# **Old Fashioned Memorial Day Parade, Monday**

(May 24, 2018) For decades in the borough sometimes known as East Berlin, the Old Fashioned Memorial Day Parade was an important cultural event, akin to a second Christmas, according to co-organizer Gregory Purnell of the Berlin Community Improvement Association committee that sponsors the annual event.

"For the last 60 years - probably more - the Duncan-Showell American Legion has used this week before Memorial Day and the Memorial Day holiday to commemorate the veterans who have gone on - and they go all out," Purnell said.

> This week, Legion members and other volunteers will place more than 200 flags in area cemeteries before ceremonies on Sunday and Monday.

"All of the members ... will get a flag. As long as we know that they're a veteran, they'll get a flag," Purnell said. "This is just something that has always been done. The older guys taught us how to do it and why they do it, and we've just followed through."

Memorial Day Services are scheduled on Sunday at 8 a.m. at the downtown memorial on the corner of Main Street and Baker Street, and at 10 a.m. at the Saint Paul United Methodist Church on Flower Street.

During the Saint Paul service, Legion members will read the names of "maybe a couple hundred" deceased veterans associated with the Duncan-Showell Post 231, Purnell said.

"We'll read off all those names, then we'll fire off the gun salute, blow 'Taps.' After that, they'll disperse and usually come to the post and have a little dinner," Purnell said.

Remembrances are also planned in area cemeteries on Monday, starting in Whaleyville at 8 a.m. and traveling to the Curtis United Methodist Church in Bishopville, Fooks Cemetery on Route 611, New Bethel Cemetery in Germantown, and Saint Paul Cemetery on Bay Street in Berlin.

Purnell said it means "more than you know" to see people just show up and remember those who served and who sacrificed.

"There's a certain pride that comes with knowing that their family member was a veteran. But it really comes to them when they hear those 'Taps' or those shots - that three-gun salute," Purnell said. "The See CEREMONIES Page 4

# Hill candidacy still uncertain in Ocean Pines

(May 24, 2018) Whether former Ocean Pines Association director and interim general manager Brett Hill will be allowed to run for election to the board this year has yet to be decided, as the

outcome will depend on a battle of minutiae involving association bylaws and other governing documents.

Multiple sources said the attorney for the Ocean Pines Board of Directors has a legal

opinion stating Hill does not meet requirements to be a candidate, although requests to obtain of the copy of the opinion were not answered.

A press release on May 16 said Director Colette Horn, as the association secretary and with assistance from the assessment/membership coordinator, determined that nine candidates met eligibility requirements. One, who later turned out to be Hill, did not according to the release.

Hill, in an email last Wednesday, said that decision would "definitely be challenged."

In a series of letters, Horn and Hill debated which sections of the governing documents were to be followed and how to interpret what seem to be conflicting rules.

For instance, Section 5.02(a) of the bylaws require candidates to meet voting requirements of Section 3.01(c), which includes paying assessments 35 days prior to the voting deadline on Aug. 8.

However, Section 5.02(d) of the bylaws requires the secretary, Horn, to "verify that the Association's records as of May 15th support each candidate's eligibility.'

Also, Resolution M-09, governing the search committee, states candidate eligibility must include "No unpaid annual charges as of May 15th of the year of the election."

Hill, by his own admission, had not paid assessments as of Tuesday this week.

"The assessments aren't late until May 31, and I most certainly will pay them. However, I don't have \$11 million in my bank account. So right now, those dollars serve me better in my custody instead of OPA's until the point they officially become late," he said in an email.

Additionally, he argued in a letter to Horn that other current and former candidates were treated differently.

Your disqualification of me is not only legally wrong but appears to be personal,' he said. "This is the exact reason why I See CANDIDATE Page 2

filed to run for the board. The board needs to be focused on managing the business of the community, not playing with resolutions to accomplish personal agendas."

Horn replied that was not so.

"In this role, I am not making policy decisions. Rather, I am applying the requirements contained in the bylaws and the board adopted policies. Unfortunately, based on the OPA's bylaws and polices, as of the close of business on May 15, 2018 you did not meet the eligibility requirements for candidacy to the board of directors," she said.

"I can assure you I had no desire to invalidate any candidate's eligibility," she added. "My personal preference is to let the members to decide who should serve on the board of directors. But, based on the language of the bylaws and M-09, you did not meet the eligibility requirements

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for candidacy to the board and I could not verify your eligibility as a candidate. To do proceed otherwise, would be contrary to the language of the bylaws."

Hill, on May 18, filed a complaint with the Maryland Attorney General's office and on May 21 sent a letter to Horn, also forwarded to this paper, again crying foul.

You responded to me on personal letterhead, and your treatment of me is unlike that of any other candidates, both this year and in years past. If your opinion is supported by counsel, please share that opinion publicly now, otherwise, I implore you to add me as the tenth candidate on the ballot as I am legally allowed to run," Hill said.

'Your independent failure to take action now will jeopardize the election as a whole, which is certainly not something I want to do, but I will continue with legal action to fight for what is legally

correct," Hill added.

In statement sent to the Gazette, Horn said she was absolutely not discriminating against Hill.

"Contrary to Mr. Hill's assertion, all of the nine other candidate registration forms were handled in the same way. Their verifications were accomplished through (1) inspection of the information they included on their candidate verification forms and any supporting documentation they attached to the form, and (2) through verification of member status and qualification to vote (i.e. Property ownership of record and status of Assessment payment) through OPA records as of close of business on May 15, 2018."

She added, in an email on Tuesday, "I also will affirm that the verification decision was vetted by OPA Counsel prior to communicating it to Mr. Hill, as was any and all correspondence from me to Mr. Hill."

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
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# **Ceremonies scheduled Mon.** in several Berlin cemeteries

first one you hear startles you, but the next ones you could hear a pin drop.

"It means a lot to those people, because you're celebrating them," he added. "We're inviting everyone to come honor



those vets and we're trying to make those ceremonies meaningful to all of the veteran families, regardless of which war or battle, and also to honor those serving now."

The finale, the an-

nual Old Fashioned Memorial Day Parade, will start at 11 a.m. on Monday at Stephen Decatur Middle School and travel southwest on Flower Street to a staging area near Dr. William Henry Park. Free parking is available in a lot opposite the park.

This year, the parade will honor Korean War veterans from Berlin and members of the VFW Post 10159 from Salisbury. The Salisbury contingent has "been in every parade" during the last 22 years, Purnell said.

The event will also recognize former parade organizer Jesse Turner, who passed away last year.

"We're always going to honor him, but the real honorees are the Korean War veterans," Purnell said. "I can tell

you it's going to be more of a turnout this vear, because of those veterans."

Berlin Mayor Gee Williams will ride near the front of the procession and stop to say a few words at the stage near Henry Park.

Purnell said the parade dates to around the 1930s, when Isaiah Fassett, a Civil War veteran, would march in the parade and attendees would come from as far away as Philadelphia.

"Memorial Day was another Christmas," Purnell said. "It was celebrated just that much in this community."

He said the old route, perhaps five miles long, started at the Saint Paul Church on Flower Street, went to Bay Street, then through Germantown to Tyree Church, then back through town on Main Street, to the cemetery on Tripoli Street, and finally down Branch Street and back to the start.

"The parade went that way every year when I was a kid," Purnell. "And you would always get a brand-new pair of dungarees and a brand-new pair of sneakers for Decoration Day [now Memorial Dav]."

He remembers practicing the trumpet during music class and again during a study hall period, twice a day every day, in preparation for the parade.

When Memorial Day came, [the See DECORATION DAY Page 5

teacher] let us march in the front of the parade. It was the proudest day – wearing that gold cape with the white shirt, black tie and black pants, and blowing that trumpet – man!" Purnell said.

"You used to say 'Decoration Day' and you got people's attention. Decoration Day has always been in the blood of people who grew up in this community, and that is why they call it the 'Old Fashioned Memorial Day Parade,' because they're trying to rekindle that spirit," he added.

The parade stalled out and was not held for about 1015 years, but was later revived by Turner and Sandra Oliver during the mid-1990s.

"And once they did that, then we started to have 10-15 units. Now we have 30 units and we're trying to get more floats and we're trying to organize it better, and in Jesse's honor we're trying to make it a *parade* parade – not just people coming through," Purnell said.

"I want to get it out and I want people there, but I also want people to take a minute to pause and remember ... it kind of rekindles that spirit," he said.



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# Frog strangler soaks county, drops fly in weekend plans

(May 24, 2018) Heavy rains last week wreaked havoc across Worcester County, causing street closures lasting into the early part of this week and necessitating several police rescues.

Flood warnings remained in effect through Tuesday morning, according to the law enforcement agencies throughout the county.

Many roads remained closed during the early part of the week, including Route 12 at the drawbridge in Snow Hill, Whiton Crossing, Purnell Crossing, Porters Crossing and Nassawango Road, and Dividing Creek Road.

"The water levels are subsiding a little, but remain high enough to prevent vehicles from navigating through them," the sheriff's office said in a Monday Facebook post. "We are hopeful that the water levels will continue to drop over the next 48 hours."

Bill Sammler, warning coordination meteorologist with the National Weather Service, said Worcester County saw 3-5 inches of rain, with the Ocean City Airport reporting 5.47 inches since last Monday.

Nearby Salisbury has had 8.52 inches of rain so far this month, good enough for the third-wettest May since 1906, Sammler said.

In Berlin, Police Chief Arnold Downing said no injuries were reported, but that several drivers stranded in inoperable vehicles called for police help last week.

According to a press release on Friday, "The Berlin Police Department assisted several motorists that were trapped in today's weather. Many of Berlin's streets had to be closed due to the heavy rains and flooding."

Streets closed included West Street, Franklin Avenue, Branch Street, Bay Street, Flower Street, Buckingham Road, Powell Circle, and William Street.

Police said rescues began around 10:15 a.m. Friday and lasted several hours. Officers in Berlin used the department's five-ton military surplus truck during the deluge.

'One of the rescues involved a handicapped person who was driven home by the officer. Three vehicles were left inoperable and had to be towed away," Berlin Police said.

Ocean Pines Police Chief David Massey said there were no calls for help in the community, "Just some low-level flooding in a few areas."

State police last Thursday urged caution on social media with a "Turn Around, Don't Drown" campaign.

"According to the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration, it takes just 12 inches of rushing water to strand a small vehicle, while 24 inches of fast flowing water can carry away most vehicles," state police said, also citing the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention as reporting more than half of flood-related deaths occur when a vehicle is driven into hazardous flood water.

As for forecasts during the Memorial Day weekend, meteorologist Tony Pann from WBAL said additional rain was "tied to what may or may not happen in the Gulf of Mexico."

'Many of the computer models have some sort of tropical system developing in the gulf and, at the same time, an area of high pressure off the East Coast," Pann said. "This combination may end up funneling tropical moisture into the Mid-Atlantic.

"The most likely days for rain this weekend will be on Sunday and Monday," he continued. "This basic atmospheric set up, a storm in the gulf and high pressure east of Maryland, was also the main reason for all of the rain the last several days. The pattern was just locked in, but that does not seem to be the case again early next week."



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# Worcester County Veteran's Memorial flying 204 banners

(May 24, 2018) The Ocean City/Berlin Rotary Club and Worcester County Veteran's Memorial Foundation set out this year to honor 100 area veterans with the inaugural Flags for Heroes display in Ocean Pines.

The effort, although nascent, doubled its goal and today more than 200 flags stand in the field near Racetrack Road and Cathell Road.

Several dozen people braved the soggy grounds of the Veteran's Memorial park Saturday, Armed Forces Day, for an introduction ceremony to the exhibit. Those hardy spectators were treated to news of the successful campaign, and a poetry reading by Ocean Pines Association General Manager John Bailey.

Cliff Berg of the Rotary Club, co-chair of the event with Marie Gilmore of the Memorial Foundation, said it was a "great collaboration" that brought together both groups to solicit donations from local businesses and community members to help pay for the presentation.

He thanked the association for its help in installing and lighting the display, and recognized attendees Sen. Jim Mathias and Del. Mary Beth Carozza, as well as "commanders and leaders of our veteran's groups that are here this morning," including members of the American Legion and Vietnam Veterans of America.

"First, I want to thank you all for coming out to a very soggy Veteran's Memorial park. It's not always this bad, but it's been a heck of a week of rain," Gilmore said, joking it was probably because everyone "prayed for some rain to get rid of all that pollen."

"I think we all prayed a little too hard," she said. "But the pollen is gone [and] the weather has cleared for us for this morning's ceremony, and for that we are eternally grateful."

Gilmore made it a point to call the event the "first annual," and said the collaboration of the Rotary Club and Memorial Foundation was highly successful. She singled out Margaret Mudron, Robert Smith and Berg from the Rotary Club, and Linda Shanahan of the Memorial Foundation.

"It's a project that the Veteran's Memorial has thought about for a number of years and I'm quite sure that the Rotary Club has had it on their agenda for a few years, but it took a collaboration between the two to be able to make it happen," she said. "We couldn't be more pleased with the outcome.

"We had asked our community, 'do you want to honor a hero?' The answer was a resounding 'yes,' so we planned on 100 flags for the first year," Gilmore continued. "Instead, we have 204 flags our first year, so we can only imagine where See FLAGS Page 10

Ortt Companies cofounder Ralph DeAngelus said it's been "seriously tiring," but also very rewarding to help resurrect the yacht club.

'So far, it really has been great. Our results have been exactly what we've hoped for," he said.

"Sales are strong and the Ocean Pines community came out fast and furious to see us," DeAngelus continued. "I think we were up to the challenge and accepted those crowds."

What's more, DeAngelus said the dining public has been extremely warm and welcoming to the all-new yacht club staff.

"I have felt and the whole staff has felt nothing but the heartfelt desires by the people who have come in for us to succeed," he said. "The karma that the Ocean Pines community has given to us is so positive that - not to sound ridiculous - but I think it's actually helping us achieve our goals.

"My staff will say to me on a nightly basis ... 'people were so nice and they were so happy.' It makes it easier for them to do their job, and I think it makes it more important for them to be successful, because everybody is so nice and so happy that they don't want to let anybody down," DeAngelus added.

'We're happy with the start. The goal now is just to make it better," he said.

The next challenge for the Ortt Companies starts on Friday with the reopening of the Ocean Pines Beach Club, on 49th Street oceanside in Ocean City.

Hours all weekend and on Memorial Day Monday are 11 a.m. to 6 p.m. Deejay music runs from 1-5 p.m., starting Saturday.

DeAngelus, as of Tuesday, said he was still in the process of getting computer systems and new staffing in place. "It's tough to open up on Memorial

Day weekend - it's like opening up for the season with the Daytona 500. You go from zero to 60 in one minute," he said. "We're going to pull it off, but it's just a little tougher.'

While the yacht club boasts a large dining area and three separate bars, much of the business at the beach club will involve the "grab and go" approach, not unlike a Wawa, DeAngelus said.

Things like slices of pizza and soft pretzels will be available immediately at a counter, while other food items will require a ticket and take maybe five minutes to prepare.

DeAngelus said the situation presents a unique set of challenges.

"The fact that you're not dealing with servers makes it easier, but you have a lot more space," he said. "So you're still serving the same amount of food, only you're doing it in a kitchen that's a quarter of the size of what you have the yacht club with a quarter of the amount of cooks.'

What's more, he said, "The bar at the beach club is the size of a thimble" and has to put out drinks for customers inside the club, at the pool, and on the

beach


We'll also have cocktail waitresses for sure," DeAngelus said. "And if the cocktail waitress goes out to a table to a lounge table by the pool - or even out to the beach - and someone says, 'Hey, can you get us three beers and a gin and tonic, oh, and by the way, can you grab me one of those burgers?' she's going to say, 'Sure!"

Prior to reopening the yacht club last week, Ortt Companies staff opened the doors two days early for a stress test, a kind of soft opening designed to push the staff to its limits.

DeAngelus said an event was recently held at the beach club as a soft opening, and a food stress test was planned on Thursday, one day before the reopening there.

"God bless we get it right the first time!" he said with a laugh.

"The whole company - the whole crew from the busboys to the bar staff feel the heartfelt desires of the customers that come in for us to succeed, and it feels really good to us," DeAngelus added.

Gilmore thanked the business owners and individuals who sponsored a flag on behalf of a veteran of the U.S. Armed Forces

After deciding on the location, the next step would be to approach Bailey to ask for assistance by Ocean Pines' public works, she said, "Because as you all well know, a flag display must be lit at night."

"My answer from Mr. Bailey was a resounding, 'Yes, we can do that and, yes, public works will help.' And they have been there helping us out every step of the way," she said.

Bailey said it was wonderful to be "in the midst of a great patriotic environment."

"When asked to speak today, my mind raced to some pretty cool memories of some patriotic events that I was able to be a part of," he said.

In 1976, at age 11, Bailey said he participated in a musical celebration of the U.S. Bicentennial while wearing blue pants, a white shirt and a red bowtie.

"And, yes, I played the ukulele and I sang," he said.

A decade later, while attending Averett University in Danville, Virginia, Bailey said he was present when former House Speaker Tip O'Neill came to speak.

"I was the president of the political science club [and] I was ready to ask him a hardball question ... that I just knew was going to trip the speaker of the house up," he said.

O'Neill, however, was suddenly called back to Washington, D.C. by Secret Service before Bailey could speak. He later found out it was because the U.S. had bombed Libya.

"When he came out of that beautiful southern auditorium building with these big, tall white columns, and remember the white hair? [It was] blowing in the breeze," he said. "Across the street from the auditorium was an elementary school, and about 250 little students came out and, as he was coming out of the building ... they started singing 'This Land is Your Land' and every one of them had a little flag waiving."

On Jan. 29, 1986, the day after the Space Shuttle Challenger disaster, Bailey was standing on a sidewalk on a cold day in Munich.

"I was told about the disaster by my history professor and I quickly purchased an English paper," Bailey said. "I read the stories on the sidewalk and I never before or since felt like such an ambassador for this great country as I did that day, with those of another country sharing, in German, their condolences and hugs for the next 10 or 15 minutes right there on the sidewalk in Munich.'

Bailey said he has attended several presidential inaugurations, parades and balls, and been at several promotion ceremonies for U.S. generals at the Pentagon.

He said the best rendition of "The Star Spangled Banner" he ever heard was at the entryway of a hotel in Saint Petersburg, Russia.

"A musician, a trumpeter, was playing music for tips and asked me what I wanted to hear. I said, 'how about my national anthem?' He grinned and said, 'I can do that," Bailey said. "I stopped dead in my tracks and faced him, and stood tall, put my hand over my heart, and listened."

Bailey said he was irritated as a fellow traveler walked by, ignoring the song and calling him "sappy."

"I muttered back, 'a little sappiness will do you some good," Bailey said. "We should never get comfortable with being proud of our country, our history, our honor, and our flag.'

He finished by asking how many had heard all four verses from "The Star Spangled Banner" during the last decade - or ever.

"Remember, it was written as a poem before we put music to it," he said. "No, I'm not going to sing it - thank goodness.'

But Bailey did read all four verses, surrounded by several hundred large American flags blowing in the wind behind him.

"I encourage you to enjoy this display of flags, and I challenge you to hold others accountable to the belief that the flag of the United States of America is worthy of our respect, always," Bailey said.

Flags for Heroes will remain through Memorial Day, Monday May 28, at the Worcester County Veteran's Memorial in Ocean Pines.

The public is invited to walk among the display and read the names of veterans identified by a medallion hung around each flag.

# Mathias, Carozza sponsor 'Flags for Heroes'

(May 24, 2018) Looking around the Worcester County countryside, it's obvious that this is an election year with several local races of consequence and thousands of colorful political signs staked into the earth.

Not the least of these contests is the District 38 State Senate race featuring incumbent Sen. Jim Mathias, a Democrat, and challenger Delegate Mary Beth Carozza, a Republican.

However, for at least the next week, also dotting the landscape are 204 American Flags at the Worcester County Veteran's Memorial in Ocean Pines, each honoring a veteran of the U.S. Armed Forces, two of whom are important to Mathias and Carozza.

Both were present during a dedication ceremony for Flags for Heroes on Saturday, and each afterward talked about the flag they had sponsored and why those former soldiers were so important to them.

"My Family and I wanted to sponsor a flag for Samuel Bowen," Carozza said. "Samuel Bowen served in Iraq and was killed in Iraq. He was a Stephen Decatur graduate in 1983."

Bowen was killed on July 7, 2004 by a rocket-propelled grenade, according to the Army Times newspaper. He reportedly was the 1,000th member of the U.S. Military to die in battle after the World Trade Center attack on Sept. 11, 2001.

Carozza said his mother, Elsie Bowen, was involved in planning for the veteran's memorial and had been honored as a Gold Star Mother when she died in 2012. She was 67.

"I wanted to keep Samuel Bowen's service alive, especially for our children

and our students," Carozza said.

Fifth grade students in Worcester, Carozza noted, each year take a field trip to the veteran's memorial.

"We have the opportunity to walk them around the memorial [and] show them the different service flags and the pavers, and when we go to the section with the army, what I like to do is personalize it and localize it for the students, so I first ask them if they can find Samuel Bowen's paver," Carozza said.

The small, red-orange brick square reads: "SAMUEL BOWEN, PFC U.S. ARMY, 1,000 CASUALTY, IRAQI FREEDOM."

"And then I asked them, 'Have you ever been to Walmart on Route 50?' And they'll raise their hand and I'll say, 'Do any of you know the name of the road in front of Walmart?" Carozza said.



The road, of course, is named Samuel Bowen Boulevard.

"I say [to the students], 'You have the freedom to shop and to play and to go to school and to pray and to go to work because of individuals like Samuel Bowen, who sacrificed his life for our country," Carozza said. "I want them to make the connection with their freedom, and for someone locally who served and ended up making the ultimate sacrifice."

Bowen's flag is number J-9 in the Flags for Heroes display.

"I thought today was very special," Carozza said. "I want to give credit to the members of the Worcester Veteran's Memorial, to the Rotary, to all the sponsors, because ... they doubled their goal. There are over 200 flags here, and this certainly shows the support and the commitment to having our American heroes honored."

Mathias chose to sponsor a flag on behalf of Edward O. Petry, the father of his late wife, Kathleen Mathias, who died of cancer in 2011.

He said Petry was a career U.S. Army man, who served in Korea and Vietnam. His flag is numbered I-15.

"We're very fortunate that he's still with us today, and we're able to stand here today and talk, living our freedom [because] of those who served," Mathias said. "They're an inspiration ... and clearly strengthened the foundation for those who have yet to serve."

Mathias described Petry, now in his mid-80s, as "a great guy, a very quiet gentleman."

"He's a patriot and he's always worked hard and provided for his family," he said. "He stands in love and dedication to this country to this very day."

Mathias added his son, Trevor, is an Eagle Scout and was inspired by the service of Petry.

"They say behind every Eagle Scout is a mother's foot in their behind, so Mr. Petry certainly inspired his daughter to keep all of us on track. And she shepherded all of us – God bless you, Kathy," Mathias said. "And we thank Ed for his service to our country, being a great father, and being a great inspiration for all who are out there in the field today."

Mathias, the former mayor of Ocean City, served on the Ocean City Police Commission for six years and is a lifetime member of the Ocean City Volunteer Fire Company.

"We thank the men and women that keep us safe and provide for our freedom, to allow us to be able to exchange ideas freely, and know that when we participate in a community we do it with protection, with freedom, and most importantly the dedication of those men and women that have given their lives to keep us free and keep us safe," he said.

"As you hear 'never forget,' this is yet another example of us never forgetting and lifting up in gratitude for their service," Mathias added. May 24, 2018

# **BFPC talks park development**

(May 24, 2018) The Berlin Falls Park Committee last week continued to work on its list of priorities for developments on the 60-plus acre former industrial site on Old Ocean City Boulevard.

Committee Vice Chairman Jack Orris said a facility with a swimming pool has been a recurring theme during those discussions.

"We would like to look further into the possibility of a county rec center partnership or a YMCA," he said. "Any option would most likely necessitate pools and recreation opportunities all in one building."

Ideally, Orris said, representatives from the YMCA and Worcester County Recreation Department would be asked to attend future meetings. The committee convenes once each month.

The committee also talked about the "feasibility and functionality of the existing buildings," and what could be done with the back half of the park, which could remain open for passive public use, Orris said.

"The nature of the passive side is pretty much prepackaged for the community – we just want to spruce it up with some signage, address safety concerns, and utilize the recommendations of the [feasibility] studies," Orris said. He added trash and dog-waste bins were installed at the park last week.

Orris also encouraged residents to continue to participate through an online suggestion box that went live the town's website last month.

According to an online statement, "The Berlin Falls Park Advisory Committee would like to hear residents' suggestions regarding the visibility of, and access to the 60-acre Town property containing the former Tyson chicken processing plant ... The park is expected to contain a combination of active and passive uses."

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# **Craft beer study points to positive impact**

(May 24, 2018) According to a study by Ann Hillyer of Shore Craft Beer, more than 90 percent of the people surveyed said the presence of a craft brewery in Berlin affected their business. Of those who answered "yes," 91.7 percent said the impact was positive.

Two thirds said the presence of craft beer affected revenue, while 25 percent said it did not and 8.3 percent were not sure.

Seventy percent said craft beer increased revenue, while 30 percent were not sure. Additionally, 75 percent said craft beer increased the number of customers and 25 percent were not sure.

Asked, "Does the quality and quantity of local craft beers produced in our region impact your business positively," 83.3 percent said yes and 16.7 percent were not sure.

Hillyer said the survey was meant to canvas the effect of craft beer in general, although some of the questions specifically mention Burley Oak Brewing Company because it was a microcosm of the craft brewing industry's relationship with communities.

She said the survey was distributed to local business owners last fall, "from shopping and retail places, to bars and restaurants, to the hotel."

"I would like to see more businesses in Berlin respond, but there was not one person who believed that the presence of the brewery in the town had a negative impact, and that's the biggest takeaway," she said. "Everybody, universally, thinks it's a positive impact ... so I think that's huge for the presence of breweries in towns and how important it is to downtowns."

She said the study was designed to gauge the impact of breweries on tourism.

"We're trying to make the shore a top-10 craft beer destination, so I want to show that the support of breweries across the state and across the shore is a good thing for all of our businesses – and for tourism in general," Hillyer said.

With a relatively small sample size, about a dozen responders, Hillyer is asking more area business owners to participate in the online survey. The study is open to business owners in Berlin, and a separate study was started for Salisbury businesses.

"Until people understand how important breweries are to our region and to our businesses, the economic impact potential is huge, but right now Maryland is 47th in the nation

per capita ... and that's pathetic," she said.

Maryland, according to 2017 census data, is the 19th most populous state, with just over six million residents.

"I think we can do so much better," Hillyer said. "If we can help the business environment for the breweries it helps everybody. It helps retailers. It helps union workers. But that data doesn't exist and that's why I want this data." Hillyer said general comments on the impact of breweries were also welcome. To contact her, email amh@maryland.com.

"I'd love for more business owners to fill the surveys out, and if they're just individuals they can type in they're an individual and it matters to them, and I can separate out that data," she said.

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# **Berlin Briefs**

(May 24, 2018) The Berlin Mayor and Council last Monday discussed the following items during a public meeting at Town Hall:

# Fees waived

The council, in separate unanimous votes, agreed to waive park reservation fees for Stephen Decatur High School and Worcester Youth and Family Counseling Services. One council member, Troy Purnell, was absent during the meeting.

During the discussion Councilman Thom Gulyas asked Town Administrator Laura Allen to look into a fee-waiver system for nonprofit use of town parks so a council vote isn't required.

# **EDU** shuffle

The council voted 3-1 to approve the transfer seven EDUs (equivalent dwelling units), a measure of water consumption, to TeePee Development LLC for use at the Purnell Crossing development owned by Councilman Troy Purnell. The costs were averaged to \$8,585.71 per EDU.

Allen said the matter was slightly complicated because some ready-toserve fees were not paid between 2003 and 2011 "for reasons that aren't clear to us." She said that fac-



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tored into the averaged costs and that it was "unclear in terms of who's really at fault in this.'

"My understanding is that it would make it easier for him to sell the properties, so he would like to get the council's permission not only to transfer, which you've done before, but to agree to do the averaging so that the EDU cost is the same across all parcels.

"Ultimately, the town would be getting the same amount of money. We're also going to be getting several years' worth of ready-to-serve [fees] as a back payment for this issue," Allen added.

Councilman Zack Tyndall opposed the measure.

## **Property tax rate**

The council held a first reading to set the fiscal 2019 property tax rate, which remains flat at \$0.68 per \$100 of evaluation.

Mayor Gee Williams said the rate was one of the lowest in the region, excluding Ocean City.

"That is five cents lower than it was seven years ago, when we were one of the few municipalities in the entire state to lower our property tax rate. We've been able to maintain that for the last several years, but it's not automatic," Williams said. "I do not know if we're going to be able to maintain ... the lowest property tax rate in this region."

A public hearing on the property tax rate would occur during the next council meeting, Allen said.

# Drug box

Police Chief Arnold Downing said a drug drop-off box was set up at the new police station, near the corner of Flower Street and Assateague Road. He said the box would be available 24 hours a day, 365 days a year.

He later clarified in an email that the box was for prescription drugs, including veterinary prescriptions, only. No liquids or sharp objects, including needles, are permitted.

"All illicit drugs should be given directly to an officer," Downing said.

## 2019 events

Economic and Community Development Director Ivy Wells said applications were available for 2019 events in the town. Those wishing to host events must register with the town by the beginning of September.

Kennedy offered, "I like being out-


side. I like nature. It's just something

# Pars for Paws golf tournament to aid Humane Society




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# **OPA** issues safety reminder: non-players stay off course

Struck golf balls can travel about 100 miles per hour, injure or kill pedestrians

(May 24, 2018) The Ocean Pines Association would like to remind everyone that the golf course is reserved for golf use only.

For safety reasons, area residents and guests need to refrain from using the golf course for walking or other personal, non-golf activities, including biking, skateboarding, and children playing in bunkers.

"While we love our golfers, they are not all PGA Tour-ready and thus do not necessarily control the flight of the golf ball like the guys and gals we see on television," Ocean Pines General Manager John Bailey said. "When hit, a golf ball is sent speeding along in flight, on average, about 100 miles per hour. The ball's speed on average is about 40 miles per hour when it lands.'

Bailey added, "Getting hit by a golf ball is painful and, depending on the circumstances, may even kill someone, especially if a child is involved.'

The Association is urging residents and guests to be safe and avoid

walking or playing on the grounds of the golf course.

"We don't want anyone to be hurt or killed by not following this simple guideline," Bailey said.

Walking along the cart path, or other areas of the course, is not only hazardous, it's also trespassing. Signs are posted throughout the golf course indicating that the golf course is for "Registered Golfers Only – No Trespassing."


There is to be no non-golf use of the golf course, including walking on the cart paths.

If someone is improperly using the golf course, golf staff will try to address the issue directly by asking the person(s) to remove themselves from the golf course. If their effort fails, then the Ocean Pines Police Department may be called.

While the Association obviously takes golf course safety seriously, it also wants to encourage pedestrians to enjoy a stroll along one of its six walking trails.

The nearest walking trail to the golf course is the "South Gate Pond Trail 2." It's a 2.5-mile walk along a stone dust trail on the south end of Ocean Pines with a variety of scenic views.

# **Students learn about water, beach safety at Pines pool**

# School district funding new program for fourth graders

(May 24, 2018) Worcester County Public School fourth graders are diving into beach and water safety courses at the year-round indoor Sports Core Pool in Ocean Pines.

"Learning to save themselves as well as how to respond to an emergency can really change the outcome of a bad situation," Ocean Pines Aquatics Director Colby Phillips said. "Worcester County is surrounded by water and, with drowning being one of the top-five leading causes of death in children, it is extremely important for our children to gain as much education on water safety as possible."

According to the U.S. Census Bureau, Worcester County has a total area of 695 square miles, of which 468 square miles are land and 227 square miles are water.

Data from Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, National Center for Injury Prevention and Control shows that every day, about 10 people die from unintentional drowning. Of these, two are children ages 14 or younger.

"So much time and energy have been put into this program to cover all

aspects of water safety," Phillips said. "When creating the program we have reached out to the Ocean Pines Volunteer Fire Department, the Ocean City Beach Patrol, the Ocean Pines Swim Team, water safety instructors, and the Stephen Decatur High School swim team."

Area students ages 9-10 are currently participating in the safety course, which includes rip currents awareness.

"Each day the students rotate through stations and each day one station is a swim lesson based on their skill set," Phillips said. "They are taught reach-and-throw techniques, how to use personal flotation devices, and how to administer first aid as well as other fun water safety-based activities."

The safety program is funded by the school district and is a newly launched partnership between the Ocean Pines Aquatics Department and Worcester County Public Schools.


Phillips, who believes the children are enjoying the program, added, "We keep it entertaining for them and keep them moving so they don't get bored."

"The team has really enjoyed working with the children," she said.

What these expressions have in common is that they're spoken so frequently that they no longer have any real meaning. We use them as utilities when the circumstances require us to say something, and we haven't really thought about a more heartfelt way of saying it.

Instead, we cover our bases by trotting out one of our well-tested conversational catchlines.

"Thank you for your service" is of particular note this weekend, as we honor soldiers, sailors and airmen and airwomen who aren't around to hear us say it.

In that respect, "Thank you for your service" doesn't cover the debt. Honoring our fallen military personnel would require so much more than that, and the only way to show it is to do more than saying "thanks" to those who were lucky enough to have done their duty and returned.

How would Marylanders feel, for instance, about picking up an extra five cents on their tax rates to extend some form of property tax break to all veterans, not just disabled ones?

Perhaps the state income tax, which spares the first \$15,000 of pay for active duty personnel serving overseas, might be lifted for all active duty service members when they're not living in Maryland, but are on a base or in port somewhere else in the U.S.

What kind of greeting is that upon returning home — thank you for your service ... and, by the way, you owe back income taxes?

As it is, veterans don't get that much once their service is done — a pat on the back, maybe a ceremony and public recognition. If we are so grateful that others have done their duty for us, we should be willing to back it up with more than just saying so.

When making a purchase of this size, whether capital or operations, transparency is crucial. Additionally, the motion notes that consideration was provided for outsourcing, but it was decided not to be the best avenue.

In board discussion at the March board meeting, directors argued over an RFP vs. RFI for outsourcing but declined to take any action. So I have to ask, how and when was outsourcing considered?

Until all options are considered and presented in detail, I believe the most prudent step would be for the board to complete the evaluation process before making a decision.

The association has been running in its current state for the better part of 20 years. Surely it can survive a few more months to make sure all options are properly vetted.

This is the reason I became associated with S.T.O.P.

Stop Taxing Ocean Pines (S.T.O.P.) has a history of fighting to protect the homeowners of Ocean Pines for the last decade and is continuing to do so here.

Association members need to attend the board meeting on Thursday and make their opinions known to the board. If the board continues down this road with blinders on, S.T.O.P. is prepared to file an injunction for judicial relief to see that proper consideration of all options is considered.

Our assessment dollars are too important. S.T.O.P. has been successful two other times in taking such action, and I have no doubt they will be successful again if necessary.



There will be a scavenger hunt on Dorchester Street with a whole list of Boardwalk trivia questions."

Graduates will receive T-shirts, food, drinks, giveaways and prizes at competitive events. Prizes have been donated by local businesses.

"All of the events are free and gives them an opportunity to do something safe, but fun," Greenwood said. "The whole thrust of our programs are to keep these kids out of trouble while they are here and send them home safely to their

parents."

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

## Top off your holiday cookout with Kobe dogs

I know I wrote about hot dogs at some point last year, but at this point I'm so tired I can't see straight. I'm sitting in an airport writing this. In



fact, this is my second airport today with my daughters, as the airline at the first airport completely botched our flight. After three hours of finding ourselves stuck on the tarmac (the stuff of legends and YouTube videos), they finally threw in the towel and redirected us.

For us, it meant a \$120 cab ride across New York and some nonstop seats to Costa Rica on a different airline.

Chalk that one up as a total loss for airline number one. But you can't leave people stranded on a tin can on an airstrip for three hours. The trip that has been destined to fail from the start is living up to its selfassumed reputation, but that's not only a story for later; that could be a chapter in a book all in its own.

We sit in the gaudy, punk-nostalgic "CBGB Pub" in Newark's C Terminal, and I can't help but to laugh at what they're trying to pull off. If you don't know about CBGB, it was an iconic punk club for many decades. Now, it's a mere spit-and-polish, kitschy representation of America's lust for clinging to nostalgia. But the food ain't half bad.

As I bite into my hot dog, I savor the flavors, the bite of the Kobe frankfurters and the crisp, tart & sweet nuances of the curtido. Theirs did not have avocado chunks in it, but I immediately thought that it needed it. I just added some to a cheese tray yesterday and it was perfect. Next week I'll grab some Kobe hot dogs from Toby at Gilbert's Provisions and knock this dish out of the park. None of it is guesswork, as I've made everything on the list countless times. But together, it is a flavor marriage that surpasses every stadium dawg, boring and drab. They simply transcend the usual fare of the seventh-inning stretch.

If you have any of the bacon jam left over from last week, that is a complete natural on this as well; the more the merrier. Homemade mustards continue to complement and complete these beasts and by performing the simple act of crushing potato chips and/or corn chips on your sandwich (oh, lord, let's don't have that argument again; yes, it is a sandwich) you will add crunch, salt and flavor that you simply cannot get from anything else.

The dog is gone, the drinks have been consumed and our seats secured (finally) on a proper flight. Now all I need is some sleep. It's been a while; approximately 30 hours at this point. Who knows? Maybe that's why I'm sounding like a broken record with these hot dogs.

#### Kobe Mayhem Dog

Enough for 4 dogs

4 5-ounce or larger Kobe beef hot dogs

- 4 Pretzel rolls
- Bacon jam (as needed, from last week)
- 1 cup Avocado-onion Curtido (recipe follows)
- 1/2 cup Homemade cheese goo (recipe follows) Potato chips or corn chips, as needed



Assorted homemade mustards & mustard seeds 1. Poach the dogs or steam them and set aside, keeping hot until ready to fire

2. Toast rolls to warm through, as you don't want them crispy

3. Place the dogs in the buns and top with everything else, trying at least to pretend that everything stays within the parameters of the bun

4. Crumble some chips/corn chips and serve

**Avocado-Onion Curtido** 

Makes 2-3 cups

1 1/2 cups Shredded cabbage

Shredded carrot, red cabbage and red pepper as needed

- 1 tsp. red pepper flakes
- 1/2 tsp. Thyme leaves
- 1 firm avocado, peeled and cut into half-inch cubes
- 1/2 Red onion, julienne
- 4 garlic cloves, roasted and smashed
- 2 cups White vinegar
- 1/2 cup Granulated sugar
- Salt & Pepper, as needed

1. Place the vegetables and seasonings in a bowl and toss well

2. Bring the vinegar and sugar to a boil and remove from heat, allowing to cool for at least five minutes

3. Pour this solution over the vegetables, ensuring that all vegetables are submerged. If they are not, try a narrower container or place everything in a Ziploc bag and squeeze out the air

4. Refrigerate for at least two hours and serve from that point and up to a few weeks

#### **Homemade Cheese Goo**

Makes 1 quart (there's never enough)

2 cups Heavy cream

- 1/2 cup Whole milk
- 1 ounce Flour
- 1 ounce Butter
- 6 Roasted garlic cloves, all squishy and toasty
- 1/4 cup Good parmesan cheese
- 1/2 cup Sharp white cheddar cheese
- 1/4 cup Shredded provolone
- 1/4 cup Goat cheese (completely optional)
- Salt & Pepper as needed

1. Bring the milk and cream to a simmer and make a roux out of the flour and butter

- 2. Add the roux to the milk and bring to a low boil, at which point you will see it begin to thicken slightly
- 3. With the cream hot, start sprinkling in the cheeses and allow them to melt through
- 4. Finish with the goat cheese last as it won't take any time to melt
- 5. Season and adjust your seasonings as you see fit

6. Keep warm until ready to use. This will also hold well in the refrigerator for up to seven days, as long as it is cooled and stored correctly
