### Pitching in to help school children

Businesses, volunteers see need and respond to loss of school meal program

(March 19, 2020) Since Gov. Larry Hogan closed schools for two weeks by executive order last week, groups and organizations have joined to find ways to feed children who depend on school meals.

Many students who benefit from school meal programs require help receiving meals during this two-week hiatus brought on by the spread of COVID-19 and the Hogan Administration's efforts to contain it.

Worcester Goes Purple is working with Hope4Recovery to supply a brown bag pickup lunch.

The brown bag lunch will be available on Thursday, March 19, from 11 a.m. to 1 p.m. in the Hope4Recovery

parking lot at 10226 Old Ocean City Blvd. in Berlin.

"Worcester Goes Purple is about supporting the community and showing community that those in recovery and their families are part of and are supported [by] their community," Insurance and Billing Specialist Debbie Smullen said. "The coronavirus puts us in unchartered waters, but it does not stop the basic needs for compassion and kindness."

The lunches will include a sandwich, drink, chips and a snack.

In addition, Worcester Youth and Family Services will be collaborating with Stevenson United Methodist Church's Spirit Kitchen on Thursday, March 26, for a drive through food pantry from 11 a.m. to 1 p.m. at 103 Flower Street in Berlin.

Baked Dessert Café owner Robin Tomaselli will be offering lunch bags filled with peanut butter and jelly sandwiches, granola bars, fruits and other small snacks, as well as a breakfast option such as a small box of cereal and a piece of fruit.

"We have for the past several years worked with organizations like Worcester County Youth and Family and Buckingham Elementary School," Tomaselli said. "We were made aware a while back that when kids are not in school, when they're on vacation, or when they're on holidays or extended weekends, that there are a lot of children in this community that actually get stressed out over it because the school food pro-

# Officials pitch irrigation for Pines course

Public Works heads believe it can be done for greens

(March 19, 2020) Protecting water systems and reducing nutrient loads in the St. Martin River were primary motivators presented by Worcester County officials last week for a proposal to irrigate the Ocean Pines Golf Course with treated wastewater effluent.

Worcester Public Works Director John Tustin and Assistant Public Works Director John Ross headed a town hall question-and-answer session last Thursday in the Assateague Room of the Ocean Pines Community Center.

### Pines closings due to Coronavirus

OPA announces operational changes as precautionary measures tied to pandemic

(March 19, 2020) Ocean Pines on Monday announced several operational changes and closings related to COVID-19 (coronavirus) concerns.

Ocean Pines began taking measures both to educate the public and slow the spread of Coronavirus on March 6.

"Like everyone, we're concerned and are constantly monitoring the coronavirus situation," General Manager John Viola said. "We are following the guidelines mandated by Gov. Larry Hogan in Maryland, as well as any federal guidelines from the CDC and others.

"The safety of our homeowners, residents, guests and staff are foremost on our minds at this time, and we are doing everything we can to help slow the spread of Coronavirus in our community.

Any additional closures and changes to the operation will be communicated through our website, www.oceanpines.org," Viola added. The following Ocean Pines departments have announced operational changes:

Public works: The Public Works office will be closed to the public effective immediately, with interactions available by phone and email only.

Public Works Director Eddie Wells said the Architectural Review Committee meetings would be suspended, with all necessary documents being signed electronically. Permits and inspections will be handled through email or fax approval.

The Public Works yard will be closed for the next two-to-three Saturdays, Wells said, and all Public Works staff will be under a liberal leave policy for the next 12-21 days.

Aquatics: The Sports Core Pool will remain closed through March 30. All activities and classes have been canceled.

"We will start contacting people in our classes by phone," Director of Amenities and Operational Logistics Colby Phillips said. "We will also have a front desk person available during the closure to take calls from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. We will work with everyone who is signed up for classes to have makeups or adjustments to the next starting session."

Phillips said staff during the closure will "shock" the Sports Core Pool, a process that uses additional chlorine for sterilization. All furniture and surfaces will also be cleaned and disinfected.

Recreation and parks: The Ocean Pines Community Center will remain closed through March 30. All activities and classes have been canceled.

Golf: Ocean Pines Golf operations will remain open for the foreseeable future, according to Golf General Manager John Malinowski.

Staff is wiping down shop surfaces, steering wheels and handrails, and Malinowski said a communication would go out soon to the entire golf email database. All flags sticks have been removed. Any further updates will be posted to www.oceanpines.org and www.oceanpinesgolf.org.

Food and Beverage: Gov. Larry Hogan on Monday ordered all Maryland restaurants to close indefinitely. The Ocean Pines Yacht Club will temporarily move to delivery only, effective immediately.

Suspension of all programs at Northside Park in Ocean City and all other indoor-based recreation programs at satellite facilities have been canceled.

### **OPA Election Committee gets ready for 2020**

(March 19, 2020) Preparing for the expiration of two OPA Board of Directors terms in 2020, the Ocean Pines Election Committee received updates on a new balloting system scanner, while also approving an election services contract last Friday.

Association IT Manager Steve Grabowski said work is just getting underway to review an online tutorial associated with the recently purchased laptop and scanner intended for the upcoming OPA election.

"We need to use a proper paper stock and color," he said. "The scanner has a problem with anything glossy."

Among the actions included in the elections committee's final report from the 2019 contest issued in September was investigating an updated ballot counting machine.

On the positive side, Grabowski said the new election gear would permit enhanced ballot design flexibility, with wider use capabilities such as publishing web surveys.

Grabowski said whatever design options are selected would involve consulting with election materials contractor Berlin-based ACE Printing & Mailing

"We do have to combine their knowledge with the constraints of the scanning system," he said.

Previous ballot design discussions have considered the possibility of including a verification barcode and candidate pictures.

Elections Committee Chairman Steve Habeger polled members to select a date to hold an online training tutorial with the hardware equipment vendor.

"I would like the committee members included, but ACE [Printing] is really doing it," he said.

The process would allow the group an opportunity to view the web-based tutorial while vetting ballot designs.

Grabowski said ballot dimensions

should be selected with consideration to envelope sizes.

Habeger agreed the final ballot would need to conform to the return envelope included with election materials mailed to qualifying association members

The committee scheduled a vendor-assisted online training session for March 31.

The committee also approved a 2020 OPA Ballot Election and Mailing Services agreement with previous contractor ACE Printing & Mailing.

Habeger said in addition to ACE submitting terms comparable to past agreements, they were the sole bidder for election printing and mailing services

Committee member Mark Heintz asked if there were any apparent reasons for the lack of additional bidders.

"Are we bound by getting a certain number?" he asked.

Habeger said despite sending invitations to bid to at least a half-dozen

area vendors, few seemed capable of accommodating both printing and mailing requirements.

"We have a goal of having a competitive process," he said.

While the traditional three-bid minimum standard was not reached in this instance, continuing the association with ACE Printing proprietor Thom Gulyas still seems advantageous, Habeger said.

"They not only do what they need to do but they forward-look," he said. "They're ready when you ask them for something, which is invaluable."

Committee board liaison Steve Tuttle said regardless of the market competition Guylas submitted a bid only slightly above prior fees.

"It would be different if ACE came back \$5,000 higher all of a sudden," he said. "His price has not changed for the last three or four years, hardly."

Heintz noted the new election services contract also includes providing a scanner operator.

# County officials provide info on golf course irrigation idea

Commission was disbanded in November 1993.

"The Worcester County Sanitary Commission ... was a quasi-governmental agency not connected to the Worcester County Commissioners," he said.

OPA General Manager John Viola said the potential to convert irrigation practices at the golf course to use highly treated effluent was still in the exploratory stages.

"Highly treated effluent" is defined as water meeting current Maryland Department of the Environment Bay Restoration standards.

Ross said the concept would eliminate spraying roughly 200,000 gallons daily of ground water on the golf course during the summer.

"We're talking about taking the treated water from the [Ocean Pines] Wastewater Treatment Plant and rather than putting it out in the [St. Martin] River, talking about using to irrigate the golf course," he said.

Ross said treated effluent from the Ocean Pines facility has continually outpaced state environmental benchmarks.

In 2005, MDE started a Bay Restoration Fund, or flush fee, financed through a monthly charge of \$2.50 for users of publicly owned wastewater treatment plants. The fee was increased to \$5 per month in 2012.

The Ocean Pines plant has consistently earned annual Bay Restoration Fund waivers by testing below maximum effluent concentrations of 3 mg/l of total nitrogen and 0.3 mg/l total phosphorous.

Ross said in many instances the Ocean Pines effluent tests as low as 2 mg/l of total nitrogen.

"You're discharging better water than what was created from the program," he said.

Worcester County officials estimate that MDE tax exemptions of roughly \$5 million have been earned over the last 14 years by the Ocean Pines Wastewater Treatment Plant for Ocean Pines rate payers due to exceptionally low levels of nitrogen and phosphorus in tested effluent.

Ross said the treated effluent is used for spray irrigation purposes at nearly three-dozen facilities across the state, nine of which are golf courses with three located in Worcester County, including Glen Riddle, Eagle's Landing and Lighthouse Sound.

"This is not something new, this is commonly done throughout the state [and] throughout the country for that matter," he said.

Ross said going the irrigation route would reduce demand on the five water supply wells serve Ocean Pines.

"We pull anywhere from one to three million gallons out of those wells on any given day," he said.

Giving the golf greens a good watering boosts that figure by about 200,000 gallons a day, Ross said.

Ross said the water supply in Ocean Pines is one of five qualified as a Maryland Department of the Environment's Water Management Strategy Area due to potential salt-water intrusion.

"They monitor withdraws out of [the] wells in order to make sure that we don't begin to pull salt water in," he said.

Ross said the pines water system is unique in the fact that groundsourced water is PH adjusted and chlorinated without extensive infrastructure.

"We do not have to filter it [and] we do not have to treat it with chemicals," he said. "We are able to meet all the requirements of the Safe Water Drinking Act without building a water treatment plant," he said.

The water system in Ocean Pines is well worth protecting, Ross said.

"You'll regret it if you ever have to go into a different aquifer as far as water quality and ease of producing drinkable water," he said.

Additional benefits of converting to spraying effluent on the golf course are realized in adjacent watersheds.

"The second reason to potentially do this is to reduce discharges to the St. Martin River," he said. "Yes, we produce really clean water, less than 3 mg/l of total nitrogen but that's still not zero."

Pines resident Jack Collins said the proposal would provide a direct financial benefit to the OPA and golf course by replacing a half-century old irrigation system.

"There's a way we can replace aging infrastructure at a reasonable rate because the county knows what they're doing," he said.

Ross said the commissioners would need to approve funding to explore the matter in depth.


"The first step of anything is to do a feasibility study," he said.

Ross said any changes would be at least three years in the making.

"It's just a concept that we believe is worth looking at for the long-term benefit of Ocean Pines," he said.

Ross also noted any associated costs to upgrade infrastructure would likely be funded by the Ocean Pines Water and Wastewater Service Area and serve a dual purpose.

"We're going to try and protect the aquifer on the water supply side and we're going to try to reduce the nutrients going into the bay on the discharge side," he said.

### **OP Water Advisory Board talks next budget**

Worcester officials detail leaky water holding tanks background, core problems

(March 19, 2020) Tracking cases of leaky groundwater holding tanks and previewing pending budget requests were principal points presented during the Ocean Pines Service Area Water and Wastewater Advisory Board meeting on Monday.

Board member Jack Collins praised the presentation about treated effluent made by Worcester County Deputy Director of Public Works John Ross during a town hall meeting the prior week.

"He made a knowledgeable presentation and covered lots of territory," he said.

Board member Fred Stiehl asked about an instance involving raw sewage overflow seeping into yards raised at the town hall meeting. Ross said the incident in question occurred on Aug. 13, 2017 during a period of extreme precipitation and the Maryland Department of the Environment received a written complaint the next day.

"For that entire week we had over eight inches of rain," he said.

In light of concerns about leaking water holding tanks Ross noted the earlier flooding incident occurred over a weekend with inspectors unable to investigate the issue until the following day.

"By the time our crews got there, getting into Monday, there was no issue," he said.

Collins recalled the time period in question presented atypical levels of rainfall.

"Front yards were under water ... it was ridiculous.," he said.

Ultimately, MDE inspectors had issued a clean bill of health for the site in question, Ross said.

In terms of addressing leaky water holding tanks, Ross said seepage oc-

curs internally, not externally, due to vacuum lines.

"Water is coming in, not out because of vacuum," he said.

Board member Greg Sauter said the matter had confused numerous residents who mistakenly thought the issue concerned outflow.

"People are thinking sewage is leaking out of the tank and that's not the case," he said. "We're pulling ground water into our system and making the [wastewater treatment] plant less productive."

In many instances, water holding tank walls are breached by tree roots, Ross said.

"Generally, we get calls about lines draining slowly," he said.

Substantial cases of tanks overflowing would raise other alarms intended to direct required corrective measures.

"If we have a major leaking tank, it's causing us operational problems," he said. "We have all tanks monitored by operators."

Stiehl said if the issue is a major problem, it needs to be remedied in a reasonable time.

"We need to understand how comfortably we can say this is a rare occurrence," he said.

Collins concurred, and requested data about the number of problematic tanks and any cases of raw sewage seepage.

Ross said he would return with the statistics at the next advisory board meeting.

Turning to pending budget matters, Ross said the Water and Wastewater Division would present financial requests to the Worcester County Commissioners on March 31.

Contingent on securing bond funding, the county is looking to repaint the north water tower in Ocean Pines, Ross said.

"We got a signed contract [and] hope to schedule a pre-construction meeting this week," he said.

The process includes draining and sand blasting the water tank.

"We're not anticipating any internal repairs," he said.

After fresh paint is applied, the tank will require disinfecting, Ross said.

"It has to be repainted without water in it," he said.

Ross said the project would begin pending funding approval

"It can take 60 or more days and obviously you can't paint outside all time so we're trying to get started as quickly as we can," he said.

# **Worcester Circuit Court will remain closed until April 3**

tim requests the presence of the officer.

"This is only a temporary change, and will not impact police response to all other types of incidents, Chief David Massey said. "We recognize that first responders have a duty to the residents to provide our continuing protection, and we shall always be there to provide prompt and efficient service. This change will better protect our police officers, by reducing their vulnerability to health risks during this health crisis."

### Berlin man needs kidney donation

(March 19, 2020) Berlin resident Nick Morris, 74, is in dire need of a kidney transplant and is searching for an O-positive donor in the area.

Morris has been a resident of Worcester County since 1975, and has been an English teacher, college instructor, long-time employee of the Alaska Stand, and lifeguard for the Ocean City Beach Patrol, Assateague Island National Seashore and Ocean Pines.

Two years ago, Morris was diagnosed with an enlarged prostate, which in turn caused his kidneys to fail. He has been waiting for a kidney transplant since January 2019.

Since his diagnosis, he noticed his energy levels dropping.

"My levels go up and down, up and down [and then] I have to come to grips mentally with this [condition] that you've got to monitor all the time." Morris said. "There are days when I'll start out and never quite feel as if I am really ever at 100 percent. I start out at a lower level and then by the end of the day, I'm done.

"Some days I ask myself, 'Is this a sign that I should go right to the doctor," he continued.

Just this January, Morris applied to be on the kidney donor list, which can take up to six years, made even

longer as his age made him less of a priority candidate on the list, he said.

"I actually would prefer a life donor," Morris said. "They do donations of deceased donors, but

the lifespan of those are considerably less than it would be for a live donor."

Currently, Morris' kidneys are between stages 4 and 5 of kidney failure, which means if his condition gets any worse, he will be forced to undergo dialysis.

It is possible to survive with only one kidney, and the recovery time is around two weeks or less for the donor. Recently, there have been discussions in the Maryland General Assembly to provide tax incentives for organ donors as well.

Morris had been matched twice in the past, but the donors decided to change their minds, though he still has hope.

"I am a good candidate," said Morris. "I have no other health issues."

Most importantly, finding a kidney would give Morris the time to travel, enjoy the foods he has been forced to stop eating and live healthy once again.

"There's still a lot of stuff I gotta

do," he said. "I'd still like to be here."

Readers interested in being a living donor, should take the first step is to find out if they are blood compatible. Morris needs a donor with an "O" blood type. If unsure of blood type, check with the Blood Bank of Delmarva (if you have donated before), your doctor, or order a home test kit for less than \$10.

If your blood type is not a match for Morris, there is still a chance to help someone else through a process called the paired kidney exchange. A paired kidney exchange allows donors to "swap" with other donors' recipients. Through a carefully orchestrated process, one person gives a kidney to an unknown recipient, and that recipients willing donor, in exchange, gives a kidney to a different recipient with whom they are compatible.

The next step is to fill out the application, which can be found online at the University of Maryland Medical Center.

# Tax filing deadline extended due to COVID-19 virus

(March 19, 2020) To assist businesses affected by the economic impact of COVID-19, Comptroller Peter Franchot announced this week he will extend business-related tax filing deadlines

The June 1 extension applies to certain business returns with due dates during the months of March, April and May 2020 for businesses filing sales and use tax, withholding tax, and admissions and amusement tax, as well as alcohol, tobacco and motor fuel excise taxes, tire recycling fee and bay restoration fee returns.


Business taxpayers who file and pay by the extended due date will receive a waiver of interest and penalties.

If the IRS extends its April 15 filing deadline for corporate and individual income tax returns, Maryland will conform to the decision of the IRS

"Our state's top priority is safe-guarding public health for Marylanders, but we must also protect the financial health of our economy," Comptroller Franchot said. "This extension will provide much-needed relief to our business owners as they adjust to changes in consumer behavior, tourism trends and employee workforce output. Maryland will also extend our corporate and individual income tax return filing deadlines if the IRS announces an extension."

### Heron Park groundwater evaluation results

(March 19, 2020) Heron Park in Berlin has passed its tests, Berlin Town Administrator Jeff Fleetwood announced at the Monday, March 9, mayor and Town Council meeting, following an analysis of water extracted from the grounds.

Last June, an undisclosed amount of sodium hydroxide (caustic soda or lye) was spilled during demolition work by a contractor, resulting in the park's closure.

Chesapeake Environmental Services handled the bulk of the clean-up for



\$283,000. Other work was done by town workers and contractors at a cost of about \$3,000 rather than the \$50,000-\$60,000 quoted by other companies.

The Maryland Department of the Envi-

ronment required an evaluation of the groundwater under the area where the spill occurred to determine if any caustic chemicals left behind. The testing, which was scheduled for Wednesday, Feb. 19,


involved drilling three wells about 15 feet deep near the original spill site.

"The engineers on site, a couple weeks ago, they did drill a number of shallow water wells," Fleetwood said. "They did extract water ... the initial field results on those tests for pH was very good, everything passed on that.

"However, the other test that they were testing for, the substance was chloride, the field test could not confirm any results so it was sent off to a lab," he continued. "Last week we did receive final results — the pH is fine and the chloride levels are fine. Those result have been communicated to the Maryland Department of the Environment.'

Fleetwood had a conference call with the department director, who said "from his perspective, everything is fine, but he was going to pass it to his staff for their opinions as well."

Heron Park was officially reopened to the public in February after five months of being closed. The park has resettled over 4,000 tons of soil and Fleetwood expects it to be seeded sometime between April and May.

"As soon as we heard that Gov. Larry Hogan was closing schools, we just decided we had to do something," she continued.

Baked Dessert Café is working with several community partners: SonRise Church, the Greater Ocean City Chamber of Commerce, Pittsville Volunteer Fire Department, The Iron Horse, of Willards, Boxcar 40, of Pittsville, Willards Lions Club and Uncle Willies of Willards to collect and distribute nonperishable items to students in need.

Tomaselli made a Facebook post last Friday announcing her intentions to help provide meals for students affected by the school closures. Tomaselli said she was shocked at the amount of support coming from the local community.

"My anticipation was that we would certainly get some donations from the community," she said. "But the response was just overwhelming. It was very evident early on, a couple of hours after I actually made the post, that it was something that was going to be much bigger than what we could handle alone. So that's when we began to pull in educators and community leaders and people that

do this every day to help out."

Donations will be collected at select locations Monday through Thursday from 10 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. Lunch will be distributed at select locations Tuesday through Friday from 1-2 p.m. at Henry Park, 111 Flower Street, Pittsville Volunteer Fire Department, 7442 Gumboro Rd. and the Ocean City Chamber of Commerce, 12320 Ocean Gateway in West Ocean City.



We've got a very good relationship among the seven directors right now, he said. "If we can keep that level of consistency going for the next several years, we'll continue to help move the community forward."





### **Short-term rental rules, regulations**

Planning Commission looks over Airbnb ordinance draft ideas at monthly meeting

(March 19, 2020) The Berlin Planning Commission looked over a short draft of the short-term rental rules last Wednesday that had been suggested by the mayor and Town Council.

Since last November, the council and Planning Commission have been looking into ordinances created by nearby municipalities and states re-

garding short-term rentals, including those known as Airbnbs.

Mayor Gee Williams discussed the importance of "what regulations should be created

here in Berlin regarding short-term rentals" during the Town Council meeting on Monday, March 9, and Planning Director Dave Engelhart provided each member of the Planning Commission with a short list describing some of the rules suggested during the meeting.

Of these rules suggested were the definition of the terms "Short Term Residential Rental" and "Permanent Residence," qualifying rental space, parking and violations.

Engelhart said the proposed measure consists of 14 pages that are ready for a first reading in the approval process, though no date for that hearing has been set.

The first reading had been set for Monday, March 23, with a public hearing set for Monday, April 6, however, both the upcoming March and first April meeting were canceled as a precaution due to coronavirus concerns.

# Cell tower to be constructed south of Berlin mid-May

Service will improve area along Route 113 to Newark

(March 19, 2020) The southern Berlin area should see improved cell service, as plans for a 195-foot-tall cell tower were reviewed by the Worcester County Technical Review Committee during its meeting last Wednesday. The tower, to be constructed by Calvert Crossland and Verizon Wireless, will be located on privately owned land on the south side of Ironshire Station Road and 439 feet west of Downs Road.

In post-meeting comments, Barb Pivec, owner of Calvert Crossland, said the tower will help the network between Berlin and Newark along Route 113. She hopes the tower will be shipped between May 5-10 and built that same day.

"We build a site in May, then it's probably another four or five months until the antennas are put on and the site is operable," Pivec said.

The project's next steps are to receive approval of its stormwater management plan, obtain the building permit and the electrical permit. The Worcester County Board of Zoning Appeals granted approval for the tower on Jan. 9, according to Pivec.


She said she's been working on this project since 2013.

"It's very difficult to build towers in Worcester County and we're very happy we were able to find a location that met the objectives and goals of the wireless carriers that was acceptable to the community," Pivec said.

She added that the tower's infrastructure will be available to other carriers and broadband providers.

### We'll get through this

Some of us are working from home, some of us are working at our offices and job sites, and some of us aren't working at all. Such is the new abnormal in a world turned outside-in by the spread of the novel corona virus.

As of early Wednesday morning, no cases of COVID-19, as the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention calls it, had been reported in Worcester County. In fact, of the Eastern Shore of Maryland's nine counties, only Talbot County with one case had been affected.

This may be one of the few times that living on the frequently overlooked Eastern Shore, in terms of getting anything from the state, is an advantage.

That, of course, is likely to change, as travel by members of our mobile society slows to a moderate trickle rather than ceases abruptly, and someone will either return home with a not-so-lovely parting gift from a trip beyond the peninsula, or a visitor will come and go and leave something viral behind.

It can't be helped, even though local and state governments are doing their best to contain the spread of this disease. Gov. Larry Hogan in particular has proven to be much more than many people thought he would be when he won his first term in a "stunning upset" in 2014.

He is the right person in the right place at a time when having the guts to make exceptionally painful and unprecedented decisions, and giving the public the straight facts while doing it, constitute real leadership.

But as necessary as they are, Maryland's strict, almost martial law-like virus containment efforts are battering local businesses, workers, consumers, the elderly and school students. That means people who can help must do so whenever, wherever and however they can. That includes helping our local businesses get back on track once this thing ends.

And it will. As bad as it is, our parents, grandparents and great-grandparents endured worse: they went through the Great Depression *and* World War II.

When the war ended, they went on to build the greatest economy the world had ever seen. If we have half the qualities of our earlier family members, we will do the same thing.

Phillips said anyone in need of


help should provide their name, phone number and address to receive volunteer assistance.
