# Town of Berlin now leads local farmers market

BERLIN – The Berlin Farmers Market has cut its connection with the Berlin Chamber of Commerce and is now under the guidance of the Main Street Berlin program.

The move comes as discussion continues about a long-term strategy for the market and how it might relocate elsewhere in the town's center.

"We ... are looking forward now to a new partnership with the Main Street Berlin program, while maintaining the character and high quality of our downtown Berlin Farmers Market," said Paul Wood, owner of A & W Farms and a member of the local farmers market in a press release sent Monday, Continued on Page 7

# New Yacht Club site plan OK'd by county officials

Contruction expected to begin in two months

OCEAN PINES – Construction for the new Ocean Pines Yacht Club is expected to begin within the next two months, now that the Worcester County Planning Commission has approved the facility's site plan.

"We were able to significantly decrease the adjustment they were seeking," county Planning Director Ed Tudor said of the commission's Nov. 1 approval.

In early October, the original site plan for the new Ocean Pines Yacht Club was rejected by the commission because it failed to provide the required number of parking spaces. A few days after that meeting, Ocean Pines Associ-

# Berlin, Pines offer hurricane relief

Ocean Pines accepts donations, Berlin helps Crisfield clean up town

BERLIN/OCEAN PINES – Representatives from Berlin government and the Ocean Pines Association are providing relief in their own way to areas devastated two weeks ago by Hurricane Sandy.

According to Tony Carson, town administrator of Berlin, Public Works Director Mike Gibbons led a team to Crisfield, about an hour away from town, on Thursday and Friday.

Crisfield, on the Chesapeake side of

Somerset County, was hit much harder by the storm than the Berlin area.

"The entire town was about 3 feet underwater. It was a disaster," said Rick Lord, foreman at the Public Works department of Crisfield.

Lord said Berlin, along with other municipalities, helped repair a major drainage issue. Once that was fixed, workers stayed for hours picking up debris from the streets such as boards and tree limbs.

"We didn't expect it, they just came," said Lord, who mentioned multiple institutions – including the Eastern Correctional Institution – are helping with the Crisfield rebuilding effort that is about one-third of the way complete.

Though Berlin representatives were only in Crisfield for two days, the gesture

will not be forgotten by the people who live there.

"We just want them to know it's a twoway street. We're here for them if they need us," Lord said.

While Berlin is doing what it can to provide relief, the OPA has initiated a major donation effort.

As of Nov. 1, drop-off stations were set up at the Ocean Pines Community Center, Public Works building, Sports Core Pool, Administration Building and Police Department.

"Our goal is to raise enough items to provide a tractor-trailer load of organized relief from one coastal community to another," said a press release sent by Teresa Travatello, OPA director of marketing and

ation representatives met with Tudor to request an adjustment that would allow them to provide fewer spaces than what the zoning code requires.

Although county code says there must be one parking space for every 125 square feet of surface in a commercial lot, part of that code allows Tudor to make significant changes to its regulations.

Depending on the scenario, the county can reduce by 20 percent the general requirement of one parking space for every 125 square feet of the

Through meetings between Tudor and OPA representatives, the number of required spaces was shrunk by exactly 10.9 percent. This was after the OPA requested a reduction of more than 20 percent, according to Tudor.

Parking spaces in the county are typically 10 feet wide by 20 feet long, but by reducing the width of several

parking spaces, some by an extremely small amount, they were able to add many more spaces than what was initially incorporated in the original site

"We are excited about the progress we have made and are looking forward to the construction phase of the project to begin," OPA General Manager Bob Thompson said in a press release sent Friday, the day after the site plan was approved.

Up next for the OPA in its effort to build a new Yacht Club is obtaining a building permit. While no exact timeline could be given, Thompson said the earliest the OPA would be awarded the permit is within four to six weeks.

Assuming no major delays, construction could begin within the next



# Market's long-term direction discussed

## Official advisory board forming to manage the new farmers market

Continued from Page 1 Nov. 5.

Main Street Berlin, managed by Berlin Economic & Community Development Director Michael Day, is in the middle of setting up an official advisory board for the market. This board will feature Day, Berlin Councilmember Lisa Hall, two market vendors, two representatives of the Berlin business community, two Berlin community members and a "market master" to act as the vendors' leader.

The most immediate action Main Street Berlin will take is the appointment of a market master, a position that has been vacant for many months.

Olive Mawyer, former executive director of the Berlin Chamber of Commerce, had held the title, but no one has assumed the position since Aaren Collins took Mawyer's chamber position in Mav.

Another town event has also been created: "Agriculture Heritage Weekfarmers market and Main Street Berlin.

Additionally, there will likely be an annual presentation of the Berlin Farmers Market at a mayor and council meeting.

With the changing to new leadership, the Berlin Farmers Market will

also undergo an update of its rules and regulations.

As the development of a long-term strategy for the market, Day could not give an estimate as to when any discussed newly items will be officially confirmed.

However, Day was able to confirm

the Berlin Farmers Market will stay in the North Main Street lot until at least next season and new locations close to the town's center will be discussed.

"I believe everyone at the meeting found that we have much to gain by working together and much to lose if we do not," Berlin Mayor Gee Williams

Williams is referencing the mayor and council meeting on Oct. 22, when the removal of the farmers market from its traditional downtown parking lot off North Main Street was discussed.

Berlin officials cited a need for additional parking because consumers have

> been complaining to the town about a lack of parking availability, especially since a great influx of new businesses have brought much traffic to the downtown area.

As the farmers market can take up as many as 25 parking spaces on the town-owned

Berlin officials decided the best option was to move the market from the location it has occupied for the past 19

The town offered Stephen Decatur Park and Dr. William Henry Park as new market locations, and asked the

Supporters of the Berlin Farmers Market filled the council chamber in protest of the relocation and to lambaste.

Many lambasted the chamber and town for not giving farmers any notice, while others argued that moving the market's presence away from downtown would kill business.

Because of the strong protest – not one public comment was in favor of the move – the mayor and council decided to table the motion to move.

The day after the meeting, Williams sent a press release reminding the public it was originally the town's request to move the market.

As town and market representatives plan the future of the Berlin Farmers Market, its members have expressed pleasure with the new direction.

"With 20 years of history and loyal customers here, I can say we are very pleased to be staying in downtown Berlin," Wood said.






# **Opera night in Delaware** featuring young artists



# What to know once a family member has passed away

Unfortunately, our loved ones do eventually pass away. We recently had a case where a client had an updated will that no one in the






family found out about until after his death. As a result, his estate will have to go through probate.


Probate is the process of "proving" that a deceased person's will is valid and that it's the last will that person wrote. Viewed in a broader scope, probate refers to the entire process of the courtsupervised administration

of an estate, from the initial probate of the will to the distribution of estate assets. Following are a few things you should know.

- How long is the process of probate? Where the estate is relatively small and uncomplicated, the probate of a will at the local courthouse may take 15 or 20 minutes (and may not even require a lawyer). If the estate is large and/or there are complicating issues, the probate of a will can require a lawyer, advanced notice to heirs, court hearing(s), and perhaps months (and in extreme cases years) to complete the process.
- What is the role of an estate's personal representative? When a person dies, property owned in the decedent's name must be assembled. Next, debts, taxes and expenses of the decedent must be paid. Whatever is left must then be distributed to the individuals or charities entitled to that property according to the decedent's will. If there's no valid will, or to the extent the will is partially invalid, the distribution of any remaining property is determined by state intestacy (without a will, descent and distribution) laws. The estate's executor or administrator is legally responsible (and legally authorized) to collect the decedent's assets, pay appropriate death taxes, debts, and expenses and distribute any assets remaining.
- Is the executor or administrator responsible for the details of a person's funeral? No. The funeral almost always occurs before the executor or administrator has been formally appointed. Usually, funeral details and decisions Continued on Page 14

are made by the decedent's immediate family. The personal representative's only legal duty with respect to the funeral is typically to pay and keep records of reasonable funeral related expenses. Sometimes, however, the decedent's will provides instructions about the funeral and/or burial and the personal representative should honor these directions to the extent practical and possible.

■ What's meant by "letters" or "letters testamentary?" When a person dies, his will is recorded in the office of the local register of wills of the county in which he/she was domiciled. The register of wills (or the appropriate court of jurisdiction) will issue to the named personal representative either "letters testamentary" (in the case of an executor) or "letters of administration" (if an administrator is serving). These "letters" are proof of the legal authority of the personal representative to collect and deal with the assets of the decedent's estate.

# Thanking OPA staff, mgmt., volunteers

We would like to take the time to personally thank the management, staff and volunteers of Ocean Pines Association who did an exemplary job during Hurricane Sandy. Under the coordination of Bob Thompson, all the mission essential departments in Ocean Pines were fully manned 24 hours during the emergency.

Enough kudos cannot be given to our police and fire departments, EMTs, Public Works, Recreation and Parks, Food and Beverage, Aquatics, Casper Golf, office staff and PR departments. Many of these people worked on a 24-hour schedule, with a command center being set up at the Ocean Pines Administrative Building.

Mr. Thompson and Chief [Bill] Bounds had the foresight to plan ahead for this storm. They secured a [High Mobility Multipurpose Wheeled Vehicle, commonly known as a] Humvee and two members of the National Guard to operate it. Six members of the Swift-Water Rescue Team arrived from South Carolina, along with a boat if they needed to make water rescues. Throughout the night, our own crews patrolled Ocean Pines removing limbs and trees from the road, putting up barricades where there was high water, and going door to door to notify the residents who lived in the area where a mandatory evacuation was ordered.

The phones to Ocean Pines and Public Works were manned throughout the event. Many calls were received from concerned residents regarding their property, rising water, trees and location of shelters. Many calls came from family members who did not live here but were concerned about parents and loved ones. All calls were addressed as quickly as possible.

Special thanks goes out to Chief Dave Massey and his entire police force: Fire/EMS Division Chief Bill Bounds and his staff of emergency responders; Teresa Travatello, who kept us informed on the Web

# Assateague Island Seashore reopens, but with limitations

BERLIN — The following provides updated information regarding the limited re-opening of Assateague Island National Seashore in the aftermath of Hurricane Sandy:

- The North Ocean Beach parking area is expected to open for day use visitation Friday, Nov. 3 at noon. Once open, the area will then be accessible from sunrise until sunset.
- The Verrazano Bridge has been checked out by the Maryland Department of Transportation and deemed safe for vehicular traffic.
- The cycling and pedestrian bridge is severely damaged and will be closed until further notice. Currently, visitors may not walk or ride bicycles across the Verrazano Bridge. Portions of bikes lanes on the island were also damaged and are unsafe.
  - The Assateague Island Visitor

Center is open 9 a.m. - 5 p.m.

- The Old Ferry Landing Road, Bayside Drive, and South Ocean Beach Parking lots are all closed until further notice due to continued high water, unsafe conditions and damaged infrastructure.
- All developed area camping is closed until further notice.
- All back country camping is closed until further notice.
- The Over Sand Vehicle (OSV) zone is cLosed until further notice.
- All hunting in the National Seashore is closed until further notice.
- The Chincoteague National Wildlife Refuge in Virginia is closed until further notice. Ninety-five percent of beach parking has been destroyed.

# Flag Ceremony Open to the Public



# Mentalist plays mind tricks at Whimsical Cottage

Entertainer Dan Cain will wow the audience this Friday in Berlin

BERLIN – Mentalist Dan Cain will present his "Experiments of the Mind" show this weekend at the Whimsical Cottage of Berlin to prove to audience members that there is no such thing as a random happening.

"I know this dispels the notion of free will, but everything's pretty much meant to be," Cain said. "I like to show connections between people."

These connections, according to Cain, are not connections such as discovering a long-lost relative, but rather seemingly random associations between people in unconventional ways.

As one example of what could be seen in his show on Friday, No. 9, Cain said he will have two random people come up on stage, one with his or her ticket to the show and another who has a \$1 bill.

Cain will then have the person with the ticket scratch off a section on its backside to reveal a series of letters and numbers.

He will then compare that series of characters to a sequence on the other audience member's \$1 bill, showing the audience both are the same.

Remote viewings are another part of the show, in which Cain will draw exactly what a chosen audience member is thinking of.

Another example of a trick Cain performs to show connections between people is bringing somebody up on stage to scratch the participant's nose. While scratching that person's nose, another audience member in no apparent relation to the other subject will then start feeling the scratches on his or her own nose.

The mentalist insists he uses no plants in the audience and there is no one backstage directing the action without the audience's knowledge.

"I try to make the show as random as possible," Cain said.

At 5 years old, Cain's grandmother taught him his first card trick, which led the way to his interest in magic tricks and eventually becoming a mentalist.

"It was enough to open that door for me and I never looked back," he said.

Throughout his 15 years of professional experience as a mentalist, Cain

has apparently grown strong with whatever gives him this power, as he reached national headlines by predicting the outcome of this year's Super Bowl.

Making his prediction three months before the February

game, Cain guessed the contest's winner, the exact score of the game and even a specific highlight of the game that there would be a crucial interception by the New England Patriots.

Cain is back to his predicting ways,

as he will reveal who he picked as the Major League Baseball World Series champion on Nov. 19 in New York City.

Although the San Francisco Giants already won the series last month, his prediction was burned onto a CD in March and put into an envelope sealed with wax to make it known the item had not been opened.

Celebrities Cory Epstein, Briella

Marie and hip-hop artist Jay Magicus will be among the attendees during the red carpet affair.

Tickets to Cain's show are \$20 per seat and there are 60 seats available.

His show begins at 8 p.m. inside the



# Yes, you can ... roll your sandwich in a pizza

Sometimes trying to cook for my own children is reminiscent of the opening scene of "Eat Drink Man Woman," a

The family ritual calls for an elaborate dinner every Sunday evening, with the father (a highly trained chef) spending countless hours in the

kitchen beforehand.

When dinner is served, a much more elaborate spread than I have ever given my family short of our Thanksgiving annual assault, the three daughters merely wince "politely" and critique the meal, sharing their feelings freely on what could have been done to better the meal.

Now, my kids may not be as critical of my work as the three heroines, but I do laugh every time that I see the movie, as it reminds me that children are fickle beasts, and some things shall forever remain a mystery.

It is a common trick of ours to tell the kids that Mom made the chicken teriyaki when, in fact, I was the artisan in charge of the task; then the kids will think it is fantastic. But when they see me in the act of making it, something to the effect of, "Aww, can't Mom cook the chicken teriyaki?" is usually heard unabashedly announced in the background, with seemingly little effort employed to hide their disappointment.

But that's enough of that for the moment, because I fell upon something that not only satiated the family's hunger issue but was lauded with rave reviews. It should come as no surprise or mystery to those of you who have been on this ride for the last eight years that sometimes I fall shy of ideas.

On any given Sunday, I am auctioning off ideas and taking hints and pointers from people. Sometimes it sticks and sometimes it doesn't. I can't explain the process, just as my wife can't explain me, and she's a therapist.

At the mention of Chicken Cheesesteak Calzones, I immediately considered the possibilities, since a good chicken cheesesteak (the Reel Inn still has the best in town) can outgun any other sandwich on the menu.

I love a plateful of onions, peppers and mushrooms ready to pile on top of the chicken, all just waiting for the Provolone cheese. I don't want to hear all of the nonsense about American cheese



being better, because it is not.

When I visit Philadelphia, a city that I find rather amazing, I always go to Geno's Subs for its famous and eponymous specialty. As a good lemming, I regularly order it in my best South Philly accent, which makes it come out something like a forced and accentuated, "Cheesesteak, wit wiz."

In the case of a good Philly cheesesteak, I won't mess with it. But south of Wilmington, I'd rather take the Provolone, especially in this case as we're going to pair it with pizza sauce and stuff it in a calzone.

As the night progresses, the house fills with the wafting warmth of rising and baking bread, wine reduced over sautéed vegetables and the piquant aroma of the tomato sauce used not only in the calzone, but also as a dipping sauce.

The children are placated. They have soundly congratulated me on a successful meal. And I for one am glad to have won this battle. It may not make a dent in the war effort, but I won this battle and I can add this to our repertoire of rotating menus.

And now all I have to figure out is

what to make for dinner tomorrow night.

Whatever it is, I will make sure that the kids see me. That always makes it more interesting.

#### **Chicken Cheesesteak Calzone**

makes 4 calzones

4-5 oz. raw pizza or bread dough balls 16 oz. shaved chicken breast

4 oz. sliced Provolone cheese

8 oz. Mozzarella cheese

4 oz. marinara or pizza sauce, plus more to serve on the side

2 cup each: red pepper julienne, white onion julienne and Crimini mushrooms 3 fresh garlic cloves, crushed

1 cup Chianti

olive oil, as needed

flour for dusting, as needed

Step 1: Have the dough balls ready to go, keeping them covered if they are in the proof stage or if you have a lot to do. You don't want them to get a skin

Step 2: In a sauté pan, heat the olive oil and cook the garlic until it is golden. Do not let it burn or it will be bitter and unusable

Step 3: Add the shaved chicken breast and cook halfway

Step 4: Add the onions, peppers and mushrooms and sauté until the water has released and the vegetables are half-

Step 5: Add the wine and cook until there is minimal liquid. Set aside

Step 6: To make the calzone, roll out a dough ball until it is approximately 8 inches in diameter. Fill on one half of the calzone, starting with the cheese, then sauce and finally the chicken filling

Step 7: Fold the dough over and pinch the calzone closed

Step 8: Bake in a 450-degree oven until golden brown all the way around. In my oven, that meant 13 minutes. All ovens are different so keep your eye on it

Step 9: Remove and let sit for 5 minutes and serve with marinara or pizza sauce on the side
