Crash throws toddler in bay, hero jumps in

Two-year-old recovering from 25-foot fall into water

(May 6, 2021) A 2-year-old toddler is safe after being ejected from a car and into Assawoman Bay during a multicar crash that left one vehicle dangling over the side of the Route 90 bridge on Sunday.

As horrific as the accident sounds, there were no fatalities reported thanks to the quick response of EMS crews and of a Good Samaritan, who jumped 20-25 feet down into the water from the bridge to save the child's life.

Ocean City Police officials said this week that the man who jumped into the four to five feet of water immediately began to administer "life-saving" measures to save the child. They added that the man wishes to remain anonymous. The child, who was flown to Johns Hopkins hospital, has since been released.

On Sunday, at approximately 2:47 p.m., crews from the Ocean City Fire and Ocean City Police departments were dispatched to an accident with See HORRIFIC Page 2

Berlin's Jazz, Blues Bash returns

After pandemic closed it last year. annual music fest ready for high notes

(May 6, 2021) Returning after a hiatus in 2020 because of the coronavirus pandemic, a scaled-back version of the Berlin Jazz & Blues Wine & Brews Festival will take place on Main Street this Friday through Sunday.

Initially launched by the Berlin Chamber of Commerce in 2008 as the Jazz & Blues Bash, the event was renamed in 2019, with this years' iteration, tagged the Jazz & Blues, Art & Booths because of health safety adaptations.

Economic and Community Development Director Ivy Wells, who helps promote the shindig, said the Berlin Chamber of Commerce focused on producing a safer version of the annual event.

"We're really happy to bring life back to downtown Berlin, especially when it involves art and live music," she said. "I'm looking forward to see what they have planned."

Berlin Chamber officials worked with local restaurants and live-music venues to flesh out details for this year's gathering.

In a change from past festivals, organizers said safety concerns left them unable to sponsor outside food and beverage vendors or stage live music outdoors.

Despite the limitations, live jazz and blues performers are scheduled to appear on stage at a number of indoor venues over the three-day festival.

On Saturday, a one-day art show and sale is scheduled from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. that will bring retailers and artists to display offerings in 10 x 10 tented booths on Main Street and several adjoining side streets.

Organizers have requested restaurants and food establishments to expand outdoor seating into closed roadways, while adhering to CDC and See JAZZ Page 4

Horrific crash on Rt. 90 bridge ends well

Continued from Page 1 injuries on the bridge.

A Worcester County fire marshal who arrived at the scene early reported that one vehicle was halfway over the bridge guardrail and that several people had suffered injuries, according to a press release from the Ocean City Fire Department.

A child, who was restrained by a car seat, fell into the bay from a pickup truck, according to police.

The Good Samaritan immediately jumped off the bridge into the water to save the toddler and was able to get it onboard a pontoon boat nearby.

Ryan Whittington, a spokesman for the department, said the child was flown to the pediatric unit at Johns Hopkins in Baltimore.

Seven other people injured in the accident were taken to area hospitals — Atlantic General in Berlin and Peninsula Regional Medical Center in Salisbury – for treatment.

Whittington said other children were on the scene, though exact details were still being compiled.

Officials said the bridge was closed for six hours after crews arrived on the scene.

During an Ocean City Council meeting on Tuesday, Mayor Rick Meehan praised the quick actions of

the "humble hero," adding that although the accident was tragic, it had a happy ending.

Meehan also said the accident brings to light an even more pressing issue, which is to dualize Route 90. He added if the crash had occurred while trying to evacuate the island, it would have created a "catastrophe."

Meehan said this near tragedy should help raise awareness of the problems with the two-lane highway Ocean Pines and Ocean City and bring the issue to the top of the list for state legislators.

No further details about the accident were available, as it is still under investigation.

One person killed and others injured in two-car collision

(May 6, 2021) One person was killed and several people were injured last Friday night in a two-car collision on Assateague Road and Grey Fox Lane near Berlin.

Maryland State Police from the Berlin Barrack a vehicle with six occupants made a U-turn in front of another vehicle with one occupant around 9:35 p.m.

The driver of first vehicle was taken to the Atlantic General Hospital and pronounced dead, while a passenger in that car was flown to Sentara Norfolk General Hospital by Maryland State Police Trooper 4, and another was flown to R Adams Cowley Shock Trauma Center by Maryland State Police Trooper 6.

Four other passengers were taken by Berlin EMS, Ocean City Fire and EMS, Showell EMS, and Ocean Pines EMS to TidalHealth Peninsula Regional Medical Center.

Maryland Natural Rescores Police and Worcester County Sheriff's Office assisted with the incident. Assateague Road was closed for several hours due to the collision.

The cause of the collision is still under investigation by Maryland State Police.

Health Department Worcester health-safety protocols.

Community bike ride in Pines well attended

Healthy contingent joins in safety-first activity traveling 14 miles throughout area

(May 6, 2021) Roughly five-dozen riders suited up for a community bike ride sponsored by the Worcester County Bike and Pedestrian Coalition in Ocean Pines last Saturday afternoon.

Early arrivals began to cycle in just after 3 p.m. for the 14-mile ride that set off around 4 p.m. from the Racquet Center on Manklin Creek Road.

Pines resident Chris Thomas joined the community event last week and hopes to participate in subsequent bike rides scheduled in Worcester County to commemorate National Bike Month.

"I just moved here last June and this is my first," he said. "I used to go mountain biking a lot and that got a little rough for me with my age."

The community ride is part of a series of local events organized by the Worcester County Bike and Pedestrian Coalition to celebrate National Bike Month in May.

Patti Stevens, with the Worcester County Bike and Pedestrian Coalition, said rides are planned the next three Saturday's to raise community

interest in the activity.

"It's a fun way to get around [but also] to remind drivers and cyclists to be 'streetwise' and share the road safely," she said.

Also among the early birds for last week's bike ride were Ocean Pines residents Roelof "Dutch" Oostveen and Steve Arthur.

"We bike everyday, 20-25 miles back and forth to Assateague Island, and I'm 90-years old," Oostveen said.

While no longer concerned about maintaining top speeds, Oostveen averages a 12-13-mph clip during the excursions.

Decked out in a safety helmet and spandex bicycle suit, Oostveen noted the shirt bore the logo of a group he helped found many decades ago in Limburg, the southernmost province in the Netherlands.

"This is my bicycle club from the Netherlands and I've been a member for nearly 70 years," he said. "Maybe next year, if I go home, they're going to celebrate."

Prior to the throng's departure from the Racquet Center last week, Stevens reviewed safety protocols, followed by remarks from board of directors President Larry Perrone and Recreation and Parks Director Debbie Donahue.

Helping assure the community bike ride was conducted safely, in ad-

dition to Ocean Pines Police and Volunteer Fire Department personnel, were roughly a dozen volunteers from numerous volunteer organizations, including the Kiwanis Club of Greater Ocean Pines-Ocean City, Ocean Pines Pickleball Club, the Sierra Club and the Eastern Shore International Mountain Biking Association.

Formed in June 2020, the Worcester County Bike and Pedestrian Coalition seeks to promote safe walking and biking throughout the region, along with expanding trails, walkways and recreational facilities to attract tourism, and to offer transportation alternatives for area residents.

OP Bylaws considers amendments

(May 6, 2021) The Ocean Pines

Bylaws and Resolutions Committee discussed the challenges of forming an Elections Search Committee and the power delegated to the Architectural Review Committee (ARC) during its meeting on Friday.

Committee Chairman Jim Trum-

mel presented a pair of concerns raised by a bylaws review work group that is drafting proposed updates to association declaration of restrictions.

The Search Committee conundrum is that even though its job is to recruit candidates for the association's annual elections, the committee hasn't been organized for the past several years, Trummel said.

"This year there are two members but there should be five," he said. Committee member Keith Kaiser

said recent efforts to fill out that committee have fallen short.

"Obviously, it's not been a fruitful effort," he said.

Kaiser suggested asking the board See OCEAN Page 8

Ocean Pines Memorial Day service to take place May 31

(May 6, 2021) The annual Memorial Day service in Ocean Pines will return to the Worcester County Veterans Memorial on Monday, May 31, beginning at 11 a.m.

The ceremony this year will feature Salisbury Mayor Jake Day as the keynote speaker.

Day recently returned from a yearlong deployment in East Africa with the Maryland National Guard and is one of only three full-time U.S. mayors ever deployed while serving in office.

revise or rewrite the related bylaws provision.

"What we have in writing is not what's being accomplished," he said.

With other committee members agreeing that the language of that provision should be changed, Trummel said the recommendation would be sent to the bylaws work group, which would then send its findings to the board.

Trummel said there are varying approaches to remedy the issue.

"One would be eliminating the Search Committee and transferring search functions as an additional duty of the Elections Committee," he said.

One risk Trummel raised with abandoning the Search Committee would be losing person-to-person contact in soliciting board candidates within the community.

"We can legitimately indicate the Search Committee provisions of the bylaws need to be addressed," he said.

The second issue discussed involved the ARC appeal process and general board oversight.

Trummel said the work group worried that the vast majority of the assorted declaration of restrictions within sections of Ocean Pines state ARC decisions are final.

"There's no qualifying statement, decisions are final, period," he said.

Differences abound among the numerous declarations of restrictions, especially those instituted after the mid-1990s, Trummel said. "In those, it doesn't state decisions are final, but that they are subject to being appealed by a lot owner in accordance with the appeals process in association design guidelines," he said.

"If you look in the ARC guidelines, you don't find an appeals process section of any kind," he said.

Trummel said although appeal processes do exist, the work group has requested instances of inconsistent language be addressed.

Kaiser asked why ARC would be deemed independent from the board.

Trummel said the origins of the power divide trace back to the formation of the HOA half a century ago.

"It's puzzling to me how they could not have seen that they were creating the impression of a committee that acted completely outside of the governance of the association," he said.

Kaiser said the matter of board oversight should be examined.

"Do we want the ARC to be allpowerful and for the board to have no control ... in the event something goes off the track," he said. "We're all subcommittees of the board."

Trummel said the committee feedback would be sent to the in-process work group to further mull which bylaws provisions to recommend modifying.

"We will be proposing a package of amendments to bylaws the board," he said.

When approved by the board, the proposed amendments will require a referendum, with a public hearing and ballots mailed to homeowners.

Berlin Council discusses Heron Park moves

Mayor Zack Tyndall revives topic last examined during March community meeting

(May 6, 2021) The Berlin mayor and Town Council last Monday mulled development plans for Heron Park, including the potential sale of parcels 410 and 57.

Mayor Zack Tyndall revived the issue following a listening session in mid-March when a multitude of opinions were expressed about selling the property or converting the location into an entertainment/recreation venture.

Tyndall asked council members to contemplate the possibilities and asked if members wanted to continue the dialogue with potential development partners.

"We're not here to decide whether we're going to sell it or not sell it," he said.

During the March meeting, the "Better Berlin Group" recommended retaining ownership of Heron Park, so the town could stage events there while having the ability to generate revenue by renting the site for private affairs.

The Better Berlin Group, which

was formed by Ann McGinnis Hillyer from State Ventures LLC. and Brad Hoffman from LiveWire Media & Events, suggested the town could benefit from having a stage in the park and possibly expanding the footprint for annual holiday and seasonal events.

Councilmember Jack Orris said the sentiment from the March discussions seemed clear that Berlin should keep parcel 410 but explore the sale of parcel 57.

Continued from Page 10 felt less decisive.

"I'm not 100 percent sold on keeping that portion," she said. "We still have the debt that's associated."

Berlin is on the hook for \$200,000 annually through 2045 to cancel the debt from purchasing the former Tyson operating plant located on Old Ocean City Boulevard.

"I don't think we need to sell it to whoever is at the table at the moment but should look and discuss what was brought to us," Nichols said.

Noting potential buyers have expressed interest in both parcels, Tyndall said the goal is to avoid wasting time for staff or developers.

"I would like to get a sense following that listening session where our heads are," he said.

Councilmember Jay Knerr championed retaining ownership of parcel 410 and exploring revenue-producing options that were proposed during the listening session in March.

"Ann Hillyer and Brad Hoffman came through and wanted to produce a concert series which would produce revenue the town would benefit from [to] help reduce the debt," he said. "We should consider selling parcel 57 provided we can get the right project for Town of Berlin." Tyndall asked if Knerr preferred to limit consideration of parcel 410 to the Better Berlin Group proposal or weigh additional revenue-producing options.

"I would like to hear all options, but I don't want it to drag into the summer where we lose the opportunity to make revenue," Kneer said.

Tyndall opined that potential parcel sales should be contingent on future development adding value for Berlin.

"We're not selling just for the sake of selling," he said.

Tyndall said legal counsel should be consulted to confirm parameters for open versus closed negotiations regarding a sale.

"We've got to start laying that framework out," he said. "We need to figure out the best way to structure it so we don't take away from somebody's ability to negotiate pricing, which is a contract negotiation and should be done in executive session."

Tyndall also stressed the importance of being open with the public regarding what options exist.

"We need to start framing that because once this budget is wrapped up in May, I'd like to get right into looking at Heron Park," he said.

(May 6, 2021) The Ocean Pines Strategic Planning Committee continued charting its progress during its most recent meeting in late April.

Co-Chairman Bernie McGorry reviewed the groups' work since it was reconstituted earlier this year.

"We're starting to get our legs," he said.

McGorry said the community lacks a strategic plan on which to plot future moves.

"We're expected to lead efforts for development of recommended Ocean Pines long-range plans," he said. "It's up to us to drive the bus."

After the committee inducted a batch of new members in January, Director of Finance Steve Phillips and Accounting Manager Julia Johnson began consulting with the committee.

"It's great to have the finance team involved, because it is going to, at some point, tie to the budget," he said.

In March, the committee began formulating strategic planning techniques, including preliminary SWOT (strengths, weaknesses, opportunities and threats) outlines.

McGorry said developing SWOT charts helps to develop clear strategies.

"Where you have a weakness, [that] turns into something to address or work on," he said.

McGorry said the intent behind establishing benchmarks standards is to examine methods other communities use that might be applicable to Ocean Pine's pursuit of improvement.

"The point is to compare and contrast," he said.

Committee members were tasked with researching online to identify key differences with nearby HOA communities, with their findings returned to co-chairs McGorry or Moe Delcher by May 14.

Among primary points of consideration when examining comparable neighborhoods are total size, available amenities and if HOA governance is handled in-house or through a management company.

Board liaison Dr. Colette Horn has talked with President Larry Perrone about how to proceed.

"His preference was to get input from department heads first and then convene an executive council meeting, where we would be getting input from the chairs of each advisory committee," she said.

Horn said an executive council meeting would likely be scheduled later See OP Page 14

Romersa said public perception of subpar board functionality could discourage potential future property owners from settling down in the Pines.

"It is a resort town, but in the last 5-10 years there's been more a shift to fulltime," she said.

Even though Romersa has been a resident for a handful of years, she has been visiting Ocean Pines and Ocean City since the late 1980s.

nance of the community's facilities and structures has been less than stellar at times.

"You have to maintain infrastructure," she said. "You can not change the past but you can learn from it."

Minimizing a recent trend of increased legal fees stemming from lawsuits against the association is also a priority for Romersa.

Striking a balance between maintaining amenities and assessment fees is also of primary concern.

'You hate to raise fees, but costs do rise," she said "But, if they're going upward from unsound financial decisions, that's not good."

Romersa supported recent increases to non-resident pool fees to widen the charge differential for resident members. "It helps both sides," she said.

In addition to higher profits from visitors, the larger cost variance might serve as an incentive for residents to purchase pool memberships.

"Are there other balances with other amenities?" she said.

As for making sound financial decisions for the community, Romersa said, "We need to seek out cost effective improvements for the betterment of the community," she said.

"You have to look 5-10 years ahead,"

she said.

She said her purpose in joining the board now would be to make decisions based on current circumstances with future considerations in mind.

'You don't step in and say in a week you're going to change it or you'd be lying," she said. "People need to understand things won't be fixed overnight, especially coming out of a pandemic."

Romersa said the lingering coronavirus pandemic adds another layer of difficulty for campaigning.

'You can't make promises because you don't know what next year's going to bring," she said.

Unknowns also affect revenues from amenities this year as pandemic restrictions continue to lighten.

"What you can and can't do is the fine balance and that's changing daily and weekly," she said. "I think everybody is ready to go forward."

Romersa recently joined the Ocean Pines Bylaws & Resolutions Committee, a position she would abandon if elected to the board.

Noting the well-publicized board divisions over the last half-year, Romersa said the question boils down to the result.

"Are you working for the betterment of the community collectively as a whole?" she said. "Stop the nonsense and lets just ... work together."

"After the executive council meeting, the board will review a synopsis report," she said.

The goal is to review the information from association staff and the executive council to identify common themes.

"The board will likely prioritize items, as all will have a dollar figure associated," she said.

Committee member Wes Blackley expressed mixed sentiments.

"I feel really confident we will develop a strategic plan," he said. "My lack of confidence — is it going anywhere?"

Committee member Jenny Cropper Rines concurred that the success of the planning effort will be contingent on engagement.

"The key to it leaving our group and being used is going to take buy-in from the board and the staff," she said.

Rines said success will depend on conveying the need to follow the plan to subsequent board members of newly hired association staff.

"New people should be informed to know it's something that needs to be perpetuated," she said.

The committee's next meeting is May 27 at 9 a.m.

Berlin Youth Club's summer camp activities in person

(May 6, 2021) The Berlin Youth Club summer camp will return to inperson activities this summer, after employing a virtual format last year because of the covid-19 pandemic.

Dr. Jennifer Leggour, executive director of Worcester

Youth and Family Counseling Services, provided the Berlin Parks Commission an update on 2021 program plans during its meeting on Tuesday.

'Last year because Jennifer Leggour of covid-19, we had to do our first virtual camp for the sum-

mer," she said.

With CDC guidelines becoming more relaxed, Leggour told the commission, "We think we can do a very small in person camp this summer."

The camp's schedule will be similar to that of its predecessors, with the eight-week summer camp being held from the first week in July though the end of August for children between ages 6-12.

"What we plan to do is have groups of no more than 10 children at a time in outdoor locations," she said.

Maintaining past summer camp tradition, each week will feature a new theme.

Leggour said the activities on tap this summer would be held in one of several outdoor locations within walking distance from Worcester Youth and Family and suitable for social distancing.

We did get conformation from the Taylor House Museum to use their lawn," she said.

Other nearby outdoor locations the camp will use are Buckingham

Presbyterian Church and the Berlin Library.

"We have three different locations we can rotate the children," she said.

Besides finding physical space to accommodate the camp, organizers also worked with other agencies to identify children-friendly activities.

"The Worcester County Arts Council has access to some local artists, so we could do art week," she said.

Other ventures planned are fitness week, with OC Beach Yoga lined-up to provide an introduction to bodybalance techniques.

Mind expansion is also on tap with Salisbury-based M4 Reactor group, which offers STEM (science, technology, engineering and math) instructional programs for children and adults.

Leggour said M4 Reactor offers mobile STEM activities for nearby locations.

'We're trying to get creative and come up with the theme of the week,' she said. "Then we can start promoting the different activities.

Leggour also credited Carol Rose for providing networking assistance. "She helped us make connections

to find safe spaces," she said. Although changes could occur during the lead-up to summer camp,

whatever CDC health restrictions remain will be honored. "We will follow all guidelines in

place at the time," she said. "I wish we could do it like we normally do, but I'm happy to provide anything.'

Apparently, the public also has been happy with whatever Leggour and the service could provide.

'Last year, even with the virtual camp, people were so grateful," she said. "There's a lot of gratitude we're seeing, even for little things that we do in the community."

Parks Commission vets disc golf course pitch for Berlin

(May 6, 2021) The Berlin Parks Commission vetted a proposal this week from local disc golf pros Austin Widdowson and Shawn Johnson to install an 18-hole course at Stephen Decatur Park.

Widdowson and Johnson, both members of Eastbound Disc Golf, presented initial plans to enhance Stephen Decatur Park during the commission meeting on Tuesday.

Widdowson told the commission several dozen Berlin residents regularly play the game, which has rules like golf except players throw discs at a target.

"We need it in this area," he said. "We're looking to provide a free service to the community."

Prior to developing their proposal, the disc-golf advocates toured several locations in Berlin with Mayor Zach Tyndall and Councilmember Troy Purnell.

After concluding Heron Park would be cost-prohibitive, and peripheral space at the Northern Worcester Athletic Complex lacked community connectivity, Widdowson said Stephen Decatur Park presented an ideal scenario.

Continued from Page 16 utilized," he said. "The infrastructure currently being used is a small portion of the park."

Johnson, a Snow Hill native who returned to the area last fall, helped establish a disc golf club at Kinder Farm Park in Millersville, a 288-acre site operated by Anne Arundel County Recreation and Parks.

We established a 501c3 that had over 100 members the first year," he said.

Johnson was also a former member of the Mid-Delmarva Disc Golf Alliance.

"The group structure was not well defined," he said. "The current board of directors and I decided to rebrand as Eastbound Disc Golf.'

Johnson said the group is focused on promoting practices and standards for installing disc-golf courses.

"I'm hoping this will be a test run for disc golf in the area," he said. "Since covid, it's been an activity that most people agree is safe."

Widdowson said course employs tee pads and distanced sticks no more than five feet tall that support chainlink baskets.

"There's no actual permanent in-

frastructure," he said. Courses are also easy to adapt and reshape if needs arise.

"There is no real extra maintenance after it's put in," he said.

Course hole poles would be placed in unobtrusive spots.

'You'll barely even notice it's there," he said. "We'll also put up signage, 'Be aware you're now entering a disc golf area.'

Widdowson said Stephen Decatur Park would provide sufficient space for two courses, for both beginner and advanced players.

'We're not asking for anything; we're hoping to donate this in full, he said. "Our goal would be to get this breaking ground ... this summer."

Deputy Town Administrator Mary Bohlen said the mayor and Town Council would require a formal agreement to move forward.

"You probably would not get very far with grant funding if you didn't have a formal agreement in place," she said. "Typically, they like to know you have permission to be on the property."

Bohlen said the proposal would be added to the agenda for a mayor and Town Council meeting, possibly later this month.

Besides, regardless of what temporary limitations might be in effect, they're not as important as the music. It's like music publisher, promoter and Duke Ellington's manager Irving Mills said, "It don't mean a thing if it ain't got that swing."

Suplee offers recipe for 'best wings ever'

I am pensive as I pull the succulent meat off of my chicken wings after a small catering function.



I am bound and determined to make this summer an epic season. After last year, many of us are simply burnt out; defeated in many ways. In an industry that was decimated by the pandemic,

hospitality leaders and managers are fighting hard to regain at least some ground in the battle against the government shutdowns. And then this happens.

First, we started with a threat to our crab meat supply, and that is indeed very real, my good people. Crabs are being purchased fresh off the dock at a whopping \$400 per bushel.

Even wholesale jumbo lump is expected to hit upwards of \$40 per pound. In the industry, we are getting to the point that items that use crab may have to come off our menus for a spell, unless we can convince our guests to spend upwards of thirty dollars for a crab cake sandwich.

And last week it was announced that chicken wings are coming into short supply. Excuse me? Chicken wing and crab shortages? At the onset of what will probably be the busiest tourist season in 20 years on the island? Will this madness ever end?

Someone has got to be joking. It is an understatement to say that restaurants and hotels have had a hard time over the past 14 months.

It would also be an understatement to claim that so many of us are ready to throw our hands up and run away to Mexico to live out our years in an obscure village somewhere in the mountainside. Wait, did I just write that? I really need to work on my inner-monologue.

When I moved my daughters to Boston in February, it truly saddened me to see how many restaurants had shuttered their windows for good, never to reopen.

They were devastated up there, but those politics shall be saved for another day. But I could tell that it has been even more of a bitter fight up north than it was down here, and rest assured, none of us had fun down here during this mess. Alas, I go off the point. Back to the task at hand.

Two of the most important, or at least most popular products in Ocean



City are now scarce and at a premium. This is a death knell to anyone who relies solely on these products and while I am sure that such operators will be creative as we all had to be last year, it will definitely leave another indelible mark on our collective souls as we work through this newest of crises.

Sometimes I wonder how this will all end. With the season starting a bit earlier this year due to what can only be recognized as COVID-Fatigue, we are seeing an influx of tourism which is a staggering indication of Summer 2021

And have I mentioned the labor crisis? Oh, I haven't? At present, it is impossible to find enough staff for local restaurants and hotels. In fact, one hotel group has been bringing people up from Texas in an effort to at the very least create a skeleton crew to pull off the impossible.

Add to this the mind-numbing concept that national chains are offering signing bonuses and egregious starting wages to unskilled laborers, and you can see that small restaurants are finding themselves doomed from the start. However, with this

being said, we survived 2020, so we can pull of the impossible again, right? We shall see.

In one of my restaurants, I already closed two days per week, and who knows what will happen with the other if we don't get more people in the workforce? Hopefully, we can maintain our seven-day schedule, but with modern dilemmas afoot, everyone will have to make adjustments. Hopefully, our customers can appreciate that. Fingers crossed.

So, in earnest I beg of you to take care of any chicken wings and crab meat that you may get your hands on. Take care of this precious gold. It is not to be taken for granted.

The Best Wings Ever

Makes 20 wings

- 20 Chicken wing segments
- 1 c. Italian vinaigrette
- Salt & Pepper, as needed
- 1/2 c. Basil puree (recipe follows)
- 1/2 c. HanksTM Hot Sauce

1. These wings are made in stages, so read through the recipe and time it out properly.

3. Marinate the chicken wing seg-

ments in the dressing for at least forty-five minutes.

4. Season with salt and pepper and place on a hot grill. The wings will char a bit as they cook, but that is what we are looking for. You want that lovely Cuban Wing feel to them.

4. Remove from the grill and let rest for about forty minutes (or refrigerate for future use, but they're better day-of). This step sets these wings apart from others, as when they go through the final step, the meat falls off the bone.

5. When it's go-time, roast the chicken wings in a 450F oven for about ten minutes.

6. Toss with the basil puree and hot sauce and serve immediately.

7. Shed tears of pride and sadness, knowing that you have created such a lovely gift while knowing that you might not be able to find enough wings for your next shindig. Blast you, supply chain. Blast you!
