## **Joaquin spares inland Worcester**

Damage from hurricane, nor'easter largely limited to downed trees, OPA docks

(Oct. 8, 2015) Although the weekend's storm caused millions of dollars of damage to the beach in Ocean City, with minor structural damage as well, Berlin and Ocean Pines were largely unscathed, according to officials in both communities.

On Thursday, Ocean Pines General Manager Bob Thompson said emergency preparation was well underway as crews gassed up trucks and generators, and prepositioned key pieces of equipment in anticipation of flooding and road obstructions.

The community's pools were closed, outside furniture and trashcans were brought inside and public works personnel were on alert for a sustained 72-hour operation, he said.

At the time, Thompson said the biggest concern was the continuous rain and high winds projected throughout the weekend, which could have caused problems for emergency workers. During Hurricane Sandy, for example, work crews fought to remove a number of large, downed trees from clogging main thoroughfares.

We were out performing tree re-

moval on Cathell Road ... and there were about eight of us trying to cut those off the roads and another tree fell right in the midst of it and landed on one of our trucks that one of guys was sitting in," Thompson said. "That's what our biggest concern is, especially with the amount of [rain] we're getting right now."

Gov. Larry Hogan declared a state of emergency later that day, opening up federal resources for what some thought could be a potentially devastating convergence of a nor'easter and Hurricane Joaquin.

By Sunday, however, it was clear that the hurricane had veered away from the East Coast, and Hogan rescinded the order.

On the following day, Thompson said the affects of the storms in Ocean Pines were limited to minor damage to a few of the docks and only about a half-dozen downed trees.

"We did well," he said. "All the prework helped out so we were ahead of it, and so far nothing major at all."

Thompson praised public works and other personnel brought in to prepare for what could have been a much more destructive weekend.

"Under these conditions, because we've had so much practice with it, they respond well," he said. "Everybody jumps in to make sure that, not only are we prepared, but typically we make sure

that everybody else is prepared as well amongst our team members."

Looking forward to the rest of hurricane season, which runs through November, Thompson said he was comfortable with Ocean Pines' readiness.

'We've had the same crew for a number of years and we're very, very comfortable with their ability to respond to these types of situations," he said. "I think we'll be fine."

In Berlin, Town Administrator Laura Allen said there was no significant damage or flooding.

"I think we got a little bit lucky with the path the hurricane chose to travel," she said on Monday. "We were also prepared. We did storm draining cleaning and jetting, we made sure the drains were cleaned of leaves and we had two pumps that we had rented on Flower Street and Williams Street. I think all of that helped us quite a bit."

On Friday the town announced it had purchased 500 sandbags, which it offered to residents free of charge. Allen said about 350 of those, placed at Burbage and Henry Park, were claimed as of Monday.

"The feedback on the sandbags has been pretty positive," she said.

Water Resources and Public Works Director Jane Kreiter was upbeat on Monday.

## **OPA**, Sandpiper inching closer to inking new deal

(Oct 8, 2015) Following a closed session last Thursday, the Ocean Pines Association board of directors could be nearing an agreement with Sandpiper Energy following what one director described as "at least three years of negotiations."

Sandpiper has already converted propane lines in several communities in Worcester County into natural gas, including Berlin and West Ocean City, and had hoped to do the same in Ocean Pines.

Talks stalled last year when several members of the board were directly participating in the discussions. Then, in June, the board voted to allow General Manager Bob Thompson to take the lead in the talks.

At the time, Thompson said he was "excited about the opportunity to take over the lead role in an important endeavor for the Ocean Pines Association and its members.'

Originally, the board gave Thompson a small window – until July – to get a deal done. That deadline apparently was extended several times, and now Thompson is not working under any specific timetable.

Hints that both sides were at an impasse surfaced during a Nov. 22 meet-See WITH Page 2

ing, when then board President Dave Stevens voiced his displeasure with the negotiations.

'We're not making any progress," he said at the time, adding, "There is no real negotiation."

Ocean Pines was seeking a franchise fee, similar to its agreement with Mediacom, and other expenses.

Following last week's approximately two-and-a-half hour closed meeting, board President Pat Renaud told the Gazette a franchise fees was probably off the table.

"That's just not going to happen I don't think," Renaud said.

As for the turnover agreement, Renaud hinted that was still "sort of" in play.

"We still have a few issues that we want to try to get resolved and Bob's going to go back and try to talk to [Sandpiper]," he said. "I think we're getting closer.

"I won't say [the board will sign a contract] the next time because I can't predict what someone is going to say, but there are about three or four of us that are generally for [the agreement] the way it is, and there are about another three that say, 'well, yeah, but I want to look at this," Renaud continued. "We're at that point now."

Renaud reiterated that Thompson would remain the lead negotiator.

"I didn't want to have any board members going at all," he said. "[Thompson] was negotiating with one fellow over there and that seems to have worked out much, much better than having everybody putting their two cents in at the same time.

"Bob's done a great job," Renaud added. "I think everyone is going to see that.'

Renaud did not offer a timeline, although he repeatedly suggested the board was close to an up or down vote.

"I think it will eventually come down to a call for a vote and if we have enough to carry it, that will be it," he said.

"Compared to other people, we did great," she said. "We did probably get about eight inches [of rain] in the three days, but we had enough time to catch up and we felt very prepared.'

Kreiter said the staff spent much of the weekend picking up downed tree limbs and that most of Berlin had been cleared as of Sunday.

"We didn't have any big trees, but we did have a lot of limbs," she said. "With all that rain, those branches were pretty heavy with all the leaves on them still. Some of the roads were in pretty bad shape, but we've swept most of them."

# Library Committee using 'novel' approach for new Berlin branch

(Oct. 8, 2015) Favoring energy efficiency over the many other concerns associated with building a new facility, the Berlin Library Committee received approval from the Worcester County Commissioners Tuesday to seek proposals for a "generalcontractor-at-risk" arrangement.

County Engineer Bill Bradshaw said the setup, which entails a general contractor acting more like consultant during the pre-construction design and planning processes, has never been used on a county project, but has been in Ocean City.

During the Aug. 18 meeting of the commissioners, acting library Director Jennifer Ranck said the committee favored a "Passivhaus" design strategy, a building concept developed in Sweden and Germany that emphasizes extreme energy efficiency.

"The general idea of a Passivhaus approach is to provide an extremely well insulated and airtight envelope, and reduce the size and complexity of mechanical systems," according to a report provided to the commissioners at the time. "This would reduce annual energy costs by 50-70 percent and even these may be offset by on-site photovoltaic production."

However, problems with that approach arose. The principle one is that county purchasing requirements will not

allow the number of at-risk contracts generally used in this type of construction, Bradshaw said.

Secondly, Bradshaw said, certain construction materials required for such a project are only manufactured in Europe.

While that defeats the dream of Passivhaus, an ultra-energy efficient building might still be workable with a general contractor acting in tandem with the design team.

"After selection," Bradshaw wrote in the request for proposals, "the General Contractor then becomes a part of the pre-construction team and is tasked with participating on the team to achieve building goals, developing estimates and schedules, developing bid specifications and managing the sub-contractor bidding process."

After that, the contractor is expected to provide a guaranteed maximum price for the project and construction schedule. The construction contract is then derived from the schedule, price, contractor and county.

Bids will be accepted until 1 p.m. on Monday, Oct. 26.

Construction isn't expected to begin for another year, and the new library isn't expected to open for another year after that — Nov. 2017. The 11,000square-foot facility has a projected cost of about 3.85 million.

Economic and Community Development Director Ivy Wells is assisting the group with a state grant proposal that could cover the cost of a second mural.

"We're looking at the Visitor's Center first, and we actually found a mural artist," Layton said. "He travels all over and he specializes in community murals."

Layton said the concept is to depict five phases of Berlin's history using a seasonal motif for each panel of the building and moving from Victorian Berlin to the present day.

Local school children will help come up with the concept, adding an outreach component to the mural, Layton added.

"The artist will actually go to Buckingham [Elementary] and ask, 'what does community mean to you?" she said. "What he plans is the first section will be the historic aspect of Berlin and then it's going to gradually, seasonally change into modern Berlin. And it's going to incorporate the Bathtub Races, Fiddler's Convention, landmarks, things that Berlin is known for."

The artist, John Donato, painted a legacy mural at the Most Blessed Sacrament Catholic School in Ocean Pines last year.

Layton said she and committee member Robin Tomaselli recently visited the school to view the mural.

"It's just awesome," Layton said. "They did that last year and the teachers and kids are still so incredibly excited about it, and they walk past it every day."

One of the stipulations for being a designated A&E district is having public art, Layton said, and the group has been working on bringing outdoor murals to Berlin for more than two years.

The committee sought preliminary approval of the project from the historic commission on Wednesday, after press time. The next step, if all goes well, will be to seek approval by the Town Council.

Layton said the project could begin as soon as this winter, with Donato working on each panel at Buckingham Elementary. The students would have plenty of input, she said.

We're really excited," Tomaselli said. "If I had my way, I would give the kids paint brushes and tell them to go out there tonight."

## **Reconvened BHB addresses** first housing issue in decade

Motion of noncompliance passed after homeowner shows up late to meeting

(Oct. 8, 2015) When Berlin's Housing Board of Review met on Sept. 30, it was for the second time in the last decade, but it was the first time that the board has had to address a housing issue.

The board reconvened in August, elected Tara Downes as chairwoman, and heard a briefing from Planning Director Dave Engelhart on goals the town hoped the board could achieve. At its September meeting, the board addressed a notice of violation on 203 Washington Street

The homeowner, however, did not show up until the board was just about to adjourn. By then it was already too late, as the board had already made motion of а noncompliance.

"If you don't show up, the way the code section reads, it means the violation order is in effect," Engel-hart said later in the week. "He has 15 days to finish the work on the house, then fines and penalties start.

"He was given the opportunity to appeal, but you've got to show up to have your appeal heard," Engelhart continued. He added that one member of the board did move to allow the homeowner's appeal to be heard, but did not receive a second.

"The procedure was followed," he said.

The housing board agreed to meet on the third Wednesday of each month, although Engelhart is not sure whether a session will be held in October.

When it does return to a regular meeting schedule, he expects it to address a number of "derelict" properties in Berlin.

"I think they're doing very well," he said. "They understand the concepts and what their duties are. I'm looking forward to it and we've got a lot more to do.

This is just the first one," Engelhart said of the Washington Street property. "There are more distressed properties downtown, and that became clear during the strategic planning sessions back in the spring.'

The board's return to the regulatory scene is the culmination of that, he said.

## **OPA buys property, turns \$6-8K profit on foreclosure sale**

#### By Josh Davis Staff Writer

(Oct. 8, 2015) Following months of work and cooperation between multiple parties, the Ocean Pines Association is poised to recoup thousands in bad debt on a foreclosure property it bought, fixed up and now has under contract to a potential buyer.

After struggling to collect assessments from some delinquent properties, the association bought a home located at 37 Tail of the Fox Drive at auction earlier this year.

General Manager Bob Thompson said the move could be seen as a test for similar moves to recoup funds in the future.

"About four months ago the board had approved to do a foreclosure," Thompson said during an orientation meeting last month. "This was our first case in many years and what we did is, when we looked how far in arrears they were, we saw there was some value in the property."

Thompson said he went to Snow Hill for the auction with a certain "strike point" in mind.

"[We knew] if we worked within this amount we were going to make an offer to buy it from foreclosure," he said, adding that three properties were on the table that day, with three <image>

For the first time, the Ocean Pines Association purchased a home in foreclosure with unpaid assessments, fixed it, and sold it for a profit. The house, located at 37 Tail of the Fox Drive, went to settlement last week.

bidders in attendance.

"Since that time we've gone onto the property, we've made repairs to it, we've done all the things that we needed to, listed it for sale [and] the property is under contract," Thompson said (settlement was scheduled for Sept. 30 but the sale has yet to be confirmed).

Thompson said the association should have a profit of between \$6,000 and \$8,000. He said the property owner was approximately \$10,900 in arrears for assessment and fines and that the work done on the home was already paid for as well.

The money gained from this sale would be placed against bad debt accounts, Thompson said.

"Overall, this is a process we hadn't done before," he said. "We were fortunate in this one." Board member Jack Collins said that Ocean Pines passed when another property came up in similar circumstances roughly a month after the first one.

"We backed off because we didn't have the experience, and the value was ... very close," he said. "I think we did a good job in this particular instance."

Thompson said when the property was purchased the board included Realtor Sharyn O'Hare and builder Marty Clarke. Collins, a former banker, also provided assistance.

"It was kind of a collective effort to analyze the whole thing," Thompson said. "It came to the board and we sat for probably about 45 minutes and kicked it back and forth and ... talked about pros and cons and decided to move forward."



toberfest. "We do a peach-pie baking contest for the Peach Festival, so we thought this was a perfect fit for

fall," Wells said. "It's harvest season and you can get local apples, and we're trying to add more of a fall festival aspect to Octoberfest."

Wells said the event would maintain its "fun, food, music and beer" theme, while becoming more family friendly.

"And who doesn't love apple pie?" she said. "It's for charity and also you'll get some great press knowing you make the best apple pie in Berlin.'

Robin Tomaselli, owner of Baked Dessert Café on 4 Bay Street in Berlin, offered readers a few tips for homemade apple pie.

Use tried and true family recipes when possible, or search for recipes on sites like foodnetwork.com and all recipes.com, where they have been rated. Read the reviews," she said.

Tomaselli said "all-natural, quality usually 'If pie crust intimidates you, don't ingredients" yield the best results and suggested using tart apples like Granny Smith, or a combination of tart and sweet.

> When making the crust, roll out the dough between two sheets of parchment or wax paper, rolling from the center outward, making quarter turns to create a circle, then lift and invert the dough into pie plate.

> "If pie crust intimidates you, don't sweat it," Tomaselli said. "Use storebought and top with a simple crumb topping.

> Finally, she suggested getting the family, and especially children, involved in the process.

> "Children of all ages like to be involved in the kitchen, especially when making dessert," she said. "The key is to have fun and don't stress."

> Tomaselli provided a sample recipe.

## Manklin Meadows expansion OK'ed by county commission

(Oct. 8, 2015) The Manklin Meadows Racquet Center expansion in Ocean Pines inched closer to completion last week, as the Worcester County Planning Commission approved the site plan as presented.

Zoning Administrator Jennifer Keener said there were no major issues during the meeting, held last Thursday in Snow Hill.

She said the next step is to obtain permits at the county level for which there is no specific timetable. In September, Ocean Pines Association General Manager Bob Thompson told the board of directors a request for proposals from contractors would follow the site plan review and that should occur within the next few months.

The board voted 5-2 last November to approve the complex, believed to cost approximately \$250,000. At the time, the plan included four platform tennis courts, eight pickleball courts, a community garden, a reorientation and rebuilding of the existing playground and improvements to the parking lot.

\*If you use salted butter, reduce the salt in the recipe to 1/2 teaspoon. 1. Whisk together the flour, salt and


buttermilk powder (if you're using it).

2. Dice the butter into small cubes or cut it into pats. Work it into the flour until it's well distributed, but not fully incorporated. Larger, peasized pieces of butter will be scattered throughout the mixture.

3. Tossing with a fork or your fingers, drizzle in the ice water. Stop adding water when the dough starts to come together and grab it in your hands. If it holds together easily, without crumbling, it's ready. If it has dry spots, or pieces break off easily, add a bit more water until it's cohesive.

4. Gather the dough into a ball and divide it in half. Gently pat/shape each half into a rough disk. Roll immediately, if desired. For better texture, chill the dough for at least 30 minutes before rolling. If dough has been refrigerated longer than 30 minutes, allow it to warm at room temperature for 10 to 15 minutes, until it rolls easily.

## Author Joan Cooper to discuss work during 2nd Friday event

(Oct. 8, 2015) Baltimore native Joan Cooper said she can't imagine life without writing.

A veteran school teacher, Cooper has written more than a dozen novels and has published two, with another two on the way through Salt Water Media



in Berlin. This Friday, she will be one of two artists to be featured at Salt Water, located at 29 Broad Street. Cooper

began writing seventh in grade, when she put together a short

story collection that was widely circulated in the area. Like many writers, she struggled to find an agent and a publisher, and was scared of selfpublishing.

That changed when a friend sent her a mysterious invitation to dinner last year.

"They basically lured me to what I

thought was going to be dinner at the Globe, and it turned out to be an introduction to [Salt Water owner] Stephanie Fowler," Cooper said. "I had been a little worried about selfpublishing. I had been submitting lots of short stories to magazines and to journals and had been looking for an agent, but she talked me through it.'

As a trial run, Cooper agreed to hire Salt Water to publish "Finding Home at Lilac Hill.'

The book was a success and she published "Return to Lilac Hill," a follow-up collection of short stories, six months later.

"They've been received well," Cooper said. "I've had a good time with it so far. I'm still looking for an agent, but it's opened up a whole new group of friends and connections."


Cooper described her two most recent books as "women's literature," with a strong central female character.

struggles with depression and anxiety, something with which Cooper is familiar.

"I had experience and I had quite a few very good friends – and students – who'd experienced really severe anxiety disorder and depression," she said. "They might try a medication for a while, but they wind up figuring out ways of figuring it out themselves, whether it's through therapy or they just figure it out.

"This particular character has had a time of being on medication and decides to go without and to handle it herself because she's a very private person," Cooper said.

Cooper teaches 12th grade English and creative writing at Bennett High School in Salisbury, where she sees many of the same struggles every day.

day. "It's surprising how common it is and everybody thinks they've done it on their own for the first time, that they're the only person that's ever managed it like this," Cooper said.

Cooper added a layer to Sarah by incorporating into the character her husband's experiences as a chef.

"We've talked and argued recipes for years, so Sarah evolved into being a cook, and so everything she makes in the book we've actually made," Cooper said.

Last week, while participating in the Baltimore book festival, Cooper said she reread several sections from the "Lilac" books, and was pleasantly surprised by how much she still enjoyed them.

"I thought, 'Boy, I really do like this book,'" she said. "I'm happy that she's out there, living without me. That's what it's like when you write these books – it's your own little family and then you release them out to the public and out to the wild and they take on their own life."

Cooper will read selections from the series during 2nd Friday. She also will promote the new chapter of the Maryland Writer's Association she established with Fowler.

"We're kind of in our own way being silly with it and calling it the 'Lower, Slower Shore Chapter,' because there's a very strong upper shore group called the Eastern Shore Writer's Association," Cooper said. "I was on their board last year, and nothing negative about them at all, but they have a tendency to want to meet in the upper areas – St. Michael's, Easton.

"I work a day job – I'm a five-daya-week teacher, and to sacrifice writing time and family time to drive to Easton once a month is almost too much. So we decided to start this chapter," Cooper added she said.

The group held its first meeting Oct. 2.

"The goal is to meet, network, do readings and just talk, basically, and have fun. You know – wine, beer, cheese, crackers and chocolates," Cooper said.

"As a writer, you have a tendency to feel like you're out there by yourself. You're interfacing with a computer screen. It's nice to get out there and talk about craft without the big pressure of a high-ticket speaker or having to buy a big lunch or anything like that," Cooper added.

The group plans to meet the first Friday of each month.

Berlin's 2nd Friday festivities will feature more than a dozen art displays in shops throughout the downtown area, along with sales and specials in area restaurants from 5-8 p.m.

# Parks Service seeking public comments for future project

(Oct. 8, 2015) The National Park Service (NPS) is asking the public to comment on its plans for future relocation of the Bayside Picnic and Parking Area, located in the Maryland district of Assateague Island National Seashore.

Comments will be accepted for the next 60 days, and the plan, called an Environmental Assessment (EA), is available at the NPS Planning, Environment, and Public Comment (PEPC) website at: http://parkplanning.nps. gov/asis.

During a series of public workshops held last year, the NPS heard how visitors value the Bayside area and welcomed ideas for more a functional and sustainable long term use of this popular location. The NPS has assembled these ideas and suggestions into five new alternatives and presented them in the EA. "We really appreciate the public's input into this project", said Assateague Island National Seashore Superintendent, Debbie Darden. "We want the public to comment on our alternatives, so that we can choose the strategy that will best provide for enjoyment and resiliency over time at Bayside."

The purpose of the project is to plan for the future relocation of the Bayside Picnic and Parking Area to a site less susceptible to damage from future storm events, minimize the impact to natural resources, and allow for sustained visitor access and recreational use of this area of the national seashore.

The NPS encourages public participation throughout the planning process. A public meeting will be held on Saturday, Oct. 17 at 10 a.m. in the park's Environmental Education Center at 7206 National Seashore Lane, Berlin. NPS will be available to answer questions about each alternative and collect additional public input. Comments on the plan can also be mailed to Deborah Darden, Superintendent Assateague Island National Seashore, ATTN: Bayside Picnic and Parking Area Relocation EA 7206 National Seashore Lane, Berlin, Md. 218110r posted online at: www.parkplanning.nps.gov/asis.

The EA was prepared in compliance with the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) to provide a decision-making framework that analyzes a reasonable range of alternatives to meet project objectives, evaluates issues and impacts to park resources and values, and identifies mitigation measures to lessen the degree or extent of these impacts.



You don't have to be a car enthusiast to enjoy it, but if you are you should definitely come."

# Golf & Country Club junior programs enjoy successes

(Oct. 8, 2015) Ocean Pines Golf & Country Club is wrapping up the golf season having had more junior golfers participate in its programs than in any other season in recent history.

"I feel like they get a sense that they belong here and that's good for the growth of the game and securing the future of golf."

## Let's praise public works

It might have seemed like much ado about nothing by Monday morning, but the storm preparation and weekend efforts of public works and emergency service crews in Berlin, Ocean Pines and the county should not go unnoticed.

While it is obvious the worst did not happen as Hurricane Joaquin wandered off and the northeasterly gale that lashed the coast for several days did little of note on the mainland, it remains that county and community emergency workers took nothing for granted.

They were well prepared and ready to prevent damage and to respond to it in the event that the winds howled a little longer or stronger, as the area faced the possibility of two nasty meteorological circumstances.

With the periodic weather forecasts riddled with so much uncertainty as the weekend approached, it would have been easy for officials and workers to adopt a less aggressive approach. But they did not, opting instead to work as if something would happen, rather than something might happen.

As scary as major storms can be in low-lying eastern Worcester County, residents should feel a little more secure with the knowledge that county and community personnel know what to do should extreme weather visit the area.

The past week's preparations and the execution of preventative measures also served as a public demonstration of these crews' ability to respond.

In that regard, these pre-storm efforts were not wasted but, in addition to getting the just-in-case work done, they also might be viewed as a worthwhile live drill that could help the next time bad weather threatens.

And as everyone who lives on the coast is well aware, there will be a next time, because that comes with the territory. When it does occur, it's apparent eastern county residents have in place the people they need when that happens.

## **National Seashore launches program**

Fourth graders and their families eligible for free park access

(Oct. 8, 2015) The National Park Service and Assateague Island National Seashore is proud to help launch the Every Kid in a Park program, as part of President Obama's commitment to protect the nation's unique outdoor spaces and ensure that every American has the opportunity to visit and enjoy them.

Fourth graders nationwide can visit the new Every Kid in a Park website to obtain a pass that provides free access to students and their families to all federally managed lands and waters - including national parks, forests and wildlife refuges. The pass is valid for the 2015-2016 school year and grants free entry for fourth graders and three accompanying adults (or an entire car for drive-in parks) at more than 2,000 federally-managed sites.

"There's a lot to discover here, and we're excited to welcome fourth graders and their families to Assateague Island throughout the school year," said Assateague Island National Seashore Superintendent Debbie Darden. "We hope that our young visitors have fun in the great outdoors and develop a lifelong connection to our nation's land, water and wildlife."

Leading up to the 100th birthday of the National Park Service in 2016, President Obama launched the Every Kid in a Park initiative earlier this year as a call to action to get all children to experience America's unparalleled outdoors. Today, more than 80 percent of American families live in urban areas, and many lack easy access to safe outdoor spaces. At the same time, vouth spend more hours than ever in front of screens instead of outside.

Fourth graders can log onto www.everykidinapark.gov and complete an educational activity in order to obtain and print their pass. Students can also trade in their paper pass for an official access card at participating federal sites nationwide.

Educators and community leaders can access educational activities, field trip options and the ability to print passes for their classrooms. Parents visiting the new website can find additional links for more information on planning trips to nearby public lands.

Every Kid in a Park is a crucial component of a multi-pronged approach to inspire the next generation to discover all that the nation's public lands and waters have to offer, including opportunities to be active, spend time with friends and family, and serve as living classrooms to build critical skills.

The Every Kid in a Park program is an Administration-wide effort administered in partnership with the Department of the Interior, the Department of Agriculture, the Department of Education, U.S. Army Corps of Engineers and the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration.

The Every Kid in a Park paper pass may be exchanged for an official card at the Assateague Island Visitor Center and the campground office in the Maryland District. ## **WPS** students read 245K pgs during summer reading contest


(Oct. 8, 2015) When school ends in June, the reading competition begins for lower school students at Worcester Preparatory School.

Totals for summer 2015 included 245,557 pages and 2,759 books read.





## Finding right olive key for salad nicoise

What is it about animals that we feel a need to bring them into our homes willingly? Why in the world

are we convinced that any of this is a good idea? And what are we going to do when we no longer have pets?

These are questions that frequent themselves in my mind as I take the dog out on

brisk autumn mornings. I'll slowly sip my coffee, savoring every nip knowing that it is not polluted with pumpkin-spiced 'anything'; just coffee, creamer and sugar. I know you purists will scoff that I don't drink it black, but I'll take halfway between manly and sissy-pants. I won't touch the pumpkin spice, as there will plenty of that in my future with Thanksgiving coming. It belongs in pumpkin pie, and that's all that I'm going to say on the matter.

Back to the dog, we've had her for just about eight years, and I've written about dear Sadie on numerous occasions. In fact, the introduction to my second book (done but disorganized; imagine that) has to do with her morning constitutional; strange as an introduction for a cookbook, but believe me, it works. There's nothing like a good segue.

We almost lost Sadie a couple months ago, as she was diagnosed with Addison's disease, so we now have the pleasure of an extra \$60 per month in steroids for the mangy mutt. Nothing can be easy with the old girl, but she is such a personality that we can hardly think of anything else to do but care for her. After a few weeks on the juice, she was back to her old shenanigans and just as ridiculous as ever. I guess you could say that she fits perfectly in our family.

Salade Nicoise is one of my favorite composed salads and on this particular day, Jeri, one of our best students, will do a great job with the salad. I guess I'm feeling mean, because she has a lot to do in a little bit of time, but she'll be fine.

You will see in the recipe that this is a straightforward salad, but there is a lot of prep. And I can't emphasize enough; you absolutely must use the freshest ingredients for everything except, of course, the olive itself. I mean, exactly how 'fresh' can a Nicoise olive really be? But make sure to hunt down these olives, as they are the tastiest tiny little olives I've ever had. They are well worth the hunt.

I sigh as I look into my mug. My coffee is gone, the brick stairs are getting cold on my backside and the dog has done her business. I guess it's time to get the day going.

#### **Salade Nicoise**

Enough for 4 people as a meal 1.5# Fresh tuna EV Olive oil, as needed Juice of 1 lemon 1 garlic clove, smashed

8 oz. Haricots verts (fine green beans)

8 ea. Fingerling potatoes

16 slices English cucumber

8 wedges of vine-ripe tomato, peeled 4 ea. Hard-boiled eggs, peeled &

quartered 4 ea. Artichoke hearts, halved

Nicoise olives, as needed

1 head Romaine

Red wine vinaigrette (Recipe fol-

1. Cut the tuna into four portions and marinate in the oil, lemon, garlic and a touch of salt & pepper

2. While the tuna is marinating, Blanch the haricots verts (green beans) and potatoes separately until tender but still firm

3. Shock in salted ice water immediately and then remove to paper towels

4. The tuna is best served warm to room-temperature, so be sure that you are paying attention to how much time it will be out; the last thing that we want is for anyone to get sick or to waste this beautiful tuna

5. When you are ready to serve, merely lay everything out neatly on plates, arranging as you would a Cobb Salad or any other composed salad

6. Grill the tuna until it is medium rare and allow to rest for about ten minutes before slicing and placing on the salad

7. Drizzle the salads with the wellwhisked dressing and serve immediately. A great pairing with this would be a dry Sancerre

#### **Red Wine Vinaigrette**

Makes about 1 cup

1/4 c. Good red wine vinegar

3/4 c. EV Olive oil

1 garlic clove, finely minced

Salt & Pepper to taste

1/4 c. Basil leaves, chiffonade1. Whisk together all ingredients until they come together in a temporary emulsion

2. Allow it to sit for at least twenty minutes but preferably an hour so the flavors can marry

3. Whisk thoroughly before serving




