



Ocean Downs casino to open in December

BERLIN – Big things are happening at the Casino at Ocean Downs. The venue on Route 589, which has been a longtime hotspot for simulcast and live harness racing, is slated to celebrate the grand opening of its casino in December.

With the addition of approximately 800 slot machines and the renovation of its nearly 34,000 square foot gaming area, Casino at Ocean Downs will bring a plethora of job prospects to Worcester County.

When construction initially began, an estimated 265 employment opportunities arose for slots operations. In addition, job openings are available in security, surveillance, food and beverage, finance and administration, and management information systems.

"We expect that most of our team members – and many of our customers – will be from the local vicinity: Worcester County, Ocean City, and Ocean Pines," said William M. Rickman Jr., president of Ocean Enterprise 589 LLC, which is the licensee of the casino project at Ocean Downs racetrack.

The casino's hiring managers have held three job fairs in the local vicinity this year.

Fatal collision on Route 113 claims four lives; injures five

NEWARK – Four people are dead and five are injured as the result of a multiple vehicle crash that occurred late Monday afternoon on Route 113 near Langmaid Road in Newark.

The deceased are identified as Carmelo A. Dominguez, 53, his wife, Evelyn E. Morales, 48, his daughter, Natasha E. Dominguez, 23, and his grandson, Jose Dominguez, 2, all of the 800-block of Macey Plaza, Bronx, N.Y. All four were pronounced dead at the scene.

Three other members of Carmelo Dominguez's family were injured in the crash. They are identified as his daughter, Christina A. Dominguez, 25, his granddaughter Yasmine Dominguez-Astacio, 4, and his granddaughter, Christina Gonzalez, 9. All three injured persons also lived at the same address with the deceased in Bronx, NY.

These three injured victims were transported to Johns Hopkins Hospital in Baltimore where they remain.

Two other people were injured in the crash. They were each driving and were the sole occupants of vehicles southbound on Rt. 113.

They are identified as Mary M. Jones, 41, of the 6700-block of Lenape Place, Snow Hill, and Daniel H. Nelson, 23, of the unit-block of Harmon Road, Mt. Holley, N.J. Jones was transported to Peninsula Regional Medical Center in Salisbury and Nelson was taken to the University of Maryland Shock Trauma Center in Baltimore, where each

Another driver involved is identified as Leroy Trader, 54, of the 4300-block of Nelson Road, New Church, Va. He was not injured.

The preliminary investigation indicates that shortly before 5 p.m. Monday, Carmelo Dominguez was driving a 2009 Nissan Cube northbound on Route 113 from Virginia Beach, Va., where he had been visiting family. He was en route back to New York and was transporting

At this point in the investigation, it does not appear that anyone in the vehicle was using seat belts or in child safety seats. Witnesses told State Police investigators the Nissan was traveling at an excessive speed and was seen passing vehicles in no passing zones as it headed north on Route 113.

Approaching the area of Newark, the Nissan came up behind a 2000 Peterbilt truck tractor pulling a box trailer, driven by Leroy Trader. Witnesses said the Nissan pulled across the double yellow line in an attempt to pass the tractor

As it drove alongside the tractor trailer, the Nissan struck head-on a southbound 2009 Honda CRV, driven by Mary Jones. This crash caused the Nissan to catapult upward and impact the side of the trailer being pulled by the truck tractor.

Now apparently airborne, the Nissan overturned onto its roof and landed on top of a 2004 Volkswagen Jetta driven by Daniel Nelson, which was also southbound. Both the Nissan and the Volkswagen careened off the roadway and came to rest on the side of southbound Route 113.

Advanced accident reconstructionists from the Maryland State Police CRASH Team responded and are conducting the continuing investigation. The preliminary findings indicate the crash was caused by speed, improper passing, and aggressive driving.

Alcohol does not appear to be a factor. At the location of the crash, Route 113 is a 55 mph un-divided highway with one lane in each direction.

Personnel from the Maryland State Highway Administration responded immediately and set up detours around the crash scene. Due to the extensive crash field, both directions of Route 113 had to be closed. The highway was closed for seven hours while the rescue and investigation continued.

GOP makes huge gains in mid-term elections

Harris defeats Kratovil for House seat

BERLIN – Jim Mathias was greeted by a borderline inappropriate amount of enthusiastic cheers when he walked into Station 7 Restaurant in Pittsville election

"Do you guys know something I don't know?" he asked the crowd and received a big laugh in response. "No, seriously," he said.

Mathias' lead had dwindled from more than 900 to less than 600 during his trip into Pittsville and by the night's end fewer than 200 votes would separate him from opponent Michael James in the race for the District 38 State Senate seat.

On top of that, the Democratic Party wasn't having the kind of night that warranted celebration. They were losing or uncomfortably close to losing in a significant number of local and national

Mike McDermott easily took Mathias' former District 38B Delegate seat and U.S. Rep. Frank Kratovil had already conceded to Republican Andy Harris

before Mathias even arrived at the party. Delegate Norm Conway was also there and, while he showed concern at first before long it was clear he had an untouchable lead.

In the race between James and Mathias it is unlikely a clear winner will emerge this week and may not be certain much before the Nov. 22 certification date.

Similarly, the State's Attorney race between Joel Todd and Beau Oglesby, with at least 1,500 absentee votes outstanding in Worcester County, will take some time to sort out. Todd edged Oglesby by 14 votes in the 2006 election but the challenger held a better than 100 vote lead after the polls closed Tuesday and, as a Republican candidate, is poised to oust the incumbent during an election where Democratic incumbency is a real liability.

Because of a federal suit brought against the Maryland State Board of Elections an extension was added for absentee ballots mailed out less than 45 days before the election date. So even after the absentee, provisional, and mili-

tary ballots are counted in races separated by only a few votes a recount could suspend some results even beyond the certification deadline.

In races where the difference is half a percent or less a recount is automatically triggered. Candidates may also call for a recount.

Other clear winners based on the initial numbers include Judy Boggs, Worcester County commissioner for District 6 who took nearly 70 percent of the vote, Worcester County commissioner District 5 candidate Jim Bunting, who easily beat on-again-off-again candidate Linda Busick.

Busick lost to Bunting in the primary and then waffled about

whether or not to mount a write in campaign, announcing that she was, then she wasn't, then, finally, that she was a little more than a week before Election Day.

The only potentially vulnerable commissioner is Virgil Shockley, the District 4 Democratic incumbent who holds a 71 vote lead with 197 absentee votes left to be counted for his district.

In the Worcester County Sheriff's race Republican Reggie Mason will fill the office vacated by retiring Chuck Martin. Mason defeated opponent Bobby Brittingham by more than 4,000 votes.

Clerk of the Circuit Court Stephen V. Hales and Register of Wills Charlotte Cathell both finished better than 1,500 voted ahead of their challengers and secured their positions for the next four years.






ACT DEADLINE NOV. 5

Herpes in hiding: genital herpes often unrecognized

It's an uncomfortable topic, but it's a health issue you should know about. Nationwide, about one out of six people between ages 14 and 49 is infected with the herpes simplex virus type 2 - the main cause of genital herpes. Surprisingly, most people don't know they're infected. Even if you have no symptoms, or only mild ones, you can still transmit the virus to others.

Herpes simplex virus (HSV) comes in two forms. The most common, HSV-1, is best known for causing cold sores or fever blisters on the face, especially on the lips and mouth. But HSV-1 can also cause genital herpes. HSV-2 usually affects the genitals, but can also infect the mouth. Both types of HSV can pass from one person to another through sexual or other skin-to-skin contact.

"Once people are infected with herpes simplex, the virus stays in the body for the rest of their lives," says Dr. Carolyn Deal, who heads the sexually transmitted diseases branch at NIH. Symptoms may first appear about two weeks after infection. After that, the herpes virus goes into hiding in your nerve cells. It may re-emerge several times a year. Over time,



reappearances occur less often.

The first outbreak is usually the most severe and lasts the longest, sometimes 2 to 4 weeks. During an outbreak, you might notice tingling or sores (lesions) near the area where HSV first entered your body. Small red bumps are the first to appear. They change into small blisters, and then become itchy, painful sores that might develop a crust. The sores eventually heal without leaving a scar.

Often, though, people don't

recognize their first genital herpes outbreak or later recurrences. A study by the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention found that more than 80 percent of people with HSV-2 infections have not been diagnosed with the disease.

Your health care provider can sometimes diagnose genital herpes by looking at the sores or testing a sample from infected skin. Between outbreaks, a blood test can detect evidence of HSV-1 or HSV-2.

Although there's no cure for herpes, prescription medicines can help calm symptoms and prevent future outbreaks. Taken regularly, these medications can also reduce the risk of passing herpes to sexual partners.

"For prevention, the recommendations for genital herpes are similar to many other sexually transmitted diseases," says Deal.

"The most reliable way to prevent infection is to abstain from sex or to be in a long-

term monogamous relationship with an uninfected partner. Condoms can also reduce the risk of transmission, but are not a reliable solution, as they may not cover all infected areas. Infected people should avoid having sex with uninfected partners during an outbreak.

Although herpes infections generally don't cause serious medical problems alone, they can cause complications. Genital herpes can increase your chances of becoming infected with HIV, the virus that causes AIDS.

In rare cases, herpes outbreaks during pregnancy can put the newborn child at risk for serious or even deadly infections.

Consistency in the gym for balance in your life



In order to succeed at any worthwhile long-term health goal (exercise, diet, stress reduction, whatever) you have to give up on being perfect. We hear this all the time but somehow we all keep forgetting this.

The only thing more harmful than thinking you, or your training, can be perfect is simply not giving a crap.

What matters is that you did what you needed to do to stay on track.

Being consistent, or staying on track, is the most important thing. Over time, if you stay on track, there will be good days and bad days but the good days will eventually predominate. Healthy living is still a pain, but the longer you keep doing it the more habitual it becomes. You will always be tempted to slack which is why you need to know how to stay on track for the rest of your life.

So what are some of the essential components of staying on track?

1. Staying accountable and being honest with yourself.

- 2. Acknowledging your achievements and not just taking them for granted.
- 3. Trying your best but refusing to get all punitive and selfhating when you inevitably screw up.
- 4. Not quitting in self-disgust because you screwed up.
- 5. Setting realistic goals and making positive changes gradually and steadily.
- 7. Accepting that while "All" may be nice, "Some" is better than "None" when it comes to good behavior.
- 8. Analyzing the triggers for bad behavior and planning to avoid them or minimize their impact in the future.

The list goes on, but the bottom line is you need to let yourself find balance and be human. What you do in your training will often be a big part of what you do in your life and fixing one may help with the

If you quit on the last rep, or slow on that last mile you are probably doing the same behaviors in your personal and professional life. Learning how to live a healthy and rewarding balance life is the ultimate goal here.

To reduce the risk of food borne illness, the Environmental Health Division developed and implemented a Certified Food Operator Course in 2003 with the goal of providing vendors with the skills necessary to prepare and serve food in a safe manner.

Since 2003, more than 370 people have completed hands-on, interactive course. The program has increased vendor awareness of safe food handling practices and enhanced relationships among regulators, vendors, sponsors and event visitors.



"We had a flood pattern and Tyler made a great catch and turned it up and I thought he was in for a TD but other people didn't see it that way," Knox said. 'Teron made a good read on the high-low flood pattern and made a nice pass."

On first-and-goal Decatur committed a false start penalty but on the next play Markell Purnell bulled his way six yards into the end zone to give the Seahawks the lead. The Decatur defense held Wicomico to a three-and-out on its next possession and then Purnell and the offense worked on running out the clock.

Wicomico had one last chance when they got the ball with 1:32 remaining and no timeouts at their own eight yard line. But the Decatur defense stuffed two running plays and sacked the quarterback to end the threat.

"I know he would play hard for us and we played hard for him," said Tyre. "He's our brother."

Decatur fell behind 14-0 in the first quarter before rallying to 14-13 at the half with two touchdown passes from Tyre. In the third Decatur put together a sustained drive to tie the game at 20 with a two yard TD run by Kee - his 17th of the year.

This Friday Decatur will play host to county rival Snow Hill at 6 p.m. "It's senior night against Snow Hill," Knox said. "It will be a great game and hopefully the fans will come out and support the team for what we've done the past four weeks.'

Berlin Dolphins still undefeated on the season

SALISBURY - The Cadet Berlin Dolphins now 6-0 have been steadily churning along this season meeting one challenge after another and beating each team in its path. The Cadet Dolphins faced their latest challenge in the undefeated Wicomico Yellow Jackets (5-1) and won 19-7

The Cadet Dolphin offense started the game off with a ball controlling time consuming 60 yard drive down the field that led to a touchdown and early lead of 7-0. The Dolphins pounded the ball and then Terran Wright scored from 30 yards out on a power sweep to the outside.





Local artists show their latest work at Water's Edge Gallery in November

BERLIN – Local artists join artist in residence, Kevin Fitzgerald, for a show of their latest paintings at Water's Edge Gallery this month.

The lineup includes Pete Cosby, Patrick Henry, Randy Hofman, Parker Nicholls, Brooke Rogers, Deborah Rolig and Peggy Warfield.

Works will be displayed beginning in November and with an artists' reception during Berlin's 2nd Friday Art Stroll on Nov. 12 and during Holiday Arts Night and Christmas Tree Lighting on Nov. 26. This is a rare opportunity to view the work of some of the most well known artists from the lower Eastern Shore in one exhibition.

"We are excited to showcase some of the best in local art and talent," said gallery manager Gail Lewis. "Each artist brings his or her own style from traditional landscapes to modern interpretations. The show is guaranteed to offer something for everyone."

Nationally recognized artist Fitzgerald will be headlining the show with his latest series of landscapes. Fitzgerald has been painting for over 30 years and holds a BFA from Maryland Institute College of Art and an MFA under full fellowship from George Washington University.

Berlin artist Cosby is self-taught and paints primarily in oils and focuses on the theme of "Wind, Water and Waves." He has been influenced by other local

Biblical sand sculptor Hofman has been painting since childhood. The Ocean Pines artist paints scenes from Assateague with interwoven religious interpretations.

In 1999, Nicholls, also from Berlin, suffered a catastrophic knee injury led to near fatal medical complications which led Parker back to painting, primarily as therapy. This artist's diverse life experiences and personal challenges have become a constant point of artistic reference. His soulful images inspire powerful feelings of faith, hope family and humanity.

Ocean City native Rogers studied with abstract expressionist Grace Hartigan

at the Hoffberger School of Painting in Baltimore, where he received an MFA in 1992. Although his large-scale paintings often tend toward abstraction, much of his work starts with direct observation from nature.

The narrative quality of Snow Hill-based artist Rolig's paintings combined with the juxtaposition of bits of realism on an abstract field captures a broad audience. The rich textures and many layers of color give the viewer a sense of the evolution of each painting.

Artist Warfield ventured into water-

color painting over 23 years ago later to discover collaging. She feels that the art of collage allows the viewer to become a participant by attaching his or her own meaning to the work.

All of these local artists are on display now through the end of the month. The Water's Edge Gallery is in downtown Berlin at 2 South Main St., across from the Atlantic Hotel, and is open to the public seven days a week. 

Boneless southern fried chicken with savoy-granny slaw

I often get stopped by readers while shopping or filling the gas tank, and more often than

Grandmothers the world over. I cook a fair amount of comfort food at home, and tonight was no different. Wanting something quick and easy, I relied on the simplest of marinades to bring out the flavor (arguable to some) of chicken breast, notably the driest and blandest part of this perplexing poultry.

Knowing that we have had a

head of Savoy cabbage in the refrigerator for more than I care to admit, it became evident that it was time to shave it down and make a hot slaw, almost a phony choucroute (a francophonic adaptation of the more famous sauerkraut).

With a touch of diced Granny Smith apples and some country ham, the cabbage was quickly and easily transformed into a lovely accoutrement to the fried chicken.

As for the chicken, leaving it to marinade in buttermilk with some basic spices overnight does a wonderful job in lending us a juicy and flavorful nugget. The buttermilk helps to draw out proteins which then case the meat. As the chicken is breaded and fried, all of the moisture inside the breast stavs in the breast. It's that simple.

The finishing touch was also easy with traditional southern milk gravy. Of course, since I had a touch of cream left in the refrigerator, I simply added that instead of milk to make it a more decadent sauce. Sauce? Gravy? Which is it, Paul?

I'll tell you. As a chef instruc-

tor once told us, what's the difference between gravy and sauce? Five bucks.

I don't think I need to tell you how to make mashed potatoes at this point, but if you need a refresher, just buy some Yukon golds, simmer (never, ever boil) with some onion and minced garlic, run through a food mill or potato ricer (named such since the resulting goop from the tool resembles little pieces of rice), and mix with cream or half & half, salt & pepper and butter to taste.
