Pines Country Club gets demolished

Tear down to facilitate new, smaller building

(May 23, 2019) The Ocean Pines country club is no more as of Monday, having been demolished earlier than anticipated.

Demolition began last Friday, when an Ocean City contractor, Absolute Demolition, which had bid on the project, was in the area and offered to perform the work.

The company had just completed a taking down a large steel building adjacent to the World Gym building on 67th Street in Ocean City to make way for a parking lot. The company had nine calendar days to complete the project, which began on Wednesday, May 8, and finished last Thursday.

"They gave us a very good price for doing the demolition," Vice President Steve Tuttle said. "Every place you See OCEAN Page 6

Rabies case confirmed in **Ocean Pines**

Raccoon sixth animal in '19 to test positive

(May 23, 2019) A raccoon captured in the area of Abbott Place in Ocean Pines has tested positive for the rabies virus, the Worcester County Health Department confirmed last week.

Anyone who had direct contact with the animal or has a pet that may have been bitten or scratched or may have come into contact with its saliva by other means, should call the health department at 410-352-3234.

Travis Brown, public information officer with the Worcester County Health Department, said it appears rabies numbers in the county are down slightly this year, with six confirmed cases thus far, four raccoons and two foxes.

Last year, 26 cases were confirmed, including 19 raccoons, one skunk, one opossum, two foxes, two cats, and one bat.

Ocean Pines board candidates announced

(May 23, 2019) All eight candidates who filed by the May 10 deadline have met the requirements as permitted by the Ocean Pines Bylaws, according to Board Secretary Dr. Colette Horn.

The candidates, in alphabetical order, are Cynthia L. Bartolomeo, Paula Roberson Gray, 73, Tom Janasek, 53, Shawn Kotwica, Larry Perrone, 63, Camilla J. Rogers, 65, Hans Edward Solum Jr. and Gregory Turner, 60.

The candidates will be vying to fill three vacant board positions, all of which are for three-year terms.

Gray, who moved to Ocean Pines three years ago, ran for the board last year and missed by such a small margin, she running again. She is calling for more board transparency.

Janasek, who has lived in Ocean Pines since 1984, ran for the board three years ago, and is running once again after gaining more experience through his work on advisory committees such as the Environmental and Natural Assets committee, which he chairs.

Perrone has lived in the association for 36 years and will be running for the

first time. He has financial experience as the chairman of the Budget and Finance Committee.

Rogers, a lawyer and nurse practitioner who moved to Ocean Pines last year, will be running for the first time. She is calling for more transparency and communication at board meetings.

Turner, who has been a resident of the association since 1978, ran last year on the campaign of making sure directors are held more accountable.



largest parade in at least five years."

The parade will begin at 11 a.m. Monday, and the lineup will begin at 9 a.m. at Stephen Decatur Middle School on Seahawk Road in Berlin.

Lockwood also said the Berlin Police Department, Worcester County Sheriff's Office, Maryland Natural Resources Police and local fire police officers would help to populate the parade.

"This year we have I think every law enforcement agency participating, [and] all local law enforcement participating," Lockwood said.

The theme for the 2019 Old Fashion Memorial Day Parade is Celebrating Women in Service.

Lockwood said organizers plan to do that by having female co-grand marshals: U.S. Air Force Capt. Michelle Rogers and Retired U.S. Army Sgt. Major Donna Dare.

Local historian Greg Purnell said this year's parade theme helps to "make women out in the community feel appreciated."

Additionally, Lockwood said roughly 20 vendors would be at next week's parade.

As for food, residents and visitors will find a major menu that ranges from crab cakes to Hawaiian ice.

One local favorite Lockwood said he's particularly excited about is steak fish, which is a thick cut of a spiny dogfish shark.

"We have a vendor that specializes in steak fish, so people look forward, they always ask me, 'Are you selling steak fish? Is the steak fish vendor going to be there?" Lockwood said.

Lockwood added that the Berlin Community Improvement Association would have a booth during the festivi-

"I think that this is a point where we can all come together and enjoy ourselves for one day and gain membership [and] new ideas," he said.

Lockwood said guests could also take advantage of several activities, including face painting, a pickup basketball tournament and a dance competition.

One obstacle Lockwood faces: Mother Nature.

"Right now, the only challenge ... would be weather," Lockwood said. "Other than that we're smooth flowing now, everyone's done an excellent job.'

Forecasts for Memorial Day show a high of 77 degrees with a partly cloudy sky, according to weather.com. There is a 10 percent chance of precipitation.

While some may call the holiday the unofficial start to summer, Lockwood added that "we don't want forget the reason we're having the Memorial Day parade for military personnel loss of lives."

Purnell, a veteran who served during the Vietnam War, said the Old Fashion Memorial Day Parade was the "grandest of parades back in the day."

Purnell noted how the parade used to run throughout the entire town for many years. Once Route 113 was established, participation decreased, and the parade even stopped.

He added there was a resurgence of the parade in the mid-to-late 1990s and has continued to this day.

However, Purnell called for widespread community participation and support.

'[It's the] coolest small town in America. Let's be that," Purnell said.

can save money is a good thing."

The unexpected demolition ended up saving money for the association, which had budgeted \$3,000 more than the job cost. It also allowed the association to get a better understanding of what work will be needed in the

"We decided to go ahead and let them do that work since [Whayland Company], who were bidding it, their time schedule was set to take place in the fall," Tuttle said. "When you get into the fall, you start getting into more difficult weather conditions.

"This provides an opportunity to take a look at the existing foundation and to verify where some of the utilities are that service the building," he continued. "This will provide some additional design information that's needed to continue with the project."

A construction date for the new clubhouse has not been set, though everything is on track "as far as architectural design and engineering goes,"

A motion to award a guaranteed maximum price contract of \$1.6 million to Whayland Company for the design and construction of the new clubhouse was made and approved by the Ocean Pines Board of Directors at its April 6 meeting.

Golf operations have been moved to a trailer and will remain there until the new clubhouse is completed. Food and beverage service and restroom facilities will be available in the interim.

Plans for the new building have already been reviewed, Tuttle said.

"The first draft of the new clubhouse floor plan and elevation views were received yesterday by the construction working group on Friday," Tuttle said. "Recommendations to the architect and contractor Whayland Company will be made early next week after gathering some additional information."

Ocean Pines Golf Club opened in 1972, making it one of the community's oldest buildings and one of the earliest courses in the Ocean City area. Open to the public year-round, it is the only Robert Trent Jones Sr.-designed course on Maryland's Eastern Shore.

In addition to offering memberships for families, individuals and juniors, Ocean Pines Golf Club features 18 holes of championship golf, practice facilities, instructional clinics, summer junior golf camp, private lessons and club sales, fittings and repair serv-

Continued from Page 1 confirmed rabid animals in Worcester County (and in Maryland), other species are also infected. Many people are not aware



that the most frequent domestic animals to contract rabies are cats."

The first rabies case this year was announced on Jan. 12, as a raccoon captured near Teal Circle in Ocean Pines tested positive for the rabies virus.

Additional confirmed cases this year include a raccoon on Feb. 22 in Pocomoke, a fox on April 14 in Newark, a raccoon on April 16 in Pocomoke, and a fox on April 22 in Snow Hill.

The health department website includes several recommendations when dealing with suspected rabid animals:

- If you see a wild animal, such as a raccoon, skunk, fox, groundhog, opossum, or a feral cat behaving in a threatening or obviously sick manner, or should your pet be involved in an altercation with one of those animals, report immediately to your local police department or Sheriff's office.
- Prevent further contact by keeping pets and people away. If a pet or person has already had contact, it is important that the rabies suspect animal be obtained (safely) for rabies testing.
- If a pet has had contact, do not touch the pet barehanded. Make sure the health department is contacted for further instructions if contact has occurred. Your pet's veterinarian may also be contacted for further advice.



Janasek focuses on drainage, management in OPA election

(May 23, 2019) Ocean Pines resident Tom Janasek, 53, and a member of the community since 1984, has decided to once again run for the board of directors.

Janasek, who installs beverage delivery systems in area establishments, went into real estate straight out of high school and started his own construction company in the early 1990s. He ran his company for more than 20 years, and now works with AC Beverage out of Bishopville.

Janasek first ran for the board in 2016, but realized he wasn't ready or well informed enough at the time.

"I realized I didn't know enough about the ins of the board and the mini government that we have within the Pines," Janasek said. "So, I have involved myself in a lot more of the politics and a lot more stuff going on behind the scenes."

He also participated in reestablishing the golf advisory committee and joined the environmental and natural assets committee, on which he serves as chairman. One of the most important lessons for Janasek was that knowing someone on the board helps smooth out the tough spots.

"What I realize is that is that you need to know somebody on the board of Ocean Pines in order to get stuff done," Janasek said. "I want to get back on it and help people get stuff done."

Ocean Pines has seen significant improvements over the last few years, Janasek said, referring to place such as the Ocean Pines Yacht Club and Beach Club being transferred to Matt Ortt Company management. However, he is concerned about micromanagement

and wants to ensure that does not happen if he is on the board.

He is also concerned because so many board members have resigned early this year.

"If you're going to commit to [the board]

you've got to commit to it," Janasek said. "Things come up, but you've got to be there. You've got to follow through all the things you wanted to get done."

Other key concerns for him are the drainage issue, which has been a source of frustration for many Ocean Pines residents, and the Ocean Pines Country Club. Janasek says with his experience in construction and business management, he can ensure these projects can proceed without going over budget or having any one person get too involved with specific projects.

Janasek knows he's ruffled a few feathers last year, when he was in charge of removing Canada Geese from the association, and concedes he might lose some votes as a result.

"I love the geese, I've no problem with them," Janasek said. "We had too many, and people will not vote for me because of that I'm sure, which is fine. Everybody has their opinion, but we had too many. Even people from Agriculture said you cannot sustain that many geese in that small pond."

Overall, however, he said he just wants to help people.

"I'd like to figure out what the problem is, figure out how to solve the problem and then take care of it," Janasek said.



MDOT provides concept of roundabout for north gate

(May 23, 2019) Not long after a traffic circle concept was proposed by the Maryland Department of Transportation at the intersection of Route 589 and Ocean Parkway at Ocean Pines' north gate, a new single lane roundabout concept was introduced to the board last Thursday.

The Maryland Department of Transportation State Highway Administration has designed a single-lane roundabout with channelized right turns entering and exiting Ocean Parkway.

"The proposed design incorporates traffic-calming and speed control strategies to ensure that drivers will safely reduce their speed approaching this intersection," a representative from the State Highway Administration said in the press release. "Intersection improvements are necessary to resolve the vehicle backup (queueing deficiency) occurring while exiting Ocean Parkway.

"An analysis showed that the proposed roundabout will operate better than the existing traffic signal and will reduce delays along westbound Ocean Parkway (leaving Ocean Pines)," the representative continued. "It will also allow traffic to U-Turn along MD 589 without entering Ocean Parkway, and has been designed to accommodate future traffic counts."

However, some residents remain unhappy with the concept.

This would be a true catastrophe for anybody that uses the north gate," one resident said during the May 4 board of directors' meeting. The board needs to step up and tell these people, 'This is a disaster waiting to happen."


Association Vice President Steve Tuttle said the primary concerns of these residents are safety and traffic issues.

Berlin Fire Company gets quarterly payment for EMS

(May 23, 2019) The Berlin Fire Company received unanimous approval for emergency medical services funding from the mayor and Town Council last

David Fitzgerald, president of the Berlin Fire Company's board of directors, requested an \$88,750 check from town officials and said it was needed by May 15 to cover payroll.

"We will have a negative cash balance when the next payroll is due to be processed on May 17," Fitzgerald said in a memorandum. "We are also projecting negative cash balance at the end of [the] fiscal year."

These discussions have continued from the two past quarterly reports that fire officials presented to Mayor Gee Williams and council members.

Fire officials estimated a nearly \$7,600 deficit in the checking account as of May 17, according to fund balances as of May 6. Factoring in upcoming payroll, retirement and other expenses, fire officials anticipate the checking account balance to be a roughly \$39,000 deficit.

As of June 30, the checking account balance is expected to plunge to a nearly \$94,000 deficit, according to fund balances as of May 6.

Fire company officials are also slated to present a quarterly report to the mayor and council during a July 22 meeting.

"I personally think this is a reasonable request being made by the fire department, but going forward we all have to know what to expect," said Councilman Dean Burrell. "I won't be so agreeable if we come back next year after we agreed upon something and there needs to be more adjustments."

"I agree with you wholeheartedly," Fitzgerald replied.

Burrell moved to approve the final payment of the EMS Corporation made by Berlin Fire Company, and the motion was unanimously approved.

are concerned if they are not familiar with a traffic circle, they may enter it and pause or wait and be overly cautious to the point where it will create more congestion than it would help.

"For someone moving out of the north gate who wants to turn left, they're going to have to cross traffic that's continuing on 589 toward Route 113 and enter that flow of traffic in order to turn left toward the medical center," he continued. "Then you have oncoming traffic from 589, which in the summertime, is a pretty heavy [with] beach traffic."

The Ocean Pines directors have been asked to donate roughly a half-acre of land on either side of the north gate bridge to complete the project, which could involve expanding that section of the road.

In the meantime, the board has invited the State Highway Administration to appear during a public meeting with the residents of the association his summer.

"We're still waiting to hear back from them as to when they can come and meet," Tuttle said. "We want to have a public meeting in Ocean Pines with the Department of Transportation so the homeowners can have a chance to ask questions and understand more fully what the concept is and what the impact will be on specifically those people who live in Ocean Pines as far as moving in and out the north gate."

Tuttle himself wants to learn more about some of the traffic studies the State Highway Administration has conducted, including a Roundabout Feasibility Study in 2016.

"I want to hear more about their traffic studies that they are doing or have done and how the lanes are going to look," Tuttle said.

In the event the concept is approved, it is anticipated that the intersection will remain open during construction.



Manklin dog park enforces key card access

(May 23, 2019) Ocean Pines Recreation and Parks Department established key card access to its dog park at the Manklin Meadows complex in the south end of the community on Monday, May

The dog park, which includes benches, a water station, and dog waste bags, features an enclosed space and a double-gated entry.

The fenced-in area allows dogs to run free and play, allowing for socialization and recreation in a safe environment. Separate sections are available for large dogs more than 28 pounds and for smaller dogs less than 28 pounds to ensure a positive, tail-wagging experience for everyone.

"Last year, the dog park was free and open to the public only because we did not have a locked gate," Ocean Pines Recreation and Parks Program Supervisor Debbie Donahue said. "For liability reasons, we left it open last year, but we got a new key card lock installed on the gate. This way, the only ones who come into the gate and to the park will be registered."

All registered dogs must be at least 4 months old, licensed and up-to-date on all their shots. Records of shots, including rabies vaccination, must be presented at the time of registration. Each dog membership will include a key card for access to the park.

"This eliminates bringing in a dog and something unsafe happening to a person or to another dog," Donahue said.

Residents and guests can register their dogs at the Ocean Pines Community Center located on 235 Ocean Parkway by filling out the forms and providing documentation of up-to-date vaccinations and shots. After paying the registration fee, the owners will receive a key card and a dog tag per registered pet.

The annual cost of each dog is \$25 for residents and \$50 dollars for non-residents. One additional dog may be registered at the same time for \$10 for residents and \$15 for nonresidents. No more than two dogs can be registered to one owner.

'One person can handle two dogs,' Donahue said. "We don't want one person with four dogs trying to handle all of them with two over here, two over there, not attended, and so on."

In the event a key card is misplaced, broken, or defective, a replacement can be purchased at the community center for \$5.

Maintenance is continuing around the dog park, Donahue said, but the park itself will be mostly unaffected and can be used.

"We'd like to let everyone know we are working on getting new fixtures, getting new mulch and everything in there," Don-


ahue said. "[Summer] is coming and we're busy getting everything done, but the dog park is on schedule and on the radar."

Draft for police expansion released

(May 23, 2019) The Ocean Pines Board of Directors has released the first draft of the architectural plans for the expansion of police department's space in the Ocean Pines Association administration.

The addition, which will add 3,700 square feet to the police department's current space of about 1,800 square feet, will be built on the west end of the existing building. Architectural and engineering firm Davis, Bowen & Friedel Inc. submitted a floor plan as well as south, north and west elevation views.

The first set of drawings were reviewed and adjusted by the board of directors and Police Chief Massey during a work session last week.

'We sent them back to the architect. They incorporated what we requested and sent us back another drawing, which we confirmed was what we had recommended," Vice President Steve Tuttle said. "Now they will go to the actual physical design of the building, including all the structural issues, foundation and electri-

Some of the adjustments include adding a door to the administration hallway that will connect to the police station. This will provide access to the



police offices from the administration's offices. Another addition includes bathrooms at the front part of the building for convenience of the employees.

The new plans feature a dedicated entrance in addition to rooms for photos and printing, processing, interviews and training. An armory and space for evidence preparation and storage are also included.

The board is satisfied with the current plans, but not nearly as much as Chief Massey, Tuttle said.

"He was very excited about the plan, the way it's drawn and [the adjustments] have been incorporated really well," Tuttle said. "He made quite a passionate appeal for added police space during the budget and finance meetings and the board has listened to him and has responded, I think, in a very appropriate way to take the steps to provide space for the police department."

The final plans are not expected to be released for at least another month, but construction is estimated to begin this summer, likely around the same time as the clubhouse, Tuttle said.

"I don't know yet what the contractor's schedule is in terms of other work they may have going or when they can start this ... it'll be probably going simultaneous with the clubhouse," Tuttle said. "There's some advantages to that in that they can have one construction manager overseeing both projects. There's some cost savings to us and efficiency of scale by having them done simultaneously.'

There are also plans to build a new craft building, which is currently in the middle of White Horse Park's parking lot. The building will be relocated closer to the farmer's market location, adjacent to the administration building. Bids for the project will be opened at 3 p.m. on Friday at the administration building.

(May 23, 2019) It's been a long journey for those involved with the community mural project in Berlin, as it was just a little more than two weeks ago when artist John Donato put the finishing touches on the piece's fourth and final segment.

Toni Keiser, vice president of Public Relations for Atlantic General Hospital, expressed her appreciation to artist John Donato and the Berlin Arts and Entertainment District for the hospital's inclusion in the community health section of the mural.

"Our employees, medical staff, board members and volunteers, patients, and visitors truly enjoyed the opportunity to participate in the Berlin mural project," Keiser said in a statement. "It was a fun and creative way for all to express their connection with the hospital and the community."

Artist John Donato puts the finishing touches on a paw print placed on a mural on May 9 at the John H. Jack Burbage Regional Cancer Care Center.

He added a big part of his process is creating an investigative dialogue with the other involved parties, in this case Atlantic General Hospital.

He emphasized the need to really get to know the hospital's medical staff to get a better understanding of what community health really means to them. This allows him to help tell a more intricate and visual story.

"And so it's just very interesting that 60 percent that I don't know that goes in a mural, they fill in all those blanks, but it has to happen in a conversation, so I have to become part of the family while I'm there," he said.

For Donato, he said logistics and timing were some of the obstacles he faced for this particular segment of the mural.

"Yeah, this one was definitely an accelerated timetable," he said.

Donato had about a week to complete the project.

"The challenge is the part that I like," Donato said. "Every step of this presents challenges that pop up for me that I might not have a solution at that moment, but I ... embrace that kind of uncertainty and then start building solutions and I will reach out to people

and have conversations."

Donato said he uses synthetic panels and acrylic paint when working on murals. He stressed the importance of properly preparing the materials to ensure durability.

"Because I'm there to protect the investment of the folks that are raising the money to put these up, "Donato said. "I want this mural to last as long as it can."

Robin Tomaselli, vice president of the Berlin Arts and Entertainment District, agreed. She said she hopes visitors will see the mural stand the test of time.

"It tells a story of Berlin. It tells the history of Berlin, but it really does depict like what makes it such a great community, which happens to be every single member that lives and works here," Tomaselli said. "So people I think are super excited when they find out ... that it's going to be on the side of the visitor center for decades."

The journey of the mural outside the Berlin Maryland Welcome Center on South Main Street started about four years ago.

The first section brought in Buckingham Elementary School students and staff, the second featured Worcester Youth and Family Counseling Services and the third was a partnership between the Calvin B. Taylor House and Germantown School Community Heritage Center.

"It is super cool, and it's been over the

process of four years, and you're talking about hundreds and hundreds of hours of effort," Tomaselli said.

Donato said the fourth mural representing Atlantic General Hospital allowed the artwork to come full circle. He added the mural's first segment showcased the cows roaming on the Esham dairy farm, where the medical facility now stands.

"We weren't thinking that when we started the project," Donato said. That's part of the adaptive process when ... you start to get the feel of the project, and you start to see how the community responds to the project and as you start to build partnerships and relationships during the project."

While it was unplanned, he said it actually turned out for the best.

"You will get things that you weren't planning on having that we can work into the project that absolutely make it better," he said. "That absolutely can make it more unique."

A photo of the mural's most recent segment was presented last week to guests of the Atlantic General Hospital Foundation's 26th Anniversary Celebration.


It's unclear when the artwork will be officially installed.

Macky and Pam Stansell Hospice House open

(May 23, 2019) With forest green oversized scissors, Pam Stansell cut the ceremonial ribbon to the applause of public officials and hospice providers to officially open the Macky and Pam Stansell Coastal Hospice House on Wednesday, May 15.

Stansell House is the region's first residential hospice facility, providing care to patients with life-limiting illnesses who are no longer safe at home or who need more care than a family can safely provide.

"Today marks the end of our planning and the start of our serving," Coastal Hospice President and CEO Alane Capen said. "More than 2,000 people across the lower shore and the state of Maryland came together to turn this dream into reality, and we honor them."

The three-story, 26,000-square-foot Stansell House sits on 11 acres at 1500 Ocean Parkway in Ocean Pines. The building provides a main floor residential hospice, with palliative care facilities on the top floor and staff facilities on the ground floor. It also provides 12 patient rooms, a family room, kitchen, spa and a scenic backyard view of the Isle of Wight Bay.

More than 30 full-time employees will provide care and support at the facility.

"This facility is strictly residential,"

Capen said. "Patients who live here would otherwise be cared for at home if they had an able caregiver. People who come here are folks who are going to need help with bathing, getting their meals and getting medications on time.

"I can't think of a more gorgeous place to be in the last weeks or a couple of months of life," she continued.

In addition to the grand opening, the event celebrated Macky and Pam Stansell for their generosity and contributions toward the project. Over the years, the Stansells, who own Macky's Bayside Bar and Grill on 54th Street bayside, have donated hundreds of thousands of dollars to hospice and the facility and have raised thousands more through charity events.

In 2017, the Stansells wrote a check for \$72,250, to push the project across the original \$5 million threshold established at the beginning of its donations campaign. Together, they're responsible for more than \$900,000 in gifts to the campaign.

In honor of the couple's longstanding support, the hospice board of directors voted to name the building The Macky and Pam Stansell House at Coastal Hospice at the Ocean.

For Macky, the facility is more than just a building, it is the embodiment of the dignity and comfort every person should have at the end of life.

"When my wife's mother was ill with cancer many years ago, I had never heard of hospice," Macky said. "My wife and her sister wanted their mom to move in with us and at first I said, 'Absolutely not!' I did not want to have our lives – or hers – interrupted this way.

"But it turned out to be the most amazing gift," he continued. "I will

Rackliffe House story comes full circle with slavery exhibit

(May 23, 2019) The surnames featured in the Rackliffe Plantation House's newest exhibition, "The Enslaved at Rackliffe House and Worcester County, Maryland: A Local Story" will be familiar to many.

Purnell, Ayers, Fassitt, Derrickson, and Henry, just to name a few.

"Many people in this area have really deep roots in Worcester County," said Linda Ayers, vice president of the Rackliffe House Trust.

Along with the European settlers and the Native Americans who preceded them, an enslaved African-American population also shaped Worcester County history.

"We also knew that we couldn't tell the full story of the Rackliffe House unless we included the African-American enslaved population that really was the engine that created and maintained the wealth of plantations like these," Ayers said. "They were indispensable and involved in every part of life here."

Officials drew from local newspaper articles, wills and a diary when conducting their research for the exhibition that opened Tuesday, on Tom Patton Lane, off Route 611 in Berlin.

Curator Ray Thompson said he hopes visitors will learn something.

"Our anticipation is that they will recognize that we have told an accurate story based on original records of what life was like here on Rackliffe Plantation and plantations near it during the 17th through 19th centuries," Thompson said.

Proposed Berlin budget shows cuts

(May 23, 2019) When Berlin town government's departments put the knife to their budgets in the last few weeks, they apparently didn't miss much, judging from the \$15.6 million budget for fiscal year 2020 town officials reviewed last Monday.

The proposed budget was reduced by 15 percent, or \$2.6 million, from the fiscal year 2019 \$18.2 million budget. The police, economic development and parks and recreation departments were among the many operations that showed budget decreases.

The budget for the town's police department dropped by 11.02 percent, according to budget reports. About \$2 million was approved for the 2018-19 fiscal year budget, and about \$1.8 million was introduced for the fiscal year 2020 budget.

The economic development department showed an 18.24 percent decrease, falling from about \$320,000 in the 2018-19 fiscal year budget to about \$262,000 in the budget year ahead.

The parks and recreation budget for the fiscal year 2020 budget was set at roughly \$63,000, according to budget reports. That's a 36.84 percent decrease from the roughly \$100,000 approved for the 2018-19 fiscal year budget.

At the same time, however, some

administrative departments showed increases for the fiscal year 2020 budget.

The administration budget for fiscal year 2020 increased by 20.89 percent, or roughly \$335,000, according to budget reports. The department received \$1.6 million for the 2018-19 fiscal year budget but about \$1.9 million was introduced for next year.

Fire and emergency medical services officials previously requested \$909,000 in total funding for next year's budget during an April 1 Town Council meeting.

The department had \$605,000 in operating allocations approved for the fiscal year 2018-19 budget and nearly \$545,000 was introduced in the upcoming budget, according to budget

The electric, water and sewer departments also included contingencies as line items in the budget.

The electric administration had a 16.24 percent increase, with nearly \$1.6 million introduced for the fiscal year 2020 budget, according to budget reports. There was about \$1.35 million approved for the fiscal year 2018-19

Budget reports show a 1,813 percent increase in the department's contingency rate. It was roughly \$12,000 in fiscal year 2018-19, and nearly \$231,000 is being introduced for fiscal year 2020.

The water administration's introduced budget for fiscal year 2020 was 7.04 percent higher, or nearly \$443,000, according to budget reports. The increase was roughly \$29,000 more from the approximate \$413,000 approved for the fiscal year 2018-19 budget.

There was also a 532.30 percent increase for a contingency line item in the proposed fiscal year 2020 budget, according to reports. Nearly \$91,000 was introduced, while about \$14,000 was approved for the fiscal year 2018-19 budget.

The sewer administration also had a 5.75 percent increase to the budget. according to reports. There was nearly \$1.3 million introduced for fiscal year 2020 while \$1.2 million was approved.

A nearly \$44,000 contingency line item also contributed to the budget's increase, reports show. There was an 81.82 percent increase from the roughly 24,000 in last year's fiscal year budget.

The property tax rate for the fiscal year 2020 budget was also was set during last week's meeting at \$.80 per \$100 of assessed value.

A public hearing for the fiscal year 2020 budget and its adoption is scheduled for June 10 at Town Hall on William Street.

Clubs committee discusses smoking policy

(May 23, 2019) The Ocean Pines Clubs Committee came to no final conclusions during its discussion last Thursday about a 25-foot no smoking restriction near the Yacht Club and Ocean Pines Beach Clubs' pools, restaurants and tiki bar.

The committee's consideration of restrictions was prompted by an unnamed resident's concerns about secondhand smoke in those areas.

"The local resident was asking us to

look into a no-smoking rule, specifically at the Beach Club," Chairman Gary Miller said. "Last season, there were ashtray buckets on the deck, and people were smoking on the deck."

Some members pointed to policies followed by other municipalities, such as Ocean City, which has strictly limited or outright banned smoking in certain areas.

However, other members expressed concerns about being too harsh with the regulation of smoking.

"I have an issue with making it so re-

strictive on people who do smoke, because I wouldn't want somebody smoking right outside [a] door, because it will filter in," committee member Cheryl Jacobs said. "They're going to smell like it when they come in and there was a complaint ... when I was on the board about that very thing. But I'd hate to make it so restrictive to those who smoke."

Suggestions were also made to consider maybe creating a designated smoking area, or gazebo, as board liaison Tom Piatti said.

Smoking limitations would also be extended toward cigars, cannabis products and vaping, the committee agreed.

"The goal is to not have people walk through smoke to get to the restaurant or pool," Miller said. "We don't want the smoking area to be near the tiki bar or the pool. We don't want anything which uses a smoke-generating apparatus."

The clubs committee also wants to gather some information and suggestions from the Matt Ortt Group, which runs both the Yacht and Beach Clubs.

"microcosm," and said the work done there ranged from agricultural workers to shingle makers to blacksmiths.

"[There was] almost every kind of occupation you can imagine because these plantations were pretty much self-sufficient, and the advantage that we have here that we think is so exciting is we have been able to tell a relatively complete story from both points of view of what life was like here," Thompson said.

A will of Plantation owner Charles Rackliffe is displayed in the exhibition. Ayers said he owned 18 slaves when he died in 1752.

"The inventory stresses that they are

personal property because they were listed here with livestock and crops and tools," Ayers said.

Aside from the panels of text, a glass display case is featured in the center, and shows various types of pottery.

Aaron Levinthal, a board member for the Rackliffe House Trust, also conducted archeological research in the effort to learn more about their lives.

"Life, labor, family, individuals, and so what we did find was that we got a lot of locations across the years that are specific to African-American life," Levinthal said. "So it's not just labor, there's also family."

Levinthal said the work has been going on for about 10 years. He also at-

tributed the findings to the fact that the parcel's site was "pretty intact." It allowed researchers to learn more about the people who lived on the plantation.

"But here, the archeological site here can make that story go a lot deeper," Levinthal said.

Tina Busko, executive director for the Rackliffe House Museum, said she hopes it's an inclusive experience for those who attend.

"We can learn about the people in the past," Busko said. "We can learn about what happened here in the past and that's really just a wonderful local story with all the descendants that are still in the area."

While the exact cost to stage the ex-

hibit isn't unclear, Ayers expressed her appreciation to groups for their support.

"We were so fortunate to have the support of many organizations and individual donors that made it possible," Ayers said.

Busko said the museum has about 21 docents who help educate an average of 30 to 50 visitors per day.

The exhibition runs on Tuesdays and Thursdays from 1-4 p.m. until Oct. 31. Admission costs \$5 for adults, \$3 for active military service members with valid ID, \$2 for children ages 4-to-14 years old. Admission is free for children under 4. 

Do more than thank them for their service

Dear veterans and active duty military personnel: Thank you for your service ... whoever you are.

Chances are we don't know you, what you're like, where you're from or what you'll be doing tomorrow. Still, it makes us feel patriotic to say it, like we're in this with you all the way, even though we weren't there when the shooting started.

True, many of you didn't want to be there either, but you did your bit when called to duty, while the other 93 percent of the U.S. population had other business to attend to and we thank you for allowing us to do that.

We also pay our respects to the 700,000 or so service members who died in hostile actions over the last 244 years. This number does not include the 450,000 to 500,000 Civil War deaths, since we were fighting each other.

This is even though the origin of Memorial Day dates to 1866, when communities began to honor their Civil War dead. Not until 1971 did Congress make Memorial Day a national holiday and moved the observance from May 30 to the last Monday of the month, so federal and other workers could have a three-day holiday.

That, of course, changed everything. The once-solemn occasion became a celebration of early summer, with a patriotic component. We place wreaths, raise flags, say prayers for the fallen and thank the living for their service, before going off to enjoy the rest of the holiday.

But what if we finally realized that simply saying "thank you" to the living just isn't enough?

What if we said being a fourth-year infantry sergeant has to be worth more than \$32,135 in base pay? Or that you don't have to pay state or federal income taxes on that, or that we'll give you vouchers for the best hospitals in the country should you fall ill, or that you'll receive at least a stipend of some kind for the rest of your life after your hitch is up?

What if we decided the best way to honor the war dead is to do something for the living beyond saying thanks? What, as we argue about everything else, were we to agree on this one thing and insisted on it?

Several council members agreed.





(May 23, 2019) The fourth, fifth and sixth-graders who participate in the mountain biking club at Berlin Intermediate School are apparently learning more than just how to ride a bike

"It's preparedness for life. It really is," said program organizer Tres Denk.

Assistant Principal David Gell said about 20 students have participated in the BIS and Beyond After School Academy program and he's been pleased with the its progress since it started last year.

"Students learned how to properly maintain a bicycle, ride properly, safety measures, and how to navigate obstacles typical of biking trails found on the Eastern Shore," Gell said. "Aside from instilling a love of mountain biking, Tres also hopes students will teach others about the sport and build support for the maintenance and creation of local trails."

Denk is the president of the Eastern Shore International Mountain Bicycling Association, an organization that strives "to create, enhance and preserve great trail experiences for mountain bikers on the Eastern Shore of the Chesapeake Bay," ac-

Denk recalled a newspaper article from 2009 informing people that bike trails were open at the Pocomoke YMCA.

"So the next day, I

went down and started the whole thing, started riding bikes, started building trails there, and it just grew from there," Denk said.

He, along with a group of other dads and their kids, embarked on this mountain biking journey.

The organization also works to develop trails throughout the area, according to the website.

Denk has had a 30-year love affair with mountain biking. He said it started when his roommates took him on a bike trip to Frederick, Maryland.

"So I went out to western Maryland, [and] I came back my bike was all busted up, [the] front wheel was wobbly, I had to take the brakes off to even come home, and I went right back to the bike shop, [but] I was like, man, it was the coolest thing I ever did," Denk said. Healthy waterways? There's an app

(May 23, 2019) Since 2013, Assateague Coastal Trust, has monitored and reported on the health of area waterways through the internationally-recognized Swim Guide water quality monitoring program.

Swim Guide is a smart phone app that enables users to find safe beaches and swimming areas to recreate and enjoy their waterways through a simple platform that relays local area water quality.

It is critical that the quality of natural water bodies be a transparent issue, and for millions of beach goers, swimmers, and surfers across the country, being in the know when it comes to water quality has proven much easier with Swim Guide.

Swim Guide is a free smart phone app available from App Store, Google Play, or www.theswimguide.org. Assateague Coastkeeper Kathy Phillips stresses the importance of such a far-reaching platform.

Swim Guide will help bring this important information to a much wider audience

In addition to participating in the Swim Guide program, ACT is an affiliate of the Waterkeeper Alliance, and each week reports numerous water quality variables and bacteria levels on its Assateague Coastkeeper webpage, www.actforbays.org/coastkeeper.html.

New for 2019, ACT will also be utilizing an interactive mapping tool known as Water Reporter, which allows users to easily identify a location within the sampling area and access that location's latest water quality data, including pH, Dissolved Oxygen levels and bacteria levels.

ACT's water quality program monitors and reports data on the coastal bays

each week. The program will run from May 16 through the Labor Day holiday in September.

This year the organization is monitoring 10 locations throughout Herring and Turville Creek, Isle of Wight Bay, Assawoman Bay and the St. Martin River.

Visitors to Worcester County and the coastal watershed are encouraged to contact the Coastkeeper if they would like to see additional areas monitored.

Coastal bayside waterfront communities like Montego Bay, Snug Harbor, and others may contact ACT to find out how their swimming or water recreation areas can be monitored by calling 410-629-1538, or email the ACT Coastkeeper at coastkeeper@actforbays.org.



Denk said he'd like to see mountain biking programs in county schools, but more importantly see today's participants someday volunteering to teach others.

He added the older students could come return to help teach the younger children, "where it keeps going around, just like a bicycle wheel itself."



Tips, tricks for 'cheat[ing] in the kitchen'

There are times when it is okay to cheat in the kitchen. At my restaurant, we pride our-

selves on a scratch menu. Yes, the labor costs are high. Yes, it is a bit taxing when the taxman comes around for his quarterly burdens, but in the end, people notice the difference.

With that

With that being said, it is just fine to cheat if you are using a product that never fails and, frankly, you would be taxed to do better. Of course, to me what comes to mind is the Hidden Valley Ranch dressing powder that you can buy on the shelf. Simply add some mayonnaise (It must be Duke's) and sour cream and you will be lucky to get away with only drinking about a quart of it as though it was a cold summer soup. I love the stuff.

Ranch and bleu cheese dressings are just about everybody's go-to when it comes to complementing buffalo wings, and you certainly will find no exception with me. When my girl-friend and I go to Harborside, we typically get one of each... and then ask for extras. There is just something about fried, sauced wings and creamy dressing that is on one hand so wrong, and on the other so right. So right.

One score and five years ago, I worked at a great place in Fell's Point, Baltimore and I loved it because the beer was always cold, the wings were always perfect and the sauces were second to none. It sat on Thames Street and overlooked the police station and the harbor. I can remember sitting on the rooftop bar on wing night, when they came in at a whopping 25 cents per wing. Back then, \$5 bought a lot of wings.

I have spent the last 25 years chasing the taste of those wings – their flagship wings — and I am pretty sure that I nailed it. Of course, it might be nothing like them, but it doesn't matter. Every time that I eat these, it transports me right back to the halcyon days of chicken wings being a welcomed break to the copious amounts of ramen that I was consuming to subsist.

Oh, this wing sauce is special. I started carrying it at the restaurant, and in three weeks it has cast a shadow on all of our other flavors combined. It is simply divine, espe-



cially on extra crispy wings (that's just my personal preference) and goes well with the aforementioned dressings.

There were a few restaurants back in the day serving garlic-horseradish wings, and they were all unique. Some used raw garlic while others used roasted. The difference is night and day, and personally I believe that you will be much happier with the roasted garlic.

The roasting process adds that deep, rich flavor that most associate with this beautiful bulb and adds a layer of flavor that you simply do not get with raw. When it comes to the latter, it can be way too much to handle for some diners. I know I personally have issue with consuming raw garlic. I feel it for days, but that is neither here nor there.

Here you will find another cheat in making the wing sauce: using a premade hot sauce. That is okay, and I don't think you'll get your chef-license revoked for this, but making hot sauce from scratch can be one of those futile exercises for bulk operations. When you can go out and buy some Hank Sauce (hands down the best hot sauce money can buy) or some bulk Texas Pete's, you just buy it and doctor it up. I'll take your back if anyone gives you any grief.

Cheat or not, this is a great sauce, and definitely one to add to the many sauces I'm sure that you're already brewing. Cheat away.

Garlic-Horseradish Wings

serves 6

3 doz. Large chicken wing segments 1 c. Fine rice flour

1 tsp. Granulated garlic

1 Tbsp. fine salt

1 tsp. Fine ground black pepper

1 tsp. Smoked paprika

Oil for frying (your choice but no t olive oil)

2 c. Garlic-horseradish wing sauce (recipe follows)

Celery, Carrot, dressings for garnish

- 1. Dry your wing segments.
- 2. Combine the rice flour, garlic, salt, pepper and paprika well and place in a large bowl.
- 3. Toss your wings in the flour, coating very lightly, and I mean ever so lightly.
- 4. Bake them off at 350 F until they are cooked almost throughout, so maybe pull them when the majority of them are at 155 F internal temperature. Don't worry, this is acceptable as long as you cook them immediately or cool them to 41 F within 2 hours in the refrigerator to finish cooking in the

frying process.

- 5. When ready to cook, simply heat oil to 350-375 F (many fryer manufacturers disagree on the actual temperature).
- 6. Fry the wings until cooked all the way through.
- 7. Remove and immediately toss in the garlic-horseradish sauce and serve with the carrot or celery sticks and dressing of your choice.

Garlic-Horseradish Buffalo Sauce

makes 1 Qt.

- 1 c. Texas Pete's hot sauce
- 1 c. Melted butter, all parts remaining (don't clarify)
- 1 c. Roasted garlic
- 1 c. Horseradish
- 1. Combine all ingredients well and adjust to your liking. I highly recommend you use the roasted garlic, but some people will insist on raw garlic. That just isn't my thing, as the kids say.




