Clarke, O'Hare go out with a bang

Outgoing directors face off one final time during OPA board meeting last Thurs.

(Aug. 6, 2015) For three years, Ocean Pines Associations Board directors Marty Clarke and Sharyn O'Hare epitomized the philosophical divide on the board, often leading to fiery debates during public meetings.

On Thursday, July 30, during their final meeting together, the pair continued to clash.

Less than five minutes into the meeting, O'Hare asked Clarke to clarify his comments during a June 25 board meeting when she was absent.

According to the minutes, Clarke, addressing a CPI violation on Tail of the Fox Drive, said, "Sharyn must have forgotten it's illegal to offer a house for sale without a written list-

"Marty, did you in fact make that

"Yeah," he said.

O'Hare, obviously not amused,

Clarke said.

made a public statement that General Manager Bob Thompson "made it very clear" the property was not for sale.

"You are accusing me of doing some-thing illegal," she said. "This is my professional career, Marty."

"I stand by the statement," Clarke said.

"You are wrong," O'Hare said.

"Okay, sue me,"

Board President Dave Stevens asked that the minutes of the June 25 meeting note that O'Hare registered an objection.

Clarke, however, was not finished. "Is it not illegal to offer a property for sale without a listing in the state of Maryland?" he asked.

"Marty, the property was not offered for sale," O'Hare said. "There was a lockbox on the property. That is not illegal. It was never offered for sale, and your general manager verified that. You're accusing me of something illegal."

O'Hare attempted to clarify that the lockbox was put onto the property as "a courtesy for the association," allowing a real estate agent to conduct a market analysis "without coming to Ocean Pines to pick up a key."

"It was strictly a courtesy. Bob and I talked about that and I did it to help [make] it an easy process," O'Hare said. "That is it. It was not listed for sale.'

"I already know a lot more now about real estate than I wanted to know," Stevens said, effectively ending the debate.

Two hours later, at the conclusion of the meeting, O'Hare thanked the board, general manager and the staff for what she called, "a very interesting three years."

"I'm glad to have the opportunity," she said.

Prompted by several board members to mark the occasion of his own retirement, Clarke simply said,

Election results for the 2015 Ocean Pines Association Board of Directors race will be revealed on Saturday during the annual meeting at the community center at 10 a.m.

The homeowners association officially announced this year's candidates on May 12. with former board members Terri Mohr, Ray Unger and Bill Zawacki joining newcomers Cheryl Jacobs, Thomas Herrick and Carol Ludwig. Slobodan Trendic, who ran last year, also campaigned for one of the two available spots on the board.

Ballots were mailed to all members in good standing on Tuesday, July 14 and due back today (Thursday). The elections committee will tally the votes tomorrow.

The two candidates with the most votes will earn a three-year term on the board, with an organizational meeting likely coming in the next few weeks to select new officers on the seven-member governing body.



Postcard photo causes election kerfuffle in Pines

(Aug. 6, 2015) Last week a postcard targeting Ocean Pines nonresidents in the 2015 board of directors election became a subject of debate in the community.

On Tuesday, the *Gazette* learned that Board Vice President Marty Clarke, who chose to step down rather than run for reelection this cycle, was behind the mailer.

The card included a photograph of the Worcester County Veteran's Memorial on one side. On the other, a note asked voters to, "Please help us elect the only two fiscal conservative candidates who will help stop the [general manager's] reckless spending. Vote for [Slobodan] Trendic and [Thomas] Herrick!"

The note was signed, simply, "Your Neighbor Beth."

Marie Gilmore, president of the Worcester County Veterans Memorial Foundation, addressed the postcard during a public meeting on Thursday.

Gilmore said she forwarded the postcard to the community's board of directors.

"The Veteran's Memorial Foundation never has and never will support any candidate running for any public office," Gilmore said. "Since that letter was sent to you, I have heard that it has grown legs, and I do not like the direction that it's going."

Gilmore said the foundation is protective of the memorial, adding, "I sincerely appreciate that they're backing me 100 percent in my feeling."

"I don't want any negative publicity put on the Veteran's Memorial, therefore I request the letter not be read publically," Gilmore said.

She added she had lengthy conversations with Trendic and Herrick and labeled the contents of the letter as, "a vitriolic statement against the general manager."

"There is no reason on God's green earth why the Ocean Pines memorial should ever be associated with something like that," Gilmore said. "It distresses me on several levels. It's like See CLARKE Page 5

"The Veteran's memorial has had ... a wonderful relationship with Ocean Pines, and an especially wonderful relationship with [General Manager] Bob Thompson ... who happens to be a retired veteran who has a deep feeling for the veteran's memorial," Gilmore added. "It truly distresses me that the veteran's memorial would be associated with vitriol."

Thompson declined to comment.

Clarke, however, maintained the card, "had nothing to do with the memorial."

Clarke has been a public supporter of both candidates.

"I used that picture because it was the best picture I could find in stock," he said. "It had nothing to do with inferring any way shape or form that [the foundation] endorsed a candidate. I could have used a picture of a wooden duck, but that wouldn't have meant the wooden duck was supporting Trendic and Herrick."

Board taps GM to continue talks with Sandpiper Energy

(Aug. 6, 2015) Following a closed meeting on Thursday, the Ocean Pines Board of Directors voted unanimously to allow General Manager Bob Thompson to continue talks with Sandpiper Energy.

The board had given Thompson a two-month window to strike a deal during a previous closed meeting, with a deadline set for July.

Sandpiper converted existing propane lines in Berlin and West Ocean City to natural gas last year and hopes to do the same thing in Ocean Pines. A franchise agreement is believed to be central to any new deal the community would sign.

"Basically, the board agreed to have the general manager continue the discussions," Board President Dave Stevens said on Monday. "It was kind of an arbitrary deadline, and as long as conversations are going on we're going to continue."

Stevens said he was satisfied with the results of the discussions thus far.

"Happy or not happy all depends on what your expectations were," he said. "When I see something that's actually a tangible gain, then I'll be happy. Certainly the conversations are good and certainly they should be continued."

In November of last year, Stevens read a letter to Sandpiper during a public meeting that asked for a franchise fee, reimbursements for legal costs incurred during negotiations and a turnover agreement

While Stevens said a new franchise agreement was still central to signing a new deal, he said "other things are just on the table."

"I don't know where Sandpiper is," he said.

The board would be required to approve any contract, if negotiations go that far.

Prior to talks resuming in June, Sandpiper and the Ocean Pines Association had not had formal communications since December 2014.

New Salt Water podcast asks, 'So What's Your Story?'

(Aug. 6, 2015) Looking to publicize local authors, as well as its own publishing enterprise, Berlin's Salt Water Media recently announced the creation of a new podcast, "So What's Your Story?"

Salt Water Founder Stephanie Fowler and local author Tony Russo will cohost the podcast, which is set to debut in September.

"We have all these authors working on interesting projects and a lot of them would tell me these great stories. I thought, you know, this would be really interesting if other people knew this," Fowler said. "This is an idea that I had wanted to do for some time now, but honestly when it came down to it I didn't know how to do it. All I knew about podcasts was how to listen to them and subscribe to them."

Enter Russo, a veteran of several of his own podcasts as well as a former staffer at the Bayside Gazette.

Russo started what have believes was the first podcast on the Eastern Shore, "The Tom and Tony Show," with then Gazette Editor Tom Melville in 2005. He later joined Todd DeHart, from Good Clean Fun Life, to create the Toddcast, and pro-

duced "Beer with Strangers" with Doug Griffith from Xtreme Brewing.

"I was an early adopter of podcasts," Russo said. "Commuting is a forever thing, and this is almost like pirate radio. If you have the gear, you can do whatever you want. You can find your niche and you can speak directly to your audience, and you don't have to fight for airtime or sponsorships.

"My biggest problem is that I

don't want to sell things – that's why I like being a reporter," Russo said. "With podcasts, there's even more freedom because you produce your own show. You say what you want you want and if people like it hope-

fully they listen to it."

While "shooting the breeze," Fowler said she asked Russo if he could give her a tutorial on podcasting. Russo had a better idea: let's do one together.

"That was really attractive to me because he knew all the ins and outs, and he had all the recording equipment," Fowler said. "All I had to do is provide a place and pull in some of these authors.'

The pair recorded their first podcast last month, with young-adult author Andrew Heller.

"With Andrew, the story behind the story, why he wrote what he wrote, was very interesting and we talked about that during the podcast," Fowler. "Right before Christmas, he was laid off and wondering what he could give his kid for Christmas, and he wrote this short story for his kid and eventually it blossomed into a three-book series.3

Joan Cooper, Carol K. Psaros and Dr. Clara Small are scheduled to record new episodes later this month.

"We want to have maybe four episodes recorded, finalized, fully edited and ready to be released before we launch," Fowler said. "We'd like to do a weekly podcast, so we're hoping to have a couple in the can so that if a guest cancels we're not out of a podcast that week and scrambling. We want to give ourselves a little buffer room.

Fowler said the subjects don't necessarily need to have ties with Salt Water.

"We're looking for at anyone who is in the area writing or publishing, she said. "We have a natural connection to the first batch of authors because of what we do here, but that's not our only base."

Goal number one, she said, is to help local writers connect with a broader audience.

"To say, 'increase awareness' sounds kind of corny, but really that is what we want to do," she said. "We want to let people know there are all these awesome local writers and authors, they have some really cool stories and really cool reasons why they're writing about what they're writing about.

Quite honestly, as an indie publisher and an indie author, getting the word out about your book is definitely something that's important, so we're hoping the podcast can be one more vehicle for the marketing of a book and an author," Fowler added.

For Russo, the author of "Eastern Shore Beer" and staffer at the Laurel Star, the podcast provides another See SALT Page 10



Berlin's 'Movies on Main Street' to expand in 2016

(Aug. 6, 2015) Following the success of the inaugural Movies on Main Street program in Berlin, organizers are planning an expanded offering in 2016

Three movies screened this year, capped by the July 15 showing of "Runaway Bride," the 1999 film staring Julia Roberts and Richard Gere and set in the fictional town of Hale using the Atlantic Hotel and several shops in Berlin as a backdrop.

Next year the program, presented by Berlin Arts & Entertainment, hopes to show six movies.

"We wanted to get this year behind us just a smidge before we asked the general public their opinion on what movies should be shown," A&E Secretary Robin Tomaselli said. "Already there have been some clear interests for us to show certain movies."

"The first two movies were in the parks and they were awesome movies, but we went with G-rated movies and the attendance was lower," A&E President Heather Layton said. "When you think about it, we can't start until 8:30 because the sun has to be down, so we're definitely going to gear it to older kids and preteens, something that's family friendly, but your 13-year-old would want to see it also."

Layton added that A&E could also aim for a date-night audience.

"The little ones are in bed at 8:30," she said, adding that the group at some point would likely start soliciting other movie suggestions via Facebook.

Next year's tentative plan is to show two movies in Henry Park, two in Stephen Decatur Park and two on Main Street.

"The concluding movie will be 'Runaway Bride,' Tomaselli said. "We hope to make that more of a cult kind of thing. The idea is to have that be the last movie of the season and to have a street closure so that people can dress up and maybe have some street vendors so it's more of an event.

"People come in here and still ask us if we're the bakery in the movie," Tomaselli added. Tomaselli said she was happy with the reception during the program's first season.

"Considering the fact that there was a rain date for the first movie and there was a rain date for 'Runaway Bride,' which kind of confused people, we were very happy," she said. "'Runaway Bride' was originally scheduled for a Saturday night and I think that would have been crazy received. We were forced to show the makeup date on a weeknight, but there were still over 100 people there, and it was awe-some because you could sit on the porch of the Atlantic Hotel and have drinks and watch the movie."

A&E plans to hold a fundraiser for the next series of films at Burley Oak this fall, and Layton said sponsorships would be available to local businesses during next year's screenings.

"We're going to start fundraising this summer to help pay for movies next year, because it's not cheap," she said. "We also need to be better about getting the word out. By the time we got approval last go-round, everything was already on top of us. We're definitely trying to be more proactive now to plan for next season."

Report details OP actions on pair of bridges

'We're going after [repairs] now,

for replacement'

(Aug. 6, 2015) A report released this week on the Ocean Pines Association website suggested the community continues to make its aging infrastructure a major priority, with bridges taking the center stage on the to-do list.

General Manager Bob Thompson originally issued the seven-page memorandum to the board of directors last week, providing what he called a "very high level overview of some of the past and present actions either completed or currently under way," addressing bridges.

According to the memo, Thompson received a county bridge report on June 23, then met with OPA Public Works Director Eddie Wells and Facilities Manager Jerry Aveeta six days

later to discuss a plan.

Ocean Pines consulted a representative from Salisbury firm Davis, Bowen & Friedel on June 30, then received a proposal to "contract immediate bridge repairs" from the firm on

July 20. Thompson apparently met with Davis, Bowen & we're going after [repairs] now, Friedel again on and we're also looking long-term July 24 and 30.

topographic Ocean Pines General Manager survey was conducted on July 10, and Thompson met

with the Worcester County Public Works Director John Tustin as well as Roads Superintendent Frank Adkins on July 15 to discuss a bridge replacement program. Worcester County Commissioner Chip Bertino was also present during the meeting.

A July 16 letter that Tustin sent to Thompson provided more information on the previous day's meeting. According to the memo, Davis, Bowen and Friedel used 2013-14 biennial bridge inspection reports by Gannet

Fleming to create designs for the eventual replacement of bridges on Ocean Parkway and Clubhouse Drive. The letter went on to say Adkins would

provide contractors who would "make the immediate safety repairs recommended" in the 2013-14 reports.

The Gannet Fleming study gave a "fair" grade to the Ocean Parkway bridge's desk, a "poor" grade to its superstructure, a "satisfactory" grade to its substructure and a grade of "good" to its channel.

Inspection findings for that bridge concluded that several concrete beams had deteriorated and were in poor condition. Bridge rails did not meet SHA standards, and the top rail on the west side was missing "at least 50 percent" of its length with rotten posts.

Repair recommendations included replacing the bridge at a cost of \$244,800. Total repair recommendations amounted to \$313,900.

The Clubhouse Drive bridge received "fair" grades to the deck, superstructure and substructure, and a 'good" grade for its channel. The report listed deteriorating channel beams and timber railings that did not meet SHA standards as concerns.

Recommendations included scheduling a bridge replacement for \$270,000, with total repairs costing \$325,350.

The memo said funding for outright replacement of the bridges would be determined at a later date based on available aid from the Maryland State Highway Administration. It also appeared the county would speed the permit process once Davis, Bowen & Friedel finished replacement designs.

At a board meeting on Thursday, Thompson said the community has worked at an accelerated pace in the days after receiving the county's report.

"We're going after [repairs] now, and we're also looking long-term for replacement," Thompson said.

Board President Dave Stevens said the state could reimburse up to 80 percent of replacement costs for the two bridges.

Basically, if you don't get the work done, you don't get the money, and if you do get the work done you do," Terry added.



OP approves \$31K contract with reserve study firm DMA

(Aug. 6, 2015) It didn't come without a fight, but the Ocean Pines Board of Directors last Thursday approved a \$31,800 contract with the Richmond firm, Design Management Associates, to conduct the study of what the community needs in the way of a financial reserve fund.

General Manager Bob Thompson said a reserve study had been a focal point of his work during the last several months.

After sending a request for information, a selection committee and several board members fielded presentations from three firms in July. A request for proposals followed and Ocean Pines residents Jerry Aveta and Ted Moroney, who were tapped to head a parallel capital improvement study, helped Thompson winnow the list down to one.

Thompson said DMA would perform a full review and that the contract would include base costs and an update, as well as an hourly rate for additional updates to the study.

'I just want to compliment you and the evaluation team," Board President Dave Stevens said, noting that other homeowners associations that used each vendor were called for references.

Stevens said the selection provided "a promising link" to the capital improvement study.

Vice President Marty Clarke asked about a potential budget overage. The board approved \$50,000 for a reserve study, but allocated approximately \$16,500 from that to Salisbury University group BEACON to perform a comprehensive study, the third part of a touted "three-legged stool" of studies, in March.

The current numbers, Stevens said, were "just about right."

Director Bill Cordwell worried the study being was rushed.

"If we're going to do a full reserve study, I want to see a [capital improvement plan] first ... to base this study off of," Cordwell said. "It seems like we're trying rush this through just to get it through this board. I'm about doing things once and doing it correctly and doing it right. I don't want to base \$35,000 just on maintenance of what we have now. We have too many projects that need to be done in the future."

Cordwell added that without a capital improvement study, "I don't know that we're doing a full reserve study."

"We had the CIP that the general manager took two years to put together, in '13 and '14, that had a list of See STUDY Page 15

(Aug. 6, 2015) The Ocean Pines Association Board of Directors discussed the following items during a public meeting last Thursday at the community center.

Financial reports

The numbers at major amenities were encouraging for the second straight month. Although golf revenues were below budget, monthly expenses were also lower, leading to a June that finished \$3,168 over budget and \$63,000 better than June 2014.

At the yacht club, revenues and expenses were also both under budget, \$80,500 and \$72,286, respectively, finishing \$8,224 over budget overall. Still, the totals were \$126,636 better than the previous year.

Aquatics finished \$18,298 over budget overall, improving \$71,438 over 2014.

Board Vice President Marty Clarke said, "The numbers are very promising" at golf at the yacht club, adding the community had only had "one month better at either amenity" in the last nine years.

Sports Core Pool project

General Manager Bob Thompson provided an update to the resurfacing project at the Sports Core Pool.

After asking for bids, the commu-

nity received only two, according to Thompson's monthly GM report, with one bid coming in at \$77,544 and the other totaling \$169,456. A follow-up inquiry suggested other potential bidders were dissuaded by an already busy summer schedule. Thompson recommended the project be shelved until July/August 2016.

Board President Dave Stevens said he hoped the additional time would lead to additional bidders.

Comprehensive non-update

Secretary Pat Renaud said he was perplexed that the comprehensive committee, which he is the liaison for. had not provided an update on the comprehensive plan being conducted by Salisbury University's BEACON group under the direction of Dr. Memo Diriker

"We obviously need to catch up on this and find out what's going on," Renaud said.

Parliamentarian Tom Terry noted that the committee had not provided meeting minutes since 2013, while Renaud added that Diriker "was not on the clock" and had not been paid.

potential projects and projected costs," he said. "I just don't understand why we're not using that."

Parliamentarian Tom Terry agreed that DMA should have access to previous data, while Stevens said the hard data of the old reserve, comprehensive and capital improvement studies were outdated.


"For me, it's just a time thing," Cordwell said. "I just think that we're pushing this through at the last minute. The [request for information] was July 17, and then they had to have a [request for proposals] done by July 23. When we did the boat ramps, we gave them a month and all we heard was, 'that wasn't enough time.'

"On the other hand, they covered the bases. That impressed me a lot," he said. "There's also a good reason too. If we're going to move into [the other studies], having this hard data prior to the next budget sessions is what's going to be important.

"This will effect both short term and long term," Stevens added.

Following public comments, Treasurer Jack Collins moved to enter into a contract with DMA. Despite the 20minute debate that arose earlier, the vote passed 6-1, with only Cordwell opposing.



Collins said the resolution went back to committee in order to address an issue related to money deposited in non-FDIC depository accounts.

At 6:30 p.m., bidding starts at the benefit auction highlighted by the fair's prize-winning cakes, helping offset the costs of putting on the event, Todd said.


"This is a big event and one of the most popular," Todd added.







Russo bringing Bargain Scotch to Concert on Lawn

(Aug. 6, 2015) Fresh from several summer shows opening for national acts such as J Roddy Walston and the Business and Trombone Shorty, local singer songwriter Bryan Russo is shifting gears and planning an intimate set on the lawn of the Calvin B. Taylor House Museum in Berlin on Sunday, Aug. 9.

The free concert, which starts at 5 p.m., is part of the museum's ongoing Concerts on the Lawn series.

Rather than bring his big, raucous blues-rock band, the Tragic Figures, Russo said he plans to tone it town and dig into the roots of American music with his side band Bryan Russo and Bargain Scotch.

"This band is more like old blues, vintage jazz and '30s and '40s swing music," he said. "I think, with the resurgence of bluegrass and old-time music, I've been finding myself spending a ton of time with old soul records, jazz, big band, and even old country records.

Russo cited a Jerry Lee Lewis country album as a major influence on the group.

"It's really not one of his hits, but it's brilliant," he said. "It's really simplistic, it's got a lot of movement to it in the changes and it's just fun music."

A former NPR journalist, Russo described his songwriting as "taking really heavy subjects and putting them into catchy tunes."

"I think too many times lyrics get thrown away," he said. "Songwriting that's all about the backbeat is like going to a restaurant and writing a review and only ordering soup. Give it

"We're sort of in a time right now when electronic dance music is just disco," Russo continued. "There's music for the body and for shaking it, and then there's music for the head, which makes you think. You have that sort of juxtaposition where you have bands that play real instruments and are writing real songs, and then you have bands that are just lighting it up and burning it down and shaking it out and staying up all night."

Russo is aiming for an audience of the former, although he insists the two do not have to be mutually exclusive. The majority of the program the songwriter is bringing to the show will be original music, he said, although don't be surprised if a few old standards show up in the set list.

"It's a short set, but I'll probably throw in a couple old standard tunes that I really like," he said. "I've been doing this old Buck Owens tune that Ray Charles made famous that I really like. That song's just three chords and the truth, you know?

Taking everything that's old and making it new again, I think, is something bluegrass has done really well,"

Dose of history comes with Russo at museum concert

Russo added. "I think old soul music and swing music can come back around too and remind people how fun it is to just dance. You don't have to just dance to frivolous crap. You can shake it and think at the same time."

Russo is also in the early stages of developing a documentary on Charles Albert Tindley, a man often called the "grandfather of gospel music," who was born in Berlin.

"What I did as a journalist for many years, even though I don't think I'll be getting back into the corporate journalism world, I still want to do things for the community and I want to tie in art and history and entertainment.

"I think that's what Berlin is – an arts and entertainment district that's rooted in history. With my background, I don't have to just be the singing and dance man. I think I can tell some stories as a journalistic storyteller as well as a sonic storyteller.

"I'm looking at different ways I can celebrate the history of the area and celebrate people coming together and having a good time," he added. "I think these things they do at the Taylor House museum are really cool and I was really happy to be asked. Berlin has a good thing going."

To employ a cliché, it's all over but the shouting, and possibly that is over as well, as the voting deadline passes in Ocean Pines' Board of Directors election.

The results of the months-long campaign will be revealed Saturday and the two winners will be installed on the Ocean Pines Association's ruling body.

The business of the association doesn't shift into standby mode during the election process, so the new directors will be wading into the continuously flowing stream of things to do.

The most obvious of these are well known: the reserve study, the elusive Sandpiper energy contract and the financial performance of the various amenities. Not quite as sensational, at least in terms of public debate, is the condition of the community's infrastructure, most notably its bridges, which need attention as well.

Whatever the election outcome, this year's board would best assist the community by putting any differences or agendas aside.

The past few years have been dominated by strong personalities and over-active egos, with the main focus being on who supports the general manager ... or not.

Little has gotten accomplished as the constant vying for control overshadowed the real work that needs to be done.

It is time to pin down those needs and establish a timeframe for accomplishment, with the board and general manager working cooperatively together.

While we may have seemed over the past few weeks to continue to harp on this message, the association members deserve a break from the in-fighting and discourse, with a team that is determined to work together despite any differences.

Members are best served by a board that does not become unreasonably divided over matters of opinion and one that gives careful deliberation on all viewpoints.

Blind support or determination to undermine does nothing to benefit the community.



Tax-free week in Maryland, Aug. 9-15

Qualifying articles of clothing or footwear to be exempted

(Aug. 6, 2015) Comptroller Peter Franchot is encouraging shoppers to take advantage of Maryland's tax-free week which begins Sunday, Aug. 9, and runs through Saturday, Aug. 15.

During that time, any single qualifying article of clothing or footwear priced \$100 or less – regardless of how many purchased – will be exempt from the state's six percent sales tax.

"Shop Maryland Tax-Free Week is a great opportunity to get deals on back-to-school clothes or to refresh a tired wardrobe," Franchot said. "During these tough economic times, having a break from the six percent sales tax on shoes and clothing can make a real difference for families, enabling them to

save more of their hardearned money. Retailers also benefit with a boost in revenue. The savings can really add up for families, putting more money in their pockets."

"Back-to-school shopping is the second-biggest shopping season for retailers,' said Maryland Retailers Association spokesperson Tom Saguella. "Tax-Free Week has become a welcomed opportunity for consumers to save on clothing and footwear as they prepare for the new school year, and also for adults looking to buy something from the new fall clothing lines. Tax-Free Week is a wonderful gift provided every year to Maryland taxpayers and you can count on Maryland retailers to do their part with great sales and promotions.

Resulting from legislation passed in the 2007 special session of the Maryland General Assembly, a tax-free week will occur every year during the second week in August, until the legislature decides to revisit the issue. During this period, each qualifying article of clothing or footwear selling for \$100 or less is exempt from sales tax, regardless of how many items are purchased at the same time.

Businesses selling items that are not eligible for inclusion in the tax-free week can still participate in Shop Maryland. Under "Sellers Privilege," other unqualified merchandise can be sold tax-free but the retailer is responsible for paying the sales tax owed to the state.

(Aug. 6, 2015) Earlier this year, hundreds of "kayaktivists" took to the water in Seattle to protest Shell's oil drilling in the Arctic. Just last week, a similar on the water – and from the bridge – gathering kept a drilling rig supply ship from leaving for the Arctic from Portland.

In light of the pending proposal to open the Mid-Atlantic to offshore drilling and other threats to water quality, local environmental groups are looking to bring some of that kayaktivist energy to Ocean City. On Friday, Aug. 14, Assateague Coastal Trust (ACT) is partnering with Waterkeeper Alliance, Waterkeepers Chesapeake and others for "Float for the Coast," an on-the-water rally in support of clean water. The Float will be part celebration to embrace the water quality protections that allow thousands of locals and visitors alike to recreate safely in the Coastal Bays. It will also be part demonstration to educate and raise awareness about the ongoing and looming threats to the fragile coastal waters. There are no plans to block boats or hang from bridges, how-

The event will feature a gathering of water craft of all shapes and sizes manned by representatives of regional waterkeeper programs, allied organizations and the clean water loving public that will paddle (or motor) to convene for a group celebration on Isle of Wight Bay just offshore from the Roland E. Powell Convention Center on 40th Street where the Maryland Association of Counties will be holding its annual summer meeting.

"Water shapes our lives and is the driving force for our coastal economies, but increasingly, our water is in danger and our most precious resource needs our help," said Kathy Phillips, the Assateague Coastkeeper and ACT's executive director. "It's easy to take for granted the many benefits we enjoy from clean water, and this event is in-

tended to remind ourselves about these gifts and to raise awareness among the public and policymakers about the threats facing this fragile resource."

The Float for the Coast will begin at 10:30 a.m. at Fish Tales Bar and Grill/Bahia Marina located bayside on 22nd street in Ocean City. The rally will convene at noon in Isle of Wight Bay adjacent to the convention center.

Once assembled, participants will hear from several speakers, including David Helvarg, executive director of Blue Frontier. Helvarg is also an award-winning journalist who has produced more than 40 broadcast documentaries for PBS, The Discovery Channel, and others, is editor of the Ocean and Coastal Conservation Guide, and organizer of "Blue Vision" Summits for ocean activists and the Peter Benchley Ocean Awards.

Once the rally concludes, participants will make their way back to Bahia Marina, where all will be welcome to refresh themselves at a happy hour sponsored by Sweetwater Brewing at Fish Tales.

The public is encouraged to join in the Float for free by bringing their kayak, standup paddleboard, canoe or any legal watercraft to the official launch site (or to an appropriate site of their choice) and enjoy a few hours on the bay while learning about some of the challenges facing local waterways. ACT will have a limited number of loaner kayaks available for those who wish to participate but don't have access to their own boat.

Fondly remembering (cobb) salad days

Sometimes you find yourself in an airport that is about as organized as an old episode of Keystone Cops. I've

had my share of disorganization, especially after that fateful day that ushered in the mighty TSA.

Finished

with our convention this weekend, it was time to say goodbye to the torrential

downpours of Orlando and head home. Shuttling to Orlando's international air hub was simple enough, and retrieving my bags from the back of the van proved equally as stressfree.

The kind and professional ticket agents were moving the line at breakneck pace, and my heart and soul were full of hope; hope that I would be able to get a bite to eat before the plane took off. Southwest Airlines had delivered again, with smiles, courtesy and expediency at the ready.


And then I rounded the corner.

Those of us who travel more than a little know the feeling of dismay when things are going so well only to end in such a trammel. The TSA lines were not only massive but there were no lanes delineating where they started or where they ended. Everyone was just a massive pile of irritated souls and luggage in a mire trying to get through the agent's questioning and clearance.

After about an hour and change, I was able to jump on the railcar that takes passengers to the terminal, and with only 15 minutes until boarding, I had to settle for something that would be easy to eat. And nothing says easy to eat like a salad (just roll with me here; I'm trying to make a decent segue into the Cobb).

I immediately gravitated to the Cobb salad for two reasons. One, it is my all-time favorite, or at least tied with a Grilled Caesar. Two, it was a frenetic salad which aptly matched the mood of the moment. A neatly jumbled pile of bacon, hard-boiled eggs, avocado, blue cheese and poached & chilled chicken was faultless in my eyes.

And of course there was no Cobb salad dressing, something I wasn't told until after I had paid, so I made a compromise and tried the Southwest Dressing that was at our disposal. And I have to say, it was impressive. Granted, it is a basic



salad with a basic dressing, but it hit the spot and geared me up to sit down and think my way through this.

Nothing more than a simple red wine vinaigrette, Cobb Dressing can be made easily enough in a blender and can hold for a long time. But by adding just a touch of lime and chipotle (of course with its accompanying adobo sauce), a simple transformation takes place and you have a southwestern-style dressing.

I dare say that it was one of the best salads I've had in a long time, and not because it was literally the best salad I've had in a long time. Rather, it was good comfort food that left me wanting nothing more to eat and ultimately leaving me ready to take a nap on the plane.

All in all, I made it to my gate, I had a simple salad and I made my flight home. There's not much to complain about here. Now I just need to watch Keystone Cops reruns so I can embed the background music in my mind. Then, I can just replay it on the days when the airport is such a mess. Yes, that's how I amuse myself.

Cobb salad

Serves 4

1/2 head Iceberg Lettuce, chopped 1/2 head Romaine Lettuce, chopped 3 Fresh scallions, sliced on a bias

8 oz. Poached and chilled chicken, diced

8 oz. Blue cheese crumbles Fresh tomatoes, diced

8 oz. Fresh bacon, cooked and cut in 1/2" squares

2 Ripe avocados, Diced

4 Hard-boiled egg, halved (recipe follows)

Southwest Cobb Dressing

1. Lay the lettuces on a plate

- 2. Neatly either line the toppings in neat rows or place them in orderly piles on the greens
- 3. Drizzle the dressing and you are ready to go
- 4. Sit back and watch the debacle of an airport that you just may be sitting in at this moment

Hard Boiled Eggs

Makes 4 4 Large fresh eggs Salt

- 1. Place the eggs in water in a saucepan and salt heavily
- 2. Bring to a boil, and immediately turn the heat off, allowing the eggs to slowly cook for 12-15 minutes
- 3. At the end of this, run cold water and ice over the eggs until they are chilled all the way through
- 4. A little trick that we do in the business sometimes is to put the eggs in a stainless bowl and toss them just gently enough to crack the shells without smashing the eggs themselves
- 5. You will start the see the eggs 'self-peel' and the shells will part from their cooked innards quickly and easily

Southwest Cobb Dressing

Makes about 1 1/2 cups
1/2 c. EV Olive oil
1/2 c. Grapeseed oil
1/4 c. Red wine vinegar
1 large clove garlic
1/2 Tsp. Dijon mustard
1/2 Tsp. Worcestershire sauce
Salt & Pepper to taste
Juice of half a lime

- 1 Tbsp. (or to taste) Chipotle with Adobo
- 1. Place all ingredients in a blender and combine until nice and smooth
- 2. Adjust seasonings and serve immediately. It will hold for up to seven days in a refrigerator



structing submersible robots, creating hovercrafts, piloting drones and simulating a NASA spacewalk mission.

"The objective of the Reach for the Stars project is to present science, technology, engineering and math [STEM] career opportunities to our highly talented students and to link them with those careers with businesses in Worcester County," WCED Director Bill Badger said.

The Reach for the Stars STEM Camp is in its third year. Funded by the Worcester County Commissioners and administered through WCED, the goal of the camp is to get youth engaged and excited in STEM careers and technologies, preparing them for academic programs at the Worcester Technical High School and in university study.

During their experience, the campers have the opportunity to apply their STEM knowledge as high school and college students if they are accepted into WCED's sister program, the STEP UP STEM Internship program, which pairs talented students with local employers in STEM fields to retain students in Worcester County after college graduation by giving them connections to local engineering, biomedical and information technology companies.

Science and Technology, Atlantic General Hospital, Bel-Art, Maryland Coastal Bays, OceanCity.com, West Ocean City Injury and Illness Center, Martin Physical Therapy, Studio Codeworks, and Sprout Creatives are among the workforce partners participating in the STEP UP Internship Program.

On July 30, a recognition ceremony took place at the Worcester County Government Center in Snow Hill to share the achievements of the interns and campers.

Camp coordinator and Red Doors Community Center director Fawn Mete partnered with NASA Wallops Island house robotics Team Titanium Wrecks, Peter Bale of the Eastern Shore Defense Alliance and Washington D.C.-based Studio Codeworks to plan a hands-on camp curriculum that would expose campers to a variety of STEM careers and applications in computer science and aerospace engineering.

Campers started by learning the basics of coding and how to think like a computer. Ryan Mete, a programmer for Studio Codeworks, then taught them how to write code from scratch to design and program their own video games. Campers invented their own characters, or "sprites," which were then digitally rendered as graphics for their games by Salisbury University adjunct art faculty member Evan Fitzgerald. The campers then learned the basics of electronics and used their knowledge to design and construct their own working prototype game controllers to use with

their games.

Team Titanium Wrecks joined in the action with its globally acclaimed FIRST robotics competition bot, demonstrating robotics applications, building line-tracking robots with the campers, programming with Raspberry Pi, constructing human hovercrafts and building SEAPERCH submersible robots.

Campers visited the Ocean Pines Sports Core pool and constructed the robots then navigated an underwater maze. The two best submersible robots were donated to the aquatics program for use in swimming lessons for children with special needs.

Peter Bale of the Eastern Shore Defense Alliance visited camp to introduce campers to the exciting world of Unmanned Aerial Vehicles, or drones. Campers practiced navigating drones and completed a search and recovery challenge using the devices. The final camp activity, a simulated space mission inspired by NASA's famous Space Academy in Huntsville, Ala., was conducted by Fawn Mete and Alex Haglich. The campers worked in teams as Mission Control and as astronauts on a spacewalk to perform weightless construction underwater in the pool, which simulates a zero gravity environment in which astronauts make repairs to satellites, telescopes or the International Space Station.


