the State of Maryland.

"Mr. Fisher was then allowed to not only use the 'staging area,' but also the parking lot. There he stored his pilings and lumber for the construction of bulkheads, as well as his 20-foot tool trailer, other trailers, trucks, bulldozers, heavy equipment, fueling stations etc.

"After several individuals wrote letters and some met with Mr. Thompson personally, Mr. Thompson said that he would find another place to utilize as a 'staging area.' In the meantime, one resident of Ocean Pines contacted Mr. Fisher and ask him to move his tool trailer with Fisher Marine painted on the side. He did move it, as it was an obvious eye soar in plain view of the resident's window, directly across the canal.

"Even though this area is designated for park and recreation and is quite clearly with a Critical Bays Area, the conditions there continue to dete-

riorate every year, with more equipment, construction materials, hazardous material, explosive fluids etc. being left and stored without care or concern by the manager or board members to the safety of the Ocean Pines residents and visitors who utilize these areas as they are designated 'park and Recreation' ... and without care or concern to the damaging environmental impact created by this construction site on our water's edge.

There are several violations according to the Declaration of Restrictions of Ocean Pines Section One - B. There is no mention of a 'staging area.' The swim and racquet club is listed as a 'recreational area.' There is statement on page 125 that states, 'The general purpose of the association is to further promote the community welfare of property owners in the subdivision.' Allowing the heavy equipment, unsecured pilings, lumber, diesel fuel tanks, and other trash to remain there for 10 months at a time, giving children and all who utilize it a chance for injury or even death. This is not promoting community welfare.

"Also, on page 145 of the Declarations of Restrictions, Section C, it stated that the association 'shall be responsible for the upkeep of maintenance, repair, and upkeep of the private streets, and parks within the subdivision.' The swim and racquet club area is a park.

"Even though the Declaration of Restrictions refers mostly to lots, it does include parks. It makes definite references to parks, recreational areas and the golf course. On page 141, it states that, 'no vehicle shall be parked on any street in the subdivision. No truck of any type shall be parked for storage overnight or longer, on any lot in the section or subdivision in such a manner as to be visible to the occupants of other lots in the section or subdivision....' Yet Fisher Marine is allowed to not only create a dangerous situation, but an eyesore for those residents facing that area.

"We are asking that the entire area known as the swim and racquet recreational area be returned to a state that it was intended for at its inception, a safe and eye pleasing area for the residents of Ocean Pines to enjoy.

"We ask that the present 'staging area' be moved to the sewage and sanitation area. If dredging is needed, Fisher Marine should do that to suit their needs. The cost could be split among all the waterfront lot owners and Fisher Marine, since both parties benefit from the bulkhead repairs.

"We are providing each of you with a summary of our concerns, the obvious OP violations, photographs of the area taken by Josh Davis of the Bayside Gazette, along with an environmental impact letter drafted regarding their concerns regarding this situation by Assateague Coastal Trust's Executive Director Kathy Philips.

Rackliffe House dedicates Mariner Memorial Garden

(June 30, 2016) Rackliffe House Trust dedicated the new Ann Showell Mariner Memorial Garden in a ceremony at historic Rackliffe House in Berlin on June 5.

Rackliffe House Trust Board President Carolyn Cummins welcomed 60 guests, including donors, docents, and members of the Mariner family. Father Michael Moyer of Saint Paul's Episcopal Church, blessed the kitchen garden, which is named in memory of local resident Ann Showell Mariner, and made possible by her family and friends.

"Ann loved gardens and historic places," said Susan Mariner, Ann's sister-in-law and Rackliffe House Trust board member. "Her husband, A. Reginald (Reggie) Mariner II, requested donations to this garden in living memory of Ann, who passed in 2013.

Family members in attendance included Jennifer Mariner Neeb and Garrett Neeb, Ann and Reggie Mariner's daughter and grandson.

The Ann Showell Mariner Memorial Garden is an interpretive recreation of the typical kitchen garden Colonial American homes would cultivate, including herbs (for seasoning and preserving food, dyeing cloth and medicinal uses), as well as vegetables and fruits.

This garden includes flax, used to spin linen; lamb's ear, for wound dressing; several varieties of mint, for medicinal and flavoring purposes; and a number of common culinary herbs. such as rosemary, sage, thyme and dill.

Kitchen gardens sometimes were located adjacent to kitchens which, in the 18th and early 19th centuries, often were outbuildings separated from the main house. Enslaved and free servants planted, weeded, watered and harvested the gardens and also worked in the kitchen.

The Ann Showell Mariner Memorial Garden is open year round and is accessible daily by walking behind Assateague Visitors Center and a half mile down Tom Patton Lane.

Rackliffe House is open for tours every Tuesday and Thursday from 1-4 p.m. as well as the second Saturday of each month from 1-4 p.m. through

Rackliffe House is a restored 1740s merchant-planter's home overlooking Assateague Island and Sinepuxent Bay. Rackliffe House was constructed by Captain Charles Rackliffe, the grandson of one of the earliest English immigrants to Maryland's seaside.


