Crowds come out for Octoberfest

(Oct. 22, 2015) Saturday's Octoberfest in Berlin was one of the busiest in recent memory, with strong, steady crowds taking advantage of live music, activities, shopping - and beer throughout the afternoon and into the early evening.

Several shops in the downtown area reported better-than-expected sales during the six-hour event.

"It was one of the best days we've had since we've been open," said Josh Faber from Bleached Butterfly on Pitts Street. "I thought it was a great event."

Faber said the store stayed opened until 7 p.m. – two hours later than usual and an hour after the event ended.

"We expected a pretty decent day, but it was definitely more than anticipated," Faber said. "It was a welcomed 'more,' I can tell you that.'

Bungalow Love on South Main Street also stayed open until 7 p.m.

"It was super awesome," said Bun-

galow owner Heather Layton. "It was busy all day and everyone really seemed to be enjoying themselves and having a great time."

Businesses located well off Main Street, including Uncle Jon's Soaps on Williams Street, also saw strong sales and happy customers.

'It was a good day with steady traffic," owner John Conley said. "Even with the crowds, people were pleasant and the mood was good throughout."

During the event, Berlin resident Diana Parsons won the apple pie baking contest, which included a \$100 cash prize, and a team cosponsored by Baked Dessert Café and Bungalow Love won the inaugural "Born to be Wild Assateague Hobby Horse Steeplechase Race," sponsored by the Assateague Island Alliance and Macky's Bayside Bar & Grill.

The race consisted of three-person teams riding wooden hobbyhorses through an obstacle course, jumping over hurdles, shimmying through hulahoops and wading through a strawfilled baby pool.

Dave Rovansek, John Colley and Ray Layton rode for the winning team, and \$1,307 was raised for the nonprofit Assateague Island Alliance.

"It's to get involved with the community and do stuff like that," Layton said. 'That's what it's all about."

Economic and Community Development Director Ivy Wells said town officials have already begun planning next year's event and that the hobby horse race would return.

"I think it turned out better than I expected," she said. "I didn't have any idea how they were going to do a steeple chase race, but the way they laid out the course and the fun that everyone seemed to be having watching, it was just great.

"Next year we're going to change a few things up and include children," she added. "Overall, I thought it was a great addition to Octoberfest."

OP mulls new rules for media relations, committee reports

(Oct. 22, 2015) The Ocean Pines Association leadership could be changing the way it communicates with its advisory committees and the local media, following a meeting last Monday to discuss both matters.

Director and former president Dave Stevens said the session was an extension of the board orientation meeting in September. Five of the seven board members attended, with Tom Terry and Bill Cordwell being absent.

We discussed board relations with the committees and board relations with the media," Stevens said. "It was an attempt, and I think a relatively successful one, to come up with a mutual agreement."

Stevens admitted the meeting was not formal, but added, "this is the way we think we ought to deal with these things.'

Regarding the committees, Stevens said the group, which included General Manager Bob Thompson, discussed having board liaisons provide a committee meeting report that would become part of the formal packets handed out before board meetings.

"It's not as easy as one would think, because they write them when they write them," he said. "Moreover, looking at the timing of the meeting and the timing of the board meeting, it might come a couple days before a board meeting."

He added the reports were not intended to be report cards and said he also suggested making the minutes from the committee meetings easier to find on the association's website.

As for how the OPA would deal with the media, Stevens said the group discussed having questions submitted in writing, by email, and giving each director the opportunity to weigh in.

"It is not useful to provide opinions to the media without including the rest of the board," he said adding, "I'll wait and see whether or not it changes anything or not.

"The whole point is somebody can put in an opinion and you print it and I read it, but that's not a board opinion," Stevens added. "And moreover, [if] it's wrong and See DIR Page 2

I disagree with it, do I wait until next week and say, 'here's the real scoop?"

Stevens said questions from the public are generally shared between each director.

"If I get one and let's say Tom Herrick answers it, just as an example, I can look at it and see what he says and I can say, 'I see where Tom is coming from, but you also should consider this," Stevens said. "Now everybody knows at the same time and it's pretty much real time, and the person getting the answer will know there are different ways to

look at it. All that's very good.

"What we talked about was, well, how can we do that with the media?" Stevens continued. "I think what we're trying to do is make a balanced approach to the media.'

Over the last year, Stevens said, multiple directors have not been given the chance to weigh in on some topics reported in the local press.

"My personal opinion is that it's a serious problem," he said. "You can't misquote an email - that's one thing - and you can't taper your opinion over an email. And, more specifically, the op-

portunity for a response is there because an email is instant, whereas a newspaper article isn't."

He added the policy would necessitate a certain degree of "self monitoring" from the other directors.

"I think this board is trying hard, including the general manager, of course, to be more respectful of different opinions and cautious in what we say," Stevens said.

Board President Pat Renaud, on vacation, did not return calls asking for a comment. Thompson also did not respond to requests for comment.

Vice President Cheryl Jacobs, asked to comment on the story, requested that questions be send to her via email.

"Speaking for myself, it is desirable when we communicate with the media, that we wish not to be 'misquoted,' which unfortunately can happen when speaking 'off the cuff' with reporters, and we would like everyone on the Board to be apprised of the communications with the media, so that was a long way of saying, yes, it is preferable that questions and responses are handled by way of written email Q & A and that they be shared with the entire Board," she wrote.

Commission passes text amendment change

(Oct. 22, 2015) Concerns over a zoning amendment that would limit how many dwelling units could built in a multi-family housing complex appears to have been settled, with the Berlin Planning Commission's decision to forge a compromise.

Last month that concerns about possible over-building resulted in the amendment being sent back for refinement, as attorney Mark Cropper, representing Rinnier Development Company, withdrew his request for the change during a public meeting at Town Hall.

The amendment, which would have allowed exceptions to the current cap of 12 dwelling units in multifamily homes complexes, was a required step in Rinnier's plans for the new 700-plus-townhome complex on Seahawk Road. On Oct. 14, the developer went back to the Berlin Planning Commission with a new proposal to change the cap to 48 units.

Town Administrator Laura Allen said the commission revised that number down to 36 and voted 3-1 in See BERLIN Page 5

favor of the new amendment. "It wasn't as open-ended as the original request," she said.

With the support of Town Attorney David Gaskill, Allen said the commission decided to skip a second public hearing at the planning and zoning level, instead sending it directly back to the Town Council.

She said the town has already provided notice of a public hearing on Nov. 9, and that the revised text amendment would receive a first reading on Monday during a council meeting at town hall.

Cropper said he was pleased with the results of the commission meeting. According to Cropper, none of the blueprints for the complex contained more than 36 units per building and the original number of 48 was offered simply "to give the town some flexibility."

Councilmembers Thom Gulyas and Lisa Hall objected to the original amendment during the Sept. 28 meeting, citing the language that would have allowed "any number" of units at the discretion of the planning commission. Both attended the commission meeting last week.

Gulyas, speaking during a phone interview on Tuesday, said he was satisfied the commission "came up with a number."

"We'll see how the rest of the council deals with that, but at least they gave us a number and they got rid of the word 'any," he said. "That was a concern of mine. We can't just have anything – build it in 'any' number of units. That's not a good plan in my mind."

Gulyas said he thought 36 units were appropriate for the Seahawk Road development.

"They're going to be using it for

the area where they have an elevator with primarily seniors and I think that's a good thing because I'd like to see more senior housing," he said. "I don't think we have enough of that and that was my biggest push to begin with."

Hall, also speaking on Tuesday, elaborated.

"The math on that is the elevator doesn't pay for itself unless there are 36 units in the building [according to the developer]," she said. "So it's going to have one building with an elevator so that if seniors can't get on the first floor, they do have an elevator building. That's why they went with 36."

Gulyas said he was unsure if he would vote for the new amendment.

"I think it's got a more positive light on it than what it did, but I want to hear from the rest of my counterparts," he said.

Hall, meanwhile, said she planned to enter a "no" vote.

"I'm probably not going to vote for it and my reason is that I'm uncomfortable that every time a developer comes into town, they purchase property, they know what the code is [and] they purchase it based on the code, then they're buying the property and they're in planning and zoning wanting text amendments or changes in the code or variances," she said.

"I just feel that Berlin is expanding, we're going outside of our greenbelt, we're going outside of our town borders and that it's important that we keep the care and integrity of our small-town environment," Hall continued. "I don't want us, in 10 years, to look back and say, 'my goodness, what have we done?' Once you do these things, you can't go back."

Delmarva Health Pavilion to open in Ocean Pines

(Oct. 22, 2015) More than a year after the initial groundbreaking, the new Delmarva Health Pavilion Ocean Pines was set to open Wednesday on Racetrack Road near the North Gate.

Construction firm Gillis Gilkerson first put shovels in the grounds of the new complex, which includes the 20,000-square-foot Building One anchored by Peninsula Regional Medical Center, in September of last year.

"We are really, really pleased to bring to this community a regional health care facility that's looked upon in this area as a high-profile, excellent deliverer of health care and bring it directly to this community of Ocean Pines," developer Palmer Gillis said during the ground-breaking ceremony on Sept. 25, 2014.

Gillis said he began eying the property more than 10 years ago but went on to co-develop complexes in Woodbrook and Millsboro, Del. with PRMC.

Speaking on behalf of the Salisbury-based nonprofit hospital, PRMC President and CEO Dr. Peggy Naleppa called the developer a "longterm partner."

Said she the complex consolidates Berlin and Ocean Pines practices into

This will certainly honor that request," she said during the initial groundbreaking. Along with family practices, PRMC will provide cardiovascular and pulmonary rehabilitation and adult fitness from its Guerrieri Heart & Vascular Institute team.

Visitors will also be able to fill prescriptions and pick up over-thecounter medicines at PRMC Home Scripts, a full-service community pharmacy that includes a drivethrough window and home delivery services. The Junior Auxiliary Board Pines Café, similar to the Junior Board's Café at PRMC, will feature snacks, refreshments, gifts and sandwiches.

In addition to Building One, Gillis Gilkerson has plans for four more buildings at the Delmarva Health Pavilion.

"As medical center builders and developers, we have constructed over one million square feet of medical facilities on Delmarva and we've enjoyed a strong working relationship with PRMC for over 20 years," Gillis said in a recent press release.

"The Delmarva Health Pavilion Ocean Pines provides convenient healthcare access for Ocean Pines, Berlin and Ocean City residents as well as all of Worcester County."

Berlin to dedicate Dr. Henry memorial, open 'Free' library

(Oct. 22, 2015) The Berlin Parks Commission will host a pair of openings at Dr. William Henry Park on Flower Street on Saturday, as the town unveils its new memorial to the park's namesake, as well as a Little Free Library geared at elementary schoolaged children.

The two-pronged event will begin at 11 a.m. with the dedication of the Dr. William Henry memorial.

"The parks commission has sought more information about Dr. Henry for several years in hopes of erecting a monument so that everyone using the park can learn about him," Mary Bohlen, administrative services director and liaison to the parks commission, said in a press release last week.

"Dr. Henry filled a number of roles in the Maryland education system, most importantly as the first African-American superintendent of schools. We're very proud to finally be able to share his story."

The NAACP will have a speaker on hand to formally dedicate the monument. Immediately following will be the ribbon cutting to the Little Free Library, which is the brainchild of 7-yearold Berlin resident Emily Zollinger.

Zollinger spotted a similar Little Free Library at Ben's Red Swings in Salisbury and received approval from the Town Council last month to create her own version at Henry Park.

Wisconsin resident Todd Bol invented the mailbox-sized structures in 2009, when he built a small model of a one-room schoolhouse as a tribute to his late mother. Bol placed the model on his lawn, filled it with books and hung a sign that simply read "free."

Six years later, the boxes have become a national phenomenon, inviting people to use the honor system and "take a book/leave a book."

Zollinger said she wanted to create the Little Free Library in Henry Park because, "the kids there don't have as much access to the library."

During a council meeting on Sept. 14 her mother, Rose, quipped, "She's pretty much the only kid who goes to a playground and finds a library."

During the event last Thursday, the chamber honored Business of the Year Ayers Creek Adventure, Citizens of the Year Bob and Kelli Beck, from DeNovo's Trattoria, and Nonprofit of the Year Diakonia.

Chamber Executive Director Ginger Fleming thanked staff and volunteers during her opening remarks.

"We've had some really successful events and we're very happy to have that community involvement," she said.

Diakonia was the first to receive its award and Fleming said the West Ocean City nonprofit has been a staple of the community for more than 40 years. "They don't only give us emer-

"They don't only give us emergency and transitional housing ... but they give food and counseling and assistance. That organization is just vital," she said.

Diakonia Executive Director Claudia Nagle called the award an "honor and a privilege," and said the chamber helped make the connection between the business and nonprofit communities.

First Shore Craft Beer fest, Saturday in OC

(Oct. 22, 2015) Ocean City's first all-local beer festival bows this Saturday in Sunset Park on South Division Street and the bay.

The Shore Craft Beer Festival, which will take place from 12:30-4:30 p.m., will feature 11 local breweries pouring unlimited samples, along with live music, food, beer merchandise and, for the first time, beer to go.

Organizer Ann Hillyer from Shore-

CraftBeer.com said the event would "have a lot of firsts" for the area, including having multiple food trucks during the event.

"Rosenfeld's Jewish Deli is going to be there, so that's an Ocean City [restaurant] that has a food truck now, and Big Al's is going to be there," she said. "That'll be the first time that's happening."

Hillyer said the beer-to-go portion of the festival adds another twist and would include canned and bottled beer, as well as a tap truck to fill growlers.

"The breweries will be selling growlers at their tables, but the growler fills will be as you enter and exit," she said, adding that guests can also bring their own growlers.

"Just bring clean ones – no moldy growlers," she said. "We've got a bunch of great brewers who don't like to pour their beers in nasty growlers. We don't want people to think our beer is bad." The event is also unusual, according to Hillyer, because representatives from each brewery, rather than volunteers, will be pouring the samples.

"The actual brewers are going to be there, so it's not some hired volunteer that's going to pour the beer," she said. "You can actually talk and ask questions and they'll know the answers."

Each brewery will bring at least See ELEVEN Page 14

two beers to the event. Evolution Craft Brewing Co., from

Salisbury, and Berlin's Burley Oak Brewing Company will both bring double IPAs.

From Ocean City, Assawoman Bay Brewing Co. will bring its award-winning Transporter, Backshore Brewing Co. will pour the Chocolate Pumpkin Ale, and OC Brewing Co. will offer its Nuckin' Futs honey brown ale. Fin City did not announce its beer lineup in advance.

Delaware-based Mispillion River Brewing will bring the Holy Crap imperial red and 3rd Wave, also from the first state, will offer the Big Reef porter.

Market Street Public House, from Denton, will pour its Chicken Necker Stout, and Tall Tales Brewing Company, from Parsonsburg, will bring the Backdraft amber ale.

Crisfield's Chesapeake Brewing Company did not announce beers in advance.

Beer supply store Xtreme Brewing will bring a breakfast porter and a harvest ale made during a collaborative ShoreCraftBeer.com demonstration in September, as well as a coffee saison collaboration with the Point Coffee House in Rehoboth Beach and a Bloody IPA made with the Salisbury Roller Girls.

"Eastern Shore Beer" author Tony Russo will present a talk during the event and the Nate Clendenen Duo will play live on the bay-front stage throughout the festival.

Burley Oak Brewmaster Bryan Brushmiller said the concept of beer festivals is becoming exclusive to the craft beer circuit and that the events help brewers gain exposure.

"You don't really see people showing up and getting samples and talking about and discussing the taste of macrobreweries [the way] that you do with handcrafted beer," he said. "That's really what sets our industry apart from the macrobeers – they're not really drinking it for taste, they're just drinking it for alcohol.

"People are actually going and getting a two-ounce sample [of craft beer] just for taste," he added. "That's really a statement for the whole craft beer industry."

Brushmiller said he also planned to bring several sour beers to the event, a variety that is increasing gaining popularity in the craft beer world.

"We kind of came up to the market [with sour beer] before it was popular just because we were from Berlin, so we decided to make a Berliner Weisse," he said. "Now we've been doing it for three years and we're starting to get well known for our sours."

Hillyer said craft beer is a useful tool in the tourism industry, and hopes the festival cements that perception in the resort.

"We want everyone to know that Ocean City is a great destination for craft beer," she said. "There's a huge variety in the local craft beer and this area is making some world-class beer.

"For me, it's the start of making Ocean City and the shore a real craft beer destination," she added. "We've got five hotels that have put packages together for this event. That's really exciting – they're selling packages for people to come to the festival and come to Ocean City and enjoy all the other things Ocean City has to offer. We want to be the newest and hottest craft beer destination."

Advance general admission tickets are \$25, or \$35 at the door. VIP tickets are \$40 (limited to 100), and designated driver passes are \$10.

(July 30, 2015) Biting into a fresh slice of pizza from Pizza-merica, a new shop in Ocean Pines, the flavors of homemade dough, molten mozzarella cheese and fresh-crushed tomatoes seasoned with garlic, oregano, sugar, salt and black and red pepper are immediately apparent.

Owner George Domostoy said those are the flavors of his childhood, first introduced to him by his mother during his upbringing in Uruguay. "There's a lot of European

and especially Italian people where I come from," he said. "When I was little, my mother always used to make pizza, in real ovens, and she taught me. The sauce and the crust come from

her." Formerly Juliet's, Domostoy took over the restaurant three months ago, calling it Pizzamer-ica in honor of his more than four decades, and extensive travels, in the United States.

Domostoy came to the country with his family in 1980, moving around often and working in restaurants in Houston, Annapolis and eventually Harrisonburg, where he owned and operated his

own restaurant for 11 years. He said he became enamored with the Ocean Pines area while visiting a friend in Salisbury.

"I came and visited, and I came to Assateague and Ocean City and it was just beautiful," he said. "I grew up next to a huge river that separated Uruguay from Argentina. Coming here, I just fell in love with the area. I live in South Point and I love As-sateague, so I just live four minutes from the beach." Pizzas at Pizzamerica are

cooked in a brick oven, lending authenticity to the New Yorkstyle food touted on the cover of the restaurant's menu.

"Conveyors are not bad, but it's just not the same," Domostoy said

Along with the food, the low prices at Pizzamerica stand out, including an 18-inch cheese pizza

"We're going to keep it that way," Domostoy said. "We try to keep our prices lower because volume is what counts. Why sell 10 pizzas for \$20 when you can sell 100 pizzas for \$13.99?

Small and medium sizes are also available, 12 and 14 inches, respectively, as well as pepperoni and cheese by the slice. Toppings,

including four kinds of cheese, eight meats, 12 vegetables and seven specialties ranging from fresh basil to anchovies, are \$1.25 for a small pizza, \$1.50 for a medium and \$2 for a large.

The restaurant also sells calzones, strombolis, fresh pasta, gyros, club sandwiches and hot and cold subs.

In keeping with the spirit of using his mother's original recipes, Domostoy said Pizzamerica is largely a family affair, with his wife, Marina, and his brother-in-law both working with him in "We have our moments, but

we get along pretty good," Do-mostoy said. "The response overall has been good and it's picking up. We're very happy with the community. No complaints!"

Although the dining room currently seats about a dozen people, Domostoy would like to expand to a larger location in the future.

"We'd love to have a bigger place, either in the same shopping center or somewhere around here," he said. "We'd like to have more of a full service restaurant with all the pastas and veal and steaks. But that's going to take time.

Although the band is based on the other side of the Chesapeake, its members have ties to the town thanks to Economic and Community Development Director Ivy Wells, who said this isn't the last Berlin will be seeing of the five-piece group.

They were so good that they had to do three encores," she said on Monday.

second group, this time called Witz End, and went to Wells for help.

"They didn't really have a place to practice, so I invited them into my house and put them in my basement [in Sykesville], and we had auditions and interviewed drummers and bass players and finally put a band together," she said.

Wells, who booked bands while interning in college, offered to find the new group some local gigs. Not long after, Rabinowtiz got married and left the band. Mark Zlatich replaced him on guitar, but Wells stayed on to represent the band.

They released an album of original music and received airplay on stations such as 98 Rock in Baltimore, but eventually disbanded a few years later.

Tucker continued to play in classic rock cover bands, but said he was disillusioned by the demands of local promoters.

"If you're going to get booked through some of the main booking agencies [in Baltimore] you've got to play the same kind of retreaded music everybody else is doing," he said, singling out songs like Van Morrison's "Brown Eyed Girl" and Foghat's "Slow Ride."

Then, two years ago, he and Zlatich decided to try a fresh approach.

"We got to a point where we no longer cared about [what the agencies wanted] – we just wanted to play," he said. "We went out looking for people that had like minds and interests we had in progressive music."

The band, now called Vintage Hi-Fi, recruited brothers Mike and Dave Shaw on drums and bass, respectively, and added Hal Leiter on keyboards after he responded to an online notice.

"We got together about a year and a half ago and so far it's been great," Tucker said. "Everywhere we've played we've been booked back several times. We've actually been able to start turning things down."

Tucker said he mentioned to Wells that he was putting together a new group, and in August he called her again to tell her the band was finally "ready." Wells floated the idea of playing at Octoberfest, and Tucker said he jumped at the chance.

"I thought it was fantastic and we had a lot of fun," he said of Saturday's performance, adding that the band would love to play another show in Berlin. "All [Wells] has to do is ask."

For her part, Wells said she had no doubt Vintage Hi-Fi would be a good fit for Berlin.

"I knew how talented Bryan was as a vocalist and how talented Mark was as a guitarist," she said. "I knew they were going to be good, so I wanted to introduce Berlin to them. Who doesn't like Pink Floyd and Zeppelin and the Beatles?"

She added, "We will definitely see Vintage Hi-Fi again."

Lack of openness by local pols. unnecessary

There is no government without politics in a democracy and two critical principles of the political process are understanding how and why elected officials make decisions.

Without that information, voters – and the public in general – cannot know whether the people they elected are doing their jobs and working on their behalf and what led them to agree or disagree with the actions government decides to take.

Yet, two of our local governing bodies would prefer that the public see only the polished version of their decision-making.

Ostensibly, the rationale for this approach is to provide the public with an accurate and noncontroversial justification for the conclusions these governing authorities have reached.

As elected office holders who are judged periodically by the voters, however, the real reason they want to avoid giving the public a warts-and-all look at what they do is to insulate themselves from criticism and to obviate the need to defend their decisions.

As reported in the current edition of our Bayside Gazette, five members of the Ocean Pines Association Board of Directors (two were absent) agreed last week that all questions to them from local newspapers must be submitted in writing.

These questions would then be shared with all board members so they would have the opportunity to discuss these inquiries among themselves and develop responses that suit their own purposes.

Theoretically, as their argument goes, this would negate any chance of being misquoted, which rarely happens locally but is a favored defense by those who have said something he or she later regrets.

In Ocean City, meanwhile, our Ocean City Today newspaper has been forced to file dozens of Maryland Public Information Act (PIA) requests in just the last few years for even the most innocuous of documents.

By contrast, no more than one or two were filed in the previous 15 years of covering resort government and its various departments. The most recent filing was in September, when Ocean City Today sought the recreation department's brief and noncontroversial report on special events. That study is reported on this week but only after a month of refusals and failures to answer requests to supply the 8-page document.

It was released last week only after City Solicitor Guy Ayres reiterated the law's requirements to city officials.

The obvious question in both the Ocean City and Ocean Pines instances is why is this lack of openness necessary?

The answer is just as apparent: they both advocate a "father knows best" approach to governance that is devoid of the natural messiness of politics and challenges to their authority.

All this is done under the guise of managing the media, when their real intention is to control and manage the message the public receives for their own political self-preservation. Governing, after all, would be so much easier if only government didn't have to answer to the voters. Ches. Ghost Walks offers haunted tours for Halloween

(Oct. 22, 2015) Chesapeake Ghost Walks, a company out of Somerset County, has scheduled more than 30 ghost tours to run between now and Halloween in 10 towns that span 80 linear miles across the Eastern Shore.

They include guided haunted walks through historic districts of Easton, Cambridge, St. Michaels, Ocean City, Berlin, Princess Anne, Pocomoke, Denton, Snow Hill and Crisfield. There is also a special tour offered only in October – an inside tour of the company owners' haunted Victorian home.

During Halloween week, the company will offer 15 walks covering all 10 towns - 11 of those ghost tours fall on Halloween weekend.

Each ghost walk lasts just under two hours and is personally guided by someone well versed in the local history as well as the paranormal history. Most tours have a nighttime stroll through a graveyard and some include sites like healing trees, elementals (non-human spirits), river walks or walks into a forest.

Collectively, the 10 ghost tours cover more than 120 stories of the haunted Eastern Shore - stories that include Bloody Henny and the LeCompte Curse (Cambridge), The Town Dog Killer (Denton), The Ghost in the Governor's Mansion (Snow Hill), The Haunted Carousel (Ocean City) and The Child Spirit at the Atlantic Hotel (Berlin). All of the walks were written and crafted by company owner and author, Mindie Burgoyne.

"Our home is what inspired me to write about haunted places," Burgoyne said. "When we bought our home in 2002 strange things started to happen. Then the incidents got scary. When the incidents became terrifying we put the house up for sale, and that was only 13 months after moving in."

Though most of the activity has quieted down, the Burgoynes still experience unexplained events from time to time. Living in that house has inspired Burgoyne to write three books and scores of articles on haunted houses and properties.

Today, Chesapeake Ghost Walks delivers more than 200 ghost tours each year to more than 5,000 guests, and the 10 walks comprise the largest cluster of regional heritage walks in America. To date, the haunted tours have been featured in the Washington Post, the Philadelphia Enquirer, The Week Magazine, on National Public Radio and by scores of local media outlets.

The haunted tours are year-round and include ghost walks, bus tours and storytelling events in partnership with local businesses such as the Life-Saving Station Museum and the Dunes Manor Hotel in Ocean City, the Atlantic Hotel in Berlin and Robert Morris Inn in Oxford.

When asked what the scariest tour is, Burgoyne said, "The scariest is probably Pocomoke because that takes guests into a forest that has a haunted legacy spanning a hundred years. Cambridge has the most haunted street in Maryland, with 14 haunted stories in two blocks. Snow Hill has the most haunted inns and mansions as well as the only haunted site on Maryland's Eastern Shore featured by a national cable network - The Snow Hill Inn. Berlin has its walking dead and some super strange energy forces. Princess Anne is the most disturbing covering two brutal murders with content so harsh that we don't allow children on that walk. All of the walks are scary in their own way."

More information on the ghost tours is posted on the Chesapeake Ghost Walks website, chesapeakeghostwalks.com, where there is a calendar of events, a full page describing each ghost tour and 35 ghost stories about haunted sites featured on the tours.

The company also has a YouTube channel where Burgoyne tells some of the stories in a "Haunted Minutes" series.

No-guilt napoleon perfect for cal. counters

With Halloween just around the corner, we can't help but to be bombarded by themed specials on tele-



vision, and of course the ubiquitous "Harry Potter" franchise. As would luck have it, my kids have outgrown the series for the most part, so while we might sit down and watch one or two movies,

we can walk away without the twitching that is so prevalent in many Potter addicts the world over.

As I've touched on many times before this is our favorite time of year as it ushers in, with Halloween programming, the beautiful colors of autumn and the brisk chill in the air. But it also brings us closer to an important part of the year for most people – the holidays. And with that season comes the increased eating, as well as the lack of caloric inhibitions.

Oh, to be 20 again. We just don't recover like we used to. I remember being a kid who was skinny as a rail, eating my body weight in food and equaling that in the volume of beer, never gaining an ounce. Now if I even pretended to touch some of my personal records set in the halcyon days, I would all but blow up. Moderation has become my friend, and I have to admit that at the moment I'm ashamed of the company I keep.

So, what can we do to at least cut back on some calories in the upcoming months? I'm certainly not about to increase my exercise to the point of counteracting the increase of caloric intake, and I am not about to cut sweets out of the equation. That would be absurd.

Instead, I'll work towards introducing some simple desserts that we make in the program, and this one is no exception. I know it doesn't resemble a true napoleon, but it is delicious (enough) to satisfy the taste buds of our guests in a pinch and we will be able calorie count if needed; that's not my thing but I know that some people really need to keep track. And while there is sugar in this recipe, the goal is not to give you a pile of sawdust, but rather to decrease the amount that can be found in a big chunk of chocolate cake or pumpkin cheesecake. Baby steps, my good people. Baby steps.



No-guilt berry napoleon

Serves 6

18 Almond crisps (recipe follows) 1 pint Raspberries

1 pint blackberries

1 quart Strawberries

Ricotta Cream (recipe follows)

Strawberry coulis (recipe follows) Mint and basil as garnish

1. When everything is prepped and ready, place your ricotta cream in a pastry bag with a star tip

2, Pipe a small amount on the plate as "glue," as we call it in the business

3. Place a crisp on top, and pipe a ring of cream on it about 1/2 inch away from the edge

4. Line with berries of your choice 5. Place a crisp on top and repeat the process, finishing with a crisp, a small rosette of ricotta cream and a garnish of chiffonade mint and/or basil leaves

6. Drizzle some coulis on the plate and you are ready to go!

Almond Crisps

1/2 cup Pastry flour (King Arthur)1/2 cup Confectioner's sugarPinch of salt3 each Large egg whites4 Tbsp. butter, melted

1 Tbsp. almond paste

1/2 cup Almonds, toasted and pulverized

1. With the convection turned off if you have it, preheat the oven to 350F 2. Combine the dry ingredients

and add the egg whites, butter, almond paste and pulverized almonds while whisking to combine thoroughly

3. Allow the batter to rest, covered, on the counter for about an hour

4. Here, you can go one of two ways. You can either go freeform and work your batter into five-inch circles on parchment, or you can put one big, rectangular layer on the parchment and then cut out circles when the cookies come out of the oven

5. Place in the oven and cook for about six minutes, or until they are golden

6. Remove and allow cooling for about 30 seconds, but here you must act quickly. If you are cutting them out, you must do so before they cool and become crispy. Otherwise, remove and allow to cool until ready to use

Ricotta Cream

Makes a little over a quart 2 cups lowfat ricotta cheese 3 cups nonfat whipped topping 1/4 tsp. Ground cinnamon Seeds from 1/2 vanilla bean

1. I know, I know. Really? Whipped topping? It's not my favorite either, but it can help to cut the calories if you are counting them. If you're not, then make a good whipped cream and fold that in instead

2. Back to the recipe, Place the ricotta in a good blender and blend until perfectly smooth

3. Add everything except the whipped topping, and blend well, removing to a large bowl

4. Fold in the whipped topping and adjust for taste

Strawberry Coulis

Makes about a pint

1 pint Strawberries (from the quart above)

1/2 cup Sugar, or as needed

1. Hull the strawberries and place

in a good blender such as a Vitamix 2. Add the sugar and puree until

perfectly smooth. If there are still seeds, I recommend that you strain them out

3. Chill until ready to serve
