# **Berlin Coffee House closing** as owner decides to retire

Peggy Hagy opened shop in 2009 with assistance from Fagers and her son, Jason

(Oct. 27, 2016) After seven years of running what was, for many in Berlin, the coffee shop where "everybody knows your name," 68year-old Peggy Hagy is retiring at the end of this year.

When it opened in 2009, the Berlin Coffee House on 17 Jefferson Street filled a major void in a town that had yet to be properly caffeinated.

Hagy, who operated the shop with her son, Jason, aimed to remedy that. A Baltimore native, Hagy and her family moved to the area in the early 1980's. At the time, she was working as a graphic arts direc-

Her road to becoming a respected barista and businesswoman was nontraditional, to say the least.

'When Gannett was buying up all the papers in town, I was working for The Independent and I thought, 'this is getting nuts,'" she said. "So I quit. And I ended up working for Kate Patton when she had the Globe in 2000. I'd never done food service and it was a ton of fun - I totally enjoyed myself."

She became the kitchen manager there, and her duties included ordering and making coffee.

When she sold [the Globe] in 05, I decided to retire," Hagy said. "My husband had a car accident and was killed, and I thought I would just retire and stay home.

Then, in 2008, "things fell apart" economically and Jason's business began to suffer, Hagy said.

# **Facing lawsuit, OPA** buys new golf cart fleet for \$319,936

Executive recruiting firm considered to fill vacancies

(Oct. 27, 2016) Funding for new golf carts and roof repairs at the Ocean Pines Golf & Country Club, as well as possibly retaining an executive recruiting firm to hire a general manager and financial controller were voted on at the Ocean Pines Association meeting on Saturday at the Ocean Pines Community Center.

The board voted 6-1, with Director Cheryl Jacobs dissenting, to spend more than \$300,000 to purchase a fleet of 2017 Yamaha golf

Interim General Manager Brett Hill said the issue became especially relevant after Yamaha filed suit against the OPA several weeks ago based on a debt of more than \$100,000 incurred in May without board approval.

"On May 18, Pat Renaud signed a lease with Yamaha financial systems for 28 golf carts from another course," he said. "I didn't see anywhere an approval from the board for such a filing of debt."

Hill presented the board with two options to remedy the situation.

"The board can approve to maintain this lease and keep the debt on their books," he said. "We can pay Yamaha \$103,600 for these used carts and keep them, which would leave us with a mixed fleet.'

In lieu of that scenario, Hill said Yamaha would take back the 28 golf carts negotiated by Renaud if the entire fleet is replaced.

"Which would be 76 new carts going on to the fleet," he said. "That was originally included in the budget but was removed for this year."

The board mulled its options to either pay \$103,600 for the 28 electric golf carts Renaud leased or spend \$319,936 for 76 new gas-powered carts, contingent on trading in 55 electric carts currently in use.

Based on higher maintenance costs for electric golf carts, Hill rec-See RECRUITER Page 10

# Tour highlights improved storefronts

(Oct. 27, 2016) Berlin helped kick off Community Development Week last Thursday, welcoming representatives from the Community Development Network of Maryland (CDNM) and touring several businesses that had recently used façade grants to improve their storefronts.

CDNM Executive Director Odette Ramos, speaking outside the Berlin Visitor's Center, described her group as "a statewide nonprofit organization with over 180 members ... that work in areas of affordable housing, neighborhood revitalization, small business development and family stability housing counseling."

Ramos joked that one of her tasks was to "stalk our delegates and senators in Annapolis" to ask for funding and support. The façade grants total about \$6 million each year in Maryland and come through the Department of Housing and Community Development.

Berlin has received \$50,000 each year during the last few years.

Ramos said Community Development Week was created to "highlight the impact that various projects around the state have in Maryland." A statewide tour of such areas started in Baltimore, and would include southern Maryland, Hagerstown and Anne Arundel County.

Ivy Wells, a board member at CDNM and the economic and community development director in Berlin, said many businesses in Berlin had used façade grants, including Gilbert's Provisions, Jeffrey Auxer Designs and the Church Mouse Thrift Shop. The Berlin Visitor's Center also received a grant to make improvements to the front window.

The matching grants can be as little

as \$500 or as much as \$10,000, she said.

Worcester County Economic Development Director Merry Mears said she recently used Berlin as an example of exemplary development of small businesses during a Maryland Municipal League meeting.

"I talked a lot about what Berlin has done over the years to really focus on developing businesses, communicating with businesses, working with businesses hand in hand to revitalize Main Street, and to bring people to your community to benefit tourism, and just raising businesses up to be what they can be," she said.

Mears said Berlin had just renewed its enterprise zone designation, and that businesses in those areas could take advantage of certain tax incentives.

"We're interested in working with See GRANTS Page 5

# Vacant building registry working

Town passed ordinance in July requiring owners to register empty properties

(Oct. 27, 2016) The most recent evidence of the effectiveness of the vacant building ordinance the Town of Snow Hill passed in July, can be seen in the identification of at least 63 structures, some of which have been registered or are awaiting response from their owners, according to Town Manager Kelly

Letters were sent to the property owners in mid-July, Pruitt said, giving the recipients 30 days to register or provide the town with a plan for the prop-

"We were happy to have 37 people

respond and were able to identify 15 properties as occupied or under construction, such as the downtown storefronts," Pruitt said. "There were 26 properties where we did not receive a response.'

The process is underway to contact those remaining owners and give them final notice to comply with the new rule.

Considering that this is a newly adopted ordinance, we have been trying to be patient with the process but will now take a stronger approach with enforcement," she said. "Unfortunately, if they do not respond to the second notice, we will have to proceed with assessing fines.

Properties determined by the town to be vacant or blighted can be cited and fined \$100 after 30 days. Appeals may be filed within 30 days of the initial report to the Housing Review Board. The

code requires the appeal hearing to take place within 10 days from the application for appeal.

Whether properties are vacant and secured, vacant and unsecured or vacant and boarded, registration is required under the ordinance.

"Part of the process is meeting with property owners after they submit their plan of action. We have met with two owners so far and are requesting meetings with two more for next week," Pruitt said.

Whether buildings can be deemed vacant is left up to the discretion of the town's code officer, and there are several provisions in the code defining how that determination is made.

Under the guidelines, a property must be habitually vacant for more than 90 days, attract an inordinate

# **United States to** join case against city, county, state

Sewell, Green, Savage suit supported by Justice Dept.

(Oct. 27, 2016) The failure of state and local officials to attend a reconciliation meeting after the Equal Employ-Opportunity Commission determined reasonable cause existed that those officials engaged in unlawful employment practices resulted in an amended complaint by the plaintiffs Kelvin Sewell, Lynell Green and Franklin Savage alleging Title VII violations, which ultimately attracted the attention of the Department of Justice.

Late last week, documents were made public that revealed the DOJ filed a motion to intervene in the case, since the consequences of the litigation could affect the rights of others not party to the case. A judge has not yet ruled on


Since the EEOC-requested meeting did not occur, according to court documents, lawyers for former police chief Kelvin Sewell, Lynell Green and Franklin Savage have since amended their initial complaint to include Title VII violations, which bars employers from discriminating against employees for many reasons, including ethnicity.

This amended complaint had the side effect of reviving the charges against State's Attorney Beau Oglesby, which had been dismissed by a judge on the grounds of prosecutorial immunity, pursuant to a Supreme Court ruling 40 years ago. In essence, the court found state prosecutors working within the scope of their duties to be absolutely immune from civil liability.

Oglesby has again filed papers requesting these charges be dismissed.

"Federal law protects against discrimination and retaliation in the workplace," Principal Deputy Assistant Attorney General Vanita Gupta, head of the Justice Department's Civil Rights Division, said in a release last week. "In police departments, that protection is vital not only for individual officials, but also for the communities they serve. The Justice Department is firmly committed to ensuring that our nation's

you one-on-one to take advantage of that next tax season," she said.

Rick Stack from Design Resources said façade grants could be used for everything from insulation and energy efficiency improvements to simple repairs and painting. Signs, windows, new roofs and improvements related to the American with Disabilities Act are also permitted.

"It's not an intimidating process," he said. "The application is actually online under the economic and community development section in the [CDNM] website ... we wish that maybe more and more businesses would take advantage of it, not only for the town, but for themselves also.3

Del. Charles Otto spoke on the importance of preservation, and Del. Mary Beth Carozza said the grants were an example of how partnerships between government and the private sector "were supposed to work.

I'm a delegate here, but ... I'm on the House Appropriations Committee," she said. "I wear that hat where I'm held accountable on how we are spending our taxpayer dollars, so ... I can look right here on the shore in Berlin, in Ocean City, and I can say this is how we've used the façade money.

'These aren't huge amounts of

money, but these projects, these grants, allow these types of improvements on our Main Streets, in our downtown, and it's a tremendous economic boost. It's also a boost for tourism as well," she added.

Toby Gilbert, owner of Gilbert's Provisions, said the grants helped him transform what was essentially a storage unit into a vibrant storefront.

The inside was falling down ... we had to put a new roof on and a new ceiling, he said. "And apart from that we needed good doors, we needed awnings, we needed signage, we needed a lot of new paint.

"Without the façade grant, there would have been no way," he added. "It's a small thing that brightens up a part of neighborhood."

Jeffery Auxer used grant money to help build a second story on his building, while Helen Wiley said the Church Mouse added a screen door.

"Ivy had explained about the program, so I did everything you're supposed to do [and] got approval by the historical committee," she said. "It really benefits the store to keep it looking good with the town and keep that historical feel, and then we don't have to have the air conditioning on."

'It was very easy to do, and I'm very grateful," she added.

# **Berlin schedules residential** fall bulk trash pickup in Nov.

(Oct. 27, 2016) The Town of Berlin's residential fall bulk trash pickup is scheduled for Nov. 16 and 30.

The bulk pick up dates are based on residential garbage service.

"If your normal trash day is a Tuesday or a Wednesday, your bulk pick up day is Wednesday, Nov. 16th. If your normal trash day is a Thursday, your bulk pick up day will be Wednesday, Nov. 30," said Town Administrator Laura Allen.

Residents should follow the guidelines listed below:

DO: Include items such as furniture;

toilets and sinks; carpet; mattresses; tables and chairs; refrigerators; washer and dryers; small appliances; televisions; microwaves; and computer compo-

Small items must be placed in a container at the curb, the total weight of the container cannot exceed 100 pounds.

DO NOT: Include such items as: hazardous waste; construction materials; paint; yard waste/brush; propane tanks; tires; chemicals; or insecticides.

Fall yard waste collection will be Dec. 7 and 14.



# Coffee, bagels, ice cream trifecta of success at BCH

■ BERLIN COFFEE HOUSE continued in and have a cup of coffee.' People always feel obligated to buy a meal," Hagy said.

She called Patton, who gave her the idea to talk to John and Michelle Fager.

The Fagers had recently taken over operations at the Atlantic Hotel. Would they also take over the small, vacant building behind it?

"They said 'Sure, sounds great'. Start a coffee house. That's actually how it happened," Hagy said. "There really was a hole in town at the time – there was no place to get just coffee, or to get a good espresso."

Berlin Coffee House opened on April Fool's Day, 2009. Hagy said she took about 10 percent of what she learned from working at the Globe, and the rest came "by the seat of [her] pants."

"When we decided to open, I said the one thing we needed to do was find fresh, roasted coffee beans," Hagy said. "We went up and down the shore, Jason and I. We drove around all of March and we ended up in Lewes, Delaware."

There, they discovered Notting Hill Coffee at the Lewes Bakery, run by Amy Faulker.

"She's a genius when it comes to coffee beans," Hagy said. "She roasts right there, so we saw the fresh beans and every time we went up there she always had something new to tell us about. Jason would come with tons of questions every time he would go up and pick up beans, and she would show us more stuff on the espresso machine than even I knew. That was a biggie."

Seven years later, the shop still buys its flavored beans from Notting Hill.

"Nobody can match Amy," Hagy said. "That was really our beginning, and actually we won the first two awards from Maryland Life based on Amy's beans."

Berlin Coffee House also features local ice cream from Chesapeake Bay Farms in Berlin, which Hagy called a "godsend," as well as bagels from A Bagel And in Ocean Pines, which are picked up fresh each morning.

"That's my holy trinity," Hagy said. "We couldn't do without any of them."

She described the ambiance at the shop as "eclectic, but comfortable," usually low-lit with strings of Christmas lights hung in the rafters, overhead. The walls are adorned with some of Hagy's original watercolor paintings and colored pencil drawings, a handful of tables and chairs are scattered to the left of the front counter, and two large bookshelves fill out the modest space, one of which features items from other shops based in Maryland.

The coffee house just predates the

great Berlin "boom," when the formerly economically depressed town suddenly grabbed national attention as it was officially deemed "cool." Hagy remembers former Berlin Economic and Community Development Director Michael Day pitching the idea of entering a nationwide contest that would cast a spotlight on a single small town.

What made it all work, she said, was how well all the business owners worked together, going so far as to feed each other customers.

"Robin at Baked Desserts and Heather at Bungalow Love and Jen at the Globe – we had always helped each other," Hagy said. "Robin has a smaller area for seating and people would want an espresso, so you would get your desserts and come over here. I still send people over there.

"We all worked with each other — everybody did that — and I think that's what visitors to the town always saw, was the fact that we were so open to sharing our customers," Hagy said. "I think that's what did it — it had to come from the business owners. There's nothing that a local government could have done. The visitors had to like it in order to vote for it."

Some of that magic, Hagy said, had been lost.

"Things have changed since then," she said. "We were all so individual back then."

Jason offered a pair of theories.

"I think the main thing, in the beginning, was that all the businesses were run by the owners," Jason said. "When the customers came in, they actually met the owner of the shop, which gave them more of an intimate feeling. And every single store was so individual and different that you could spend the whole day finding new things.

"I think having shops come in and selling the same thing that a store down the street is selling really hurts the town," he added. "If you have three shops selling the same exact stuff – whether it's retail or food – you're not going to have the same cool, all-day adventure where you don't know what you're going to see in the next store. I think it's going to be very hard to get that back."

During her second retirement, Hagy said she would spend more time making art, perhaps do a little design work on a freelance basis, and volunteer around the town whenever she could. She has already offered her services at the new Berlin library, which could start construction next year.

"I told them, whatever you all do I want to be a part of it," she said. "Not as an employee, but I'd like to help with all the fundraisers and stuff. That's going to be really cool."

She said the decision to close the shop was partially based on frustra-

tion, partly on a down sales year, and partly because Jason was moving on to another business endeavor.

What she'll miss the most, she said, are the people.

"We've had such wonderful people come in here, and I have sent coffee mugs around the world -Shanghai, Germany, Italy," Hagy said. "I sent bags of coffee and two coffee cups with this couple in Finland. They wanted her mother to have some, but she didn't have room in her suitcase, so I sent them.

"It's been grand. It's been an absolute surprise," she added. "I never dreamed that it was going to be as successful as it was. We won the Coastal Style award every single year except one, and that went to the Pemberton Coffee House, who are friends of ours.

"I have groups of people that come here every year," she said. "They come here first, they get their coffee, and then they go off to Assateague, Chincoteague, Ocean City or wherever, but they stop here first. And John's guests from the hotel to see them standing outside my door at 6:15 in their pajamas waiting to get coffee - I'll miss that."

She also said she would miss the relationships she has built with many of the other business owners in town, several of whom got their start in the coffee house, including Atlantic Retreat and Cupcakes in Bloom. Bungalow Love owner Heather Layton and Zenna Wellness Studio owner Chrissy Ehrhart are both former employees.

When people found out we were closing, everybody came in here and it's just been an enormous response that I never expected. People came out of the woodwork," she said.

Hagy laughed when recalling some of the stranger things she's seen while running in the shop, from customers asking, "is your coffee any good?" to watching four-axle tractor trailers, given a bad route by their GPS systems, try and navigate the narrow confines of Jefferson

"It's been a joy. I don't regret any of it really. And I've learned so much business-wise," she said.

"We feel like we're getting to leave on our own terms," Jason said. "We saw an opportunity and we thought it was the best judgment on our own to leave at this point - that's really what it was. And our patrons have been more than gracious."

The shop will stay open until Christmas, and Hagy said she planned to use the following week to

state and local law enforcement agencies comply with Title VII's promise of a workplace free from racial discrimination and retaliation."

Through the case the plaintiffs, and now, potentially, the United States are seeking "all appropriate monetary relief" including back pay and pre-judgment interest to Sewell, Green and Savage, as well as compensatory dam-

In addition, the plaintiffs are seeking to force the defendants to develop and implement policies, procedures and training to prevent similar circumstances from happening again.

The basis of the complaint starts with Franklin Savage, who claims he was subjected to a hostile work environment by the Sheriff's Office, and by extension, the state, while he was assigned to a joint task force. Savage complained

■ VACANT BUILDING continued amount of calls for service as measured by the police department, a fire hazard, have unfinished construction or demolition or creates a reasonable interference with reasonable and lawful use of surrounding properties.

According the rule, the properties of residents on extended vacations or those with alternate living arrangements - wintering in Florida for example — would be exempt. However, a verified emergency contact number for the property owner or responsible party must be on file with the town and the property must be maintained while the owners are away.

about the environment and alleges he was subject to further retaliation by the Sheriff's Office and Pocomoke City, up to and including his termination.

Further, two people who supported his claims, Lynell Green and Kelvin Sewell, allege they faced retaliation themselves for supporting Savage. Green eventually resigned from the PCPD, and Sewell was fired by the city, sparking an outcry and protests.

In July, Green and Sewell were indicted by a grand jury on charges of misconduct in office and conspiracy to commit misconduct in office. A jury trial is scheduled in December.

Both Sewell and Green face charges stemming from the same incident in November 2014. According to the indictment, both are alleged to have "knowingly, willfully, and intentionally, under the color of his office, interfering with the legitimate investigation of a motor vehicle accident by subordinate police officers for the personal benefit of an acquaintance, Correctional Officer Captain Douglas E. Matthews..."

The pair is also accused of conspiring with each other in order to perpetrate the alleged misconduct.

There is no record of the accident within the Maryland Judiciary Case Search database, which provides public access to court records online. However, there are exceptions to what information is made publicly available.

These charges were not brought directly by Oglesby, but by the State Prosecutor Emmet Davitt. The office of the State Prosecutor was established 40 years ago specifically to investigate election law violations, public ethics violations, bribery law violations, official misconduct as well as related perjury, extortion or obstruction of justice claims.

The prosecutor investigates these issues under his own initiative, or via request from the governor, attorney general, General Assembly, the state ethics commission, or a State's Attor-

"My recommendation is accept the offer to turn the carts back in and get out of that lease and execute a capital purchase of \$319,936 with Yamaha Financial for the purchase of 76 new carts," he said. "That would stipulate the return of the carts under that lease and the trade in of our 55 existing electric carts."

Director Dave Stevens said the matter needed to be addressed by the end of the month to avoid further legal action by Yamaha.

"We are under a lease situation which has never been brought to the attention of the board and was signed unilaterally by our past president," he said. "How we ended up in this situation is totally beyond me.

It's a bad situation and I think we need to get out of it."

Director Slobodan Trendic said from his recent research gas-powered carts are coming back into

vogue. "The gas carts maintain their value much better than the electric carts," he said. "The electric carts — the largest component is the battery which lasts on average three to four years. We're at the point

now where were going through a second series of batteries."

He also noted the perceived value in an electric fleet has been a lower decibel level on the greens.

"The electric carts are generally preferred because of the noise, and gas carts have in general been loud with more pollutants," he said. "The fleet that's proposed is a 2017 model

from Yamaha and is the best state-ofthe art-technology for noise levels. It's at the same level as electric."

Jacobs said there was \$300,000 request for golf cart acquisition last year.

"The board as it was constituted at the time decided

that wasn't appropriate," she said. "There were lots of discussions about the golf carts and where that fell in our list of priorities of what we wanted to spend money on."

Hill also said the current lease arrangement does not include a purchase option, limiting the possibility to retaining the electric carts signed for by Renaud.

"We're going to incur interest and we keep this debt filing against us, which is by our practice against the way we operate as an association,' he said.

In other business, the board unanimously approved budgeting funds to complete repairs to the Country Club roof but is still awaiting a third proposal for the project.

"Right now we have two parties declining to bid on the RFP because they didn't feel they had the relevant skill set to bring in the someone for the general manager role," he said. "We need to go further into the resources for recruiting. I would say we are looking at a budget expense, out of the operating fund, it will be greater than \$15,000 and could be \$30,000 potentially for the executive recruiter."

The board voted unanimously to continue the RFP process and will examine future responses as they are received.

# Pay dispute arises in otter exhibit at Discovery Center

(Oct. 27, 2016) The Virginia-based contractor ExPlus, hired to build the Wally Gordon River Otter exhibit that opened to the public in July, has filed suit in Worcester County Circuit Court against the Delmarva Discovery Center, alleging nonpayment of the more than \$178,000 in construction costs

Documents related to the case, and the signed contract for the work was provided by DDC President and CEO Stacey Weisner, because of her personal commitment to transparency, she said.

According to the contract, payments were due on the 30th of each month according to the percentage of work that had been completed by the contractor, with the final payment due within 30 days of completion.

Additionally, work was to begin on April 5 and to be finished by June 24. The amount of the contract was not to exceed \$200,000. The agreement also included provisions for the center to accept a 20 percent markup on plumbing, stainless steel and electrical subcontracts.

The contract was signed by Weisner, board chairwoman Susan Pusey and a representative from ExPlus in April.

ExPlus, in court filings, accused the Delmarva Discovery Center of reneging on the deal.

Weisner said after the first invoice came due after 30 days, she had a meeting when the parties agreed to wait until the project was finished for the center to pay the bill in full.

"The original contract was for \$200,000, and the reduction was because we dealt with one sub-contractor directly instead. Although it did not exceed the amount of the contract, in our opinion, it also does not accurately reflect the work they performed," Weisner said.

Weisner said there were several "large discrepancies" with the work that was done versus the charges on the invoice.

"One specific example is they charged \$21,730 for project management and were only here for four hours," she said.

The center was charged \$4,100 for a kickoff meeting, about \$11,300 for detailing and almost \$104,000 for delivery and installation. The three items that allowed a 20 percent markup came to a total of almost \$35,000. The two remaining itemized entries on the invoice are discounts, one for about \$17,400 listed as "deduction for acrylic" and another for about \$1,500 for "use of Parker's lime/materials."

"We take donors money seriously, and in this case a large part of the money is from the State of Maryland. If we pay them for work they See LAWSUIT Page 12

(Oct. 27, 2016) It was a night of department overviews and updates on projects but mostly it was a night to welcome Zachary Tyndall to the Town Council and to renew the oaths of Mayor Gee Williams and Councilman Elroy Brittingham.

In front of a full house at Town Hall this past Monday night, Williams was sworn in by Worcester Court Clerk Susan Braniecki, who then swore in both Tyndall and Brittingham.

After the ceremony, the three returned to the dais to elect a vice president of the council. Councilman Dean Burrell nominated Brittingham, the incumbent, who was elected by unanimous decision. The new and returning officials then delivered re-

Brittingham, who will mark 32 years on the council at the end of this new term, said he was happy to continue working with a mayor "who almost always shows up" — therefore downplaying his role as a stand-in for Williams if he is absent — to laughs all around.

He thanked the audience and town for their continued support, and promised to follow Williams' lead during his new term as vice president.

"It's a privilege and honor" to serve the property owners, visitors and friends of the Town of Berlin, Williams said, and he committed to keeping Berlin's charm alive while

avoiding the temptation to live in the past.

"Because we live in a small town, not a small world, he said. "We're all human and we all make mistakes, but you can never fix what you never do," he said.

Williams said the town needed to progress, especially in the realm of technology, but would continue to do so in the most cost-effective manner possible.

He said his goal was not to make the town a cutting-edge technological marvel, but to keep pace with ongoing developments.

"The mayor and council will continue to do the right thing in the right way," Williams said.

The council then heard various updates on its operations while

Williams provided thumbnail sketches of the ongoing efforts for the benefit of the unusually large crowd.

Finance director Natalie Saleh said new software should be running by Jan. 8, giving her department new options and increased functionality over the old system.

Tim Lawrence, electric utility director, said the generator damaged by

flooding during the recent storms has been removed and sent for repair. The generator should be back in operation in about a month, he said, and operations shouldn't be affected by its absence.

Economic and Community Development Director Ivy Wells reported she had "an abundance" of façade grant funding available and those interested are invited to apply. She also said the Christmas parade is now full with 80 entries, and Fin's Ale House and Raw Bar is currently in the "soft opening" phase and invited residents to check it out.

The only action the council took was at the end of the night when it approved, in a motion by Tyndall as his first act as a councilman, the installation of professional-grade lights on the town's tennis courts at a cost of about \$92,000. The cost is set to increase by three percent at the end of the year, Lawrence said, and the equipment will be stored until the courts are refurbished.

Councilman Burrell said he recalled a similar discussion regarding some local basketball courts that ended up budgeted in the past but faltered due to a lock of community support. He asked that the council take another look at installing lights on those courts as well, to which the rest of the council assented.


have not done, we are not being good stewards of those funds. We are hopeful to settle this out of court," Weisner said.

During the 2016 session, the state awarded the Delmarva Discovery Center an amount not to exceed \$200,000 for capital improvements.

ExPlus is seeking the amount of the invoice, plus interest, attorney's fees and any other relief the judge sees fit to grant. Also, it is requesting the court establish a trust for the benefit of the plaintiff in the amount it may have been unjustly enriched via the work completed by the plaintiff.

"We owe ExPlus and want to pay them, and we have met with them and thought we could work it out," Weisner said. However, in the complaint ExPlus's lawyer, Bruce Mann, said the center has been unresponsive to requests for contact to this point.

No trial date has been set.

# Pocomoke gets partial water, sewer maps from consultant

Too early to begin testing, but progress made toward solution for ongoing issues

(Oct. 27, 2016) While there are no models or tests that can be run on the Pocomoke City water and sewer systems that might determine the cause of foul-smelling and sediment-laden tap water, particularly in the Pocomoke Heights area, the data collection phase of the project is almost complete.

The mayor and City Council heard a report on the progress from Scott Getchell of Salisbury-based GMB architects/engineers, who are performing the mapping operation for the town.

One of the problems in determining the cause of the problem is that the town records were incomplete, and even when the data were complete, it was often spread out over multiple areas.

Earlier this year when the council approved a study to ferret out the cause of the water problems, the first step was to produce complete maps of the existing water and sewer sys-

The city's first complete water system map is finished, but the sewer map isn't.

City Manager/City Attorney Ernie Crofoot has said previously the sediment, though unidentified, isn't ferrous material.

Getchell said there were many issues in collecting all of the data, and operationally, all avenues to fill in the gaps have been exhausted.

"It's time we got scientific about it," he said.

The water map is undergoing conversion to a digital model, where scenarios and tests can be performed to see how the system operates under certain conditions.

The sewer map has not yet reached that point, as more data is collected from disparate sources.

Though hesitant to speculate on the cause of the contamination until all the data are collected and tests could be run, Getchell, under pressure from Mayor Bruce Morrison, did say the conditions, as they were described to him, hinted at a circulation problem within the sys-

Getchell said the complete model should be ready by the end of the vear.



### **OPA General Manager Briefs**

(Oct. 27, 2016) Updates on numerous projects were reviewed by Ocean Pines Association interim General Manager Brett Hill at the board of directors meeting last Saturday.

### **Yacht Club**

Furniture on the first floor of the Ocean Pines Yacht Club has been rearranged, Hill said, allowing for the addition of seating space at the bar. Also more televisions have been installed at the second floor bar and first floor lounge area.

Hill also highlighted a new partnership aimed at upgrading entertainment options at the yacht club.

"We signed a contract with Buzztime trivia and those devices are going to be installed hopefully next week," he said. "We'll be hosting trivia during all operating hours on the Buzztime national network."

He said the new system also provides gaming options to help entertain youngsters and older children.

"The DJ that normally moderates the trivia night will still be there but it will be moved on to the Buzztime live system," he said.

He also noted with the revamped seating arrangement happy hour specials will be available throughout the facility and not exclusively at the bar area. For example, a new offering for Monday Night Football, which includes a pitcher of beer and 10 wings for \$5, has been quite popular, Hill said.

### **Positions added**

Hill said the board has taken steps to address more than 200 open work orders sitting with public works by authorizing additional positions.

"Those jobs have been posted and we're looking to fill them as quickly as possible," he said.

After the board reviewed the capabilities of the current public works staff in multiple closed sessions, Hill said the decision was reached to hire four additional people for public works and one employee for the facilities department.

### **Projects updates**

The wooden roof covering the White Horse Park bathrooms is about to be upgraded with a new metal roof, which Hill said would be fabricated next week.

"We are still on task for that building to be completed by Dec. 1," he said. "It will be a nice change from the 40-year-old bathrooms we've been using outside in the middle of the parking lot."

Work to replace the sports field at

Huntington Park is on target Hill said.

"While we're late in the season for new grass to be growing for any sports for this year, we will have a nice field in place for the spring," he said.

Despite recent weather delays, Hill said a pickleball conversion project is still on track to wind up by the end of the month.

"The fence company is due in at the beginning of the week," he said. "Hopefully, we'll still have a little warm weather and we can play pickleball before it gets too cold this year."

Although there has been a twoweek delay in starting repairs for the bridge at the golf course, Hill said work is still on target.

"They are about two weeks behind, but the actual work cycle, now that we're in the cycle, is on track," he said.

### **Beach Club bathrooms**

Since assuming his position as interim general manager, Hill said extensive time has been invested analyzing potential upgrades to the Beach Club bathrooms. He also reported this week an initial draft of the proposed scope of work was received and is being reviewed.

"We reviewed that scope with both

the federal, state and Ocean City guidelines for permits and we found there were some areas that needed more attention in the initial draft," he said. "We had some compliance issues that we felt we were a fine line whether or not we had to accept the ADA (American With Disabilities Act) compliance or we could stay in place, since we're really just doing more of a facelift remodel."

After looking closer at the options Hill recommended to "Err on the side of caution," by bringing the bathrooms into current ADA compliance.

The updated scope of work proposal should be completed this week with a request for proposal released in November, Hill said. The project is slated to begin in January and take about three months to complete, he added.

### **Golf clubhouse**

Cleanup issues continue to be addressed outside the golf clubhouse, Hill said.

"We're beginning further repairs to bring the clubhouse back together," he said. "The most noticeable repair going on right now, if you're in the building, is the third floor loft is being renovated."

Hill also noted clubhouse roof repairs are about to begin.



# OPA about \$30K off budget YTD, \$12K in Sept.

Controller Carmine says variances not that bad, but yacht club remains problem

(Oct. 27, 2016) September was another good financial month, according to Ocean Pines Association Controller Art Carmine, who briefed the budget and finance committee on that month's financial report last Wednesday.

Overall, he said the association was about \$30,000 lower than budget, bringing the year-to-date variance to about \$12,000 off estimates.

"Variances have been relatively minor - \$12,000 in five months isn't bad," Carmine said. "No need to panic at this point."

He highlighted revenues at several departments that had a more than \$5,000 variance from the budget, which included golf, off \$26,141, the beach club, off \$14,134, and the yacht club, which was \$36,720 lower than estimates.

In what has become something of a trend during recent committee meetings, the majority of the discussion focused on the yacht club, where Carmine said costs were down, but not enough to offset the dip in revenue.

Banquet bookings were notably slow, and Carmine said the abandoned food truck accounted for "probably about \$75,000" of the \$179,413 variance between year-to-date net operating and what was budgeted.

The reasons? "I guess there's a lot

of theories around," Carmine said. "We really need to talk to the manager and see what trends that he's seen over the year. Obviously, Friday and Saturday nights are popular - and Sunday brunch - but that's only three out of seven days."

Carmine said a large number of people in Ocean Pines that have disposable income traditionally go south for the winter, a circumstance that makes improving the club's offseason fortunes unlikely. During football season, the club is open Monday nights, closed Tuesday and Wednesday, and open again for portions of Thursday through Sunday.

He joked that several committees were looking into the problem and sending the board "emails, smoke signals" and dropping "flyers from airplanes."

"The question gets to be do you want [the club] open for members that want to go or do you not?" Carmine said. "We've been struggling during the summer, which is alarming to me.'

"If the summer's this bad this year, it's never been enough to offset the non-summer time, historically," committee member John O'Connor said. "It doesn't foretell anything very nice for the rest of the budgeted year."

Carmine said stiff competition from other restaurants in Ocean Pines – not to mention Ocean City - were obviously hurting the club.

"Therein lies part of the solution is you've got to be more competitive, O'Connor said, adding that both quality and service were still concerns.

### **Budget review**

Viola confirmed that the committee would meet publically to discuss the next fiscal year budget on Jan. 11 and Jan. 12 at 9 a.m. The location has yet to be determined. A third day is also possible, as last year the committee added a third half-day for additional

The committee will meet again on Dec. 7 at 9 a.m. in the administration building. No November meeting was scheduled.

### **Budget recommendations**

Board liaison Pat Supik said the directors discussed committee budget

guidance during a work session just two days earlier and, for the most part, were either already implementing or recommending all of the suggestions of the committee.

One item that "probably caused the most discussion," Supik said, was the notion of doing the budget in a "multiyear format." She said interim General Manager Brett Hill said creating a multiyear budget by January "may be totally, totally out of the ques-

Another item that was apparently rejected, she said, was the notion to not reduce collections for reserve accounts.



# Blue Dog Café features bit of ol' Broadway

Weekend-only eatery gives showbiz flair to Snow Hill causes and local charities

(Oct. 27, 2016) About 20 years ago, when Salisbury native Gary Weber walked into Snow Hill, he brought with him his love for theater, his knowledge of restaurants and a steady flow of income during the early century's real estate boom to bring the culture of one of the world's biggest cities to one of the lower shore's smallest towns.

"Ours is a special events place," he said. "We always have entertainment, and it's always something different."

Sometimes, it's just birthdays, when staff and local musicians belt out renditions of "Happy Birthday" to groups - sometimes up to seven times per night, he said, but other times, it's in support of local and regional causes, like the event scheduled for tonight, that benefits local emergency shelter Diakonia.

"We try to give back by sponsoring a soccer team, raising money for Jesse's Paddle or, in this case, Diakonia, which is the only local place for women in trouble to go."

Tonight the Blue Dog Café is featuring "A Broadway Melody" with Cheryl Taustin, Weber himself, Michael Pruitt and Todd Crosby.

"It's a Broadway review and a three-course dinner. We'll end up seating about 70 people and have a live and silent auction. We still have room," he said. "We don't do too many unknown songs - we focus on the popular hits."

Weber said the shows he tends to

feature are the ones that are constantly being brought back as revivals.

"We do classic Broadway and movies. We have several colleges down here - we want culture. There's good comedy and it doesn't offend anyone," he explained. "It's what you get in a rural area — we're not doing Equus, it's not high art without any comedy at all."

Weber lived in New York during the 1980s, and like many bitten by the acting bug, had to supplement his income by working in restaurants. He said he started washing dishes in restaurants at the age of 15.

"I was into acting at Salisbury University, and have been on TV. I'm into it. In the boom of 2005, I was blessed to make some money and bought the Blue Dog. It had a stage already, so we have to use it," Weber said.

So the Blue Dog Cafe, primarily open on weekends, offers these glimpses into the world of musical theater regularly, but on occasion, Weber said, he's able to bring down some of his friends from the city to perform, or to try out something they've been working on.

There isn't a set schedule for these types of performances, and the best bet is to visit the website at www.bluedogsnowhill.com.

The next scheduled event is scheduled from Dec. 5-8, and is entitled "A Blue Dog Christmas" featuring Weber, Taustin, Rhonda Apple, Pruitt, Margot Resto and Crosby, accompanied by the Blue Dog Elf Band.

"I have regulars from Bethany, and a few local couples. Snow Hill doesn't have the population, which is the biggest struggle in keeping everything open and working. Population is going to determine how long we survive. But we've been stable for six years," he said.

The weekend shows along with the special events are enough to keep the business side open and functioning, but with the small population of Snow Hill, staying open more often is harder to manage.

"People who love theater and live performance know who we are -Ithink most people know who we are," he said.

And for now, it's working.

"I somehow landed here in Snow Hill. I built a real estate business here. Lots of other places have come and gone. It's been a struggle — but I've been blessed. I'm doing the best job I can," he said. "The restaurant portion is key, but the entertainment gets people to make the drive. It's the hospitality business so if you're hospitable, you'll do well."

The fundraiser dinner costs \$75 per plate, and begins at 6:30 p.m. For more information, call 410-251-7193.

# **Decatur Middle** student honored by Johns Hopkins

Outstanding test scores led to event invite for Forbes

(Oct. 27, 2016) Benjamin Forbes, a student from Berlin, was honored recently as one of the brightest middle school students in the world during an international awards ceremony sponsored by the Johns Hopkins University Center for Talented Youth (CTY).

# **Getting out in front of it**

No one would think that Pocomoke and Ocean Pines have much in common, separated as they are by a fair amount of distance, demographics and form of government.

But it turns out this week that these two otherwise disparate communities share one thing: they both have had to confront legal problems over unmet financial obligations.

In addition, both these debt situations resulted from mistakes or misunderstandings rather than malfeasance and both are dealing with them publicly and in a straightforward manner.

In Pocomoke's instance, it isn't the town, but the Delmarva Discovery Center that found itself in trouble over an unpaid bill from the contractor that put together one of its exhibits. At dispute is the amount being charged, and perhaps the terms of the contract, but not the fact that the center will have to make good somehow.

More interesting is that the center's president, Stacey Weisner, made the story public in the interest of operational transparency. Getting out in front of the story like she did takes much of the sting out of the circumstances.

Similarly, the Ocean Pines Association Board of Directors found itself obligated to an expensive golf cart lease authorized without the full board's knowledge, apparently, by a previous board member. Rather than attempt to deal with the matter quietly, the directors discussed it publicly and agreed to a solution in an open session.

That's the way it ought to be done, because it stops cold the biggest threat to good government once a story starts to leak out the inevitably wrong public speculation about what really happened.

So yes, mistakes were made and will be corrected, end of story, and it's because of the laudable fashion in which they were handled.

If every government or institution was as open and upfront about their predicaments as these two have been, the public might have a better appreciation of the demands they have to meet.



# When weather turns cold, turn to soup

I paddled three times last week, once in an outrigger and twice on an ocean board. I left my house yesterday morning in

And then today happened. I walked outside and could see my breath in the chilly, 43-degree air that had our quaint little village beset in frigid misery. Despite all of that, our youngest is an 11-year-old, who walked out of the house in just a T-shirt, assuring me that it wasn't cold. He mocked me.

Remember those days? Being a kid in the pool or ocean in September so long that your lips were blue and your entire body shook in convulsions? "Nope," you would say to your parents as they told you that you were cold. "I'm fine" and you would stay in for another hour, barely able to move your joints as you stretched out for the grilled cheese and tomato soup that your mom had so thoughtfully prepared for you.

Nowadays, it only takes me a whiff of the cold autumn air to realize that my aging bones and joints are already creaking. And it is precisely at this moment that I begin to search out comforting foods that will appease said ails and nurse me back to my young self once again: Or least in my mind.

When I experience days such as these, my mind goes in many directions simultaneously. Warming spices? Yes, I could make something that would have cinnamon, allspice, mace, white pepper et al. Or perhaps soups?

Alas, the days of watermelon gazpacho are over and it's time to move on to more robust, rib-sticking potage such as butternut squash soup, clam chowder, cream of crab soup or one of my favorites, beef barley soup.

I couldn't have walked out on a better day to wish for comfort foods as, as mentioned before, it's flipping cold out there, and we are cooking foods from the Midwest today. The Midwest, home to quaint colloquialisms about men, sheep, beer and cheese. But more importantly, home

to fairly hearty foods. And can you blame them? Once the summer is over, it's time to stack wood for the winter!

I have cousins who live in Milwaukee, and as I flew up there in the winter last year, it struck me that it was much like Upstate New York; when we get a foot of snow down here, we're done for a week or so. They wouldn't get a school delay for a foot of snow. Up north, folks are much more hardened to the hardships of winter, and I plan on keeping it that way: them hardened and me not.

One of my students, Donald, made a nice batch of beef barley soup, and as I sit here typing away madly, I can smell (literally) and taste (figuratively) the soup as it is in its final stages.

A straightforward and simple soup, you would do well to enhance the flavors by making your own stocks with which to start. There is nothing quite like a fresh stock from roasted bones to make a soup 'pop' with a freshness that you simply cannot get by using a cheap bouillon or storebought 'stock' (which is nothing more than bouillon with added water; those sneaky marketers).

You can also use sun-dried tomatoes as a substitute for tomato paste, as the concentrated flavors of the sundrieds will add a lovely dimension of flavor to your soup. By simply pureeing them with oil and/or stock, you will have the opportunity to bring even more flavors into this simple favorite.

And when the dust settles and the smoke clears, you are left with a bowl of nutrient-dense broth that will help you deal with the cold days ahead. They're coming. Oh, they're coming.

### **Beef Barley Soup**

Makes about 3 quarts 1/4 c. Sundried tomatoes 3 Tbsp. Chicken stock, or as needed 2 Tbsp. EV Oil 8 oz. Lean sirloin, cut into small

cubes
1 ea. Medium carrot, peeled and diced

3 stalks celery, lightly peeled and diced

1/2 ea. Red onion, diced



4 ea. Garlic cloves, mashed and minced

2 c. Pearl Barley

2 stems fresh thyme, leaves only 2 qt. Roasted chicken or veal stock

2 ea. Bay leaves Salt & Pepper to taste

Italian parsley, as needed for garnish

Puree the sundried tomatoes with the chicken stock in a strong blender under perfectly smooth. This is a nice substitute for tomato paste as sundried tomatoes have more of a pronounced flavor. Set aside until later

In a soup pot, heat the olive oil and cook the beef until it has a nice brown crust on at least one side

Add the carrot, celery and onion and cook for four minutes

Add the garlic and cook for an-

other two minutes

Add the barley and cook for five minutes, making sure to stir everything together

Add the time and chicken stock and stir

When it's at a full simmer, turn down a little bit and add the bay leaves

Cook until the barley and beef are both tender

Season to taste and serve with parsley as a garnish

# Election guidelines as big day approaches

(Oct. 27, 2016) For the 2016 presidential general election, voters can vote in person or by absentee ballot.

To vote in person, voters can vote before election day at a designated early voting center in their county of residence or on election day at the polling place for their residence.

Early voting centers will be open for voting from 8 a.m. to 8 p.m. from Thursday, Oct. 27 through and including Thursday, Nov 3. The best days to vote early to avoid delays are Saturday, Oct. 29 and Sunday, Oct. 30.

There is at least one early voting center in each county, and voters should vote at an early voting center in their county of residence. Addresses of all early voting centers are available at www.elections.maryland.gov/voting/early\_voting.html.

Voters who prefer to vote on election day can vote on Tuesday, Nov. 8. On election day, polling places will be open for voting from 7 a.m. to 8 p.m. To avoid delays, voters should try to vote between the hours of 10 a.m. and 4 p.m.

During early voting, voters should vote at a designated early voting center in their county of residence. There is at least one early voting center in every county. Centers are located at accessible facilities with adequate parking and within a convenient driving distance for most voters in the county. Information about early vot-

ing centers and early voting in general is available at www.elections.maryland.gov/voting/early\_voting.html.

On election day, voters should vote at their assigned polling place. Voters can find their assigned polling place by looking at the voter notification card they received from their local board of elections or by clicking the Find your Polling Place link at www.elections.maryland.gov.

Voters who have moved, but have not updated their address with their local board, should search for the polling place for their new address or contact their local board of elections. It is important for voters to vote in the polling place for their new address because only those contests for which voters are eligible to vote will be counted.

There is a new paper-based voting system in Maryland. Voters will now cast votes by marking and scanning paper ballots. Most voters will use pens to mark paper ballots by hand, but there will be an accessible device for voters who need help reading or marking a ballot.

All voters will insert their marked paper ballots into a scanner. Instructions will be available to help voters familiarize themselves with the ballot and how to vote. Voters may also ask an election judge to explain how to vote on the voting system, but a voter must vote alone, unless the voter is unable to do so because of disability, inability to write,

or inability to read the ballot.

For absentee and provisional voting, voters are issued a paper ballot. Absentee voters who choose to receive their ballot electronically, print their own paper ballot to mark by hand or use the online ballot marking tool to mark and print the ballot.

To mark a ballot by hand, voters fill in the ovals next to the candidates or ballot question responses for which they want to vote. At the local board of elections, the ballot is fed into a scanner that reads and tabulates the selections made by voters. All provisional ballots and absentee ballots are reviewed in a public meeting after the election and counted or rejected according to State law and regulation.

Voters may request to receive their absentee ballot by mail, electronically, or by fax. Visit www.elections.maryland.gov/voting/absentee.html to request an absentee ballot.

The deadline to request a mailed absentee ballot is Tuesday, Nov. 1. The deadline to request an electronic absentee ballot is Friday, Nov. 4. Voters who request an electronic absentee ballot will be notified by email that their ballot is ready for download, then instructed to enter unique identifying information before printing their ballot, voting instructions, and return envelope template.

If you miss the above deadlines, but still want to vote by absentee ballot, you or your agent must apply in person at your local board of elections before 8 p.m. on election day. Visit www.elections.maryland.gov/voting/absentee.ht ml for more information.

Voted absentee ballots may be delivered to your local board of elections by 8 p.m. on election day or mailed on or before election day and received by your local board by Friday, Nov. 18.


A provisional ballot is a safeguard to ensure that individuals who believe they are registered and eligible to vote are able to vote. Voters required to vote by provisional ballot will be asked to complete a provisional ballot application, and then issued a paper ballot.

It is important that voters complete the entire provisional ballot application because the information on the application is used to determine whether the provisional ballot will be counted.

A provisional ballot will only be counted after the local board of elections has reviewed the provisional ballot application and determined that the individual is in fact registered and eligible to vote the provisional ballot.


