Electronic voting safety assured

Election committee wants to reassure voters their privacy will be protected

(July 7, 2022) One of the priorities for the Ocean Pines Elections Committee ahead of the board of directors election in August is to ensure voter privacy and to allay any concerns about the security of electronic voting.

Those goals were front and center during the committee's latest meeting on Friday.

The committee pored over the voting directions, which include a paper ballot and instructions to vote online, to be sent to voting-eligible Ocean Pines Association members next

week. In particular, the committee wanted to make sure the information is clear and that there would be no confusion over how far the committee will be removed from the online voting process.

The OPA board voted on June 27 to allow electronic voting for annual elections and referendums.

Viola returns for two more years as GM

Being asked to come back major factor in his decision

(July 7, 2022) John Viola isn't going anywhere.

On July 1, the Ocean Pines Association announced that they had

agreed on a two-year contract with its general manager that includes an option for a third year.

In a press release issued that day, OPA President Colette Horn said the associinterviewed ation



other "very qualified candidates" while maintaining a line of communication with Viola. Ultimately the board of directors allowed Horn to negotiate the extension with Viola.

One of the reasons Viola decided to come back, he said, was simply being wanted back.

"Throughout my four years, I've never turned down a constructive board majority. Six of seven (directors) came to me as well as five of the six (director) candidates told me they wanted me to stay on, as well as many others (in the community)."

Viola said there is plenty of work to be done in the second half of 2022. His goals, he said, are to continue improving drainage around the community, putting the amenities in a balanced position, the bulkhead projects and replacing mailboxes around the community, which is slated to begin next week.

Earlier this week, Horn praised the work Viola has done in Ocean Pines thus far.

"He's certainly proven his ability to be a successful leader," she said. Financially, developing his staff, workwith the board. ing He's result-oriented and he's shown that. See VIOLA Page 5



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

Berlin employee manual gets long overdue modern update

(July 7, 2022) The handbook for Town of Berlin employees just got a makeover.

At the June 27 town council meeting, Administrative Manager Kelsey Jensen outlined changes, additions and subtractions.

"they/them," adding great-grandparents to the definition for "immediate family" and updating the harassment policy.

'These are things that have previously been approved," Jensen said to the council. "We added great-grandparents to immediate family because many employees have them and they should be able to follow through with that bereavement if there is a passing.'

The harassment policy is probably the "largest change," Jensen said as far as housekeeping goes.

"The harassment policy changes were recommended by (Local Government Insurance Trust)," Jensen said. "They took our policy and made several changes and then sent it back to us. They are our insurance provider (and) who we look at for this type of resource. We did go ahead and implement their policy into this.

Harassment updates includes various rewordings, such as changing the phrase "work atmosphere" to "work environment." Specific language was also added that says that 'actions, words, jokes or comments based on an individual's sex, race, color, ancestry or national origin, age, religion, disability, sexual orientation, sexual identification, genetic information, pregnancy, marital status, military service or any other legally protected characteristic will not be tolerated. The handbook also now lists general examples of offenses based on those characteristics such as the displaying of offensive pictures or drawings or "racially or ethnically charged" text messages.

Holidays were also addressed. Employees now get a full off-day on Christmas Eve and New Year's Eve. Juneteenth, which falls every year on June 19, is now recognized by the town as well.

The sympathy guidelines have been cleared up on 24-hour recovery stays versus outpatient care and minor procedures.

Councilmember Jay Knerr pointed out that some outpatient procedures are indeed major.

"I'm not sure how you guys will want to handle that," Jensen said. "Currently, it's set for the period of a day. I don't know what you consider a day. If someone has something major, we've sent flowers, even if it's not 24 hours."

The cost of flowers to be sent now exclude delivery costs.

"A few years ago, this was approved by the prior town administrator and prior mayor," Jensen said. "It was difficult to order a decent arrangement and any delivery/processing fees for under \$100. We cannot always use a local florist depending on where the flowers are being sent.

She added that department heads are responsible for requesting a sympathy card or gift for their staff members.

"They know best about the status of their employees," Jensen added.

The electronic equipment section was updated in light of the prevalence of take-home laptops. The town administration credit limit was updated based on purchasing policy, up to \$10,000.

The town will also leave it up to an employee's respective department to request documentation for sick leave, with the department head being the one to direct the employee to submit proper documentation to the HR department.


A section has been removed that instructed that handbooks must be returned upon an employee's termination. Jensen said most people do not return them and she doesn't see why they'd need to.

'Lastly, we indicated where copies of the most up-to-date handbooks would be available and that employees will sign off for updates," Jensen said.

"That's kind of what we changed. This time around we're going to go section by section, if these are approved this evening and just kind of - it's an outdated handbook and it hasn't been truly updated I think since (2015 or 2016).

Jensen and the council will continue to work on the handbook section by section at the second meeting of every month, when recommendations can be made and discussions had about the handbook.

transmission to help our voters understand that a lot of the issues that come up about integrity of the vote are eliminated by doing it electronically," committee chair Carol Ludwig said after the meeting. "It's a third party. None of us touch anything. The only thing we get our hands on is paper ballots and we have to go through those. That, to me, is not as private or efficient as people voting online."

During the meeting, Ludwig discussed telling the online voting vendor, Vote HOA, to refrain from sending eligible voters access to vote.

"When we send the names of eligible voters to the assessment database, they will assign random numbers for them and send them back. That's what we provide to the printer," Ludwig said. "If they have an email address on the list, they will send them a connection but I think I'm going to tell them not to do that. We need the people to log on and do their thing rather than have them receive an email, though the emails in the assessment database are probably good."

Committee member Mary Anne

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On the corner, south of the stoplight 33034 Main St., Dagsboro Whitcomb responded by raising concern about the wording of the instructions and how it could be misconstrued as insinuating the committee indeed collects email addresses.

"The problem is there's been a lot of stuff on social media that somebody has emails and they're sending them out with these nasty things about the candidates. I don't want to be in a position where I have people's emails," she said.

"(The instructions say) 'If we do not have your email address on file or you do not know your code, you can still vote online. Please contact the Elections Committee or go to the web address below.' It sounds like you can contact the Elections Committee to find out your email on file. That's how it reads. 'Please contact the Elections Committee to get your vote.'"

Ballots mailed - Week of July 12

Ballot Deadline - Wednesday, Aug. 10 by 4 p.m.

Ballots counted and vote totals announced - Thursday, Aug. 11 starting at 10 a.m. in the Clubhouse Meeting Room

Annual Meeting - Saturday, Aug. 13. Time and Venue TBD

Another issue was voter codes being featured on the mailers. It was decided after some discussion between the committee and Thom Gulyas, president of ACE Printing and Mailing who is also a candidate in the Worcester County Commissioners elections, that the codes would go on the top of the instructions page in what Gulyas described as "very big letters" in the meeting.

Committee member Bob Windsor asked if exclusively electronic voting is the goal in the future.

I'd like to continue the success that we've seen.'

"I'm delighted to see that we were able to negotiate that agreement with him.'

The OPA brought on Viola in 2019 in the wake of a forensic audit of the association's ledgers that had left it in dire straits financially. The association's treasurer immediately before his ascension, Viola was originally inked as an interim replacement for former General Manager John Bailey, whom the association ousted amid the monetary mayhem consuming the association.

Under Viola, the OPA's finances rapidly approved, making a continued partnership a sensible move in the eyes of the association's leadership.

No other details on the contract were available at the time of the announcement.

this exercise," Ludwig replied.

Before exiting the meeting, Gulyas asked about the timing of when the mailers would be sent out and Ludwig said that a decision on whether to go forward with a hybrid annual meeting was holding up the process.

Through the whole (process) I've held that (online attendees) have to have some type of identification. They log onto Microsoft Teams and request to get in," Ludwig said. "We look up the information they put in there and make them turn their camera on and they have to show a picture ID.'

"I made them pay attention to the fact that in person, you have to have a picture ID. So online, they're going to have to do the same thing. I said I'm not going to put the Elections Committee at risk over that.'

Later in the meeting, the committee discussed duplicate ballots and Ludwig pointed out that any extra markings on ballots or envelopes will render the ballot invalid.

"If anybody blacks out their section number, we're not accepting that. Because we can't see if it's a duplicate," she said. "Why do we get duplicates from the same address? I don't get it."

"The sad thing is they don't realize that ... if we get a duplicate, we can go through and identify who sent those in. But we never do. We just discard the duplicate."

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National lifeguard shortage affects pool hours in Pines

(July 7, 2022) Like many organizations, the Ocean Pines Association has been affected by a nationwide shortage of lifeguards, and that has caused some changes to operating hours.

General Manager John Viola this week said the staff continually evaluates the situation to ensure pool members receive the expected value for their membership.

"We do strive to supply added benefits to our swim members, including exclusive members-only swim times on mornings at the Yacht Club and Sports Core pools, which we have publicized. We also admit members first upon opening, at all our pools," Viola said.

Viola said efforts to recruit and train new lifeguards have included offering higher wages, free training and certifications, and paid advertising for the positions. Despite those efforts, the Aquatics Department lifeguarding staff is at roughly 50 percent of what it needs to be to run five pools simultaneously.

"Because of that, several of our pools

are running on abbreviated hours, which we have communicated through weekly posts both online and at each pool. We do not anticipate the situation improving this summer, and we appreciate the patience of our homeowners and residents," Viola said.

Pool hours are updated weekly and communicated on the Ocean Pines website and social media, and in a direct email to more than 8,500 people. Hours are also posted at each pool.

In all cases, pool members are let in first when pools open. The Sports Core Pool offers members-only swimming hours from 6-10 a.m., Monday through Friday, and the Yacht Club Pool offers members-only swimming hours from 8-10 a.m. seven days a week, weather permitting.

"We will continue to explore every option to supply quality service and a safe environment for everyone at our five pools," Viola said.

OPVFD hosts town hall to talk about new South Station

(July 7, 2022) The Ocean Pines Volunteer Fire Department held a town hall on June 30 to discuss the upcoming renovations to the South Station.

A panel consisting of OPVFD President David VanGasbeck, OPVFD Chief Steve Grunwald and Gary Campbell, a public safety architect from contractor Manns Woodward Studios, anchored the gathering.

At the beginning of the meeting, Grunwald stressed how vital response time is in an age when homes and appliances in homes are built with materials that can enable fire to spread quickly.

Grunwald said it can take as little as five minutes for a fire to render a space unlivable from the time it is ignited.

"The importance of response is crucial when it comes to fires," he said.

In designing the firehouse, Campbell outlined several priorities to consider: first-responder health and safety; being sure the facility is recognized as a fire "house," as in people live there; providing decompression space m for firefighters to unwind

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after battling fires.

He also said the potential for growth must be considered along with establishing clear boundaries between public and private spaces.

Campbell said of the three basic types of firehouses — single-story, two-story and hybrid solutions each has its unique characteristics and requirements. Ocean Pines is leaning toward a hybrid solution.

"We just do not have the acreage for the footprint they need in a singlestory station."

The existing firehouse sits on a 1.34-acre property with 13 public parking spots, eight responder parking spots and three drive-through apparatus bays that exit directly onto See OPVFD Page 8

OPVFD, architect break down revamped South Station plan

The proposed design calls for new ADA-compliant parking and access at the public entrance, eight public parking spots, five responder parking spots, a new drive-through apparatus bay with a concrete response apron and four drive-through apparatus

On the lower level, the department is aiming for six individual bunk rooms and additional room for future overflow, four or five bathrooms, a kitchen and dining area and a couple of administrative offices. All living

The level will also include a decontamination area, which the station does not have. The inclusion of a decontamination area at the South Station would permit gear to be quickly cleaned after calls to hasten first re-

The upper level will be accessible

by stairs and elevator from the secure main entrance and include a training room, conference room, administrative offices and storage.

The exterior of the firehouse will feature a stone-base veneer with a cast-stone sill and cementitious siding panels.

The roof will be a standing seam metal roof. Openings include "highvisibility" bay doors and high-efficiency windows.

In April, after securing \$1.35 million in state funding, OPFD officials estimated they'd need approximately \$7 million for the project, with the Ocean Pines community footing about half of the bill.

The South Station, which was built in 1981 and totaled 3,200 square feet, had an addition in 1985 that included three apparatus bays and support areas totaling 4,200 square feet.

Lastly, in 1985 an additional 500 square feet was added to the site.

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Architectural Review Briefs

(July 7, 2022) The Ocean Pines Architectural Review Committee looked at the following appeals during its July 5 meeting:

Screened unit

The committee denied a request to allow a screened canopy to be used as living space on the deck of the residence at 23 Ivanhoe Court. In making the decision, committee chair John Dilworth told applicant John Fiori the basis for it.

"The only way that we can look at this — the only thing in the guidelines that comes anywhere near this is we have to consider this an alteration or an addition to the existing home (to pass it)," Dilworth said. "If you look at the alteration and existing home, there are specific design requirements that it has to be the same material as the house, same color, constructed in a way that adds and augments existing structure. It has to be permanently attached."

"So when we looked to see something to hang our hat on here ... what you have up there doesn't meet any of (those guidelines.) There's nothing that we can look into using the documents we use so that we can legitimately approve this thing. This is a temporary structure that you bought that can be taken up, put down, built like a tent, looks like a tent, made with material (used for tents). It's not permanent. You can't use it as living

space. That's really what it's coming down to. We have no other option to look to."

Detached garage

The committee approved an exception to allow a 9-foot driveway for a detached garage at 8 Crossbow Trail. Hurdles that applicants Mark and Marla Taylor needed to clear included a neighbor's drainage concerns, which Mark Taylor said was ultimately found to be "no issue whatsoever," and moving a 10 x 10-foot shed to another part of the yard.

Fence

The committee approved a request to install a 4-foot fence off the side property line at 8 Admiral Avenue. Applicant Joseph Crupi described the fence as "L-shaped." He said the reason he wants the fence off the property line, aside from cosmetics, is the presence of a gas line. "If I put it coming off the house and straight down, that's going to put the gas line between the fence and the hedges. God forbid something happens, we won't be able to get at it."

Deck construction

The committee approved a request to build a deck and handicap ramp that will extend beyond the 35-foot rear building restriction line by about seven feet at 3 Harpoon Road. A representative on behalf of applicant Kyle Colbert said the ramp has since been moved to the right side of the structure. Both the deck and ramp had been previously approved by Worcester County.






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'One-stop' maternal health, recovery Berlin campus open

(July 7, 2022) Individuals recovering from substance abuse and uninsured mothers-to-be need all the support they can get to get by in this world and later today, the public is invited to the grand opening of a groundbreaking one-stop-shop for some of society's most vulnerable, the H4R Recovery Campus in Berlin.

'It has been 15-hour days and a lot, a lot of work and prayers and loan and support from the board - Hope4Recovery. And we have a ton of community partners," said founder Tish Ottev.

According to a press release, the campus, located at 10226 Old Ocean City Boulevard, will house the Grace Center for Maternal and Women's Health, a nonprofit dedicated to providing services and programs to meet the needs of pregnant and parenting mothers; Worcester Goes Purple, an awareness project to engage the community in promoting healthy choices and preventing substance abuse; Hope4Recovery, the overseeing nonprofit that provides a safe, sober and structured living environment for those in recovery from substance use disorder; and Cove Recovery, an outpatient provider of substance abuse

treatment and mental health services on the lower Eastern Shore.

'We felt like we could provide more by bringing in Worcester Goes Purple," Ottev said. "We always wanted to have meetings on our campus. We were lucky enough to get Cove Recovery as another addictions counseling and mental health service. Which is desperately needed every day."

Though there are other recovery resources in the area, Ottey said what's truly remarkable about the campus is the breadth of services available.

"We have a treatment facility on site. Worcester Goes Purple is there and they help with resources, both education and financials. They help with getting birth certificates, social security cards, all the things that people in early recovery may not have but need," Ottey said.

"We have a research center, packets for resources around the area. We tend to have classes in the back space, so (people can learn) life skills (such as) how to prep taxes. We're bringing people in to help with those things.'

She added it wouldn't be unusual for families going to the Grace Center to find value in other parts of the campus.

"The Grace Center for Maternal Health is for women who don't have insurance. But commonly, some of their clients come with their baby's father, and sometimes they have a substance use disorder. Sometimes (these things) go hand-in-hand."

Ottey also stressed that the campus isn't simply for those in early recov-

ery. "Individuals out in the community attending AA and NA, this whole campus is at their fingertips," she said. "We're not aware of anything around here that is that type of onestop-shop to get help and resources."

The opening ceremony will feature a ribbon-cutting at 3:30 followed by tours of the facility. Light refreshments will be served.

Berlin Town Council Briefs

(July 7, 2022) The Berlin Town Council discussed the following at its June 27 meeting:

One-Day Liquor License

The council approved a special one-day permit to the Berlin Heritage Foundation and Taylor House Museum for an evening event that will serve alcohol on Aug. 14.

Councilman Jack Orris, who is a member of the foundation's board, said a similar event in early June was "extremely successful." The event, dubbed "Sundays at the Museum" will feature "music and fun at the Calvin B. Taylor House Museum," according to the town's website.

Lift station contract

The council approved a \$411,937 contract to TK Construction of Salisbury for upgrading the William Street pump station to meet confined space standards. The project is part of a larger town goal to evaluate and upgrade its water infrastructure.

Mutual aid

The council approved a mutual aid agreement between the Choptank Electric Cooperative and the Town of Berlin that stipulates that entities would help each other should either need assistance during emergency

service restoration, such as during or after a hurricane.

Orris suggested that the council invite a representative from the State Highway Administration to a meeting to answer questions. He said issues he'd like more information on local projects that involve signage, crosswalks and brick inlays in crosswalks

Mayor's report

Orris also suggested that the council bring back the mayor's report to the council.

"It doesn't have to be the magna carta, but just bullet points of happenings in town," Orris said. "People are concerned about crosswalks. I wasn't really aware until they came to me. Saw chatter on Facebook where there was information available that just hadn't gotten to us."

(July 7, 2022) Developers of Triple Crown Estates just south of Ocean Pines were given the thumbs up from Worcester County Commissioners to amend phase two of their plans with less units than originally proposed.

Property owners Steen Associates originally sought to construct 60 buildings on the 92-acre plot of land in two phases – the first phase consisted of 30 single family homes and the second consisted of 30 duplexes.

With the first phase already underway, the developer changed his plans to include 30 single family homes instead of duplexes in the second phase, cutting the number of units in half.

Jennifer Keener, the director of development, review, and permitting, told the commissioners this amendment is proposing to take 60 units, or 30 duplexes, down to 30 units, or 30 single family homes.

"We're just matching here," she said. "Same density as before. Just an expansion of the land area."

Zoning Administrator Kristen Tremblay said the development is located on 92 acres just north of Gum Point Road, South of Ocean Pines, and East of Racetrack Road. It is zoned R1, or rural residential, and RP, resource protection, as 90 acres are comprised of uplands, 1.25 acres are non-tidal

wetlands, and 0.2 acres are private tidal wetlands.

The property currently has approval for phase one, Tremblay said, and of the original 30 homes, several single-family building permits have been applied for. But they are all waiting on County Roads to approve roads that have been cleared, along with base and stabilization to be completed before issuing the permits.

Phase two was anticipated when Phase one was approved.

The development will include 47 acres of open space of which 32 acres will be natural and open, 3.5 set aside

for active recreation, and 11 for passive recreation.

There is also one point of access, which is an extension of King Richard Road in Ocean Pines.

On May 5, the County Planning Commission found the area is recommended by the comprehensive plan to include cluster or planned forms of development with a density of 1 unit per acre. The proposal presented for Triple Crown Estates has a density of 0.66 per acre, complying with the comprehensive plan recommendation.

The Planning Commission also found the project will not have an ad-



verse impact on local traffic and transportation patterns, Tremblay continued, will be provided with public water and sewage, and incorporates measures to improve water quality in sensitive tidal and nontidal areas.

Laura Parker, who lives near the development, questioned how adding 30 homes will not impact traffic and rain runoff, finding it unbelievable

The traffic in front of her house along Gum Point Road, she said, has increased three times over the last 10 years and drive by at ridiculous speeds.

As for rain runoff, Parker added, she was concerned that the runoff will already hurt the "already sick" Turville Creek.

Dennis Parker raised similar concerns.

"They're saying there's no impact?" he asked. "Invite the lawyer to sit there and try to make a left off of Gum Point Road."

Commissioner Joe Mitrecic acknowledged there were traffic issues in the area, as did Commissioner Chip Bertino.

The latter told the Parkers that he agreed 589 was dangerous and backs up. For the last eight years, Bertino said, the county has tried to get the state to widen the road, but nothing has been done and funding has not been made available.

Based on the findings presented by Tremblay, the Planning Commission recommended the applicant's request, but with two stipulations. The first was that if a utility easement being used by construction vehicles along Route 589 is proposed as an emergency access to the development, approval be obtained by the State Highway Administration.

The second stipulation was that fencing, and a gate be added along the accessible areas on Route 589, or Racetrack Road.

The commissioners closed the hearing and when put to a vote, Bertino motioned its approval based on the findings of fact. The final vote was 5-0 with Commissioners Diana Purnell and Bud Church absent.

MCBP completes horseshoe crab survey in coastal bays

(July 7, 2022) They're large, sturdy-looking, spiky and in an ominous shade of brownish-green, but a beachgoer would just as soon be injured in an attack by a rogue beachball than any encounter one might have with a horseshoe crab.

Around the coastal bays region, protecting them is a top priority for environmental organizations such as the Maryland Coastal Bays Program, which just completed a survey in conjunction with the Maryland Department of Natural Resources of these brackish-water arthropods during their spawning season.

"We go out to different sites at Assateague and Skimmer islands and we walk along hundred-meter transects," said Carly Toulan, an environmental scientist with MCBP. "Along them, we go one meter into the water from the high-tide line and count each horseshoe crab by sex. We do that until we reach the end of the



100-meter transect."

Toulan added that the survey typically entails two volunteers counting and will use the average if there is a slight disparity in the two counts, but recount if the difference is great.

"In addition to counting and sexing the horseshoe crabs, we count any dead horseshoe crabs along that beach whether, in the transect or not, just to gain an understanding of how many dead are in that area," she said.

Typically around six volunteers help and Toulan said the half dozen on tap have been helping MCBP for years and thus are familiar with where and how to conduct the survey.

"For this program specifically, the importance (of these volunteers) is being able to cover more ground and survey more areas," Toulan said. "We wouldn't be able to get as many survey sites and conduct as many surveys as we do without the volunteers."

Data from the 2022 survey won't be available until the fall, but Toulan said so far indications are there won't be much variance from the 2021 survey.

"The population has been steady, which is really good," she said. "We haven't seen any major declines but also we haven't seen any drastic increase. which is good. We want steady and stable. We've been conducting this survey since 2002 in the coastal bays and populations have been steady since. it's really great and it's looking like it'll be consistent this year as well."

The survey didn't extend to the very end of the spawning season, which may prompt MCBP to get back out in the surf in July to see just how long the spawning season lasts, Toulan said.

There was also an addition to MCBP's attention to horseshoe crabs this year with the stranded horseshoe crab recovery team, a group of nearly three dozen volunteers that monitors four different locations for stranded horseshoe crabs that they can safely

remove and put back into the water.

While the survey isn't in need of more volunteers, Toulan said the recovery team is always looking for help.

Protecting horseshoe crabs is vital for three main reasons, Toulan said. First is human health the horseshoe crab's. Their blue blood can be harvested to create Limulus amebocyte lysate, which is used to test injectable drugs to make sure they're safe and

that no endotoxins are present.

"Any injectable drug or vaccine you've had will have been tested with horseshoe crab blood to make sure it's safe," Toulan said. "There is a whole biomedical industry revolving around the horseshoe crab."

Secondly, ecologically speaking, horseshoe crabs are vitally important at this time of year because their eggs are a main source of food for dozens of different fish, birds, mammals and

reptiles. For instance, the endangered red knot shorebird stops over in this region on its great migration from South America to the Arctic Circle and depends on the eggs to plump up and store the energy needed to complete their flight, Toulan said.

Thirdly, she added that they're used as whelk and eel bait, giving them importance to local fisheries.

And, again, as Toulan points out, horseshoe crabs are not dangerous.

"It's really important that people know that," she said. "They can't hurt you. They don't pinch, sting or bite. (If helping a stranded horseshoe crab) the proper way to hold it is by the sides of its shell. Never pick it up by the tail, which is very sensitive and very fragile. If that tail breaks, it'll hinder the horseshoe crab's ability to move and flip over if it gets stuck on its back."

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Residents want Worcester to put ARPA funds toward high-speed connections

(July 7, 2022) The Worcester County Commissioners turned to the public when looking for ways to spend \$8.7 million of American Rescue Plan Act money funds sitting in limbo, and the majority of those who spoke during the over 1-hour hearing on June 21 pushed for fast and reliable internet.

The county has received \$10,154,000 in ARPA funds - half was received in 2021 and the other half should be coming soon – and up until last month, \$3,487,000 was to go toward a sewer project on Lewis Road, Maryland Broadband Cooperative, Riddle Farm Wastewater Treatment Plant, and a grant match with broadband provider Talkie.

The county set aside as much as \$2 million for the grant match with Talkie, but that grant fell through, according to Chief Administrator Weston Young.

Now the county has \$8,667,000 to put toward public sector revenue loss allowance, public health, and economic response, restoring and sup-



porting public sector capacity, premium pay for essential workers, and water, sewer, and broadband infrastructure.

Commissioner Ted Elder told the commissioners just before opening the public hearing that he wanted to see most of the money go toward broadband because it is something the county needs "desperately." The commissioner was not alone.

said access to reliable internet should available be as much as electrical power is to resi-She dents. explained that during the covid-19 pandemic, her schoolaged children were unable to do homework from home because the farmhouse they live in

does not have broadband. Instead, Richardson would take her children up to Snow Hill and other areas with better internet so

they could do homework. 'This has to be a big priority," she told the commissioners, adding she should not have to choose where they live based on the availability of internet service.

Along with being a mother, Richardson is also a nurse and she said she has turned down job offers because of the lack of a hardwired internet connection to her home.

Richardson has spent years in pursuit of some sort of internet for her home, which has been in the family for six generations.

"We're out in the sticks," she said. In 2019, Choptank Electric Cooperative proposed bringing internet to all its customers, and at the time, the company said 36 percent of Maryland residents, most of whom live on the Eastern Shore, do not have internet service that meets Federal Communication Commission Standards.

Richardson said when Choptank

proposed bringing fiber to every resident in the county, she was relieved and elated.

"Having a hardwired internet connection would be amazing," she said.

But rather than partner with Choptank, Worcester County chose to contract with Talkie.

During the public hearing, Young said the county put out a request for proposals to find a broadband provider and of the two companies

that submitted proposals, Talkie was the only one that said it would actively pursue grants.

Grants commonly come with stipulations that the county would have to match a percentage, and Young said

that would be the best way to use the ARPA funds.


Richardson was not alone in feeling slighted when it came to the county choosing not to work with Choptank.

Stacey Hart owns a home and a business in Snow Hill and told the commissioners she lives in a black hole. She explained that she once triggered a fire alarm when changing the batteries in her smoke detector, and when the fire marshal arrived, he was unable to contact the department and advise it of the situation.

In Hart's 18 years of living in Snow Hill, her internet has been provided by four different companies - all of which were "unreliable." Hart said she believes she has exhausted all her options.

Internet is a necessity, she said, as most communication systems rely on that technology. Medical offices require internet to make appointments, she added, as do many companies in the service industry.

Hart said the county needs to allow for more affordable options for broadband in Snow Hill, because the







more options, the better.

John Bruning, the chairman of the Farm Bureau, told the county he did not think Talkie was the best option, with only 18 hookups to date.

Christina Parada, another Snow Hill resident, said she agreed with everything everyone said about the need for internet.

She said of her five children, two graduated from Snow Hill and suffered greatly during the pandemic because of the lack of broadband. Parada also criticized the commissioners for not having a committee investigate the pursuit of reliable internet.

Commissioner Jim Bunting kicked back, though, saying it was not as if they were sitting and not doing anything about it.

Responding to questions about why the county did not choose Choptank, Bunting said the company was going to put 50 percent of the fiber on poles, while advisors said they should go underground. He also said the county is aware of all the areas where there is no broadband or reliable internet.

"We need it. Everyone knows this," Dave Bruning said.

Dave also said he feels like Chop-

tank was left out of the process and meetings.

Commissioner Joe Mitrecic told Bruning that Talkie was offered Rural Digital Opportunity Funds, or RDOF, where Choptank was not. RDOF, he added, means the county can get grants.

Choptank, according to Mitrecic, could do the project for \$38 million, but wanted a check up front. The company never mentioned pursuing grants to help pay for the project.


"That's why the county went with Talkie," he said. "They had the right to the RDOF funds, Choptank did not."

Roger Richardson, who lives on Old Furnace Road near Eden, said Somerset has broadband all the way to the county line.

Somerset got the same information as Worcester in terms of matching funds for the project.

"Somewhere along the line, I feel like Worcester County needs to wake up and get with it," Richardson said.

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OP Golf Members' Council announces '22 scholarships

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This summer's Ocean Pines Association election could result in a significant change in the composition of the board of directors, considering that six candidates are vying for the board's three open seats.

That's the sort of thing that politically aware association members might find unsettling. After all, the uneven history of the board has shown that new directors sometimes challenge the status quo, while first-time re-elected members have occasionally viewed their victories as a mandate to assume a more aggressive role in board affairs.

Property owners should not fret unnecessarily, however, as a major component of the status quo will remain intact — the association's proven management.

By urging General Manager John Viola to rescind his resignation and sign a new two-year contract, the current board has assured the community that no matter how the election turns out, association operations will continue to function smoothly.


It may not be a first, but it is one of the few times in recent years when a new board is seated with a trusted and well-respected general manager in place. That advantage alone eliminates one source of possible friction between directors, as no one can dispute that Viola, his department heads and association employees have been making things work financially and operationally.

Obviously, all administrations have their critics for one reason or another, but it's impossible to argue that the community would be better off were the directors to continue to pursue — and argue over — a new general manager who can do what's already being done.

The word this spring was that all Viola needed to stay on for another stint was to be asked. It's impossible to know when the directors realized that, but they did and made the right call at the right time. Now association members can await the election results secure in the knowledge that the operational wheels will keep on turning as they have been.

Seared lamb with Alabama white sauce

(Reprint from July 9, 2020) Is there anything better than a hunk of fresh fish or a freshly seared



a freshly seared steak to bring a smile to your face?

I mean, unless you are a vegan, something I greatly admire, there is something so satiating about a beautiful

satiating about a beautiful piece of meat adorning a simple plate.

Last week, I ran across an online store selling Australian lamb loin. It is such a beautiful cut of meat, and I remember it fondly.

Truth be told, it was not unusual for me to take a small snip off the end of the loin as we were plating up.

Snacks are a critical benefit for the cook. Rather, I guess I can say that it was quality control. After all, I needed to ensure that we were serving the best product possible.

So, having received the loin yesterday, it was time to just get a little old fashioned with it.

We're talking well-spiced, seared in a cast iron pan, over fire.

The main difference is that in years past, I've coated the loin in ras el hanout, the ubiquitous Moroccan spice blend. Today, I just hit it with my own simple blend.

At the restaurant, we serve a basil puree with our seafood risotto (which was removed from the menu due to this silly pandemic and staffing issues) and sometimes with steak specials.

It is a loose play on a chimichurri, but it is more accurate to call it a puree. We also use it on the Caprese salad, as I have never been a fan of raw basil leaves with fresh tomato.

The puree is a natural fit with the lamb, and if you have never made it, take the time, especially if you have a basil bush in the backyard, as many of us do.

As for the Alabama White BBQ Sauce, something else that we have always had at the restaurant, it goes exceedingly well with any of your meats, whether they be smoked or grilled. It also pairs well with smoked fish.

The final tip in this stimulating tome is from famed French chef Fernand Point from 60 years ago, with a small twist.

An eternal prankster, his short book Ma Gastronomie is a wonderful tribute to his work, and the foreword



by Chef Paul Bocuse was exceptional. Point had a local fisherman friend whose boat he hid once a year on the man's birthday, one year even hiding it up in a tree.

The year before Point's death, on said anniversary, the fisherman looked high and low all throughout the town. He looked for hours.

Exhausted, he pleaded to Point to learn the whereabouts of his boat. Point had not touched it. It was right in the slip, where he left it. Man, I love that story.

And the tip has nothing to do with a boat or pranks. It simply comes from Chef Point. And the tip is to use half clarified butter and half oil, the latter which raises the flash point.

That's it. Super simple. And if there is anything that will elevate a seared chunk of meat, it is going to be the proper fat in which to cook it.

Seared Lamb Loin, Cracked Pepper Spice

per person

- 1 ea. 8 oz. lamb loin 1 Tbsp. Vegetable oil
- 1 Tbsp. Clarified butter
- 1 Tbsp. Cracked Pepper Spice
- (recipe follows) 2 oz. Basil puree (recipe follows)
- 2 oz. Alabama White BBQ sauce (recipe follows)
 - Pat the loin(s) dry when ready to

sear. Season with the cracked pepper spice and allow to sit for about 15 minutes at room temperature

• Heat oil and butter in a cast iron pan until hot

• Carefully place the seasoned loin on the oil and cook for 2 $\frac{1}{2}$ minutes

• Assuring that you have a good crust after this time, turn the loin over and remove the pan from the flame. It will continue to cook due to the residual heat stored in the cast iron

• Check the temperature, as it should be at a perfect medium rare. If it's ready, allow it to rest for a few minutes

• Remove from pan, slice and serve with the sauces, drizzling any pan drippings on the meat

Cracked Pepper Spice

makes 1 cup

- 1/2 c. Large flake kosher or sea salt
- 2 Tbsp. Cracked black pepper corns
- 2 Tbsp. Granulated garlic
- 2 Tbsp. Onion powder
- 1 Tbsp. Thyme
- 1 Tbsp. Smoked paprika

• Combine all ingredients well and set aside in an airtight container until ready to use

Basil Puree

makes about a pint

A large handful of basil leaves, with a small amount of stem

1 c. EV Olive oil

- 1 c. Good red wine vinegar
- Salt & Pepper, to taste

• Blend everything today, adjusting the seasoning at the end

• Refrigerate until ready to use. It will be light in color, as you have just incorporated a great deal of air into it. As it settles, it will turn a deep green

Alabama White BBQ Sauce

- makes about a quart
- 2 c. Duke's Mayonnaise
- 3 Tbsp. Sour cream
- 2 Tbsp. White vinegar
- 1 tsp. Ground black pepper
- 2 tsp. Granulated garlic 2 Tbsp. Coarse ground mustard
- 1/2 tsp. Sugar
- Salt, as needed
- 2 Tbsp. Horseradish

• Combine everything with a whisk and refrigerate until ready to use. This is better when it gets to sit overnight or so






