Third time is a charm

Sunday's Berlin Peach Fesival expected to be even better than before

BERLIN — The Berlin Peach Festival is like a party that has gotten out of hand in the best way. Inaugurated by the Harrison family and the Berlin Historic Society as a small get-together to celebrate the town's near-forgotten agricultural history, the event has quickly morphed into the kind of day people keep marked on their calendars well in advance.

There is some irony in the fact that, unlike peach trees themselves, which have to be carefully cultivated and tended if they are to grow strong, the Berlin Peach Festival both began and has grown exponentially from a slightly promoted and planned event.

The first year, while not quite haphazard, was not geared to the kinds of crowds it attracted. It was a brutally hot Sunday and those who recall attending must also recall their shock at the number of fellow attendees out in the heat.

Nearly all the vendors, and there weren't as many as there will be this year, were sold out of their peach-related wares within a few hours. Chesapeake Bay Farms' peach ice cream lasted about as long in the cooler as it would have out in the sun.

But at the heart of the success was that the event was pure fun and the attendees made the most of it. The peach Continued on Page 5

Town to save over \$4 million on sewer plant



BERLIN — Although there is much to be done in the coming months, the wastewater plant upgrade should come in at more than \$4 million below the approved bond funding, according to Town Administrator Tony Carson.

The mayor and council this week approved a bond measure to secure the next phase of the plant's construction—the pipes to carry the effluent to the spray field—at a cost of about \$3.5 million.

The bonded amount will be a little more than \$2.4 million at an interest rate of 2.5 percent over 40 years. The bond will be secured as a loan from the USDA.

In addition to the loan, the town will *Continued on Page 3*

receive \$1,037,350 in grants from the USDA and spend \$650 in cash for the

Water Resources Director Jane Kreiter said she was happy with the way the work has progressed.

"We're beginning to see the light at the end of the tunnel," she said, reminding the council of their facility tour on Aug. 22. "And you won't have to bring your boots."

At the beginning of the year, the town authorized up to \$10 million in bonds for the project.

Carson told the council that it was likely the town would have to bond less than \$6 million.

He added that some bonds the town has already taken were secured at a rate of four percent but that the staff is working to see if those higher interest rates can be refinanced after all of the deals are done.

In other business, work will likely begin soon on the Cottages at Berlin, a low-income independent living facility to be built near Purnell Crossing.

Planning Supervisor Chuck Ward told the council the construction permits were finalized and on his desk waiting

'Hopefully we'll see groundwork at the Cottages out there pretty soon,"

Mayor Gee Williams said.

Electric Company Director Tim Lawrence told the council that his department was placing its last fuel order for the year and all indicators suggest the final fuel cost will be well below budget estimates, barring any emergency needs.

During his presentation, Community Development and Economic Director Michael Day reminded the council about the Berlin Peach Festival this coming

Auxer, David set to square off in pie eating contest

Berlin Peach Festival's premire event a vehicle for settling bathtub score By Tony Russo

BERLIN — When Jeffery Auxer walked into the Globe last month and began trash talking with Greg David about which of them would emerge victorious at the end of the Bathtub Races, he sparked what has become a heated rivalry. Although he was eventually eliminated, David bested Auxer in the

bracket rounds of the race and has yet to let the local artist forget it.

"Well, I had a real bathtub," Auxer said as way of explanation, and it was true. His tub was likely the heaviest of the contraptions in the entire competition. But standing at a pre-pie-eating contest press conference at Baked Dessert Cafe and Gallery, he didn't have a lot of pro-authentic-tub friends in the room.

For his part, David has begun a strict gum chewing regimen that he believes will keep his jaws from locking up on him once the peach pie-eating contest begins. He also has advice from a former peach pie eating contest champ that he said could seal his victory.

"Don't get your nose in the pie," he said he was told. "You'll suffocate."

Auxer said that while he expects to win, he is gunning for a particular competitor.

"The whole thing is beating Greg or the Globe ... whatever he's calling it," he said. "There is one purpose — beat Greg."

The two squared off as part of a promotional event aimed at heightening the tension as the Third Annual Berlin

Peach Festival begins to get under way. Each year one of the highlights has been the pie-eating contest but, as with the bathtub races, there hasn't been the kind of compelling story line that forces people to choose sides.

Inaugurated in 2009 with the expectation of it being a relatively small affair, the Peach Festival has become the not-to-be-missed August event, bringing locals and tourists alike out in the thousands for a day of old-timey fun and entertainment.



pie-eating and baking contests had as surprising a number of participants as the event in general. Moreover, as any good performer knows, it left everyone wanting more.

Last year's event had even more to do and see as word got out to perspective vendors that there was no better way to spend an August Sunday than at the Berlin Peach Festival and the hundreds who braved the first year's heat assured their friends the trip would be worth it.

The Taylor House Museum and grounds were as packed as the downtown and since the number of diversions had doubled the event was refreshed rather than rehashed.

Even the Little Mr. and Miss. Berlin Peach pageant, which took place the preceding Friday, was better attended and much more was made of the title, its responsibilities and its glamour.

This year's schedule of events adds to and improves on last year's and the expectation is that the Berlin Peach Festival is getting ready to take its place as the premier late-summer even in the region.

Those who may not have yet attended the festival can be assured they will miss none of the staple events including the pie eating and baking contests and the various food and craft vendors who have made the festival part of their annual plans. But in the interests of keeping the festival new for everyone, more events, artists and crafters have been added.

For starters, Baked Dessert Cafe and Gallery will have a table selling the original Berlin Peach Dumpling, a confection tailored specifically to be the town's official dessert. Other food vendors will include the Arcadia Questers, Berlin Coffee House, Berlin Lions and Lionesses, Buckingham Presbyterian Church, Chesapeake Bay Farms Creamery and Stevenson United Methodist Church.

Although the event officially ends at 6 p.m., attendees are encouraged to stay on for a concert to follow featuring Peter's Voice at the Taylor House Museum's monthly Concert on the Lawn. Food vendors will stay late as well with picnic foods available for those who would rather not pack their own.

There will also be performances throughout the day by Twisters Gymnastics and Cheerleading and Smith Island storyteller Janice Marshall

In addition, the Berlin Heritage Foundation will hold a raffle for a basket filled with vouchers and gift certificates valued at \$300. Festival goers can also win a \$25 gift certificate to Main Street Berlin shops by guessing how many peach pits are in a jar.

grown, the Berlin Heritage Foundation, which sponsors the event, has increased the amount of diversions and activities available not only to keep people occupied and coming back, but also to keep the festival from becoming stale.

Among the other highly anticipated new events is the Peach haiku contest, which is the one contest everyone can win. Haiku is a Japanese style poem that traditionally has three short lines with the first containing five syllables, the second containing seven syllables and the third containing five syllables. People who submit their haiku and are willing to read it onstage will have their efforts rewarded a peach.





Drug sweep







Meetings set to review master plan for AINS

ASSATEAGUE ISLAND — Superintendent Trish Kicklighter last week announced that the National Park Service will hold public workshops to provide the community with an opportunity to learn about and comment on the new General Management Plan being developed for Assateague Island National Seashore.

The General Management Plan (GMP) will establish a vision for the Seashore and provide broad guidance for its management over the next 15 to 25 years.

At this stage in the planning process, the park has developed several preliminary management alternatives, or options for how the National Park Service will go about protecting the National Seashore's resources while continuing to provide high quality recreational opportunities

The August workshops will present the alternative management strategies and provide a forum for questions and comments

In crafting the GMP, the park has chosen to consider climate change and sea level rise as key factors influencing the future of the Seashore.

"Barrier islands such as Assateague will be especially vulnerable, and while major impacts are not expected in the near term, now is the time to set the stage so that future managers have options available when conditions do change," Kicklighter said. "We're really hoping that folks will come out and participate in the workshops. As Superintendent of Assateague, I look forward to working together in planning the future of the Seashore."

In addition to public input on how to prepare Assateague Island National Seashore for the coming decades, the workshops also give members of the public an opportunity to see the planning that has gone on thus far.

For those not able to attend the workshops, a newsletter is available that describes the GMP planning process and the preliminary management alternatives.

Downtown Berlin has Cupcakes in Bloom

North Main Street shop features new takes on traditional confections

BERLIN — It is rare that a company can be assured a certain level of success before the first time the owners even open their doors, but that is the case with Cupcakes in Bloom, which recently opened downtown. Owner Shawnee Berzonski's new store doesn't house a new business but rather is the logical extension of a good idea that became a serviceable side job and finally a career.

Berzonski has been making high-end cupcakes for more than three years. She started simply enough, making the occasional batch of themed cupcakes for friends. But when you do something so well, it is only a matter of time before demand for your services escalates.

Before too long, Berzonski was producing cupcakes for friends of friends and so on until the people clamoring for her cupcakes were strangers and her calendar was filled with weddings, showers and similar events.

Setting aside her particular talent, one of the reasons her services became so sought after was that her company remained small enough that she could oversee the setup and delivery personally. She still makes many of her trips alone — she has travel plans for weddings in Annapolis and Baltimore booked this month — in order to ensure that her vision is carried out completely.

To be fair, it is often a shared vision. Many of her clients elect to be part of the process, asking for specific designs while others select from her extensive catalog showing just how versatile a medium a cupcake can be.

Having a shop now, instead of working from home, gives Berzonski the opportunity to experiment more and to expand. Although if you don't act

quickly on a busy day you are apt to miss them, she has many of the more popular cupcake designs and flavors for sale there daily.

Expanding into a fully stocked store also provided Berzonski the opportunity to offer more than cupcakes. Cupcakes in Bloom will also be a quick lunch stop, providing healthful boxed lunches to go. All of the lunches come, as one might expect, with a mini cupcake. Just a little something sweet that won't ruin your day's calorie count.

The plan is to have a rotating menu

that favors customers' most popular choices without ever becoming too mundane. Among the regulars in the rotation are the chicken salad sandwich and the hummus platter. What sets the lunches here apart is that many of the salad ingredients are purchased at the Berlin Farmers Market or other area farm stands.

By using local sourcing for her salads and garnishes, Berzonski gets the benefits of a reliable supply chain and her customers get the benefits of healthier lunches made from local products. She expects that in the coming weeks she will be able to received faxed orders and have the lunches waiting for quick pick-up so customers can spend their lunch time eating and relaxing rather than standing in line.

Although it is not unheard of for Cupcakes in Bloom to have ready-to-go cupcake arrangements on hand, Berzonski recommends that people who know they want to have something special and specific for a particular event and day, even if it is a small office party, to place their order four or five days in advance.

Economic indicators that matter the most

I'm often ho asked about po what reports or me news that I think ofare the most important when fla gauging the U. health of our ua

economy. Following are the ten most important in my opinion.

Jobless Claims: The number of people who file for unemployment benefits in a given week. This data is collected by the Department of Labor, and published as a weekly report. The number of jobless claims is used as a measure of the health of the job market.

Non-Farm Payroll: A statistic gathered by the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics, which represents the payroll data for the bulk of the United States. The employees who are not included in this report include government employees, nonprofit employees, individuals who work within a private household, and farm employees. This calculation represents roughly 80 percent of United States work force.

Consumer Price Index (CPI): An inflation indicator that measures the change in the cost of a fixed basket of products and services that include:

housing, electricity, food, and transportation. The CPI is published monthly. It's also been called the cost-of-living index.

Producer Price Index (PPI): An inflationary indicator published by the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics to evaluate wholesale price levels in the economy

Beige Book: This report on current economic conditions is published by the Federal Reserve Board eight times each year. The Beige Book is part of the Federal Open Market Committee's planning for its meetings. The book is a summary of economic conditions in each of the Fed's regions and is primarily seen as an indicator of how the Fed might act at its upcoming meeting.

Housing Starts: The number of residential building construction projects begun during a specific period of time; usually a month.

Consumer Confidence Index: A measure of consumer optimism toward current economic conditions. The consumer confidence index was originally set at 100 and is adjusted monthly based on a survey of about 5,000 households. The index considers consumer opinion on both current conditions (40 percent of the index) and future expec-

tations (the other 60 percent).

Durable Goods Orders: A government report which measures consumer spending on long-term purchases that are expected to last more than three years. It is intended to act as a gauge for the future of the manufacturing industry.

Gross Domestic Product (GDP): The total market value of all final goods and services produced in a country in a given year. This is figured out by adding total consumer, investment and government spending; plus the value of exports, minus the value of imports.

Retail Sales Index: A monthly measurement of all goods sold by retailers based on a sampling of retail stores of different types and sizes. The retail sales index is often taken as an indicator of consumer confidence.

These ten reports, when studied objectively, can help spell out where our current economy is heading.

Several months ago we pulled a podcast down because it contained too much of my Jersey "accent" and ever since I've been careful to watch my mouth so much as I'm able.

The same cannot be said for Robin Tomaselli, one of our guests and partner in the cafe along with her sister Shelly Eppard.

He and his wife are completing the process of purchasing a house across the street and expect to celebrate their closing with bellinis.

For those you who, like me, are ignorant of the drink, it is a cocktail made with one part peach puree and five parts champagne. This will be welcome information if you aren't interested in grabbing the Festina Peche available at the Globe Sunday.

But as Todd pointed out, you can't get to Sunday without getting through Friday and for once it is likely that both of us will be in the same place Friday evening — the 2nd Friday Art Stroll here in Berlin. Many if not most of the shops and galleries have either openings or demonstrations (See "Ruby moves focus into mixed media" on page 28) and it will certainly be a blast.

Of course, Little Chico, who got all the ink he really needs last week will open at Baked Dessert Cafe and Gallery in the shadow Patrick Henry. Todd also observed that Henry purchased some of the artist's work. That is the kind of intra-recognition that can only help local artists.

The Happy Hour podcast comes out Thursday afternoon and is available by subscribing on iTunes. Just type GCFL into the search bar at the iTunes store to subscribe. It's free, fun and only requires a half-hour listening investment. Fair warning before you listen: Put on your irony hats, kids. It's all in good clean fun.

Coffee, tea, wine and beer can be sustainable and local

BERLIN — Man cannot live on bread alone, which is just as well, because getting locally ground wheat can be a bit of a problem. But wherever the bread comes from, there is no reason to wash it down with anything that isn't produced on the Eastern Shore.

Earlier this week, four of the people primarily responsible for providing locally produced beverages other than water sat in the Berlin Coffee House and talked about their respective vocations — a brewer, two vintners and a coffee and tea purveyor.

The four have more in common than vocations that revolve around beverages. They have a shared vision of an alternate way of doing things, one that relies less on low, low prices and more on creating a sustainable supply chain. All get their ingredients or products from reliable local sources or create those sources themselves and all stand to benefit from support of long-term sustainable practices.

The Berlin Coffee House

Coffee and tea are easily our country's oldest imports. But just as it is naive to suggest that beef and pork raised locally but exported to be imported isn't really local, it is equally naive to expect coffee

and tea plantations to thrive in this climate. That's not to say that there isn't a sustainable model for imports.

The fair trade movement is superficially about human rights and employment practices. At its core, it is about preserving farms and practices that provide the coffee beans that jumpstart the American morning. It is an outgrowth of accepting that small farms have to take better care of their produce and their land if they expect to remain profitable.

When Peggy Hagy and her son, Jason, opened the Berlin Coffee House nearly three years ago, they understood the practical as well as the financial benefits of participating in a reliable supply chain, even though the prices tend to be a little higher for a small startup.

After some experimentation, they elected to get their coffee from Notting Hill Coffee Roastery in Lewes, Del. With the exception of the actual growing, all of the work that makes coffee drinkable is done less than 40 miles from their door. The upshot is that they've been buying local because it makes good long-term economic sense.

Similarly, their teas are from Summerbridge Tea, a Stevensville company that blends fair trade teas for retail sale. As it turns out, the most local tea you can purchase is called Jazz Green. Sum-

merbridge owners Matt Poole and his wife, Kathi, purchased and blended the ingredients for the tea especially for the Berlin Coffee House.

Costa Ventosa Vineyard and Winery

As with coffee, some production requires a bit of leeway, moving from hyper-local into regionally sustainable. Jack Lord and Kathryn Danko-Lord, the husband-and-wife team who own and run Costa Ventosa Vineyard and Winery

in Whaleyville use both what they grow themselves and what others grow in the region to produce their wines.

By combining their young grapes with grapes from an older, more established vineyard on Virginia's Eastern Shore, Costa Ventosa produces wines that run the gamut of complexity.

Although they have just celebrated their first anniversary as retail vintners,

Ruby moves focus into mixed media

BERLIN — The only thing more satisfying than being good at something is getting good at something. Finding both the means and the reason to push yourself out of your comfort zone in order to reawaken your creative spirit is an act with which many are already familiar.

But when your creative spirit is also your livelihood, it takes more than confidence to do something new, it takes a significant amount of will.

Paige Ruby has been a prolific painter for nearly two decades. Working primarily in watercolor, she was drawn more to marine scenes featuring boats than any other subject she studied as she traveled the peninsula. But over the last few years she's found herself drawn more to mixed media, layering paint, paper, silk, and other texturally interesting pieces

onto her canvass.

"I've decided to make silk thread my signature," Ruby said.

Like many changes in artistic direction Ruby's foray into mixed media was more an exercise than anything else. She took some classes as a way of changing her focus and, hopefully, providing a new perspective on color and technique.

"It was an exercise in the beginning," she said. "As you do layers you evolve out and into what you're doing."

As Ruby become more involved with the process she found she enjoyed it. More importantly, she had a talent for it.

The way she approached mixed media is much the way one might expect an abstractionist to. It is about on-the-fly texture mixed with a predetermined color scheme. A way of doing whatever

you want as long as it conforms to a predetermined style.

Working within that paradox is a little more dangerous, in terms of production, because it is easy to lose a piece or have it become too unwieldy.

Working in watercolor, there is plenty of room for correction and adjustment. In Ruby's style of mixed media, she is either able to come to terms with what needs to be done or she is not. when she is not, the piece is ruined, but when she is something special happens, and it is evident in the work.

"I build it up by layers and it has to work," she said. "If it doesn't work, you know it"

Combining nameless disposition and emotion on canvass has indeed helped Continued on Page 29

the Lords have been cultivating the soil on their farm for some time, moving to grapes a few years ago. Each is responsible for half of the operation so there's mutual quality control. Jack makes sure nothing but the best makes it into the vats and Kathryn makes sure nothing but the best comes out.

While it is with good reason that the primary aspect of the vineyard they promote is the quality of the experience there — and if you haven't made the trip yet you should — the part that is often overlooked is the quality of the product.

Most of the wines produced at Costa Ventosa are unpretentious, from the sweet, grapey Whaleyville Red to the best-selling Diana's Delight, a cool Vidal Blanc that pairs as well with dinner as it does with a glass and some time to kill.

Those who want a little more complexity and have given up on getting it from Maryland wine will be pleasantly surprised at the less-democratic choices produced in Whaleyville.

The 2009 Pursuit of Happiness, a Gewurztraminer, is a singular dessert wine and both the 2006 and 2007 Declaration Meritage are bold, blended Bordeaux reds unlike any other produced in the state, let alone the region.

Burley Oak Brewery

Bryan Brushmiller, who has been championing his soon-to-open brewery for the better part of two years, will open his doors to the public within the next week.

Like the Lords, he can't produce enough beer with what can be grown locally — although he does have local hops producers contributing to his brews but expects that as his business grows so too will the local supply of ingredients.

Brushmiller's story begins, as all good brewing tales do, in his garage where he has spent the last several years tinkering with different ideas for beer. As he perfected his ideas he brought in Brian Carl, a professional brewmaster, to help take his notions into production. Not realizing the difference between making fivegallon batches and making 500-gallon batches is a new brewery pitfall Brushmiller wisely avoided.

More importantly, Brushmiller had the will and vision to open the political inroads that would allow beer production in Berlin.

This last observation is particularly interesting as the Eastern Shore was a hotbed of brewing in Colonial Times. Beer and wine were so pervasive the government legislatively stamped the spirits business right off the map of the Eastern Shore and it effectively remained dead for literally centuries.

With brewing's resurrection, along with continuing softening of wine regulations, Worcester County is particularly suited to move back toward a sustainable self-reliance. For the better part of the last 400 years, residents of the Eastern Shore — and indeed most of the country — subsisted and even thrived predominantly on local production. If nothing else, the local challenge is a reminder that it is still a possibility.





Wor-Wic debuts new high tech health building

SALISBURY — It is always in the interest of an institution not only to educate well but also to develop a reputation among professionals for producing graduates who can perform. With the opening the the Allied Health Building this week Wor-Wic Community College has secured their place as a top flight center for learning on the Eastern Shore.

Allied health is not so much a field or discipline as a description of similar fields and disciplines. Their programs cover nearly all facets of medical operations. The new building, however, puts cutting edge practices and technologies in the hands of their already capable staff to ensure that graduates have both the skills and practice they need when they enter the workforce.

One of the difficulties for students doing clinicals — something between a residency and an internship — is that the different cases they get to see are the luck of the draw. Whatever emergencies occur while they are on duty are the only ones they witness. Because of the way the new building is designed, students will have more access to a wider range of practice situations than they would ever be able to get during their clinicals.

"Everything here is so up to date and correlates so well with what they'll see in hospitals," said De Harrison, R.N. who has been lecturing at Wor-Wic full time for the last seven years.

Although she wasn't directly involved, Harrison said the faculty had a significant amount of input when it came to the kinds of things that improve the students access to knowledge and stimulated their quest for it.

The nursing class she was teaching with colleague Sharon Contini, R.N. was held in a room where the desks were surrounded by gurneys. In each gurney was a different mannequin made to repre-

sent different sexes, ethnicities and ages. More importantly, the mannequins are as high tech as the rest of the building and able to be programed with particular responses like breathing and heart rate.


As the students worked on their respective mannequin, others called out tips and reminders where necessary from their seats.

The class was filled with first year nursing students who were still getting used to the hands on aspect of their newly chosen careers and help from the class is part of the learning atmosphere the faculty tries to cultivate.



Students in Allied Health get hands on practice in class

In fact, one of the technological wonders of the building is that the classrooms in which students practice as opposed to, say, the lecture halls, have video camera concentrated on the treatment area.

When students are performing exercises, the teachers can record their performance and play it back. This can be an invaluable tool not only because the other students can see what correct as well as incorrect practices are but also because the students can see themselves.

If a student makes a mistake or shows particularly good form during a procedure, the instructor can freeze the frame so all of the students can benefit from the visual. A student who has made a mistake can see what the mistake looks like and therefore learn from it all the better.

Students enrolled in the radiologic technology program will also have a new laboratory that includes an energized radiograph machine surrounded by leadlined walls that can be used to take actual x-rays of mannequins with organs and skeletal systems.

There is a classroom built to look like a living area in anticipation of the school's plans to eventually offer Physical and Occupational Therapy Assistant classes

Although that particular program remains unfunded, the room is already in use as part of Wor-Wic's Emergency Medical Service program.

Students need to practice extricating people from different situations that occur in the home and the layout facilitates those scenarios perfectly.

In addition to the home and emergency and hospital room layouts for students to practice in, the Allied Health Building also boasts an ambulance classroom for EMS and other students to practice in.

Built into the side wall of a third floor classroom is a replica of the back half of an ambulance. While it is all well and good for EMS students to study photographs of what is kept where inside an ambulance, to practice their trade on mannequins in the close quarters of an ambulance helps make the training more practical.

Although the new building offers plenty of space, Contini said it is unlikely the nursing program — which has a notoriously competitive enrollment process — will expand to fill the rooms.

"The biggest shortage in nursing is qualified faculty," she said. Adding that the highly qualified accepted students tend to come from a pool of already highly-qualified applicants. As more programs become available, however, it is obvious that the health aspect of a Wor-Wic education will not run out of room anytime soon.



Making the most of a day at the beach

The kids love the beach; we merely like it. I guess that's part of filling the roles of organizer, cook, delivery system, referee, sanitation engineer, logistics chief, cleanup crew and any other title that goes along with carting a fairly large family to our sandy shore.

We have a few bonfires at Assateague during the summer, and this past week was no different, excepting that it was the first trip in a long time that I can remember staying all afternoon and into the late evening and

having the time of my life. And we did nothing of import.

That is, if you consider family time nothing of import, which I certainly do not. No, we made our customary fire after swimming in the small waves and then broke out the plancha for cooking some sumptuous seaside provisions.

Alla Plancha is the Spanish term for 'in the style of the grill' or flattop griddle. Call it what you will, 'plancha', 'cast iron skillet' or 'griddle' it is an amazingly simple tool for cooking.

Setting aside the weight of the griddle itself, it is fun, and one that impresses

even the younger lads, making it easier for them to accept a grain or two of sand in their burger.

Most people use the plancha on top of a gas flame, but as I was already lugging the firewood, shovel, towels, boogie boards, coolers (one for food and one for water and soda) et al, I figured we would go old-school on this trip and try it out directly on the fire; to outstanding results and accolades.

Most of the food was cooked alla plancha, as indicated in the recipe, but I kept my clams (middlenecks drenched in fresh garlic butter, herbs, lemon and wine) in the packet and placed on the embers and let them go. When they were done, they were perfect and the broth was an obvious match to the dipping bread. When you cook alla plancha, don't be afraid to get at least one side of your food product crusty; that's the point. The maillard ("my yard") reaction (browning similar to caramelization) affords a sweeter and more robust flavor to the finished dish.

When you read the recipe, don't stick to it exactly. Anything that you can cook on your stove or in an oven can be cooked in or on a campfire.

In fact, even as I write this, I am planning our next trip to the beach, the next bonfire and a different round of goods and the next time I get to truly appreciate our hidden treasure at the shore.

Grilled Grub alla Plancha

serves 8

2 doz. Scrubbed middleneck clams

1 doz. 10/20 dry scallops

2 lbs. diced chicken breast

Fresh garlic

c. Fresh thyme

c. Fresh parsley

c. Fresh Basil

Rosemary if desired

1 ea. Fresh lemon, quartered Splash, dry white wine for clams Spice blend of your choosing Burgers & Dogs for the kids

This takes preparation but you will thank me if you do it at home instead of trying it all in the sand!

Lay out aluminum foil and place scallops on top with butter, garlic, fresh herbs, salt and pepper. Place a lemon quarter in the foil and seal

Do the same for the chicken, adjusting the seasoning if preferred. I leave the lemon out of the chicken

When your packets are done, wrap them in a second sheet of aluminum nice and snugly. This may come in handy if you decide to throw the packets directly onto the embers

Pack in a cooler with side dishes. It might not be a bad idea to bring a small table, which will help to keep the food from sand-level for longer periods of time. The one shortcoming we had was a touch of the sandy crunch in the edi-

bles, unpleasant to the bite but a little added minerals to be sure

Go to beach and frolic

Nearing frolic's end, start your fire and wait until there is a substantial bed of embers beneath the tinder. In reality, to use a plancha you should let the fire die to embers and use that as your fuel bed. However, if you do that, you might have a hard time getting the bonfire going after dinner, so I just put the grill on earlier

Keep it simple. Cook the burgers and dogs to feed the children and get them back in the water.

Then you can focus on mealtime for the grownups. Otherwise, simply time everything to be done at once so that you may eat your family meal together

Here is where the choice comes in: You may either place some of the packets directly on the embers (hence the double foil) or you may unwrap and cook directly on the plancha

The plancha will give your food more of a crust, as the iron will be incredibly hot sitting directly on the embers. Oil and butter well and have at it!

At our cookout at the beach, I cooked the clams in the foil on the embers. They took a while to open but the flavors were melded perfectly.






