OPA directors mull 86-ing Janasek

His yacht club confrontation has board asking whether to yank amenity privileges

(June 2, 2022) After an altercation at the tiki bar at the Ocean Pines Yacht Club that allegedly saw former Ocean Pines Director Tom Janasek accost current Director Josette Wheatley, Director Larry Perrone introduced and tabled a motion during a special meeting on May 25 that could see Janasek suspended from Ocean Pines amenities for a year.

The motion was tabled so the

board can review and analyze the facts of the incident and the options available to them.

Witness accounts suggest that on May 20, a Friday, Janasek confronted Wheatley

and her husband and the altercation escalated to the point that Yacht Club staff escorted Janasek off the prop-

Janasek allegedly returned after being told to leave.

"It's just beyond the pale," Perrone said afterward. "It's outrageous that a member of the board, or for that

matter any member of our community, should be abused verbally as Josette Wheatley was on the night of May 20, 2022."

"There's no question that it happened,

there's no dispute about what happened ... The discussions that we've had to this point are whether or not our documents give us the ability to render punishment for actions of this nature. I think the answer to that question is 'no.' However, the bylaws also — under the 'other lawful acts'

Town finances ahead entering final quarter

Rescue Act money biggest contributor to fiscal health

(June 2, 2022) The Town of Berlin's finances are outpacing FY2021 at the third-quarter benchmark of FY2022.

At the May 23 meeting of the Berlin Town Council, Finance Direc-

tor Natalie Saleh broke down revenues and expenses through the first nine months of the fiscal yearwhich ended on March 31, and reported on what the council should expect as the fiscal year enters its last month.

"Overall, at \$8.8 million at the (3rd quarter) benchmark, we are (roughly 22.7 percent) higher than this point last year," Saleh said.

The town had \$7.15 million budgeted for revenue through the first nine months, but the actual number ended up at \$8.78 million. The biggest change came from the "contributed revenue" category — \$2.29 million more than last year — which is due to the town receiving American Rescue Plan Act funds earlier in the fiscal year.

Property tax revenuses are also up. "The property taxes, I'm glad to report are being collected fully," Saleh said at the meeting. "There is actually a little extra left over from what we budgeted (at \$59,319)."

GM report talks up racquet upgrades, disc golf, T-docks

(June 2, 2022) New business including racquet sports upgrades, disc golf and new mailboxes were covered in General Manager John Viola's report to the Ocean Pines Board on May 25.

"In the racquet sports, a lot's happening down there," Viola said.

He said there's a punch list on maintenance and other items that will be ad- John Viola dressed.



The pickleball courts have been completed "in-house within budget," Viola said.

The 10-hole disc golf course at Bainbridge Park is still in a trial period and has cost the Ocean Pines Association nothing so far, Viola said. In the future, if ithe course is retained, there will be "minimal to no cost.'

The association held a town hall for community opinon on the course on May 21, which Viola described as 'well represented."

"I will evaluate as time goes on and so will (Recreation and Parks Director) Debbie (Donahue) and we'll get feedback," he said. "Berlin did it on a trial basis for a year, they made a few adjustments, some that we're already making such as where we're going to position these metal baskets and we'll go from there."

A walkthrough of the course was scheduled last week for homeowners.

Viola also reported that Public Works installed floating planters on both sides of the North Gate Pond re-

The planters help with nutrient and algae control, Viola said. They're also a resting place for turtles and cover for fish.

Viola said that the \$1,000 planters will be installed in other ponds "if all goes well.

Viola said he hopes that drainage projects will conclude by the end of

"Over a year ago, we had the grant and did the pond filtration," he said. "That's all completed, all positive all around. However, the pipes on the three main roads have not been completed. We have to work in conjunction with the county, and with covid, supplies and the contractors, there have been some delays."

"Our whole plan on maintenance is to get these pipes fixed which haven't been addressed in 20, 30, 40 years. The pipe liners, the way they go as far as work, a dollar amount is way cheaper. Instead of maintaining them, once we put them in, I won't have to maintain them. It is coming out of the reserve for drainage, so that is a shift we will have to do going forward."

Over at the Swim and Racquet Club, the roof is scheduled to be replaced and the exterior was painted last week. The makeover work will be evaluated at the end of the summer.

T-docks have been built and Viola said the association is waiting on floats that go under the docks. That should take six weeks. The construction cost is \$65,000.

A and D docks will be used for the new water taxi that transports people from Ocean Pines to Ocean City.

Fifty-five mailbox sites have been evaluated, Viola said.

"I am going to have favorability," he said. "Some of this favorability or a nice piece of it is the mailboxes that I believed as tasked by the board that I would have maintained over the last few months or the last period."

Viola will present to the board bids replacing mailboxes pedestals. Concrete will be addressed and done in-house.

Regarding recommended surplus allocation, Viola prefaced with the fact that \$650,000 was taken out of realized favorability" for FY21.

"We're in the same position now," he said.

The association was \$1.6 million "in the hole" in FY18, which has been See NEW Page 3



OP Strategic Planning looks at community goals, mission

(June 2, 2022) The Ocean Pines Strategic Planning Committee is continuing to work on its mission statement as well as developing goals for the Ocean Pines Association.

Committee Bernie McGorry said the goals are driven by a survey in which residents offered their opinions on what they believe are important issues for the commu-

"(There was a lot of) community things like safety, appearance, infrastructure, (which) were the top three, but also incorporating core values into future planning," McGorry said.

"The committee debated a lot about (whether we are) the content experts or the process experts. I think the consensus was at the next board work session that we'll recommend executive council committee chairs be involved in a future planning session where specific long-term actions or lists or strategies are developed."

McGorry added that the committee is hoping to have a work session with the Ocean Pines Board of Directors sometime later this month.

The Strategic Planning Committee itself is relatively new, coming online in 2021. McGorry said that he didn't believe the community has had such a committee in "at least 10, if not 20"

"I signed up on (this committee) because I felt Ocean Pines needed long-term direction," McGorry said. "It started with benchmarking other communities, creating surveys, and now it's taking some of those survey results and making recommended goals, maybe slide updates to the mission, making a five-year plan."

"It'll help the budgeting and planning processes."

The goal of the committee is to incorporate values identified by the community — including transparency and accountability — and other key issues.

In other business, McGorry said the committee planned to discuss amenity reporting and whether staff reports just performance or also includes budget. The committee decided to continue doing a better job and communicating amenity performance transparently.

"It's more the committee continuing to refine their recommended goals that they plan to review with the board at an upcoming work session," he said. "There are things that were identified in the survey like maintaining infrastructure, improving community appearance and current amenities along with maintaining high levels of safety."

The Strategic Planning Committee is scheduled to meet next on June 23.

"well-publicized," Viola said.

"Where we are now, what I'm saving at the end of this Fiscal Year '22 - obviously the books aren't close (yet) — but we'll be at (\$3.1 million.We were at \$1.6 million) unfavorable before we all started.'

"So that (\$3.1 million estimated for FY22), what we did last year on the top there, the one-time assessment, I needed \$650,000 out of last year's favorability to get that assessment to (896). We put that in there and the board approved that we'd have this plus-minus account so that if we did have favorability we could lower the assessment.

If the association's revenues remain unfavorable, the board and Viola would have to decide on how to cover and increase the assessment over time or a one-shot deal, Viola


"I certainly don't anticipate that in the near future," he said.

"If you look at where we are today, if you want to put another \$350,000 into roads — and that's in addition to the \$300,000 we normally put into the assessment to do the three miles — that \$350,000 plus the \$350,000 that'll be in there now, we're up around \$700,000 of that cushion or surplus that everyone asked me to

Viola pointed out that the pickleball courts weren't in the budget and they could have used maintenance money for it, but it was recommended to the board to take those funds out of the surplus.

'It's all planned. It's all transparent. It's just timing," Viola said. "We're still projecting a surplus of \$900,000."

Ocean Pines Board of Directors Briefs

(June 2, 2022) The Ocean Pines Board of Directors discussed the following during its May 25 meeting:

Purchase requests

The association unanimously approved two purchase requests. One was for culvert pipes for the Bainbridge project — priced at \$13,676.00 for Beaconhill Road pipes, \$12,236.00 for Pinehurst Road pipes, and \$12,236.00 for Sandyhook Road pipes by Deppe Brothers Excavation. The other was for the replacement of mailbox cluster units and pedestals for \$60,987 from Salisbury industries.

Tree removal

The board unanimously passed new procedure and penalty guidelines for homeowners who eschew Ocean Pines Association rules for removing trees from their property. The OPA has long been dealing with residents who hire contractors on their own and have trees removed with no input or consent from the association. These violations often get tied up in the association and can even progress to Worcester County courts.

From now on, permits for tree removals will include a notarized signature from the property owner, a move that the association hopes will do

more to include the property owner in the process directly and thus educate them on the steps that must be taken.

Open violations

The board unanimously passed the declaration of the existence of multiple open violations that in turn suspend the voting rights and use of amenities for the violators, as long as the cases remain open. Six of these open cases have gone to litigation, OPA Secretary Rick Farr said.

"This (motion) will shorten the timeline, save (the association) money and provide a better forum for property owners to work out their problems as opposed to the Worcester County court system," Farr said.

Geese control

Environment and Natural Assets Committee Chair Sharon Santacroce gave a presentation to the board about the committee's plans for addressing the health of area ponds due to overabundant Canada geese populations.

The plan largely deals with plant and tree buffers, which help deter geese because of the risk of lying-inwait predators, Santacroce said.

Santacroce said that the committee's research could lead to a "50 to 70 percent" deterrence of Canada geese.

Deeley breaks down OP insurance

(June 2, 2022) The Deeley Insurance Group presented an overview of its coverage of the Ocean Pines Association during the May 25 board of directors meeting and broke down trends on premiums and policy costs.

Regardless of rising policy costs, premiums have nonetheless come down from the last year to what has been forecast now through 2023, largely because of progress with regard to worker's compensation.

All policies, excluding worker's compensation, totaled \$383,630 in 2020-21 and are projected to cost \$404,488 for 2022-23. But when adding in worker's compensation, the difference of nearly \$40,000 — \$150,133 in 2021-22 and \$110,156 in 2022-23 — wipes out that deficit and creates a savings of roughly \$19,000.

The company specializes in coastal property, transportation,

hospitality, contractors, human services and community associations and is a member of chambers of commerce in Berlin, Ocean Pines and Ocean City as well as the Ocean City Hotel-Motel-Restau-

rant Association.

"When we take over an association and every year, what we do is we audit the existing insurance policies against the governing documents of the association," Deeley senior client advisor and liaison to Ocean Pines Megan Muller said. "We make sure nothing's changed over the year."

Over the past two years, Muller said, commercial property insurers

have been hit hard because of natural disasters, supply chain issues, labor shortages and inflation — in other words, the same hang-ups that plague much of the global economy today.

Natural disasters, she said, are the primary cause of building and equipment losses, due in part to the surging prices from covid-related supply chain issues.

"Extreme weather events" rung up \$100 billion in insured losses last year, Muller said. The issues causing the surges are still a problem today.

Even in a more favorable economic climate, insurance companies often stay away from coastal communities because of the great weather risks

"The closer to water, high-wind areas or even proximity to neighbors can cause rates and pricing to escalate," Muller said.



County candidates weigh in on major issues

Four Republicans debate topics with hopes of getting votes to represent district

(June 2, 2022) Republican candidates on the hunt to represent District Three in Worcester County participated in a forum at the Ocean City Golf and Yacht Club in South Point last week, giving residents and members of the South Point Association an idea of where they stand on issues representing the county.

Commissioner Bud Church currently represents the district at the county level, though he is choosing not to seek re-election this November.

Instead, Eric Fiori, Thomas Gulyas, Shawn Kotwica, and Tim VanVonno have thrown their hats into the ring to take the helm of a district that includes most of Berlin and West Ocean City down to South Point.

The forum drew a good crowd of more than 50 constituents who sat at tables covered with white tablecloths, and a handful with American Flags.

Steve Katsanos moderated the discussion and posed more than 10 questions to the candidates regarding topics such as development along Route 50, the proposed sports complex near Stephen Decatur High School, teaching sexual identity in schools, and developing areas south of Buck's convenience store on Route 611.

Each candidate was allowed time at the beginning to introduce themselves and drew straws to see who would go first.

VanVonno, a businessman whose family was in attendance, drew the shortest straw and went first.

"It's a bad omen," he was heard saying just before taking to the podium.

VanVonno has a background in construction and real estate and holds an undergraduate in communications and an MBA.

He raised four children in Worcester County, and said, "It was one of the best experiences raising a family here."

VanVonno also said he would like to focus on education because the largest portion of the county's budget goes toward the public school system.

While looking to the education portion of the budget, VanVonno said the county should be more involved in finding a way to pay the bus drivers more money.

Gulyas said adding bus drivers as

employees was not the solution, and rather than make their plea to the county, the drivers should have gone to the board of education to produce a solution on getting more pay to help cover costs.

Kotwica said becoming a bus driver was a risk each of the operators took. While giving them more pay may not be the solution, he suggested finding a way to get the drivers tax credits or supplements to help them out

Fiori, who has experience selling rented equipment and has been a long-time entrepreneur said it would be easier to raise revenues and cut expenses in education, suggesting there was a solution that could be reached for the drivers.

Fiori, who has three children in the school system, grew up in Anne Arundel County and by the age of 10 was in business for himself selling softshell crabs. He later went on to deliver newspapers, and by the time he was 17, he operated a four-bay service station. When he moved to the Atlantic coast, he opened several businesses and learned a lot about mixed commercial use zoning.

"I wanna see people work hard and grow in this county," he said, putting the focus on the residents.

One of Fiori's philosophies is that research should be done before making major purchases like bringing the Black-eyed Susan paddleboat to

Snow Hill.

While he said he thinks bringing attractions like the boat to the area is great for tourism, several things were missed while researching the purchase that led to a failed inspection. Likewise, Fiore said, the same is happening with the purchase of property north of Stephen Decatur High School for over \$7 million for a sports complex site.

Big purchases and pricey projects, he explained, need to be thought out, and he promised to listen to both sides, show respect, and do his own research.

VanVonno said he was opposed to the sports complex because the land was expensive and he is worried about traffic issues.

All candidates except Kotwica were against the sportsplex.


Kotwica is a 20-year resident of Worcester County who worked his way up into restaurant management and now is a Realtor with Coldwell Banker.

As a big proponent of development, Kotwica supports putting infrastructure in place to be able to handle projected growth to places like Berlin and Ocean City.

"Now is the time to step forward," he said. "We don't want to be behind."

Kotwica said Somerset County was a prime example of an area that built many homes without infrastructure.

Opponents take similar stance on wind farm

In terms of the sportsplex, Kotwica admitted to possibly being the only candidate in favor of it because the facility will practically scream family-friendly to people coming to the area.

A public hearing on the sports complex was held in April at Stephen Decatur High School, at which time Gulyas, a former Berlin councilmember, declined to comment.

Gulyas said he was frustrated with the hearing because none of the commissioners answered questions posed to them on the facility or purchase. Someone at the hearing asked if Gulyas was going to speak and he said no. On Tuesday, he explained, the deal was already signed before it took place and accused County Commissioner Joe Mitrecic of signing that deal.

Gulyas owns Ace Printing and Mailing in Berlin and has a 40-year career in local politics.

He, like the other three candidates, is opposed to more development south of Buck's, and said a \$200,000 feasibility study on adding a traffic light where Routes 611 and 357 cross is a waste of money. Gulyas added that the county could pay anyone \$10,000 to sit at the intersection on the weekend to see the need for a light.

All four candidates oppose the construction of a wind farm off the

coast of Ocean City, with Gulyas saying anyone who believes they will see a reduction in their power bill is "being sold a bill of goods."

The candidates were asked about adding workforce housing to district three, and Kotwica said there was available real estate in the area that could be made safe for housing.

VanVonno suggested if more affordable housing was made available, more business development would need to be implemented to sustain it year-round. Though Gulyas was not opposed to workforce housing, he said the government has no place in creating it. Instead, the developers should purchase properties themselves and create the housing.

Fiori also weighed in, saying when he used to go to Ocean City to live and work in the summer, he would stand in line at the convention center on 40th Street and hand out resumes during the job fair. Now, the businesses are struggling to find workers, and Fiori said the county must first find out why the workforce left, never mentioning anything about the high cost of rentals or homes being converted into AirBNBs.

Voters will be able to vote on which Republican candidate they want to serve as District Three commissioner during the primary election, on July 19.

Janasek taking 'full responsibility'

provision — make the board responsible for the safety and our amenities. This was a safety issue."

Perrone claimed during the special meeting that witnesses said the incident for a time looked as if it were going to become physical.

Claims that Janasek appeared intoxicated could not be confirmed.

Janasek has acknowledged that the incident was unfortunate but sees this as just the latest attempt by Perrone and the board to come after him.

"It escalated to a point that it shouldn't have and I take full responsibility for where it went but I don't see how I should be banned," Janasek said. "I've been a patron of the yacht club and all the amenities of Ocean Pines for 40 years. I don't see why there'd be any reason to ban me at this point but it's an agenda with the board. They like to go after me whenever they can. They did it when I was on the board and they're doing it now."

Janasek added that he doesn't believe he will be banned and, even if he were, he had no plans to seek legal counsel, a possibility some are wary of seeing.

"If this is left to (General Manager John Viola) and he has made it very clear that he is not willing to do anything because he is concerned about litigation, then as a board, we do have an obligation," Perrone said. "While our general manager may be concerned about litigation coming from Tom, I am more concerned about litigation that could occur in the future if Mr. Janasek is allowed to frequent our operations and this incident happens again and someone is hurt. Then, we're looking at a lawsuit — the other concern I have."

Specifically, the ban would prohibit Janasek from entering the yacht club, the Beach Club and the golf club for one year from the date he was notified of the suspension.

"It's a bigger loss for the community and the amenities if I don't go (to them)," Janasek said. "So if that's what they want to do — cut their nose off to spite their face — (let them). Apparently from what I've heard in the rumor mill, it's not going through anyway."

"It was an effort from Larry Perrone, for sure, who's had it out to get me for the last two years but I don't think it's going to go much further."

But Perrone said the issue is in no

way personal.

"It's not personal. I have an obligation as a member of the board of directors to protect the community and ensure the safety of anyone who goes to our amenities," Perrone said. "Whether it was him or someone else, I guess he just doesn't understand this is not personal. What he did was not acceptable and as a community and as a board, we should not accept that behavior at our amenities whether it's a board member, employee or any other patron."

This is not the first time that Janasek has found himself in hot water because of his actions involving others.

Last October, Janasek resigned from the board after he was threatened with potential removal for a derogatory statement aimed at Ocean Pines Board member Colette Horn.

In November 2020, Janasek was nearly removed from the board based on his public criticisms of General Manager John Viola. The issue was resolved after the pair made peace during an open meeting.

Wheatley could not be reached for comment.

ties such as Worcester County — are up \$28,592 at \$1.02 million.

On the expense side, the town has spent \$1.18 million on general government, \$1.86 million on public safety and \$686,428 on public works.

Overall, the town has spent about \$210,055 more through the first three quarters of this fiscal year than in FY21.

"We have expenditures remaining at 33 percent, which is a good percentage," Saleh said. "If we take into consideration the ARPA grant contributed revenues from the revenue total, the front balance as of March is

\$1.6 million, comparatively to FY21, is very close — by a \$60,000 difference."

The town budgets the most for public safety, which comes in at \$2.31 budgeted for the year. General government follows at \$1.97 million, then public works at \$1.11 million and capital outlay at \$949,500.

The general fund balance as of March 31 breaks down as:

\$1.61 million in nonspendable money, which includes the sewer and stormwater funds.

\$116,736 in restricted, which chiefly includes slot revenues that can only be spent according to guidelines set by higher levels of government

\$902,176 in committed funds, including impact fees that are also restricted by spending guidelines.

\$907,694 in assigned, which includes health care and the community center.

\$1.67 million in unassigned, with is money available for unexpected costs and needs.

Overall, as of March 31, the general fund balance is about \$5.2 million.





Fleetwood's gone but not too late for Viola

Good government administrators are hard to find, simply because there's more to the job than solid managerial ability, budgeting experience and people skills.

The occupants of these top posts must also be able to work well with a changing lineup of elected officials, regardless of their personal politics and philosophies.

Ocean Pines and the Town of Berlin know about that, having have had experiences over the years with general managers and town administrators who didn't quite mesh with the elected leadership.

Sometimes is simply a matter of clashing personalities or management styles and has nothing to do with an individual's qualifications or job experience. Further, most hiring authorities will admit that no matter how many interviews and background checks a job applicant may be subjected to, it is almost impossible for them to know who will meet that vague standard known as "a good fit."

It's always a roll of the dice, and all town councils and governing boards can do is try to tilt the odds in their favor.

That's why Berlin's loss of Town Manager Jeff Fleetwood in April and the pending departure of Ocean Pines General Manager John Viola make life more difficult for Berlin's mayor and council and for the Ocean Pines Association Board of Directors.

Both have done excellent jobs and will be difficult to replace. In Berlin's case, Fleetwood wasn't as finished with government as he thought he was. He's in line for the town manager's job in his home port of Delmar, with the council there expected to vote whether to hire him later this month.

Would he have stayed longer with the right incentives or a change of circumstances? No one can say, but it does beg the question whether Viola's service to the OPA might be extended were he to be asked.

The directors haven't offered any indication that this has happened, nor are they liable to, but given the solid results Viola and his administrative team have delivered over the past couple of years, it's a question that the board should pale

(June 2, 2022) Blood Bank of Delmarva is calling for more blood donors, because of an alarming drop in blood donations over the holiday weekend. The organization announced a blood emergency earlier this month, as the blood supply has remained critically low.

The region's blood supply currently stands at a five-day level, which is well below the ideal level of seven days, according to a statement released by Blood Bank. In particular, O negative is at just 0.7 days and B negative is at just 1.5 days.

Hospitals and patients rely upon a steady flow of volunteer donors to receive life-saving donations, but the recent holi-

day weekend coupled with school breaks and increased travel have made blood donation less of a priority.

In addition to this, the past two years have caused increased volatility in the blood supply, as the pandemic made it difficult for companies and schools to host blood drives.

"This time of year is always difficult for the blood supply, as Memorial Day and the start of summer makes it even more difficult to turnout donors. This year the holiday is coinciding with already low supply levels and steady rising COVID-19 cases," said Patricia Killeen, senior executive director at Blood Bank of Delmarva. "We highly encourage all who

are able to donate today and help us combat this shortage before we head into the summer months."

Killeen said it only takes one hour to donate, and a single donation can save multiple lives. Roughly one in seven hospital admissions require a blood transfusion. Those in need include: cancer patients, accident, burn, or trauma victims, transplant recipients, surgery patients, chronically transfused patients suffering from sickle cell disease or thalassemia, and many more.
