Mathias calls for less divisiveness, more cooperation

Chamber recognizes achievements in 2012

BERLIN — Maryland State Sen. Jim Mathias (D) stressed the need for reduced political polarity to achieve the types of cooperation needed from state and federal resources in the upcoming year. Mathias addressed the Berlin Chamber of Commerce Dec. 12 as it installed its president and board of directors for 2013 during an awards dinner at the Atlantic Hotel.

"We have to make certain that we work with our neighbors and the state," to find common good, Mathias said. He urged the businesses to help the local community maintain a tone of leadership and respect during times when political debates become torrid in order to help efforts to bring needed money back home.

Mathis said his main aim when the Maryland General Assembly convenes on Jan. 9, 2103 for its 90-session was to win budget approval for funding to complete the final segment of construction on Route. 113.

"When my day is done, I'd like to have that roadway finished," he said. The state senator, whose legislative district (38) includes Somerset, Wicomico and Worcester Counties, also described his efforts to get the federal government to reconsider its denial of claims for reimbursement to help property owners offset the costs of damage caused by Hurricane Sandy and credited Sen. Barbara Mikulski (D) with being instrumental in seeking "elasticity" from federal decision makers.

Also during the dinner, several local businesses and business people were recognized for their contributions to the community.

Baked Dessert Café & Gallery received the Chamber's Business Philanthropy Award, which is presented to business owners who have given Continued on Page 9

Berlin restroom project would bring them up to standard

BERLIN—The public restroom renovation project, scheduled to begin shortly after the new year, will include modernizations from signs to handsfree fixtures.

On Dec. 13, Robert Palmer, project engineer for Milton, Del.-based Beacon Engineering & Consulting, said the construction would be primarily an interior restoration. It will also bring the facilities into compliance with access requirements mandated under the Americans with Disabilities Act, he said.

Berlin officials are waiting what kind of bids they receive for the job before determining the how extensive the renovation will be, but the floor and ceiling tile work will be completely replaced, according Deputy Town Administrator Mary Bohlen. Depending on the budget, the walls will either be left as is or covered with either wall covering or paint she said.

The deadline for construction contractors wishing to bid on the project—to restore public restrooms next to Town Hall on Williams Street— is scheduled to close Dec. 21. Roughly six local businesses have requested bid specifications so far, according to Palmer.

Once completed, the restoration will bring the aesthetics of the public restroom facilities more in line with upgrades that have already been made to the town's other buildings and business facades, according Town Administrator Anthony Carson.

Carson told the Bayside Gazette in a Dec. 12 interview that construction will likely begin mid- to late January, after the Victorian Christmas season is over. It is expected to be completed by early March, he said.

The project is expected to provide jobs for approximately six workers. Berlin received funding for the project through a grant from the Maryland Department of Housing and Community Development. Therefore the project is subject to regulations that require workers to be paid under a pre-set range of prevailing wage rates.

The prevailing wage rates for jobs associated with the project will range from \$12.56 per hour to \$30.07 per hour, according to Palmer.

According to the bid request, the project will include "demolition and removal of an existing floor slap and partition wall, installation of new bathroom fixtures; new floor, ceiling and wall finishes; entrance doors; partition walls; plumbing; electrical; HVAC; and other incidental work."

NOEL Community to serve free dinner on Christmas Day

OCEAN CITY — St. Paul's by-the-Sea Episcopal Church hall on Third Street will be festively decorated, with music playing, to put everyone attending the NOEL Community's 15th annual Christmas Day dinner in the holiday spirit.

From 11 a.m. to 2 p.m., NOEL (Nothing

Other than Eating and Loving) will serve not only a hot holiday meal — turkey and ham with all the trimmings, but volunteers will also provide fellowship and companionship to guests who may not have anywhere else to go on Christmas Day.

The atmosphere in the hall is "absolutely incredible," said Katie Coffman, chairwoman of the NOEL planning com-

mittee.

"It's just a beautiful place to be. Both the guests and volunteers look forward to it," she said. "It's an upbeat and positive place, with music playing and the decorations."

Jody Farley and Valerie Gartland, with the help of the Rev. Bryan Glancey, former priest at St. Paul's, organized the inaugural Christmas dinner in 1998. The church had supplied baskets for families at Christmastime, but Farley and Gartland wanted to offer a hot meal for the holiday to those who were homeless, unemployed, underemployed, shut-in or alone, as well as to people who simply wanted to socialize.

This year, more than 100 volunteers will prepare, serve and deliver the food on Christmas Day. Local restaurants have donated turkey breasts and hams for the dinner and businesses, organizations and residents have contributed toys and money.

Two trees will be set up in the church hall, one with stuffed animals for children and another trimmed with gloves and hats for adults. A tree will also be adorned with candy.

Children will have the opportunity to enter "Toy Land," a room filled with holiday gifts. Adults will receive toiletry kits. Santa will be at the hall to greet guests.

Coffman said the church hall was filled to capacity last year. The holiday dinner began at 11 a.m. and a line to get in formed around 9 a.m.

The NOEL Community served approx-

imately 1,300 meals last year.

About 400 visitors dined in the hall last year, and each was provided a meal to take with them. Volunteers also delivered food to members of the police and fire departments and public service workers on duty that day, as well as to shut-ins and others who could not make it to the church.

Approximately 900 meals were carried out or delivered.

Those who will be unable to get to the church this Christmas may request a delivered meal.

Non-perishable food, clothing, toiletry items and monetary donations are always accepted and can be dropped off at the church. Mail checks, made payable to NOEL Community, to P.O. Box 1207, Ocean City, Md., 21843.



One of NOEL Community's other projects is serving lunch to those in need. Some of the leftover food from Christmas dinner will be used to make lunches following the event.



January through April, guests are invited in for a sit-down hot meal. They can also take a hot meal with them as well as a sandwich and snack. An average of 200 meals are distributed in a day, Coffman

From May through December, lunch and sandwiches are provided. Between 80 and 100 meals are distributed each week.

Coffman said the NOEL Community is

on target to serve about 8,000 meals/sandwiches in 2012.

Be wary of holiday scammers, BBB warns

MARYLAND — The Better Business Bureau is alerting consumers to reports of phony charity solicitations, supposedly on behalf of the families of victims of the Sandy Hook Elementary School shooting in Newtown, Conn., on Friday.

BBB recommends donors avoid giving to charities or funds through unsolicited phone calls, e-mails, texts or social media appeals.

BBT urges donors to:

■ Do your homework: Always research a charity at the Better Business Bureau's Wise Giving Alliance Web site, www.give.org, before donating money. To research Maryland-based charities, search www.greatermd.bbb.org and the Maryland Office of the Secretary of State.

■ Select a charity yourself: Charity cheats will use every method at their disposal to reach out to generous Americans in times of tragedy. However, rather than replying to a charity appeal, BBB recommends choosing a well-known charity or one that has been endorsed by local or state authorities.

■ Contact charities directly: Never click on links to charities on unfamiliar Web sites or in texts or e-mails. Donors may contribute to a victims' family fund through a collaborative effort between the United Way and Newtown Savings Bank. Donations may be sent to Sandy Hook School Support Fund, c/o Newtown Savings Banks, 39 Main St., Newtown, CT 06470.

Planned giving to charity offers multiple benefits

'Tis the season to give. Have you ever considered a substantial gift to a charity?

With a properly planned gift, you could rearrange your investment portfolio without paying capital gains tax on appreciated property or you could also possibly get an income tax deduction.

However, to get the tax advantages related with planned giving, your gift must be made to an eligible organization. To meet the criterion, a charitable organization must have been created in the United States, strictly be a non-profit business, and not be involved in politics.

You can contribute almost anything to a qualified organization. The deduction limits are more limited for gifts other than cash, but you are free to give almost any property that has worth.

In addition to making an out-andout donation, there are a number of other gifting methods you can use. You can give life insurance, which may allow you to bestow a sizeable future gift at a comparatively reasonable cost. Of course this type of gifting can be complex, but it's a viable option.

Another choice you have would be creating a charitable remainder trust. This type of trust may allow you, or your beneficiaries, to receive payment of a specific amount annually, and at the end of the trust, the designated charity the gets the remaining assets.

When using a charitable remainder trust, the trustee can sell the gifted investments and reinvest the proceeds to generate income, possibly without incurring a capital gains tax liability. This means that a well-planned gift could permit you to realign your investment portfolio, create more diversification, and even possibly increase your cash flow. You may also get a current income tax deduction on the value of the remainder interest that will go to charity in the future.

An additional trust option would be a charitable lead trust. This strategy al-Continued on Page 14

lows you to give the income generated to a charitable organization. At the end of the trust period, the remaining assets are paid to you or your beneficiaries. If planned properly, a charitable lead trust can let you can pass an appreciated asset to your beneficiaries with little or no estate taxes.

So, a charitable contribution set up in a trust may permit you to receive a current income tax deduction. But once you've given the gift, you can't try to get it back, or start selling assets and then keep the proceeds. On the other hand, you can change the charity that will in time receive your gift.

Whichever gifting strategy you choose, planned giving can be very worthwhile. Not only do you get to help a worthy cause, but you can potentially get some favorable tax benefits too.

Just remember that you should speak with your tax and/or legal advisors about your particular situation before using a gifting strategy.





Now that the new Ocean Pines board is settled in, those who were elected are facing the challenge of how to work together and keep both their focus, as well as the focus of the community, on solving the issues at hand rather than being distracted by a war of personalities and convictions.

Voters knew when they elected Marty Clarke that they were getting someone who keeps a keen eye on how their dollars are spent. Not a bad thing for anyone elected to office of any kind.

However, voters also certainly knew that in Clarke they were getting a wild card. Unfortunately Clarke's outspoken manner, while at times refreshing and sometimes amusing, does not always work to their benefit.

Report questions if state monitors tax breaks

MARYLAND — A report by the Pew Center on the States says when it comes to responsibly managing tax incentives, Maryland is helping to bring up the rear.

The report, released by Pew last week, says the state is among 25 others that are "trailing behind" in terms of monitoring the cost of tax breaks it uses to attract and retain businesses.

Only 13 states, the study said, are "leading the way." Researchers found "mixed results" in other states. Maryland is one of 16 states that has not published a report evaluating tax incentives between 2007 and 2011, Pew's study found.

The report's authors say states designing tax credits should include reliable fiscal estimates and an annual spending cap.

"States should consistently use these two tools together to ensure that tax credits, exemptions and deductions for economic development are affordable and manageable from day one," said Jeff Chapman, research manager at the Pew Center on the States. "When policymakers create tax incentives without knowing the expected costs and guarding against economic changes beyond their control, they leave their states vulnerable to budget pressures that are entirely avoidable."

The Daily Record found last year that of the more than 300 loopholes in the tax code, very few are actually monitored for effectiveness by the state. Some are controlled, however, such as a credit that defrays costs for film and television production in the state. That credit caps annual spending at \$7.5 million.

Other Maryland tax loopholes, however, are less well-managed, Pew found.

Researchers highlighted Maryland's enterprise zones, a commonly used economic development tool meant to revitalize stressed areas. There are 28 enterprise zones in the state (including such zones in Berlin, Snow Hill and Pocomoke). Pew found the state has not published a rigorous evaluation of the program.

A spokeswoman for the state Department of Business and Economic Development did not immediately respond to a request for comment.


Some tax credits are being reviewed by state lawmakers. Legislation sponsored by Sen. Richard S. Madaleno and Del. Bill Frick, both Montgomery County Democrats, was approved by the legislature and signed by Gov. Martin O'Malley this summer. The law calls for eight tax credits to be reviewed between July 2014 and July 2017.

The original bill called for 31 tax credits to be reviewed, but Madaleno said at the time that the Department of Legislative Services did not believe it could handle such a hefty workload.

But Chapman said even periodic review of tax breaks was not enough. He cited a 1994 tax exemption passed in Louisiana for natural gas drillers that cost the state just \$285,000 in fiscal year 2007. But the discovery of a large natural gas deposit in the state — combined with the expansion of horizontal drilling technology that has coincided with hydraulic fracturing in the northeast — had pushed the price tag to \$239 million in fiscal 2010.

Arizona's Quality Jobs Tax Credit of 2011, California's Film and Television tax credit of 2009 and Florida's Manufacturing and Spaceport Investment Incentive of 2010, were all pointed to as examples of how to responsibly cap incentives' cost

"Regular evaluations of existing incentives are essential, but not sufficient to prevent the unexpected costs these policies can cause," Chapman said. "Clear estimates and annual spending limits from the outset are the best approach to avoid unnecessary fiscal risk without sacrificing the economic returns of effective tax incentives."

Little Free Library gets big reception

Yes, it's a library but it's also an art installation on Jefferson Street

BERLIN - Paige Wisniewski could barely wait for the official ribbon cutting ceremony on Dec. 14 to end to take her pick from the collection of children's books in the crisp, white houseshaped box with its red roof, green doorway, and metal gate and trellis.

She had her sights set on two books, but her mom made her downsize to one at a time. So she chose the touch and feel book "Zoo's Who?" with its pages bulging with fuzzy pictures of animals throughout.

Paige's dad, metal sculptor Larry Wisniewski painted the box and designed the gate and trellis. It was fashioned from recycled chair metal, from where else? The ultimate reading chair,

With the December sun setting in the background and the house-shaped waterproof box illuminated with a spotlight, Anna Mullis, executive director of the Worcester County Arts Council cut the ribbon initiating the county's first Little Free Library, along with a small friend. The "library" is located in front of the Arts Council building at 6 Jefferson Street, just off Main Street.

The opening of the Little Library was timed to coincide with Berlin's Second Friday Art Stroll, since the brightly painted structure is considered an art installation that serves to beautify the community while its function is to promote literacy in Worcester County, according to Mullis. To make the library kid-friendly, it is positioned at the eye level of a child, she said.

The most popular books, she said, tend to be children's books, best sellers and "beach reads." Donations are welcomed and organizations can even make themed book donations, she said.

Mullis said she was very proud that the Arts Council was able to roll out the Little Free Library concept, which was achieved through a grant the Arts Council awarded to the Red Doors Community Center.

According to its Web site, the Red Doors Community Center is an outreach program of St. Paul's By-The-Sea Episcopal Church, which is designed for people of all faiths or no faith.

Fawn Mete, director of the Red

Doors Community Center, told the Bayside Gazette that she was inspired to bring Little Free Libraries into the area by a story she heard during a National Public Radio program. She said that she thought it would be a "good fit," especially for Berlin, and saw the Arts Council as a "natural partner" for the endeavor.

The next Red Doors Little Library will be installed and dedicated on Third Street in Ocean City on Sunday, Jan. 27, at noon.

Mete said the dedication will be followed on the same day by a Little Libraries Builder's Day event. She said all ages of children attending Showell, Buckingham and Ocean City Elementary Schools have been invited to participate in the Builder's Day event, to help construct and paint Little Libraries that would be installed in other locations throughout the county in

Caramel Popcorn (www.allrecipes.com/caramelpopcorn)

6 quart popped popcorn

1 cup butter

2 cup brown sugar

1/2 cup corn syrup

1 tsp. salt

1/2 tsp. baking soda

1 tsp. vanilla extract

Step 1: Combine butter, sugar, syrup, salt and baking soda in a pan

Step 2: Bring to a boil and cook for 4

Step 3: Spread mixture on popcorn on greased tray and place in 250-degree oven

Step 4: Cook for 1 hour, turning every

Step 5: Let cool and it is done

Variations - at the third and final turn. sprinkle chocolate chips on top and let them melt in. Also, you can add nuts of your choice with the popcorn in the beginning and allow them to candy.
